

Window dressing

In many ways a window is your room's greatest asset. Windows can provide a focal point to the room. A dressed window will alter the acoustics of a room, making an otherwise echoing space feel more cosy. Crucially and not surprisingly windows determine the amount of natural light in a room, be it a natural wash of energising sunshine, filtered and diffused through voile or dramatic shadows cast by Venetian blinds.

Curtains are an extremely versatile dressing offering a whole host of different headings from casual tab top and contemporary eyelet to the more classical hand sewn pinch pleats and goblet pleats. Pelmets can provide drama to a window and an element of formality whereas a valance or a flop over frill will look less formal. Full length curtains will always look more elegant than sill length.

Roman blinds are a popular and relatively cost effective alternative to curtains. Fitted within the recess they will block out a certain amount of light, so it may well be a better option to have them fitted outside the recess. Roller blinds are available in an expansive range of colours and textures these days, no longer the bland option they once were. Hard window treatments such as Venetian blinds come in a wide range of wooden and metallic finishes – perfect for kitchens, bathrooms and home offices. The wider slats of a Colonial blind will give you the look of shutters but for a fraction of the price.

When using pattern, consider the scale in relation to the size of the window. A small pattern on full length curtains may be lost. Some patterns with a small horizontal repeat may look quite different when made up into curtains since when drawn the pleat of the curtain will throw forward part of the design and at the same time hide another. A three colour stripe for instance can appear quite two-tone if one of the stripes is hidden when the curtains are pulled back. This is not to say that it's wrong to do this but it may produce an effect that you don't want so it's worth giving it some thought. Window treatments can be a really effective way of restoring the proportions of a window. By using a longer pole and dressing the curtains back off the window an overly tall window can appear wider. Conversely you can achieve the illusion of height by fitting a pelmet to a short and wide window.

There is no one way to dress a window but some treatments will work better than others and getting it right is crucial to the success of a scheme.

Fergus Garrett talks to Lindfield Horticultural Society



THE NAME FERGUS Garrett will be familiar to most keen gardeners as the Head Gardener at Great Dixter at Northiam in East Sussex, a paradise for plant lovers. Fergus worked closely with the late great Christopher Lloyd, whose family home was Great Dixter, and appeared in television programmes with him. He has carried on Christopher Lloyd's ideas and philosophy in the gardens, particularly with regard to planting and the use of dramatic colour combinations.


This was Fergus's second visit to Lindfield and the event in the King Edward Hall was a sell-out! His talk was entitled Continuous Colour in the Mixed Border and he began by explaining what was meant by that. Everything can be included – trees, shrubs, perennials, biennials, annual bedding plants and climbers. Of course in our own gardens we do not have six acres surrounding a fifteenth-century manor house to play with but the principles remain the same. They can just be applied on a smaller scale. There are plenty of smaller evergreen shrubs, for example, to provide focal points in all seasons.

Fergus emphasised the need to start with strong healthy plants in good soil with plenty of nutrients, mostly derived from compost. Creating a border should be like composing a picture, with plants of different shapes and sizes that provide visual contrasts with each other. Foliage of different textures will also provide interest. 'Hot spots' can be strategically placed large plants or shrubs which work throughout the year. With slides of Great Dixter in winter, Fergus showed that even then a garden will be



attractive if size and shape have been taken into account – although Dixter's dramatic topiary wouldn't fit into the average suburban garden!

The key to achieving continuous colour lies in underplanting, so that as some plants which flower early in the season die down, larger plants grow over them and provide further interest. As an example, Fergus showed how snowdrops can be succeeded by hostas. Daffodils and other later spring bulbs work well and can be succeeded by taller perennials. Inter-planting will also be effective, with plants such as verbena bonariensis or teasels appearing randomly in a border – although self-seeders like these need to be kept under control and thinned out if necessary. Climbers such as late-flowering clematis can clamber through a shrub which has finished flowering to give late-season interest. If the clematis is a tangutica such as Bill McKenzie it will also reward you with fluffy seed heads which will last well into the winter.

