We want to take the opportunity to say a huge thank you to all who have supported us in trying to reach our massive £16,000 target, and we are delighted to say, as of 11th June, we have raised £15,847.

On 18th July 1999 the work to produce the magnificent tapestry which covers the east wall of St Augustine's Church in Scaynes Hill was finally concluded when, in a special service, the Bishops of Horsham and Chichester blessed the finished tapestry. This year marks the twentieth anniversary of the tapestry, and the church is going to celebrate the occasion with a special Tapestry Open Afternoon on Saturday 20th July.

The tapestry came about in 1990 when members of the church wished to mark the 60th anniversary of Scaynes Hill becoming a separate parish from Lindfield, and the idea of creating a tapestry to cover the entire blank east wall was proposed. After a long period of planning, the first stitch was put in on 9th December 1991. Work continued for more than seven years with the final stitch being put in on 28th January 1999 after which the last of the three panels was hung in place. This was a remarkable achievement for a small village church.

The tapestry was designed by the artist Polly Hope and was stitched by local people. A dedicated group of about a dozen people stitched regularly but about 250 people from all over the world put in stitches. There are three million stitches in all!

Polly's design is based around stories from St John's Gospel. The amount of detail is extraordinary and the colours used are truly glorious.

Since its completion many hundreds of people have visited the church in groups to hear the story of the tapestry and enjoy a 'Tapestry Tea'. But we know that many local people have not had the opportunity to be part of a visiting group. On our Tapestry Open Afternoon everyone is welcome to drop into the church anytime between 2pm and 4pm. Short talks on the tapestry will run during the afternoon, and tea and cakes will be served in the annexe from 2.30pm to 3.30pm. We do hope that you will be able to join us on this special occasion.

Scaynes Hill WI scoop craft awards

Talented members of Scaynes Hill WI are becoming the ones to watch at the annual South of England Show competition.

The women regularly return home with awards in the arts, crafts, story writing and cookery classes, which attract entries from groups from across Sussex, but this year they excelled themselves with one of the most successful shows yet!

The group was one of only two WIs to enter all 13 classes and members picked up awards in almost every one, collecting three firsts, three seconds and one third prize rosette, alongside a Highly Commended and a Commended certificate. Scaynes Hill also won the Visitors' Choice in the painting.

First prizes were awarded for a hand embroidered sampler in the 'Sew Beautiful' class, a crochet bedspread in the 'Cottoned On' category and an exhibit entitled 'My Wl' which six members had put together. The exhibit featured a slice of Victoria sponge, flower arrangement, cloth napkin and a knitted tea cosy depicting a WI member!

Second prizes went to 'Summer Sensation', a flower arrangement featuring natural plant materials, '1919: A Woman's Story', a story and illustration based on a woman's experience at the end of the first world war, and 'A Summer Picnic', a hand knitted seasonal scene, which included a knitted bicycle, picnic basket, cricket bat and ball! The scene was made by three main members with contributions from a further 12.

The third prize rosette was proudly pinned on to Scaynes Hill WI's very own life sized scarecrow made from recycled materials, including drinks cans and a kilt made from sewn together crisp packets, in a class entitled 'If I only had a brain'.

Scaynes Hill's entries were also appreciated by the visiting public who voted their painting, bedspread, knitted scene and 'My WI' cooperative best in class and their knitted scene overall 'Best in Show'.

Susan Lodge, who co-ordinated the Scaynes Hill entries, said: "I am so very proud of all our members who took part. We may be a relatively small WI but we certainly pack a punch when it comes to craft!"



Matt's footie journey

It's often said that it's not the team with the best players that wins, it's the players with the best coaches.

And when Lindfield football coach Matt Beard led the West Ham women's football squad to this year's cup final at Wembley, following their most successful season ever, much of the credit has to sit with the team on the touchline.

"Of course you need good players, but you need good people behind them and to be able to trust everyone to do their job," said Matt. "From the coaches and physio, to team doctor to the video analyst, everyone has a role to play in building a successful team."

