Schools great cross country results

Lindfield and Blackthorns schools entered both a girls and boys team into the district cross-country event at Warden Park Secondary last month. The children had to run in gruelling conditions with many runners slipping on the wet mud as the rain came down. Despite this, both schools did exceptionally well. The Lindfield boys team came 3rd with five runners qualifying for the next round and the Lindfield girls finished 6th with three girls qualifying. The Blackthorns boys team finished 4th with one boy qualifying for the next round and the Blackthorns girls finished 5th with one girl qualifying. An excellent achievement for both schools.

On top of this, both the girls and boys races were won by pupils from our schools. Jacob Rodderick, from Lindfield Primary, ran amongst the front group of runners from early on in the boys' race. At the three quarter mark, Jacob broke away from the group and stretched out an impressive lead to win the race.

B Crouch, from Blackthorns Primary, took the lead in the girl's race within the first half of the run. She maintained a steady pace throughout, before accelerating within the last 100 meters to pull further away from the runners behind her. A fantastic run from both pupils.





Blackthorns Community Primary Academy in Lindfield has received an Outstanding rating from the Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted) following a recent inspection.

This is an uplift from the Good rating received in March 2018 and places the school in the top 19 per cent of UK primary schools rated Outstanding.

Blackthorns Principal, Marianne Brand, said: "This is a wonderful and well-deserved acknowledgement for our whole school community. Our pupils, staff, local board members, parents and carers have worked together with passion and dedication to make this result possible. It has been an honour to lead the academy on this journey to Outstanding."

This success builds on recent plaudits. Earlier in 2018, Blackthorns was recognised as one of the best performing primary schools in the country, based on data from the Department for Education and Ofsted, analysed by the Schools, Students and Teachers network: Blackthorns pupils' attainment at the 'expected' and 'higher' standard at Key Stage 2 in Reading, Writing and Maths is in the top 20 per cent of all schools nationally.

Ofsted praised the school stating: 'Pupils thrive at this school because their needs are met extremely well.'

The report concludes by saying 'This is an outstanding school' and, in relation to the five assessment categories, it states:

- Everyone works together resolutely to help pupils achieve their very best. High standards are an expectation, not an aspiration.
- Pupils learn very well across the curriculum, attaining highly throughout their time at the school. This prepares them successfully for their future learning.
- Pupils flourish because of rich opportunities that support their personal development.
- Pupils attainment in reading, writing and mathematics is high across the school.
- Children thrive in the early years because of the high-quality provision they
 experience.

Blackthorns joined the University of Brighton Academies Trust, sponsored by the University of Brighton, in 2015.

The role of the Trust was also commended: 'Governance is very effective. The local board and wider trust work very well together to ensure legal duties are met. Their collective rigorous challenge to leaders ensures that standards in the school are high.'

Dr John Smith, Chief Executive, University of Brighton Academies Trust, said: "I wholeheartedly congratulate Blackthorns on this Outstanding judgement. It is our aim for all our academies to be rated as Outstanding. This result for Blackthorns, just three years since joining the Trust, is confirmation that we are meeting our ambition to deliver excellent education for the children of Sussex."

Walstead Cemetery pathway rejected

At their meeting on 29th October, members of Lindfield Rural Parish Council reiterated concerns about unmarked burials saying little can be done to provide sufficient disabled access. They say they are sympathetic and could prioritise plots with easier access for families with disabled members.

A nine month campaign has been carried out to have this pathway provided. A petition with over 230 signatures, many with comments highlighting access problems, was delivered.

Councillors have continually rejected it.

Reasons have been that there are unmarked burials, and it would not be in keeping with the rural aspect of the cemetery and that there are protected wild flowers.

The council said they did not undertake a survey to identify unmarked burials because it would be inconclusive. In this case the path is being rejected only on an assumption of unmarked burials.

Prioritising plots would not address access problems for family and non-family members who develop mobility problems in the future.

I would urge anybody who feels strongly about a disabled access pathway for Walstead Cemetery west side to contact Lindfield Rural Parish Council directly to voice their concerns.