Tall verbascums, with their elegant spires and grey-green foliage, are another feature of Dixter borders. Grasses will add a gentler structure and can be left over the winter to glisten with hoar frost.


He suggested searching out plants which do several things. Maybe they have attractive foliage, followed by flowers, followed by interesting seed-heads or autumn colour. A cornus alba elegantissima (a dogwood) makes an attractive feature in a border with its variegated leaves during the summer and dramatic red wood in winter. Similarly, look for plants with a long flowering season, such as rudbeckias or heleniums. Some geraniums will only flower for three weeks, while others - such as Rosanne or Russell Prichard - will go on for months. The phormium tricolor produces dramatic tall flower spikes in the summer while others, such as phormium tenax, have architectural leaves but do not flower. The Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit is given to plants following extensive trials - some of these can be seen in progress at Wisley. The award indicates a particularly good variety so look out for the letters AGM on plant labels in the garden centre.


Perennials which come up reliably every year give good value in a border, although they will still need splitting or thinning out every couple of years. Taller varieties may need staking, which needs to be done in as naturalistic a way as possible. Annual plants at Great Dixter are not set out separately in 'beds' but integrated into

the planting scheme. They complement the perennials by adding colour and filling in gaps. They can be used to vary the colour contrasts from year to year.

Apart from the garden, the ancient manor house, which Lloyd's father Nathaniel restored and to which Lutyens added a wing, is well worth a visit. The

garden has a nursery whose very extensive stock list is also available from the website. After Christopher Lloyd died, the future of Great Dixter was uncertain but with a £4 million grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and contributions from other donors (including the public) the Great Dixter Charitable Trust is now in a position to secure full ownership of the Great Dixter Estate. If you haven't been there yet, it's certainly worth a visit.

IF YOU DON'T know her name, you'll certainly recognise her face if you're ever out and about in the village around school drop off or pick up times. Village People this month features Val Joyner, one of our three regular school crossing patrols or, to most people, a lollipop lady. But Val's story this month coincides with a Royal Invitation, as she has been invited to one of Her Majesty's Garden Parties at Buckingham Palace in recognition of her service to our community for well over 25 years.

It was when her two daughters were at school that Val took on a job at the then Lindfield Infants School as a dinner lady. During her time there she heard of the opportunity to become a lollipop lady and decided to take on the challenge. Twenty-seven years later, she's still doing it. Back when she began, she had three days training from the local traffic warden and then was on her own. She recalls how nervous she felt on that first day, stepping out for the first time, hoping that the cars would stop. Now all our school crossing patrols are trained and supervised by West Sussex County Council, who employ them, and regularly update them on changes in the law relating to their work.

The School Crossing Patrol Service was first introduced in the UK in the 1950s as part of The London Traffic (Children Crossing Traffic Notices) Law in 1953. This Act allowed any person authorised by the Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police to stop traffic using an official traffic sign (the lollipop) to allow children to cross the road. It wasn't until 2000 that the law changed and the responsibility for school crossing patrols moved to local authorities. In 2001 a further change to the law meant that school crossing patrols were given the power to stop traffic to enable anyone across the road, not just children. The official lollipop has also been changed over

the years, with the word children most recently being replaced with a universal symbol. The black strip across the centre of the sign was intended for crossing patrols to be able to write on it in chalk the registration details of any vehicle not stopping. Further changes are currently being piloted across the UK, including West Sussex, with the introduction of high tech lollipops that contain a tiny video camera capable of recording details of incidents and the unacceptable behaviour of drivers that some crossing patrols encounter. In 2007 around 1400 incidents involving lollipop men and women were reported to councils. Failure to stop for a school crossing patrol can lead to a £1,000 fine and 3 penalty points on a driving license. It's a serious business but one that Val clearly still enjoys. "You've really got to concentrate, it's not just about stopping the traffic, you've got to know where the children are and keep them back until it's safe to cross" says Val. "There are more children going to school on bikes and scooters these days too, so you've really got to keep your eye on them. By law, children are not allowed to cycle across


the road, so it's about educating the children and parents too". Val and the other crossing patrols often visit local nurseries to introduce preschool children to road safety.

