RSPCA branch seeks new trustees

A Scaynes Hill animal lover, who joined the local branch of the RSPCA ten years ago and became chairman three ago, is appealing for new trustees to help safeguard the future of the branch.

As the Sussex North branch of the RSPCA approaches its 40th birthday, Anita Marsland is appealing for supporters to take on the trustee roles so the branch can continue to raise funds and provide much needed animal welfare services.

"We've always been a small but active branch, and currently have around 100 members," said Anita, who explained that when people join the RSCPA as supporters they automatically become a member of their local branch.

"But, like many other charities, we struggle to find people to take on the officer and trustee roles. We currently have long-standing trustees stepping down from their roles and desperately need replacements. We are particularly keen to recruit a volunteer co-ordinator, fundraiser and someone to manage our social media so that we can continue the valuable work supporting animals and pet owners in the area."

The branch provides support for people wanting to rehome a pet. "Last year our rehoming volunteers, who include two Lindfield residents, carried out 200 prehome visits and 78 post-home visits," Anita added.

The branch also provides affordable veterinary care for sick and injured animals and low cost neutering for dogs, cats and rabbits for owners who meet the criteria. "Last year 154 animals were neutered by the branch and 405 were given welfare assistance," said Anita. "We also recently opened our second clinic, based in Burgess Hill, offering affordable veterinary treatment for pets of people on low incomes."

Funds are raised from events and donations, with members supporting fundraising initiatives, including Bark in the Park in Tilgate Park in May and running stalls at local events. "For the past couple of years we have run a teddy tombola at the Lindfield late night shopping evening which has been extremely popular," said Anita. "We'd love to attend more events and with more volunteers we could!"

What's happening at All Saints Church?

Shortly after Easter, contractors will move in to All Saints to begin the final phase of building works to redevelop the parish church building to provide a warm, welcoming and more flexible space to meet the needs of current and future generations.

While the church is closed the congregation will be temporarily relocating their Sunday services to Lindfield Primary Academy, close to the Common. Services will take place morning and evening in the Sports Hall and everyone is very welcome. Children's groups and youth ministry will also be on-site, and ample parking is available in the Academy grounds. The 8am Holy Communion services on the first, third and fifth Sundays will be held in the Tiger Lounge (next to All Saints). Full details are available on the church website.

The project (known as ASPIRE) has already seen the spire, roof and windows repaired, the vestries redeveloped to include an accessible toilet and the replacement of pews with modern seating. The more accessible interior has enabled the church to host a number of community events, including gospel singing workshops and The Christmas Experience for schools.

The next phase requires the temporary closure of the church building. Work will include the replacement of the floor with new stone tiling and underfloor heating,



improvements to the south porch and west entrance, upgrading the audio visual and lighting facilities and redecoration.

Alongside the building works, it is planned to renew the bells and refurbish the church clock.

It is anticipated that the church will be closed until January 2019.

During the week, the Tiger building will continue to host its regular weekly activities and the church office will be open as usual throughout the building works.

Once the work is complete, the church will be in great shape to continue worshipping God and welcoming the community of Lindfield for many years to come. Watch this space for updates!



New development threatens village character

An application for permission to build 42 two-bedroom flats and six houses has been submitted to MSDC on the former Tavistock and Summerhill School site in Lindfield. The Friends of Summerhill Lane Area of Townscape Character supports the development of the site for housing. However, the density and mass of the proposal is unsympathetic with the character of Summerhill Lane, Summerhill Grange and Oak Bank. Should permission be granted, it may set a dangerous precedent in other village Areas of Townscape Character, for example West Common, Sunte Avenue and Birchen Lane.

Following a very well attended recent public meeting last night Lindfield Parish Council unanimously rejected the proposals and Lindfield Preservation Society is responding in detail, both saying it fails to meet the Lindfield Neighbourhood Plan in several regards.

School site proposal

We now have the planning application for the old Tavistock and Summerhill school site. Why, oh why, wasn't a conservation order placed on this building years ago?

Application DM/18/0733 for six houses and 42 flats has been submitted - with a three storey block and a two storey block plus underground car park.

The proposal is totally out of character with the Summerhill Grange area as well as Lindfield in general - it opens the door for such intensive development elsewhere in the village.

We are supportive of the need to develop this site, but it must take full regard of the village's character.