But Matt is certainly not resting on his laurels following the team's success and is busy planning for the season ahead and raising the bar for his players. And with women's football enjoying a massive surge in popularity, there's everything to play for.

Matt looks back over his career to date, from his early days as a professional footballer, to his coaching career in the men's and women's game and his cup final glory.

Matt was brought up in South London, living in Colliers Wood, Sutton and Wimbledon.

Football was very much part of family life. "Dad was a scout and youth development officer for Wimbledon so I grew up with the game," said Matt.

"We were all great Wimbledon supporters, and I'll never forget the Cup Final in 1988 when we beat Liverpool 1 – 0 in one of the biggest shocks in the history of the competition!"

Matt attended Richard Challoner School in New Malden where he excelled at sport and was part of the school's most successful football team winning the Surrey and London Cup for the first time.

After leaving school Matt and his brother Mark went on to become professional footballers. "I played as a right full back for Brentford and Fulham, and Mark played for Wimbledon, Millwall and Sheffield United," said Matt.

But while Mark continued as a professional player, Matt turned his attention to coaching.

"Professional football didn't work out for me, so I got a job as an estate agent, enrolled on a coaching course, got my badges and began coaching non-league football," said Matt. "I became assistant coach

at Hampton and Richmond and then reserve team manager at Tooting and Mitcham, taking the team to 7th in the league and a cup final."

Matt's move into women's football came when he was offered the job of assistant coach at Charlton Athletic and then head coach for the Millwall Lionesses who were promoted to the premier league the following season.

As his reputation as a coach grew, Matt was offered a coaching job with Chelsea, a move which coincided with two other life-changing events. "I married my wife Debbie and we moved to Lindfield!" said Matt.

"My brother had lived in the village for some time and whenever I used to visit I'd always think how lovely it would be to live here. So when Debbie and I decided to get married and start a family Lindfield was the perfect place."

The pair married at Haywards Heath Town Hall and held a reception at the former White Horse pub. "It was such a fantastic location overlooking the pond, and we had a lovely relaxing day with family and friends."

However, commuting to Chelsea began to take its toll on Matt who reluctantly decided to leave the village for Epsom. "We were sad to leave but I needed to be near the training ground and commuting was taking up too much of my time."

There was a further move in 2012 when Matt took over as coach for the Liverpool women's team. "I was there for three years and we won the league twice."

Word of Matt's successful coaching record spread overseas, and he was head hunted by the Boston Breakers women's football team in America.

"By that time we had two children, Ellie and Harry, so moving to America was a great opportunity for the whole family," said Matt, who spent two years in America building the team. "The first year was a struggle as we had to completely rebuild the squad, but the second year was much more successful - the best since the team started."

Unfortunately in the third year the club folded after sale of the club collapsed, and Matt and Debbie decided to return to England and to Lindfield. "We'd had enough of moving around," said Matt. "Our children were growing up fast and we wanted to settle down somewhere where we could stay and become part of a community.

"We had always loved Lindfield, and we knew we'd be very happy moving back here. My brother Mark, who is now under 18 coach at Brighton & Hove Albion, is still here too, so we have no intention of moving again!"

Shortly after arriving back in Lindfield, Matt signed a contract with West Ham women's team. "The FA had launched a new league for the 2018/19 season," said Matt. "West Ham applied to be in the top division and was granted a licence. We were jumping two divisions, so it was a huge move for the club, and we only had six weeks to build the squad and recruit the staff.

"This was a completely different journey for me – building a team from scratch, getting to know the players and helping them to gel as a team," he said. "Only two of the players were from the original team, the rest were all new. It was a frantic time but we made it."

The first season brought more success than Matt and the team could have dreamed of.

"Our aim was to stay in the league but we actually finished seventh," said Matt. "But the icing on the cake was reaching the FA Cup Final – that really was a fairy tale ending."

The team travelled to the final at Wembley to face Manchester City. "It was such a fantastic day, and a great experience for the girls, playing in front of a crowd of 43,000. The result was disappointing but we will learn from it."