GB athlete inspires Blackthorns children

The children and staff of Blackthorns Community Primary Academy were very excited to welcome World and European 4x100m champion sprinter and GB athlete CJ Ujah to the academy. The visit came following local resident Naomi Treen winning a competition run by Muller. She generously donated the GB athlete visit and £2,000 to spend on sports equipment to her local school.

Ujah, who boasts an impressive 9.96 seconds 100m personal best, took part in a question and answer session with Year 5 and 6 children. During this the children gained a better understanding of CJ's daily training schedule and the many sacrifices he has made to pursue his dream of being one of the fastest sprinters in the world. He spoke of his admiration for Usain Bolt and demonstrated some of his sprinting drills. He then hosted some athletics sessions with children in Years 2-4, during which he gave them advice on technique.

The visit immediately inspired the children's writing, and some children from Year 6 even performed the song they wrote for him at the end of his visit.

Have you ever found yourself in a fruitless mind spiral? Replaying a scenario that makes you sad or angry? Thinking about doing something but never getting started? Perhaps these thoughts start to spin out of control, leaving you feeling frustrated, angry, paranoid or confused? When you see it for what it is, doesn't it feel like a complete and utter waste of time and energy?

This negative 'hamster wheel' style of thinking has a massive impact on how you feel and these emotions impact your physiology, behaviour and your performance. This type of thinking produces a classic stress response, a release of cortisol and adrenalin which actually shuts down the frontal cortex of the brain impacting your ability to think logically, to plan and to make rational decisions and perform well when it counts.

Let's consider just one way of thinking on purpose, let's change our self-talk. The problem with self-talk is that it is often negative, critical, even harsh, and we aren't necessarily aware of what we might be saying to ourselves. The one guaranteed thing is that we are always listening and therefore we should be very careful about what we say. Many of my clients used to talk themselves down. They had a negative commentary running in their heads. This became the narrative to their lives and negatively impacted everything they tried to do. Often they didn't succeed and this reinforced their negative chatter, which further impacted their next attempt. My clients used to say things like 'I'm rubbish at this', 'this is hopeless', 'I'll never get there'... and guess what - they didn't, until they started thinking on purpose and taking control!


Top performers, whether in business, in sports or even on the stage, are able to take control of their thinking; they are able to use their 'self-talk' to direct their thoughts. In taking control they own their narrative and therefore own their emotional response and, ultimately, control their performance. They think on purpose, they are positive and powerful in what they say to themselves and they have their phrases and mantras ready to counter any negative thoughts which might creep in.

They use positively framed language so that they constantly focus on what they want and not what they don't want; for example, they might say 'make it count' rather than 'don't miss', or 'I'm the expert' rather than 'the audience must know more than me' or 'I'm excited to retain this client' rather than 'I'm terrified of losing this business'.

To achieve more and to outperform our 'norm' we will want to think differently and think on purpose. As Einstein once said: 'Insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different result'. When we practise our pre-performance, positive, self-talk, it creates a sense of control. It puts us in the driver's seat and it steers us to achieve our desired outcomes. Consistently thinking on purpose and achieving our goals reinforces our self-confidence and motivates us to achieve more. Think on purpose, take control, own your narrative and be your best self.



Bells and Clock: Down and Out!

After several years of fundraising and thanks to the generosity and support of many in Lindfield, action associated with the Bell and Clock Project at All Saints Church is underway.

In October 2018 the church clock movement was removed to the workshop of The Cumbria Clock Company. Then, last month, the eight ringing bells were lowered from the tower and loaded on to a lorry for removal to the bell-hangers, White's of Appleton.

In terms of the Lindfield bells this is a significant event, occurring less than once in a lifetime! The last major bell work was carried out in 1887 when four new bells were added to the five already in the tower. Three of these new bells were donated by Charles Eamer Kempe of Old Place, and the fourth by Sir William Sturdy of Paxhill Park.

This led to the retirement in 1887 of the oldest bell in the tower, cast in 1573, which has since been used to sound the chimes of the church clock. The other four older bells, cast in 1599, 1603, 1631 and 1682 will now join the ranks of the retired. Each of these historic bells is listed by the Council for Care of Churches as worthy of preservation, so they will be restored and returned to the church where they will be hung 'dead' (not rung) above the new eight ringing bells. Meanwhile the four



Victorian bells will be recast in order to provide a much lighter and more finely tuned ring of eight bells.