With 48 units not only will it be an invasion of privacy on certain properties but will cause tremendous logistical problems with say 75+ cars and over 100 individuals.

Obviously there are many key points which this proposal throws up which could adversely affect the whole village if it were to proceed.

I fully appreciate that this only affects a small portion of the village but the implications could be enormous.

Although we only have a short time to lodge an objection, we understand Mid Sussex District Council is keen to hear the views of the village, and hopefully enough Lindfield residents will feel the desire to protect the character of our village. Chris remembered

In January, a beautiful new bench was installed at the top of Lindfield Common.

The bench commemorates the life of Chris Paice, a Lindfield resident who sadly lost his life to cancer a year ago aged just 43.

Chris's enthusiasm for life and love for Lindfield makes the bench a fitting tribute, providing a place for his family and many friends to reflect and remember him.

Chris grew up in Haywards Heath, attending Harlands School and then Warden Park.

A keen sportsman, Chris played football for his school and was also a keen swimmer, winning many

medals at county level for Haywards Heath Swimming Club.

The family had a strong connection to the village, attending All Saints Church, while Chris and his younger sister Vicki joined Sunday School and children's clubs in The Tiger.

When Chris was a teenager he moved with his mum Polly to Pelham Road and later bought a house in the Limes which become his 'pride and joy'.

Chris commuted to London, working in the city for the Bank of Montreal, and looked forward to his weekends spent in the village. "He really enjoyed the community spirit and loved attending village events such as Bonfire Night, Village Day, Christmas Festivities and the Arts Festival," said Polly.

"He enjoyed walking on the common and in the countryside around the village and, of course, he contributed to the local hostelries!"

Chris had many friends in the village and was well known locally. "He was very popular, especially with the ladies," said Polly. "He was still a bachelor and a real ladies man!"

Chris was a fit and active man who loved life. "It was such a shock when he was diagnosed with stage four cancer in December 2016," recalled Polly. "Chris had a rare form of lung cancer which is unrelated to smoking and extremely uncommon in young men. By the time it was diagnosed it had spread to his brain."

Chris died in a London Hospital on 12th March last year, just three months after being diagnosed. He was 43.

"Despite his prognosis, Chris never lost his sense of humour, and never gave up hope," said Polly. "Looking back I think he kept much of his suffering from us."

Following cremation at Worth, the family held a service of remembrance at the King Edward Hall followed by a wake at the Bent Arms.

> The 120 friends and family who attended the wake were invited to lay tulips at the foot of a tree on the Common near the car park. "The area was covered in pink tulips, which represent friendship, and people were laying them for weeks afterwards," said Polly.

"I knew Chris had a lot of friends but I had no idea just how popular he was. The outpouring of love at the remembrance service, and the messages and comments on Facebook and social media were quite overwhelming," said Polly.

Following the service Polly and Vicki began making enquiries about providing a bench on the common as a lasting memorial to Chris. "We wanted something a little different, with carved lettering rather than a plaque, and are really grateful to the parish council for letting us deviate from the usual style," said Polly.

The bench was erected in January, just before Chris's birthday, and was soon decked in flowers.

"We are really pleased with it and many people have remarked on how lovely it looks," said Polly.

"It's nice to think that people will enjoy sitting on the bench in the village that Chris loved so much."

One of the things I love about my job is that I am always learning. Whether it's the latest research in what makes a room suitable for a person with dementia or a new type of performance fabric, I am a sponge for new knowledge. For the past two years I have been studying Applied Colour Psychology under Karen Haller. I have referred to it before in my column but not yet really gone into the detail of what I have learned, but it struck me as a good topic for a series of articles, a series which I hope will help some of you in your own projects. Am I doing myself out of a job? Not really since I think many people happily decorate their own homes without professional help but may come unstuck on a certain room, and this might just help. I use this new knowledge in many of my projects though very much in a background way. Early on in the course I made the mistake of mentioning colour psychology to a client who promptly clammed up and thought that I was some kind of sorceress, so for me it's a helpful tool which I use but don't necessarily headline with at first meetings.

So what is it? Essentially it is the study of colour in the context of human behaviour and provides a framework which helps us pick out colours, textures and styles which resonate with our personalities. I have said before that interior design is all about creating spaces that work for you and your family, and ones that you love spending time in, so it makes complete sense that a scheme which stems from your personality will make your heart sing.