As you may imagine, a lot has changed in her time. There are far more cars on the road that seem to travel a lot faster and children that she once used to see across the road are now crossing with her again as mums and dads with their own children. Her spot on Lewes Road tends to have a lot of larger lorries passing down it now. Her original orange uniform has been replaced with the familiar hi-visibility yellow and the job used to include switching on the lights at the crossing points with a long stick, but now they are automated. For Val though, it's the contact with the children and their parents that she really enjoys. Many cross with her over a number of years so she builds up quite a rapport with them and many of the children are keen to tell her their news or show off a new pair of shoes. She's often received gifts, cards and letters of thanks, not just from the children, but also from a driver that she regularly saw who thanked her for cheering her day with her constant smile. Particularly when the junior school was still located on Lewes Road, Val found herself providing more than a safe place to cross. She'd spend much time listening to mums and was often still to be seen by the side of the road at 10am. She loves it when the 'grown up' children come and visit her and tell her what they're studying at university or what job they now do. "It's funny to think of that little boy who was always late for school now being a pilot!" she recalls.



With a relatively short day to fill between the school drop off and pick up times, Val and her husband like to visit local National Trust properties. She also 'oversees' their garden at home and enjoys time with her daughters and grandchildren. When children leave the primary school, many of them may still see Val in one of her other roles as an exam invigilator.

It's quite a commitment that Val has undertaken for all these years. She's out there come rain or shine, twice a day. "The school holidays are a perk though" laughs Val, "it could be thought of as a mundane job but contact with the children and the mums make it a really happy job." All that's left now is to find the right outfit for the Royal Garden Party – leave the hi-visibility jacket at home this time Val!

HAVING SEEN HER stunning collection of silver jewellery at a local craft show, I eagerly accepted an invitation to meet local designer Debbie Smith at her workshop in Lindfield. Nestled deep within her leafy garden, I discovered a wonderful place where students can learn her intricate craft and discover how to produce beautiful and unique pieces of silver jewellery from their own designs.



My eye was immediately drawn to an old wooden bench, probably made from solid oak over 200 years ago, which came from the Cartier workshop in London. It was well worn and covered with markings from craftsmen who had clearly spent many hours grinding, pummelling, piercing, hammering and polishing a variety of precious metals, humbly transforming each special piece into a magnificent work of art . I began to realise this was an old and well respected craft and very little had changed in the way that jewellery had been made over the years. The same skills, materials and tools are still being used and handed down today.

The three students I met have been keen followers of Debbie for the past 18 months and I was greeted with their wonderful creative energy. They were proudly wearing pieces they had made and it was a joy to watch them working, using a variety of skills they had learnt. Their journey began with Debbie's 6 week beginner's course and having become truly hooked, they went on to complete the improver's course and now meet each week for a three hour session to create some wonderful pieces of jewellery and enjoy the special friendship they have made.

As a student herself Debbie completed a four year diploma course in Jewellery, Silversmithing and Allied Crafts at the Sir John Cass School of Art at London Metropolitan University and worked in the trade for over 15 years before becoming self employed. She



learnt her trade as an assistant designer, by 'sitting at the bench', learning the ropes and delving into each and every area of the jewellery business. Costume jewellery was her speciality and she worked for a number of top end manufacturers designing collections of jewellery for a fast growing market. Having recently completed a Post Graduate Teaching Certificate in Art and Design, Debbie now shares her passion for jewellery design and making with those who are willing to learn. The large garage in

her garden was converted five years ago into a state of the art studio, fully equipped with a comprehensive collection of tools.

Each course is designed to accommodate up to five students, which guarantees that each participant gets plenty of personal support. As well as the beginner's course where students are encouraged to complete one special piece to take away at the end, Debbie also offers one day 'taster courses'. The improver's course is longer (usually 10 weeks) and begins with a great day out in London, touring Hatton Garden and visiting a variety of suppliers in order to source components which are known as 'findings'. Serious devotees are encouraged to visit galleries and museums such

as the V&A in London and optional trips are organised for those who seek further inspiration.