We now look forward to the coming spring when the new bells will be delivered to the church and raised into the tower. More of this in a future edition of Lindfield Life!



By Richard Bryant, Lindfield History Project Group Last month's article looked at the River Ouse and Deans Mill, this month's explores more nearby features along the river.

Did you know Lindfield has a castle? If Historic England's Monuments Schedule is to be believed, on the northern bank some 500m downstream from Lindfield Bridge, on strictly private land, stand the remains of earth works described as a motte and bailey, dating to Norman times. Named Lindfield Castle it is also marked on Ordnance Survey maps as a motte and bailey, although all that remains today are a series of bumps covered by bushes and trees. Historic England's record says the motte at the centre measures about 40m across and stands some 1.5m high. This was surrounded by a broad moat which joined to the river through gaps in the outer earthworks. North-west of the motte is a crescent shaped bailey 45m long. Outside a ditch linked to a stream entirely surrounded the castle. Such defensive structures were constructed in towns and on open land. The listing describes its position as 'strong yet strategic location for policing of traffic crossing the Ouse'. However their papers do indicate an element of doubt as to its origin and suggest it might have been a system of fish ponds. This is plausible as in 1175 a nunnery was established somewhere close to the castle site. Fish ponds were a feature of religious houses in medieval times. Another suggestion is the remains of a moated farmhouse.

Interestingly, on the 1845 Tithe Map, the earthworks are labelled 'site of a priory'. The adjoining two fields carried the names Nunnery Pond and Nunnery Plot, while standing close by is a wood which to this day is called Nunnery Wood. This small nunnery was no doubt closed on the orders of Henry VIII and quickly became a ruin. Since that time all traces of the stonework have disappeared.

As an aside, hanging on the wall in the Library Room, King Edward Hall is a copy 1840s map. Although difficult to see, in the top right hand corner is a small drawing that purports to show 'The Ruins of Lindfield Nunnery as they appeared in 1601' with a pond in the foreground.

Without an archaeological survey the precise location of the nunnery and the true origin of the earthworks will remain undiscovered, but it is pleasing to think Lindfield might have had a Norman castle.

A fact beyond doubt is that the Ouse did have an important strategic defensive role during World War Two. Early in the war, in the event of a German invasion breaching the Sussex coastal defences, 'stop lines' were created along natural features to halt or at least slow any advance. One of the most important lines ran west to east along the Rivers Arun and Ouse with an anti-tank ditch joining them between Handcross and Slaugham.



The northern riverbank at Lindfield was revetted with vertical tree trunks making it difficult for tanks to mount the bank, so forcing them towards Lindfield Bridge which was heavily defended with anti-tank blocks, barbed wire

and a pillbox. It was the responsibility of the Lindfield Home Guard to man this Type 28 pillbox, which still exists today just north of the bridge. There were similar defensive positions at the other local bridges. Home Guard member Sid Cross recounted several years ago being equipped with a Lee Enfield rifle and ten rounds of ammunition and told 'that was enough to kill 12 of the enemy – ten with bullets, one with the bayonet and the last with the rifle butt'. An anti-tank gun was not received until later in the war. Thankfully, the invasion threat soon receded! A short distance along the road is the southern entrance to Paxhill, which during the war was a Canadian Army camp.

There were similar invasion fears in the mid-19th century arising from the French, resulting in the Sussex Rifle Volunteer Corps being formed to defend the county. It was essential for these part-time soldiers to be able to shoot accurately. For 25 years, the men of the Lindfield unit had 'been subjected to the inconvenience of having to walk to Cuckfield for target practice'. To correct this unsatisfactory situation, Colonel Dudley Sampson, the owner of Buxshalls, made land available upstream of Lindfield Bridge for use as a firing range. In August 1886, the 300 yard range was opened with much ceremony and a mock battle defending a nearby foot bridge. Two years later the range was extended to 600 yards and it was hoped this facility would encourage more Lindfield men to join the volunteers.