The fact that as human beings we relate to colours and styles differently, and that these can be broadly described in four groups, is not new. In ancient Rome, Galen divided humanity into four groups relating to the four bodily humours; Phlegmatic, Melancholic, Sanguine and Choleric. Centuries later Carl Gustav Jung identified four groups of people, relating to the 'determining function', specifically Thought, Feeling, Sensation and Intuition. Colour psychologist Angela Wright developed

Jung's theories, recognising that colours have a positive psychological effect when in harmony with one another, and when they are not the effect is likely to be negative. Angela Wright described the different groups as Type 1 to 4 but then called them by the seasons. The groups can also be seen as vibrant, muted, earthy and icy. Colour preferences and the personality traits associated with that group can be seen in nature, so it's a really helpful analogy.

Colour alters our mood on a very primitive level; it has an impact on us emotionally, physically and intellectually. Colour will always create an initial feeling but it's the effect a colour will have on behaviour over time that is most important. You can walk into a room and feel a certain way; it's a first impression and very much at the surface, whereas spend more time in that room and the environment will have an impact on your behaviour. That is what we are interested in. So if a client tells me that they want a room to feel relaxing, I will be interested in what 'relaxing' looks like to them. Very often of course I shall be talking to more than one person, a couple or perhaps a family, and when it comes to care homes, many stakeholder groups. So a relaxing environment might well mean quite different things to a husband and wife. Listening to the answers to this question will provide me with clues as to their personalities and consequently the season that they are most in tune with. Since we are all different and an element of compromise will always prevail in a space used by more than one person, applied colour psychology is really helpful in identifying each of their seasonal personalities and throw up some common ground. People are usually a combination of seasons with a primary and a secondary. The primary personality is all about colour with an element of style and the secondary is purely style.

When Jeff Essen was diagnosed with Parkinson's seven years ago, his initial reaction was to 'keep calm and carry on', hiding it from everyone but his wife Jacqui.

But after keeping his diagnosis secret for five years, Jeff's eventual 'coming out' marked the start of a whole new life! As national Parkinson's Awareness Day approaches, on 11th April, we are pleased to tell Jeff's story.

"I'm not exactly sure when my Parkinson's actually started as it tends to creep up on you, but I was commuting to London and walking to my office when I realised that I was dragging my foot and scuffing my toe on the pavement," Jeff recalled. "At first I didn't think anything of it, but I then noticed I wasn't swinging my right arm either."

When Jeff found it difficult to sketch and his lettering was becoming unclear, he made a doctor's appointment, assuming he had carpal tunnel syndrome.

"The doctor tested my arms and diagnosed Parkinson's," said Jeff. "He also referred me for a scan to check for a brain tumour."

Jeff had heard of Parkinson's but knew little about it. "I went home and immediately got on to Google. The first thing I read was that you couldn't die from it, so that was a huge relief."

Jeff was further reassured when his scan results came back clear.

Feeling grateful that a brain tumour had been ruled out, he started to do more research visiting websites including Parkinson's UK. "I was lucky that my Parkinson's was mild and in the early stages," he said. It also meant it was easy to hide.

"I had told my wife Jacqui but decided not to tell our children," said Jeff. "I wanted to keep it quiet. I was worried about how they would react and that they would start treating me differently. It was easy to hide, so I just got on with things."

After five years, as Parkinson's is a progressive condition, Jeff's symptoms became more noticeable. "My son, daughters and stepsons were aware that I was slowing down and finding it difficult to lift heavy things, so I knew the time had come to tell them.

"They had guessed that I wasn't right and wished I had told them sooner, but they understood why I hadn't."

Telling the family also became the trigger for Jeff seeking more support. "I was beginning to lean to the left when I walked, which was worrying. However, I was told it was called 'the Pisa syndrome', which made me feel better," he said. "I thought: 'I've had five good years but am starting to degenerate now'. That's when I decided it was time to get help."

Jeff found out about the Mid Sussex support group by accident while attending a physio appointment at the Princess Royal Hospital.

"I was having treatment for an unrelated knee condition, and the physio asked why I needed a walking

stick," said Jeff. "When I told her it was to counter my Parkinson's lean, she said she could do something about that and introduced me to her colleague, Lindfield resident Sue Blunden, chairman of the local Parkinson's support group."