I thoroughly enjoyed my visit. It was great to see ideas being lifted off a page and silver being lovingly shaped into bold and interesting pieces that expressed the moods and feelings of each maker. What wonderful therapy!

On foot in Lindfield


THIS MONTH we are staying close to home and exploring the village on foot. There are many public footpaths in and around Lindfield that give you different views of the village than the ones that you're more used to seeing. The Lindfield Life team have been exploring a few paths that start from the High Street and that provide short walks suitable for all who fancy a bit of a stroll. For those who want to go the extra mile (or more!) then there are several circular walks starting and finishing from the High Street. This time we're focusing on a walk that should take around 1½ hours, so if you're feeling up to the challenge you can do the whole route, if not you can just do part of it. It's a great time of year for an early evening stroll now that the days are longer and a bit warmer. If you want to see what's in store before you head off, why not check out the satellite view on Google Maps?! So make up a flask and pack a snack, invite a friend and off you go...

The start of this walk, heading out of the west side of the village, begins on a path that can be found tucked away between the High Street houses opposite Church Cottage, by Little Blacklands, near the parish church. It



is signposted from the road and takes you through a cluster of stone houses that once used to be a school. Follow the driveway to the right and the public footpath is accessed through a kissing gate. It's a bit of a narrow path (watch out for nettles) and the gate makes it unsuitable for pushchairs but the route can be picked up by joining the same path a little farther along by heading up Finches Lane instead. This narrow path runs behind The Welkin,

then joins with Finches Lane. Turn right at the next gate and follow the wide path down the hill. This is certainly suitable for an all-terrain pushchair and provides a great



path for kids to explore and spot some wildlife and wild flowers. For those wanting only a short stroll, this path ends at the driveway to Kenwards Farm, so turn around here and enjoy it a second time on the way back! Follow all the way to Hickmans Lane playing field this time and enjoy some time watching any sporting activities that may be taking place for a while. For those wanting more than a stroll, continue up Kenwards Farm drive and turn right on to High Beech Lane. Do take care walking the short distance along this road as cars travel at some speed and we wouldn't recommend it with young children. If you cross over, there is just about enough space to walk on the verge rather than the road. After only about 100m turn left into Copyhold Lane, and although a quieter lane, continue to take care as you follow this road until you reach a lay-by and a footpath that crosses the road.





Taking the path on the right (towards River's Farm) will eventually bring you to Ardingly Reservoir, perhaps a walk for another day as it's here that we take the path on the left, through another kissing gate and over the line of the abandoned railway (marked on an OS map but not so easy to identify on the ground).

After a short up hill walk

through the woods, the path enters Haywards Heath Golf Course. The instructions as you follow this public footpath between the holes is to keep walking, don't stop to loiter and watch out for golf balls moving at high velocity! If like me you're not a golfer, wandering through this beautiful course may whet your appetite to give the game a go. Half way across the course you pass through a cluster of trees and from the safety of the trees we saw

several golfers and a brave squirrel making his way across the path of some of those high velocity balls! The last stretch of the golf course passes the end of the driving range, with a high fence stopping any long hits crossing the public right of way.

As you leave the course, the route returns to a wooded footpath. Even after a lot of sunshine it was still quite damp and we were fortunate enough to spot a lovely frog wallowing in a muddy puddle. Along this stretch of the route, listen out for the trains; the London to Brighton line runs out of Haywards Heath towards the Balcombe Viaduct on this side of Lindfield. Keep to this path until you reach Wickham Farm, then turn left and remain on this fairly narrow path until you appear from what appears to be a hidden path by the roundabout at the end of Sunte Avenue. It's your choice from here how you return to the High Street down Sunte Avenue, right at The Witch Inn (perhaps stopping off for refreshments as you pass) and then left into Denmans Lane; or left down the hill and through By Sunte, Finches Park Road and over Hickmans Lane playing fields and onto the High Street to finish in one of the coffee shops with a well-deserved slice of cake.