A more peaceful pursuit, also on Buxshalls Estate's land, was established about 200m upstream from Lindfield Bridge, when in May 1906 the Lindfield Swimming Club was formed. Colonel Dudley Sampson agreed to grant the club permission to use a section of his riverbank, provided everything was conducted in a proper manner and all non-costumed bathers treated as trespassers. Accordingly, club rules were established, and approved by the Colonel, prohibiting card playing, gambling and other improper conduct and requiring all bathers to wear full 'University costumes' in the club's colour of navy blue. From the annual subscription rates it would appear membership was initially only open to men and boys.

The bathing place, as it was known, was soon set up with a changing hut and the land fenced off. Arrangements were made with the miller at Dean's Mill to shut the sluice gates during Friday evenings to allow water to build up for the weekend. This allowed members to dive from low boards.





The club thrived, women were permitted to join and facilities constantly improved including men's and women's changing huts; a newspaper report also mentions a 'clubhouse'. In 1924 the club had 229 members made up of 156 gentlemen and 73 ladies. It was decided to construct a new diving stage spanning the river, with platforms at 6ft, 10ft, 14ft and 18ft, and room 'for ten persons to dive off the stage at once'. Permission was given to deepen the centre of the river to allow safe diving from the new higher top platform. Arrangements to blast the riverbed were duly made!

Swimming galas and diving competitions were regularly arranged for members and matches against other local clubs, with cups and medals duly awarded. The bathing place provided much enjoyment for villagers and many children learnt to swim and dive in the river. Sadly the facility was closed in 1938 due to a polio scare in Lindfield.

On this section of the Ouse, historic records for the 1500s and 1600s suggest a fulling mill stood, unfortunately little information is available, although its one time existence appears to be reflected in the names of the nearby farm and derelict river lock. Finally, adjacent to Lindfield Bridge, for many years during the 19th century, was a wharf, mainly for coal carried up the river from Lewes. The facility to transport coal in bulk by barge allowed Lindfield residents to enjoy cheaper coal and increased its usage in the village.

Enforcing a County Court Judgment

LISTEN TO THE LAWYER

Question: I have obtained a CCJ against a customer that didn't pay his bill. He is still refusing to pay, what can I do? Answer: When trying to recover money you are owed by a debtor, obtaining a CCJ (County Court Judgment) is only half the battle. If that debtor still refuses to pay the debt, you will need to enforce the terms of the CCJ through the courts. There are several methods of enforcement available and which to use is somewhat dependent on the information you have about the debtor and the value of the debt.

If you happen to have previously acquired the debtor's bank account details by legitimate means (perhaps they were included on a previous payment he made to you), you can apply to the court for a third-party debt order. If the application is granted, the court will, if the account has sufficient funds, order the third party (in this example the bank) to pay you directly to settle the CCJ. Likewise, if the debtor is employed, and you have the contact details of his employer, you may be able to apply to the court for an attachment of earnings order. This will, if granted by the court, result in the employer making deductions from the debtor's wages every month to pay directly to you. The amount of the deduction is dependent on the debtor's salary.

If the debt is large, and you are aware that the debtor is a homeowner, you may be able to apply to the court for a charging order to be registered against his property. This will secure the debt but may not necessarily result in it getting paid. If, however, a charging order is made you may then be able to make a further application for an order that the property be sold by the court to pay off the CCJ.

Perhaps the easiest and cheapest means of enforcing, however, is to instruct the County Court bailiffs (or, alternatively, if the debt is greater than £600, the High Court enforcement agents). Once instructed, they will attend the debtor's property and demand payment of the debt. If they are not able or willing to pay, the bailiffs or enforcement agents are authorised to remove goods owned by the debtor to the value of the CCJ.

It is important to consider the financial status of a debtor before issuing court proceedings. A 'man of straw' may of course be unable to satisfy a CCJ, irrespective of which method of enforcement you use. For a modest fee, a private detective can be instructed to report on the financial standing of an individual or company that owes you money, and this is a prudent step to take prior to commencing formal legal action against a debtor.

Thought-provoking exhibition success

Sunday afternoon on 4th November saw the 'Lindfield Remembers World War One' exhibition held in the King Edward Hall. It was well attended, with over 300 people coming through the doors to look and read the information on show.