Sue invited Jeff to the 'Fit 4 Life' exercise classes for people with Parkinson's. "My initial reaction was I didn't want to mix with lots of other people with Parkinson's," Jeff recalled. "I wasn't ready for that yet!"

Reluctantly he went along. "I didn't know what to expect, but it was brilliant. All the exercises were designed specifically for people with Parkinson's and made a big difference. I was having problems turning my neck, but within weeks it was so much better."

Encouraged by friends made at the exercise classes Jeff joined the Parkinson's choir Good Vibrations. "I never thought I'd ever sing with a choir but it really seemed to suit me and everyone was really friendly," he said. "Last year we performed at the Christmas tree festival in Cuckfield, a 'Swing into Spring' evening and at our Parkinson's church service."

He then stepped well out of his comfort zone, signing up for dance classes – and is now a regular dancer!

"The dance classes always start with ballet stretches, but luckily you don't have to wear a tutu!" Jeff laughed. "It's a mix of country and highland dancing, and also a bit of 'dad dancing'. Partners and carers come along too, so it's really good fun.

"I really value the new friends I've made through joining the groups - people who know exactly what I am dealing with because they are going through it themselves. It's like having a big extended family. We are all at a different one of the five stages of Parkinson's, and swap notes, but 'how long have you been diagnosed?' is the first thing we all ask."

Jeff is keen to help raise awareness of some of the day to day issues faced by those living with Parkinson's. "I never used to suffer from stress, or at least admit to it, but often find myself in stressful situations," he said.

"The major effect for me has been how slow it makes you in everyday tasks. It's the little things like struggling to get my money out of my wallet in the supermarket queue when I can feel eyes burning into the back of my head as I hold everyone up!" he said. "It would be wonderful if supermarkets could introduce a 'slow queue' for people who can't or don't want to rush! So please be patient with us!"

Jeff added that it's not uncommon for people with Parkinson's who walk unsteadily and have slurred speech be mistaken for being drunk. "I know of people who have been reported to the police by people who have seen them getting into a car and assuming they were drunk," he said.

Parkinson's seems to be on the increase. "Everyone seems to know someone with it," said Jeff. "A good friend of mine was diagnosed after I noticed the tremor in his hand. We still meet up regularly to moan about Parkinson's and laugh about how he has to use both hands to lift his pint, thankfully I don't have the tremors, except when I'm stressed!"

The diagnosis can be hard to accept. "Some don't, but it's really important to talk about it and to try and have a positive attitude," said Jeff. "My glass has always been half full, and I try and relate that to my Parkinson's. It may seem strange when I say I've been 'blessed with Parkinson's', and of course I'd rather not have it, but it really has opened up a new life for mebut then of course there are a lot more worse off than me, so it's easy for me to say."

It's also given Jeff a purpose in his retirement. "When you retire there can be an empty void to fill, but having Parkinson's has made me join groups, take up new hobbies and make new friends," he said. "We often used to think about doing charity work after we retired, and now we raise money for Parkinson's."

Jeff is positive about the future. "I'm looking forward to carrying on with my life. I still do DIY and work on my allotment – in fact everything I did before but at half the pace," said Jeff, who is a keen member of the Lindfield Horticultural Society, and a regular exhibitor in the village shows. "The only downside is that I can't walk far which is hard as we used to love hiking."

However, Jeff has been encouraged by taking part in an exciting new exercise regime from Australia which aims to reprogramme the pathways from the brain to the muscles. "I've definitely improved and can now manage to do up buttons where I had been relying on my wife," he said.

"My balance has definitely improved and people have commented that I'm back to my old self!"

Jeff hopes his story will help raise awareness of Parkinson's and inspire newly diagnosed people. "My message is - don't be afraid. There is a future and, for me, it's not all doom and gloom," he said. "You can still enjoy yourself, there's a whole new world out there and you'll meet some wonderful people along the way."

Parkinson's support

The Mid Sussex branch of Parkinson's UK is one of 365 local volunteer led support groups.

Set up in 1992 with just 9 members, the group now has grown to 250 and includes people with the condition, their partners and several former carers whose partners have passed away.

Groups rely on fundraising and the support of the local community to subsidise activities which include exercise and aquafit sessions, Music to Movement classes and communication skills groups, and even a choir - Good Vibrations.