"I'm incredibly proud of the girls, who have been absolutely brilliant!" Matt added. "I think it helped that we all started together, so we have a real feeling of cohesion. The atmosphere has been fun and relaxing - if we didn't win a game, no one panicked!"

The club has also recently been the focus of a BBC documentary, Britain's Youngest Football Boss, which follows the story of 18 year old Jack Sullivan who manages the West Ham Women's team. "It's been fun having cameras follow us around!"

Matt is now busy planning for next season. "Our main target is to progress in the cup competitions and reach at least the quarter final stages," he said.

"It will be tough as Arsenal, Man City and Chelsea have huge financial support and will dominate for the foreseeable future, but we are hoping to be near the top of the others in the league," said Matt.

"It's not going to be easy but we have a good opportunity to take some real strides forward."

He added that the club is also developing a new College Academy for players aged 16 to 21, which will ensure that girls continue playing after they leave school, along with a regional talent centre for 9 to 16 year olds.

"The profile of women's football has enjoyed a huge surge with more big businesses interested in sponsoring the game, which will all help with development," said Matt. "Girls now know they can now have a career as a professional footballer, and the success of the England team is attracting more players and supporters.

"So many people tell me they enjoy watching the women play more than the men," he added. "It's a very honest game – you don't get diving and cheating! It's not as fast and powerful as the men's game yet, but it's getting better tactically and as the players get stronger it will go from strength to strength."

With the Lionessess currently in France for the World Cup, interest in the game is reaching a peak. "The Lionesses have a good chance but America, Holland and Australia are all looking strong," said Matt. "It's going to be an exciting tournament that's for sure!"

A hoot a minute!

Hollyrood, a residential support service in Lindfield for people on the autism spectrum, invited 'Owls and About' to showcase their beautiful birds to service users.

Five different owls, all of which were hand-reared and were very used to being stroked and handled, were given to service users to hold. The mother and son team, who are private owl owners with many years' experience, take the birds to a number of events to help increase public awareness and raise money for good causes.

Service users were delighted and in awe of the magical creatures as they learnt all about their new friends. Rachel Priestly, Service Manager at Hollyrood, said: "I am so pleased that staff and service users are able to enjoy this treat. It makes a real difference to their day if they are able to do something out of the ordinary, and this is definitely not ordinary. It gives everyone a chance to come together, learn and enjoy this wonderful experience. Not many of us are able to be this close up and personal to these beautiful birds."

"This visit was only possible thanks to donations from the public," said Fundraising Manager Hayley Wicker-Bradbury. She also commented: "It fills me with great pride and pleasure to be able to support service users in this way. Public support gives The Disabilities Trust the ability to make activities like this a regular option rather than a one off. We would like to thank everyone who makes a contribution."



Coaching is everywhere...but what is it really?

Life coaching, executive coaching, business coaching, success coaching... so what is coaching and how does it differ from training and mentoring? All of these terms tend to be used interchangeably, and it does get confusing since all three approaches seek to take a person to the next level, whether in a work setting, their own development or in dealing with life, generally.

Training as a way to impart knowledge

Coaching is a process to drive personal development In contrast, coaching focuses specifically on enabling an individual to grow and develop.

Coaching helps the client identify their needs. These may not always be clear at the start and, as a result, different needs may come to the fore over time. - Coaching is collaborative, participative, flexible and is an active process
- Coaching signals personal investment and creates a positive ripple-effect


LINDFIELD IN BLOOM

Cooking for the warmer weather





Gratin of New Potatoes and Ham (Serves 4)

Preheat oven 180°. Cook 450g tiny new potatoes, drain and roll in a tea towel to remove any moisture. Tip into a shallow buttered baking dish with 225g diced cooked ham. Combine 150ml double cream with 150g diced blue cheese and pour over the ham and potatoes. Bake for about 15min until a rich golden brown. Serve with a crisp green salad.