The exhibition was presented jointly by Mid Sussex Red and Lindfield History Project Group using photographs and artefacts of the period from their archives.

The exhibition included 'Life in Lindfield during World War One', 'The Lindfield men who did not return', '94 years of the Royal British Legion in Lindfield' and a WWI Canteen.

Lindfield Bonfire Society presented a Living History Museum in the form of a

World War One mini hospital, to replicate the use of the building as a military hospital at the time. The Bonfire Society members also ran the canteen. The Lindfield branch of the Royal British Legion had a table at which members displayed their poppy appeal materials.

Particularly poignant was the reflection space given over in the Library to the 'There but not There' soldier silhouettes. These were part of a national initiative which provided the dignified seated silhouettes to enable



people to remember those who died during the First World War.

Many thanks must go to the Comber's Trust for its support which enabled the exhibition to take place and to all those people who gave their time and help on the day. Over £300 was raised from donations, which was divided between the Royal British Legion, Lindfield Bonfire Society, Lindfield History Project Group and Mid Sussex Red.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS MAY 2019 – BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR

Are you interested in representing your local community? If so, then have you considered standing for the position of a Parish Councillor in May's election?

As a parish councillor you will represent the views of all residents within your parish. You will be part of the council that as a corporate body has responsibility for running local services, including public toilets, street lighting, allotments and street furniture. You will also take part in budgeting by deciding on how much to raise through the council tax in order to deliver council services. The role offers the opportunity to influence and shape the long-term development policy for the parish, and, as part of the planning process, comment on planning applications in the parish. You will have the potential to improve the quality of life and the environment in the local area. By liaising with parishioners, you will work to identify issues which are important to their lives and well-being. You will seek to bring about improvements through local projects, lobbying other service providers and working in partnership with other parishes and agencies.

In order to stand as a Parish Councillor you must:

- · be a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or
- · be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or
- be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union; and
- · be 18 years of age or older,
- be eligible to vote in the Lindfield Parish Council election; or in the past 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish; or work in the parish (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the parish boundary.

The term of office for a parish councillor is four years. You will be expected to attend evening meetings and other meetings on an ad hoc basis. Each of the council's committees meets six times a year, except for the Planning and Traffic committee which meets every three weeks. Full council meets every two months. Parish Councillors are expected to serve on at least two committees.

Elections take place on Thursday 2nd May 2019. If you would like to know more about this opportunity, please do not hesitate to contact us.

Tips for good soup making

- The smaller the ingredients are sliced or chopped, the quicker they will cook.
- Onions, leeks, peppers and all root vegetables benefit from a light fry before adding liquid, to bring out their natural sweetness. Alternatively arrange the lightly oiled chopped vegetables on a baking tray, pop in the hot oven when cooking something else, then cool and refrigerate to make the soup later.
- When a recipe includes milk or cream always reheat very gently to avoid curdling. Evaporated or coconut milk is great in soups too.
- Most vegetable soups, just like casseroles, taste even better the day after making. Soups freeze well too.

Butterbean and Lemon Soup

Tip a 400g can butterbeans into a sieve and rinse under cold water. Put in a pan with some crushed garlic, finely grated rind and juice of 1 unwaxed lemon and 300ml vegetable stock. Bring just to the boil, simmer for 5 min then buzz (processor or blender) until smooth after adding 2tbs dried milk powder. Return to the pan and stir in a further 300ml stock. Season to taste, gently reheat and serve sprinkled with chopped chives, crisp bacon or grated cheese.

Soup, soup, glorious soup, nothing quite like it for ... I think we have Flanders and Swann to thank for that cheerful phrase but there is certainly nothing like a bowl of home-made soup to cheer up a grey winter's day. Easy to make, they can contain many ingredients, most of which you will probably have to hand. Use whatever flavour of stock you have available, tomato juice is also a good liquid to use. Be creative with your toppings – croutons, grated cheese or finely shredded ham, crisp bacon, soured cream or crème fraiche or a spoonful of pesto – whatever is appropriate or you have handy. A good soup served with crusty bread makes a great light meal.