Members come from Haywards Heath, Burgess Hill and all the surrounding villages.

Armed with water bottles and dressed in brightly coloured costumes, 80 Swoovers descended on Clair Hall in Haywards Heath earlier this month on a mission to raise funds for charity.

Shared driveway

LEGAL EAGLE

Question: The house we are looking at buying has a driveway that is shared by a neighbour. What should we look out for?

Answer: It is not uncommon for properties to share a driveway or perhaps a path for accessing a garden. In these cases, typically one property owner will own the land on which the shared access lies and the other will have a legal right over that land, usually for a specific purpose (such as accessing the main road). That right is referred to in legal terms as an 'easement'. There are several ways an easement can be created, and before committing to the purchase of a property affected by a right of way it is important to establish how that right impacts you.

Usually the deeds to the property will identify the extent and scope of the easement, and these deeds should be checked carefully by your solicitor during the conveyancing process. Most easements will 'run with the land' meaning they will legally bind all subsequent owners. However, that may not always be the case, so it is important to seek professional advice on how the right of way specifically operates.

There are many ways that an easement may be established. Although the majority are formally recorded in a deed it is not uncommon for a right to be created through the prolonged and unopposed use of a piece of land. It is vital for your solicitor to make the relevant enquiries of the seller's solicitor when there is a question mark over whether a right over neighbouring land exists.

As the potential new owner of a property and driveway with shared access you are likely to be responsible for keeping that driveway in a good condition for the benefit of you and your neighbour. If the driveway is in a poor condition you may be required to repair it, and usually the associated costs would be shared with your neighbour, so it is essential that you obtain information from the seller regarding any anticipated repairs and expected costs.

You must also ensure your neighbour can easily exercise their right to use the driveway. For example, if the driveway is not wide enough for two cars to pass you are unlikely to be able to park on it as that would obstruct your neighbour's right of way.

The law surrounding rights of way can be complicated, so seeking accurate legal advice is crucial to ensure you understand the implications of purchasing a property with a shared driveway.



Cottages at The Colony

By Richard Bryant, Lindfield History Project Group Gravelye Lane for centuries was merely a track providing access to a couple of farmsteads and Northlands Wood; then in the nineteenth century it became the route from Lindfield to America! There are more points of historic

interest along the lane than you might think.

Almost immediately after turning from Lewes Road into Gravelye Lane, on land now Grey Alders and Kidbrook, the Dowager Countess of Tankerville, while living at The Welkin, opened a laundry in 1902. It was run on charitable lines to provide work and a home for women in difficult circumstances struggling to regain their character through honest labour. The laundry home called 'Quinta' provided accommodation for thirty female workers. The laundry was taken over by the Salvation Army in 1912 until 1922 when it became a business trading as the Mid Sussex Steam Laundry. A particular feature of the laundry was its 74ft high chimney. Not only was this a local landmark it also

housed the 'start and stop work' hooter. Many villagers used to set their watches by the hooter such was the accuracy of the time signal. On closing in 1972 the buildings were demolished and the houses built.

Further up Gravelye Lane on the left-hand side is a small property sign bearing the name Criplands. The first identified mention of the name is in the Will of William Neale, dated 1625, in which he leaves lands and a house called Cripses, later known as Cripland, to his brother, John Neale. On his death the land is inherited by his second son Nycholas Neale. The Neale family had a lengthy connection with Lindfield as butchers and farmers. Cripland farm passed through several generations before eventually leaving the family.

In 1742 it was purchased by Nicholas Tanner, a mariner from Brighton, and his wife. At this time the farm comprised a house, two barns, two gardens, an orchard and 30 acres of land and was rented by a Ralph Comber. A series of complex transactions followed until October 1744, when Cripland was purchased by John Dutton and his wife. At this point the Cripland story takes a twist.

In the eighteenth century there was no effective treatment for smallpox which often resulted in death. At best an outbreak could be contained through isolating sufferers in a pest house. In 1716 Lady Mary Wortley Montagu, recently recovered from smallpox, accompanied her husband to Constantinople where she discovered that in Turkey healthy people were deliberately being infected with smallpox. They were inoculated with a small amount of pus and then kept in isolation to avoid the risk of spreading the disease. She introduced the concept of inoculation as protection against smallpox to Britain. Gradually the procedure was

adopted by a number of pioneering doctors.