Seafood and Rice Bowls (Serves 4)

In a large pan whisk together 175ml vegetable stock, 2tbs sun-dried tomato paste, 1tsp chilli sauce (or more to taste) and 400ml can coconut milk (full or low fat). Peel a medium-sized butternut squash and cut into bite-sized pieces. Deseed and cut 1 red pepper into strips and slice several spring onions. Add to the pan, bring just to the boil then reduce the heat, cover and simmer just until squash is soft. Stir in the juice of 1 lime, 200g large shelled prawns and 400g mixed diced seafood. Continue to cook until the fish is cooked – it will only take a few minutes. Serve in bowls over hot cooked rice – this is where 'boil-in-the-bag' Basmati comes in handy. Garnish with lime wedges and serve with garlic bread.

Warmer weather makes me less inclined to spend so much time in the kitchen but we still get hungry! Happily we have a wide choice of home-grown summer fruits and vegetables to choose from which makes deciding what to eat much easier. Most require little or no cooking and are so simple to prepare. Sussex Blue cheese is made at Five Ashes near Mayfield. Lightly veined and very creamy you will find it in local cheese shops. New potatoes do not travel or keep well, so buy little and often – and local, Cornish or East Anglian grown.



Chicken with Tomato and Pesto Sauce (Serves 2)

Cover 3 large tomatoes with boiling water and leave until the skins begin to split. Drain, peel and cut into wedges, discarding the seeds. Gently fry 2 large boneless chicken breasts (with or without skins) in 2tbs olive oil until golden brown. Spoon the tomatoes round them and continue to cook while you combine 200ml crème fraiche, 3tbs pesto sauce (hopefully home-made) and seasoning to taste. Add to the pan and bring just to a gentle bubble. Cover and cook over low heat for about 15 min or until chicken is cooked through.

Chicken and Fruit Salad (Serves 4-6)

Whisk together 150ml each of mayonnaise and natural yogurt, 2 finely chopped pieces of stem (preserved) ginger and season to taste. Stir in 900g diced cooked chicken, 225g green grapes, some finely chopped spring onions and celery sticks (about 4 of each). Season to taste. Drain a 227g can pineapple slices, cut into quarters and stir in. Chill until serving time. Line a large platter with lettuce leaves, spoon on the salad and top with salted roasted peanuts.

Tipsy Cake (8-10 slices)
Cut a sponge cake horizontally into three slices, place one on a flat plate and sprinkle with sweet sherry. Top with layer of thick custard and soft fruits. Repeat with the second layer of sponge, sherry, custard and fruits then place the third layer on top. Sprinkle with sherry then spread whipped cream over the top and sides. Refrigerate overnight then just before serving top with more fruit, toasted almonds and mint sprigs.



By Richard Bryant, Lindfield History Project Group This month's article looks at the reason why there is a burial ground at Walstead and its design. Until the early part of the 19th century burial facilities were mainly provided by the Church of England in parish churchyards and, for some high status burials, inside churches in vaults sunk into the floor. All Saints Church, like many other parish churches across the country, had existed for close on a thousand years and its churchyard had become full. Existing burials were frequently disturbed by new graves with the consequent fear of risk to public health. Similarly new interments within the church also gave rise to health concerns. There were also issues concerning the burial of non-conformists and members of other religions, as parish churchyards were exclusively Analican.

The churchyard at Lindfield was so full, it is said, new burials were being interred on top of existing graves, which accounts for the raised ground in the northern part of the churchyard.

The government, recognising the widespread nature of these problems, passed the Burial Acts 1853. This Act allowed for the Parish Vestry, forerunner of a Parish Council, to form a publicly financed local burial board to establish a burial ground. Furthermore by 'her Majesty in Council' an order could be made that required the discontinuance of burials at specific locations. Such an Order in Council passed on 30th January 1854 applied to Lindfield, requiring 'burials to cease at once under the church and from and after the first of May 1854 in the churchyard burial ground'.

Lindfield churchwardens and parish overseers were faced with establishing a burial board together with the urgent and difficult task of finding a new burial ground.

Their aim was to acquire land near the parish church but owners were not willing to sell. Two grants extending the closure date for the Lindfield churchyard were given, to allow time to find a site, with the final deadline being 1st September 1854.

A two-acre plot on Walstead Common on the northern side of East Mascalls Lane was eventually identified as a suitable site. Walstead Common at that time covered over 35 acres and was part of the Manor of Walstead held by the Earl of Chichester, who made the land available.