Denmans Lane Public Toilets



FLUSHED WITH PRIDE, members of the Parish Council officially re-opened the Denmans Lane public toilets on 29 May after a complete refurbishment by Premier Hygienic Ltd. The Parish Council took this facility over in 2007 from Mid Sussex District Council to save it from being closed. The toilets were in a poor condition, did not meet the current DDA requirements and really let the village down especially considering that these are the only public toilets in Lindfield for visitors to use. Lindfield deserves the best so we have now spent £66,000 on upgrading the toilets and we no longer feel ashamed of them. The work involved completely gutting the building, opening up the north face and inserting three self contained modules. Sam and Matt who did most of the work on behalf of Premier Hygienic Ltd thoroughly enjoyed working on this project and particularly enjoyed the interest shown by people passing by, many of whom stopped to chat to them. We now have a gents' and a ladies' cubicle plus a spacious disabled cubicle, all with direct access. The disabled toilet is accessible via a RADAR key. Baby changing surfaces and nappy bins have been provided in each of the cubicles. Unfortunately unforeseen problems do arise with major projects such as this and the work took longer than originally anticipated. We hope you will all think our luxurious lavatories are well worth the wait. Any comments on the condition of the toilets should be made to the Parish Office and these will then be raised with the contractors responsible for cleaning and maintenance.

SPRING CLEAN



OUR ANNUAL Spring Clean event on the morning of Saturday 15 April was a great success. We had about 35 volunteers out in the Village, clearing litter (approximately 24 bags of it) washing down posts and litter bins and cutting off the basal growth on the High Street trees. As an added bonus this year WSCC Highway Rangers came along and cleaned the white gates at the northern entrance to the village and the large signs at the other approaches into Lindfield as well as cleaning other street furniture and helping with the work on the trees. SERCO gave us their support by providing sacks and gloves and two large bins for the bags of rubbish. We ended the morning with a simple lunch in the King Edward Hall. Our thanks to SERCO, the Highway Rangers and to all of the volunteers, including a group of children from Blackthorns School with their parents who did a sterling job cleaning the posts on the Common and round the Pond.

Civic Service

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome Civic guests and representatives of local organisations at the annual Civic Service on 17 May at All Saints Church. The Service was led by Canon Dr. James Clarke, with an inspiring sermon on Community from Reverend Charles Martin and intercessions led by Parish Councillor Rev. Michael Davies, both from the United Reformed Church. The Lessons were read by Councillor Mrs. Margaret Johnson (WSCC) and Parish Council Chairman Will Blunden. For Margaret and her husband Derrick, this was their last Lindfield Civic Service, as our local Member on West Sussex County Council and Parish Councillor respectively, as they were to retire from their Council roles in June. Their many years of dedicated service were gratefully acknowledged and Canon Clarke wished them both well for their retirement on behalf of the Lindfield community.

Core Strategy - Extraordinary Meeting

Lindfield Parish Council and Lindfield Rural Parish Council held a joint Extraordinary Meeting on 22 April. to raise public awareness of the proposal to include site "K" (land between Gravelye Lane and Scamps Hill) as a development site of 550 or more new dwellings in Mid Sussex District Council's Core Strategy, which is a significant policy document of the Local Development Framework. The meeting was very well attended by over 100 people who heard a very clear explanation by Planning Consultant Dereck Wade of planning policy and the process leading to approval of large scale new development. Mr. Wade stressed the importance of engaging with the District Council at the appropriate time to get maximum benefit for the local community from any development by means of legal agreements between developers and the Local Planning Authority. John Jesson of the Lindfield Preservation Society spoke about the likely impact development on this scale would have on the village, particularly in terms of the increase in traffic. After Mr. Wade and Mr. Jesson set the scene, a lively open session followed. Cllr. Will Blunden, Chairman of Lindfield Parish said that Lindfield was being expected to take most of the new homes expected of Mid Sussex and the policy makers should be made to recognise Lindfield as a village and not part of "Greater Haywards" Heath". Inclusion of site K in the adopted Core Strategy will establish a policy for developing this land and the principle of the development cannot then be used as a reason for objecting to planning applications from developers. It is therefore of the utmost importance to send in comments during the consultation period for any of the Local Development Framework documents.