One such doctor was John Dutton who practiced in Lindfield in the late 1730s and is thought to have lived at Bower House. He may have been using part of the premises as a Pest House. In Easter 1741 'John Dutton, Churgeon' (surgeon) had agreed with the Parish Overseers to 'supply the Poor (of Lindfield) with physic and Chyrurgery' for a year and in May 1742 entered into a longer-term agreement to do the same for £4 4s per year, and £1 1s extra 'in case small pox should happen to break out'.

In March 1744, John Dutton and his wife Elizabeth purchased Cripland and established it as a Pest House. Around this time he started to inoculate people in the village with smallpox pus. This caused great consternation to the inhabitants of Lindfield. As a consequence, Dr Dutton was required to stop this practice and enter into a £600 bond with a term of 60 years payable should he recommence inoculations.

It is understood that Dr Dutton complied with the undertaking and subsequently sold the Pest House and accompanying land to John Verrall in February 1767. However, the property continued to be known as Pest House Farm until the late 1880s when it reverted to Cripland Farm when sold by John Verrall.

In 1898, Henry and Ellen Howorth purchased part of the farm's land on which they built Cripland Court in 1905, a spacious 12 bedroomed country house with colonial style balconies to the rear together with staff accommodation, a range of stables and outbuildings.

Following the death of her husband in 1907 the property was put up for sale. A tenancy agreement with option to purchase dated 15th November 1911 was entered into with Alexander Howden, a Ship Broker in the City of London. The purchase was completed in 1913. Following Alexander Howden's death in 1914 and his widow eight years later, the property was sold in 1922 to Granville Bevan. It remained in the ownership of Mr & Mrs Bevan for some thirty years.

Granville Bevan died in November 1950 and Cripland Court was placed on the market in 1952, being sold to Bishop & Sons Depositories Ltd in December 1953 who used it as a furniture store until the main house was demolished in the 1960s.

Almost opposite Cripland Court stood Gravelye Farm, continuing up the lane and shortly before the junction with Lyoth Lane stands Gravelye House,

In the early decades of the 1800s across the country there was much poverty amongst agricultural labourers, many were in fact paupers, placing great demand on a parish's poor relief. William Allen, an eminent chemist, Quaker philanthropist and social reformer, thought it would be possible to reduce poverty by providing them with an independent means of support, thus reducing their reliance on the parish. His solution was to establish colonies of cottages with allotments. In the late 1820s, Lindfield was chosen as a parish worthy for this experiment, as poverty was rife. William Allen was helped by his friend John Smith MP of Madehurst who purchased 100 acres in the Gravelye area and placed

some of this land at Allen's disposal for creation of a trial colony. Smith also built Gravelye House for William Allen's use when visiting Lindfield. At around the same time Allen established the School of Industry on Blackhill to educate boys and girls from poor families.

The land selected by William Allen was down a track beside Gravelye House, close to today's Hanbury Stadium, where he built 12 dwellings, six modest single storey thatched cottages each with an acre and a quarter of land, rented at 2s weekly, and adjacent were six larger cottages with the same amount of land at 2s 6d weekly. Additionally in Gravelye Lane he built three pairs of semi-detached two storey houses with supporting land at 3s a week.

The cottages immediately became known by some as The Colony and by others as America, thought to have derived from the idea of a land of promise for settlers, and later as Gravelye Cottages. The America name endured for the area and appears on old Ordnance Survey maps and the track beside Gravelye House to the cottages took the name America Lane. America is reflected in other road names today. Hanbury Stadium is named after William Allen's business partner, the business growing into the pharmaceutical manufacturer Allen & Hanbury Ltd now absorbed with GlaxoSmithKline.

William Allen required tenants to be industrious men with large families. Additional land could be rented if needed, and guidance and small loans were provided for the purchase of seeds, fertiliser and a pig or cow. The expectation was that the labourer would cultivate his allotment in addition to working for a local farmer. Locally in the short term it was a success, as no family went on parish relief after moving to The Colony. However, the colony concept did not provide a feasible national solution. After William Allen's death in 1843 the Gravelye estate was sold and the colony concept ceased. All the dwellings were condemned and demolished in the 1940s and 1950s.

Survived by his mother, Mrs L. Willie of 2 Albert Cottages, Sunte Avenue.