A Vestry Meeting held on 11th May 1854 agreed that the Lindfield Burial Board could borrow the money 'required for providing and laying out the new burial ground' and for it to be charged to the parish poor rate. It was further agreed that the Board should 'provide fit and proper places in which bodies may be received

and taken care of previously to internment and to make arrangements for the reception and care of the bodies to be deposited therein'.

At a further Parish Vestry meeting on 29th June 1854, the Burial Board was authorised 'to expend the sum of Twelve Hundred pounds for the purpose of providing and laying out the New Burial ground.'

The following are examples of the Burial Fees set by the Parish Vestry to apply from 19th October 1854:

There was no tradition of cemetery design to draw upon and small burial grounds, like Walstead, were often utilitarian but with design references drawn from small country estates that is to say, an entry lodge, some landscaping, boundary walls and the mortuary chapels taking the place of the country house as the focal point. These four elements can be seen to this day in the Walstead Burial Ground.

Two mortuary chapels, stood a short distance behind the Entry Lodge, formed the focal point of the burial ground. The identical adjoining chapels each having their own porch and doorway, were dedicated for the separate use of the Church of England and Nonconformists. The Church of England chapel was on the eastern side. They were described, in language of the day, as being for 'Episcopal' and 'Dissenters' respectively.

The simply designed brick chapels with tiled roofs in the traditional ecclesiastical style had wood lined tunnel vaulted ceilings and tall stone framed, three light arched windows. By the 1900s the Chapels and Lodge were heavily covered in ivy. Today the Chapels have been sympathetically restored to retain their original character and are used as offices.

The Entry Lodge built of brick with a tiled roof had living accommodation on either side of the central arch and gabled entranceway that ran through the middle of the building. This archway, with sufficient width to permit the passage of a horse drawn hearse, aligned with the Mortuary Chapels behind, which had pathways running to their respective porches. The arch, although now bricked in, remains visible in outline at the rear of the lodge.

The original boundary wall enclosing the ground was built to a strict specification requiring a uniform height of five feet and one brick thick. This wall was replaced, when the burial ground was enlarged and the boundaries realigned, with the more substantial walls that largely exist today.

The original two acre site was laid out with two wide curving pathways running northwards across the burial ground from each mortuary chapel. Trees were planted around the perimeter and the ground generously planted with evergreen bushes such as yews and rhododendrons. Remnants of this planting can still be seen.

In the original layout the ground to the east was consecrated land for Church of England burials. A central area was given over to common graves, burials without headstones and those buried at the expense of the Parish. The ground on the western side was non-consecrated ground for Nonconformist and other burials.

In 1905 Lindfield Parish Council, the owners at the time, acquired an additional two and a quarter acres of land to enlarge the burial ground to its present size. The two footpaths extended to the new northern boundary have since been removed. Although perhaps not as pristine as in years past it remains a tranquil resting place, now under the care of Lindfield Rural Parish Council.

Snagglepuss by Mark Russell and Mike Feehan

BOOK REVIEW

This stunning graphic novel is set in a cold war America where lions, dogs and men walk the streets together, all under the glowing banner of capitalism. All is not well, however, as our protagonist Snagglepuss (a celebrated author and playwright) soon reveals. Beneath the facade of freedom, McCarthyism is on the rise; the gay community, including Snagglepuss, must hide their sexuality for fear of prosecution. Our hero becomes embroiled in the second red scare, and the novel tracks his desperate battle against the committee of un-American activities; a fight that could well spell his doom.

One of the key messages of the novel is the question of how we should define freedom. Should we place the freedom from foreign threats above other concerns or should freedom of speech, belief and mind be a country's true measure of liberty? In this debate the book succeeds admirably. It paints a realistic picture of the inner conflict of 1950s American society beneath the economic boom and capitalist euphoria. Students of history will enjoy the parallels to reality that the book brings.