Spiced Parsnip Bisque (Serves 4-6)

Put 1 finely chopped medium onion into large pan with 1tbs oil, crushed garlic to taste and 1tbs grated fresh ginger root. Cook, stirring, until just soft. Add 375g peeled and thinly sliced parsnips and a large peeled and sliced baking potato plus 600ml hot stock and 1tbs curry paste. Simmer until soft. Puree in the processor or blender, adding 2tbs milk powder. Return to the pan and reheat to serving temperature.

Cheese and Chive Scone

No complicated rolling out or cutting into rounds plus the chive flavouring comes already in the cheese. Extra good eaten freshly baked but could be gently reheated or split and toasted.

Preheat oven 200C and place a baking sheet in the oven. Sift 225g SR flour into a bowl (or the processor) with 1tsp baking powder and a good pinch of salt. Rub in (or buzz) 50g butter to make coarse crumbs. Stir in 50-75g grated Cheddar cheese with chives (or onion) then gradually stir in 150ml milk to make a soft dough. Tip on to a floured surface and knead gently just until smooth. Pat into a 15cm round. Place on the hot baking sheet and, using the back of a knife, quickly make deep cuts in the dough to make 6-8 wedges (do not cut all the way through). Bake for about 15 min or until well risen and golden brown.



Proud grandparents celebrate

When Ocean Brothers Greg Bailey and Jude Massey set foot on dry land after their gruelling Atlantic row last year, there were tears, celebrations and a new world record set!

And no one could have been prouder than the boys' grandparents Ron and Anne Skinner from Lindfield who had spent a nerve-racking 53 days tracking the perilous journey.

The brothers sailed into the record books as 19 year old Jude became the youngest person to cross the Atlantic as part of a pair. The brothers also smashed their fundraising target, raising over £100,000 for the British Skin Foundation.



Donations included £1,000 from the Weald Theatre Group, of which Anne is a long-standing member. Ever year the group donates proceeds from its annual pantomime at Clair Hall to charities and Anne was delighted when the Ocean Brothers was chosen.

Back on dry land, the boys were presented with the cheque and sent a message of thanks to Weald Theatre Group: "You have been instrumental in helping us to succeed," Greg told members. "We are bowled over with gratitude and appreciation."

The brothers embarked on the voyage after losing their father and step father Pete Massey to skin cancer. "A keen adventurer, Pete helped nurture the brothers' love of the sea along with wife Alex, who is a member of Lymington Yacht Club where Jude is a sailing instructor," said Anne. "After Pete's death, the brothers set about planning and training for the challenge, fuelled by their determination to raise money for research into skin cancer."

This time last year Anne and Ron were gearing up for many anxious weeks, as they followed their grandsons' progress on their 3,000 mile journey starting from Gran Canaria.

"Every day we would track their progress on the internet, along with family and friends, and send messages of love and support," said Anne. "It was a worrying time and I still get choked up thinking about it. I never want them to do anything like that again!"

The brothers spoke of how they battled against the elements and overcame serious setbacks including the GPS tracking system failing and water filter and automatic helm breaking down.

"At one point the weather was so bad that they capsized and had to batten down the hatches, retreating into the cabin and letting the boat take its own course," said Anne, who added that they were also followed by sharks.

"But they were also accompanied by a strange bird who followed them for several days, regularly landing on the boat," she added. "They named it Pete after their father."

The journey took its toll on the pair, who existed

on a vegan diet of rehydrated food, and suffered torn liquents as they took it in turns to row and sleep.

"It was so nice to get back to a place where the elements weren't trying to kill us," said Jude, who is now planning to go travelling, but this time on dry land!

But doctor Greg is a restless soul and has other plans. "He's already working on his next challenge," said Anne.

Members of the Weald Theatre Company are currently busy rehearsing for this



year's pantomime, Snow White and the Seven Dwarves at Clair Hall in Haywards Heath, from 8th-12th January.

As usual, writer and director Lance Milton has added a modern twist to the traditional tale including casting adults (rather than children) as the dwarves. This year, proceeds will be split between local charities – Woodlands Meed School and St Peter and St James Hospice.

Folk of Lindfield boost fundraising for Will

Christmas came early for the family of Will Bennett, the former Lindfield student who lost both lower legs following an horrific climbing accident, with the news that their £50,000 fundraising target had been reached.