Reginald George Hill

Private A215. 1st Battalion, Canadian Infantry. Killed in action, aged 48, on 26th April 1916 during the 1st Battle of Ypres. Buried at Hooge Crater Cemetery B112. There is a brass plaque to his memory in All Saints' Church.

His parents lived at Neilgherry, Sunte Avenue.

Malcolm Hill

Private 574. Royal Army Medical Corps. Died from wounds, aged 26, in Salonika, Greece on 27th February 1917. Buried at Salonika (Lembet Road) Military Cemetery GR7.

Survived by his mother of St Romolo, Sunte Avenue.

Frederick George Hillman

Gunner 103665. Royal Field Artillery. Died of disease in Egypt, aged 25, on 23rd October 1915. Buried at Chatby War Memorial Cemetery Egypt E6.

Survived by his wife of Lyoth Lane, Lindfield and his parents of 6 Francis Road.

George Herbert Hobden

Private 90840. 37th Battalion, Machine Gun Corps. Died of his wounds, aged 24, on 4th November 1918. Buried at Romeries Communal Cemetery Extension Fr206.

Survived by his parents of 4 Alma Road.

John Henry Jeffrey

Lance Corporal 4163. 9th Battalion, Queens Royal Lancers. Died from gas poisoning near Ypres, aged 39, on 24th May 1915. Buried at Hazebrouck Communal Cemetery F200.

Survived by his father (Henry Jeffery) of Lewes Road.

What goes in the Blue Bin?

Every fortnight I put our blue top recycling bin out at the kerbside and used to wonder if I had got my recycling right, or had I inadvertently put something in my recycling bin that would cause the recycling process to grind to a halt.

To cut a long story short I am now a volunteer Waste Prevention Advisor for WSCC, one of about 12 throughout the County.

Now if any group or organisation, or even an individual, asks for a talk and presentation to their group I can come along and tell you all about recycling and explain what can and what cannot be recycled.

So, my challenge to the residents of Lindfield: Do you think you know what can be recycled in your blue top bin?

OK, let's test you? What in this list of ten can go in your blue top bin? Plastic margarine tub, plastic margarine tub lid, hair spray or shaving foam aerosol, window envelopes, lemonade/ coke can, tin foil, aluminium foil, glass bottles and jars, corrugated cardboard.

Are you confident with all your answers or are some guesses or just not sure? In West Sussex we dispose of 399,000 tonnes of rubbish every year. Our black bin still contains over 20% of recyclable material. If this was put in the recycling bin this would save £3 million every year!

And the ten items – they can all be recycled in your blue top bin! And, yes, usually all your Easter Egg packaging can be recycled in West Sussex. This includes the foil wrapper, any plastic tray and, of course, the cardboard box.

The Mid Sussex Choir is an amateur community choir and registered charity drawing its members from across Mid Sussex. It's a friendly choir and is always looking for new members (aged 18 or above). It presents two main concerts each year, in December and April, and also sings at a small number of charity and other events. In recent years it has performed a wide range of works and music styles ably lead by its

Musical Director, Andrew Sutton, and accompanist (and Lindfield resident) Phillip Sear. The choir rehearses for two hours on Wednesday evenings at 7.45pm at the Methodist Church, Perrymount Road, Haywards Heath, between September and June each




year. The next concert is on 28th April at 7.30pm, also at the Methodist Church, and features songs from musicals including selections from Gilbert and Sullivan, Rogers and Hammerstein, Gershwin, Lerner and Loewe, and Andrew Lloyd Webber.

The choir was formed in 1946 when Hilary Preston was asked to assemble a group of singers to provide incidental music to 'The Amber Gate', a pageant play staged by Mid Sussex Guides, Brownies, Cubs and Scouts. The pageant, advertised in the Mid Sussex Times as 'a treat for all ages', proved a memorable experience for all taking part. Tickets were 2/6d. The choir entered the annual Lewes Music Festival the following year and in 1954 won the silver cup. 1961 saw a new departure for the Choir with the singers in costume providing the chorus for 'Don Pasquale' sung by a group of young soloists from Glyndebourne. In 2016 it celebrated its 70th anniversary with a concert at St Wilfrid's Church, Haywards Heath, including works by Vivaldi and Puccini to orchestral accompaniment.