Calling all landowners

The Parish Council has a duty to provide allotment plots when there is a demand for them. We currently have a waiting list of 59 people for plots on the Denmans Lane Allotment Site which is divided into 55 of plots or part plots so the wait is going to be a long one for many of those anxious to grow their own vegetables. The Parish Council does not own any other land to convert to allotments, so we have to consider the options open to us. We would be very interested to talk to any landowners in or close to the Lindfield Urban Parish who might have any ideas that could help us meet the demand.

Summer Parish Walk

Last year for Sussex Day, Chairman Will Blunden led a leisurely walk with information about points of interest along the way. This was greatly enjoyed by the 20 people who took part, several of whom asked for a repeat performance so Councillor Blunden is planning to get out his walking boots again on Saturday 25 July for another stroll in our beautiful surrounding countryside. Details will be on the Parish Council notice board nearer the time.

Trees

The Parish Council's Environment and Amenities Committee has agreed to the recommendations from a meeting with officers of WSCC and MSDC, regarding the future maintenance of the High Street and Compton Road trees. The trees in Compton Road that were not pollarded in the winter of 2006/07 will be done later this year, except for the two at the entrance to Compton Road from Hickmans Lane, one of which is not a lime and the other is to be left to balance it. The previously pollarded trees will be repollarded so that the whole road will be dealt with at the same time in the future. WSCC are only able to fund pollarding every four years, so to get the trees repollarded every three years the Parish Council will budget for the additional years. The High Street trees will be monitored during the current season and a maintenance programme as for Compton Road will then be considered.

Welcome

Councillor Mrs. Christine Field has recently been elected as our new County Councillor. We look forward to working with Councillor Field in trying to achieve the best we can for Lindfield.

Starting School?

FOR SOME of the younger members of our community July brings the end of an era. Nursery, playgroup or pre-school days are over, as in the autumn term they will be starting at big school. Lindfield Life has been looking into what being in reception class is all about and Steve Davis from Blackthorns School shares his tips on what parents can do to prepare their young ones. We've been

out and about talking to parents of children at

Lindfield and Blackthorns schools to get their top tips, after all, they've already been through it - and survived!

The most important thing to remember is that every child is different. The youngest in the class may only just be four years old when they start, but there may be others who are almost a whole year older. The

Well done! reception class can be thought of as an

extension of pre-school as it follows the government guidance that is set out in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS). It acknowledges that the environment plays a key role in supporting and extending a child's learning and development and that children do this in different ways and at different rates. There is an emphasis on learning through both planned and spontaneous play, which is relevant and motivating to each child. There are six areas of learning and development outlined in the EYFS. Theses are listed below, but if you want to find out more then you can download a copy at www.standards. dfes.gov.uk/eyfs

- 1. Personal, social and emotional development
- 2. Communication, language and literacy
- 3. Problem solving, numeracy and reasoning
- 4. Knowledge and understanding of the world
- 5. Physical development
- 6. Creative development

So here are top tips from Steve, an experienced reception teacher, on preparing for the first day:

- 1. Walk to school with your child. Stand outside and talk about the building and about the playground and playtime.
- 2. Talk about the different activities that will go on in school, including older siblings and relatives where possible.
- 3. If you know any children who go to the school, try to get together and talk about school life.
- 4. Begin to work in a routine that will fit in with school e.g. the same bedtime, getting up early so that you and your child do not have to rush and can feel calm and relaxed.
- 5. Practice getting dressed in their uniform and PE kit so that they feel familiar with their new clothes.