They can now go ahead and order the special all terrain wheelchair and van, which will get Will mobile and on the path to reaching his dream of competing in the Paralympic Games.

"It's fantastic news and the best Christmas present the family could have wished for," said former neighbour Julie Reason, from Noahs Ark Lane, who has co-ordinated fundraising

efforts locally. "I know the family were planning a special Christmas Day lunch with Will, so this will give them an extra reason to celebrate!"

The fundraising appeal was launched after Will Bennett, a soldier and former pupil at Lindfield Primary School and Oathall Community College, became paralysed and lost both legs following a rock climbing accident. The Bennett family is well known in the village – dad Geoff was the village policemen and a scout leader for many years and mum Anne a former driving instructor.

After reading about Will's accident in Lindfield Life, villagers rallied round to support the family and help

raised the funds needed to buy Will a special all-terrain wheelchair and adapted van

Recent fundraising efforts have included donations from recycled Christmas cards made by a local resident and a quiz night, complete with Elvis impersonator, at the King Edward Hall, which raised more than £4.000.

"I'd like to thank all those who supported our quiz night, and,



in particular Mandy Claidon who hosted the evening and provided our Elvis," said Julie. "We also had some fantastic raffle prizes donated by local businesses."

She added that she has been overwhelmed by the support from Lindfield residents.

"I can't thank the people of Lindfield enough for their amazing support. Without them this could never have been achieved," said Julie. "From those who dropped off Christmas cards for recycling, and donated to the just giving page, to the communities which organised fund raising events, and the

businesses which gave raffle prizes – you have all helped us to reach our target."

Will's mum Anne added: "Words can't describe how grateful we are to everyone who has donated to our appeal. The support and well wishes from the people of Lindfield have been overwhelming."

She added that Will, who is expecting to be discharged from hospital in February, has already been in touch with a company which customises vans.

"He's already planning activities for when he gets back to Bristol and has had a taste of wheelchair rugby," she said. "He's aiming to join the Bristol team as well as going back to his rock climbing."

Sussex brings European women's football championship home




The American Express Community Stadium in Brighton has been named as one of nine match venues for the UEFA European Women's Championship in 2021.





It is with great sadness that we have to report the passing away of John Jesson, our head of planning matters, in August. John was an active member of the Society for more than 20 years and was a key contributor to our management committee. He had a high level of expertise in planning and led our responses to planning applications of all sizes. John was also a true friend who will be greatly missed.

Planning issues

Early in 2018, the Secretary of State for Housing allowed an appeal by Wates against Mid Sussex District Council's refusal of planning permission for 200 homes south of Scamps Hill. His decision ran counter to the recommendation of the Planning Inspector who heard the appeal and who concluded that it should be dismissed. Current government policy is so heavily weighted in favour of development – regardless of local concerns – that this outcome is sadly typical.

A further speculative application for 43 dwellings at Portsmouth Wood Close received outline planning permission in 2017, despite strong local opposition. A detailed 'reserved matters' application has, however, yet to emerge. There are serious questions about land stability and flood risk on this site. We will argue that these concerns must be addressed thoroughly when the developers submit their full design proposal.

Following widespread objections, an application for a large complex of blocks of flats and houses on the Tavistock and Summerhill School site has been withdrawn. This urban scheme would have been entirely out of keeping with Lindfield's character. It is to be hoped that a more respectful plan will appear for this land.

We expect an attempt at a large development on the site of Haywards Heath Golf Club, which we will oppose. Another inappropriate housing estate here could only add to the cumulative pressure that speculative development has already placed on the infrastructure and character of Lindfield.

The Society has reviewed 120 planning applications over the year, taking a public position when this is considered appropriate.

Design awards

The Society has decided to recognise the efforts of individual residents who carry out building work using thoughtful design and materials that contribute to the preservation and sympathetic development of Lindfield. Certificates commending good craftsmanship and design throughout the village will be presented to the recipients at our AGM each year.

2019 will no doubt be another challenging year. We always welcome new members and in particular new participants on our management committee. We would like to thank all our members for your support in 2018 and wish you and all Lindfield Life readers a happy and peaceful New Year.