Why join the Choir? Many join simply because they enjoy singing and it's much easier to do that with other people. Finding your voice (literally) can be liberating – it really doesn't matter that you're never going to be the next Alfie Boe or Katherine Jenkins. Singing offers other benefits too: it helps breathing, exercises the vocal muscles and absorbs your attention. And learning to read music is a great way of exercising the brain! Lindfield resident John Robin has been a member for three years: "As a boy I sang in the church choir but

hadn't sung a note since. Fortunately the choir doesn't do auditions; I could simply turn up and see how I got on. The first time was pretty excruciating but then there was a moment when all the voices came together in harmony and I was hooked! Rehearsals are always great fun and I enjoy the excitement of singing in front of an audience."

If you'd like to give the choir a try you're welcome to come to any rehearsal. In addition, special taster sessions have been arranged on 6th, 13th and 20th June - an ideal time to see if singing with the choir is for you. Cauliflower with bacon and herbs

Break a medium cauliflower into florets and cook in salted water until just tender. Drain well. Roughly chop 4-6 rashers of streaky bacon and cook in a hot frypan until crisp. Remove with a slotted spoon. Add 1tbs rapeseed or olive oil to the hot pan plus a crushed garlic clove, 1tbs wholegrain mustard and 1tbsp wine (red or white) vinegar. Bring just to bubbling, remove from the heat and stir in the bacon, some chopped parsley and seasoning. Add the cauliflower and gently spoon the hot dressing over it, taking care not to break up the cauliflower. Serve immediately - good with grilled sausages or chops.

Roasted onions

(Serves 2)

Preheat oven 180°. Peel 2 large onions and cut in half crossways. Place in a baking dish, cut side down, add 1tbs cold water, cover with foil and bake 30min. Combine 50ml clear honey, 3tsp oil, seasoning and 1tbs mild curry paste or wholegrain mustard. Turn the onions cut side up, pour over honey mixture and roast for a further 30min until very tender. Excellent with roast beef.

I'm writing this after all the snow has gone but the weather forecasters are not giving any guarantees we won't see some more before the month is out. So we probably have some time to go before a plate of crisp salad sounds appetising. Try cooking some of our home-grown winter vegetables in a slightly different way to tempt appetites. Try roasting wedges of butternut squash alongside the Sunday roast. Bake red-fleshed sweet potatoes until soft (they don't take as long as baking potatoes), split and serve with your favourite filling. Layer sliced leeks, as a change from onions, between potato layers when making a potato gratin. Delicious topped with grated smoked Cheddar cheese. The rhubarb dessert is a hot pudding with a twist!



Leek, onion and potato fritatta

Cut a leek into thin slices. Peel and cut a baking potato into small cubes. Drop both into a pan of boiling water and cook just until soft. Drain well. Break 4 eggs into a bowl, add seasoning and lightly beat with a fork. Thinly slice a medium onion and add to a generous knob of hot butter in a frypan. Cook, stirring, until golden brown. Add a crushed garlic clove and the drained vegetables. Continue to cook over medium heat until they are brown. Pour over the eggs, reduce the heat to low and cook until the eggs are just set, lifting the edges to allow uncooked egg to set. Top with grated cheese and slip under a hot grill until golden brown. Serve immediately.

Rhubarb bread and butter pudding

Cut 3 slices of fresh bread into cubes and roughly break 100g gingersnap biscuits and tip both into a bowl. Add 125g quartered strawberries and 6 slim sticks of newseasons rhubarb, sliced. Lightly combine and tip into a buttered baking dish. Whisk together 2 eggs, 568ml creamy milk (I like to use evaporated milk) and 2tbs caster sugar. Strain over the fruit mixture and leave to stand for a good 30 min. Bake in a 170° oven for about 45 min or until the top is crisp and golden brown. Serve

This first novel is a confident debut, one which ended up with the author deservedly winning the Costa Book award last year. The narrator and title character, Eleanor, is a woman struggling with social relationships, trying to hide her loneliness and the hurts of the past by edging towards alcoholism. As a person dominated by a mother, Eleanor has to learn to be free of a trauma from the past and to trust the love of her friends. There is a massive twist that is unexpected and very satisfying – you hopefully won't have seen it coming. The depiction of Eleanor is brilliant and suggests that Gail Honeyman is a major talent in the making. 