Here are ten top tips from parents who have already been through starting school with one, two or more children:

- Help your child to develop their independence skills, especially getting themselves changed for PE and going to the toilet.
- Visit the school as much as possible the summer fair is a good opportunity to see the school and get used to being in a busy and noisy environment.
- Label absolutely everything you'd be surprised at what turns up in the lost property box.
- Buy school shoes and plimsoles with Velcro fastenings as they are much easier to do up independently.
- With up to 30 identical book bags, help your child to learn to identify theirs quickly by attaching a large or brightly coloured key fob to the strap. Make their PE kit bag more easily recognisable too by getting a brightly coloured one.
- Think about what you put in their lunch bag they need to be able to open boxes and packets, so have lots of picnics over the summer and encourage them to be independent. This is also a good opportunity to practise asking for help!
- 7. Encourage your child to tidy up books, toys and games when they've finished playing with them this really helps the teacher (and you at home!).
- Organise some 'get-togethers' in the park during the summer holidays with other parents so the children get to know a few more of their classmates and there are a few familiar faces on their first day.
- Make plans together for starting school have a special outing to buy a lunchbox or schoolbag.
- And finally, the first day at school is often more traumatic for the mums. Don't go home and sit there waiting until 3pm; meet up with some other mums and go for a coffee after drop off, remembering to take some tissues!



IN THIS COLUMN I would like to share with you the principles of naturopathy so that you might view your own health from this perspective and apply a few simple ideas to help yourself from any ailment you have.

The naturopathic triad, which is the basis of naturopathy, has three angles or approaches which show us how the body can become ill and also how it can achieve wellness. These approaches are via: structure, chemical and emotion. Structure refers to our physical body and can range from the obvious such as a sports injury causing pain to the less obvious low back pain aggravating irritable bowel syndrome. The other side to the structure coin then is how to help yourself, by having for example osteopathy, acupuncture, sports massage or some other physical therapy. This area also includes beneficial excercise suited to your abilities, such as circuit training, pilates or Tai Chi etc.

Next is chemical and this really refers to nutrition and eating a wholesome, nutritious diet and taking appropriate supplements for your condition. It also refers to avoiding chemicals such as those in processed foods or toxins in our environment that we may be exposed to.

Third is the emotional aspect, a very broad heading for this might be stress and all conditions will have an involvement of this and certainly can be helped from this angle. Simple approaches to self help could include meditation and getting eight hours sleep each night to seeking treatment from a qualified Neuro linguistic or life coach practitioner.

Of course there is a fine line between these catagories, for example it is very common to have a breathing pattern disorder which has been found to cause many symptoms such as anxiety and even low back pain by altering the chemical pH of the blood, however this would be rectified using structural approaches such as osteopathy. Another example would be emotional issues that are helped by balancing hormones through nutritional factors.

I hope you can see that there are three major aspects of health to observe yourself from and that each of these has two sides. The side that is detrimental to your health and the side that benefits your health. So simply decrease the bad, or the things that are blocking your return to health and incease the factors that will speed your recovery. This is a simple equation that can be applied to any ailment. Also look at the naturopathic triad, can you approach your health from all three aspects, the physical, the nutritional and the emotional/spiritual? If you can apply all three correctly then you have the best chance of both recovery and maintaining good health.

Simply Food..

THIS TIME OF the year I love to fill my plate with all the home-grown fruits and vegetables our gardens, allotments, farmers' markets and shops are full of. New crop potatoes do not travel or keep well. Look for local, Cornish or East Anglian grown, buy as you need them and cook immediately. No need to peel, just a quick scrub and into the pot. Omit that bunch of mint, it clouds the flavour. Just add a big knob of English butter, a sprinkling of crunchy coarsely ground seasalt and tuck in. Cook all the

new seasons vegetables very lightly for the best results. When you fancy something a little different try these ideas. Sussex Blue is the only blue cheese made in Sussex, at Five Ashes near Mayfield. It is a cow's milk cheese, lightly veined and very creamy. Find it in local cheese shops.

Spiced New Potatoes

Serves 4

Cook 450g tiny new potatoes, drain well and roll in a teatowel to remove all moisture. Heat 2tbs oil in a wok, add 3 crushed garlic cloves and 1tbs freshly grated root ginger. Cook for 1 min then add a good pinch each of ground cumin and carraway seeds. Add the potatoes and cook over high heat, stirring, until golden brown. Season and serve piping hot. Good with home-made hamburgers.

Gratin of New Potatoes with Sussex Blue Cheese Serves 4

Preheat the oven to 180°. Cook 450g tiny new potatoes as in the recipe above. Tip into a shallow buttered baking dish. Season 150ml double cream, stir in 150g diced Sussex Blue cheese and pour over the potatoes. Bake for about 15 min or until a rich golden brown. Goes well with slices of cold ham

Warm Potato Salad Serves 4

Cook 450g tiny new potatoes as the first recipe. While they are cooking, in a large serving bowl, whisk together 5tbs olive oil, 2tbs white wine vinegar, 1tbs wholegrain mustard, 1tbs clear honey plus salt and pepper. Add the hot dried potatoes and gently stir to coat them with the dressing. Stir in sliced spring onions or lots of finely chopped chives. Serve at room temperature with a selection of local cheeses and some warm crusty bread.

Strawberry and Lemon Layer

Bake a single layer sponge cake (75g self-raising flour, ½tsp baking powder, 75g each of soft tub margarine and caster sugar plus 1 medium egg. 20cm tin, 190° for about 20 min). While the cake is baking squeeze the juice from 2 large lemons and make up to 225ml with water. Put in a small pan with 115g granulated sugar and stir over low heat until the sugar dissolves. Prick the surface of the just baked cake (still in the tin) with a fork and pour the hot syrup evenly over the top. Let cool completely. Two hours before serving remove the cake from the tin to a flat serving plate. Swirl whipped cream (about 300ml) over the top and chill to allow the cream to firm. Just before serving pile hulled strawberries on the cream, add some sprigs of fresh mint and generously sift icing sugar over the top for the final flourish.

Eton Mess Serves 4

Reserving 4 perfect berries slice 450g ripe strawberries into a bowl. Sprinkle with 3tbs Kirsch liqueur. Cover and chill for 2 hours. Whip 300ml double cream to soft peaks and fold in 4 crushed meringue nests and the marinated fruit. Pile into individual glasses and top with the reserved berries.

How Small Footprints Make Big Steps:

A reader's challenge...

ONE OF OUR readers has decided to take some action to reduce her carbon footprint and has challenged her neighbours to follow suit. Now she has extended this challenge to all of us. Will you join her in taking action to reduce your impact on the environment?

Liz Hinze writes:

How many of you have and use a tumble dryer? I have one but use it very infrequently. Yes, it is easy to push a button, but have you considered 1) the harm to the environment and 2) the cost?

Each time you use a tumble dryer you are pushing out vast amounts of heat into the atmosphere. The cost of electricity for a tumble dryer cycle is very high. It's easy to work out exactly how much it costs using a simple calculation. Just find the information plate on your machine (it must have one by law) and note down how much electricity it uses in terms of power (watts or KW). Check out your latest electricity bill to find out how much you pay per kilowatt hour and multiply this cost by your machine's power output to find out how much it costs per hour. Multiply this figure by the number of hours your tumble dryer is running each month. It all adds up but if the costs don't worry you then the environmental consequences should.

It is so easy to dry washing without resorting to mechanical means:

- If you have a garden, you can hang washing out on most days all year.
- You can install a tidy dry in your bathroom or utility room.
- 3. You can install an old-fashioned type drying rack which is raised to ceiling height in any appropriate room (excellent for those of you with high ceilings).

For those of you with children still at home, reduce the workload by trying to wash fewer cycles per week. Make your clothes last a bit longer by only washing them if they are actually dirty or smelly. A complete change of clothes everyday may not be necessary.

If you want to work out how much money you could be saving each year by reducing your use of appliances, such as tumble dryers, or by simply turning off appliances that are kept on standby, then there is a good online calculator for this task. Check out http://www.ukpower.co.uk/running-costs-elec.asp


*More on Iain Matthews