Without a doubt, Snagglepuss is the best graphic novel I've ever read. An often overlooked literary form here is mobilised to its full potential. Far from being a 'comic', Snagglepuss exists at the crossroads of film and literature, taking the best from both to create a story with profound depth and meaning.

ANNUAL REPORT 2018/19

CHAIRMAN'S OVERVIEW

(Chairman of Council, Councillor William Blunden)
Once again this has been an interesting and busy year
for your Parish Council. Developers continue with their
quest to build on the green fields that surround our
village creating problems for our residents. The Parish
Council works closely with our colleagues on the Rural
Parish Council and the Lindfield Preservation Society
when considering large applications.

During June we held a public consultation on the proposed replacement public toilets on the Common. This resulted in the Parish Council applying for planning permission, which was approved on 29th March 2019. The Parish Council will do all that it can to complete this project as quickly as possible but there is a due process that it must follow.

We were sorry to lose two of our Councillors during the year, Simon Hodgson and Matt Damsell, both due to work commitments. I would like to record the Council's appreciation for the contribution they both made during their time as Councillors and wish them both well for the future. However, on the plus side we gained one new Councillor when lan Wilson was elected.

During the year we appointed a new member of staff; John Cunningham is now our Village Orderly. John quickly proved to be a great asset to the Council and village in minimising the effects of the disbanding of the CIC group (which had previously carried out similar tasks).

Following on from the Road Traffic Study the Parish Council purchased two SIDS (speed indicator devices). The Village Orderly, under the supervision of the Clerk, has been deploying the SIDS in different locations in the village, which has resulted in the lowering of the speed of most cars. The data recorded by the devices has been very useful and is shared with West Sussex County Council.

PLANNING & TRAFFIC COMMITTEE

(Acting Chairman: Councillor Ron Plass) The Traffic Study consultation showed that residents feel very passionately about issues relating to traffic within the village. All the data has now been collated and the report has now been submitted to WSCC Highways for review. We are hoping our WSCC Cllr Andrew Lea will do everything in his power to bring

some of the recommendations to fulfilment. The Parish Council decided to purchase two SIDS, which has had an immediate impact to the benefit of the residents.

The Committee has continued to review applications in the village, fulfilling its role as a statutory consultee. In the 2018/19 financial year the Council has reviewed 148 applications. Additionally, the Council has also considered, and opposed, large scale applications within the Lindfield Rural Parish Council boundary.

Within our own Parish the Committee has recently raised objections to the proposed development on the former Tavistock and Summerhill School site.

The Parish Council agreed to back a resident's traffic regulation order application for Lewes Road.

The Council successfully applied to MSDC for a grant in order to purchase a remembrance beacon, which was lit on 11th November as part of the National Remembrance event. The event was very moving and well attended.

Additional crocuses were purchased and planted in the High Street verges.

Replacement litter bins have been purchased and installed around the village.

Christmas Festival Night was a huge success thanks to the work of our Clerk, Deputy Clerk and the Working Group.

Arranged six refuse freighter visits to the Tollgate car park.

We continue to organise the Village Spring Clean, which has

FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE

(Chairman: Councillor Stephen Henton)

The Finance and General Purposes Committee is responsible for overseeing and reviewing the day to day financial matters of Lindfield Parish Council and to recommend to the Council the annual budget and the precept to be levied for the Parish. Staffing and the Parish Office accommodation also come under the remit of this Committee as well as governance, insurance, risk assessment, production of the Lindfield Parish Directory and Year Book and any matters of policy which do not fall clearly within the responsibilities of the other Committees or where there is conflict between them.

Putting together the annual budget is a major task. As Lindfield Parish Council has very little income from other sources, most of its funds have to come from the annual precept, which is one element of the Council Tax. In 2018/19 the precept was £156,000. If the amount required to fund the budget is underestimated, the Council is unable to obtain any further sums from other sources, other than loans for particular capital projects, so it is essential that reserves are held as a safeguard in case of unexpected but necessary expenditure. After careful consideration of the budget for 2019/20, it was agreed to retain the precept at £156,000.

Full copies of the accounts are available from the Parish Office. A breakdown of the budget for 2019/20 is enclosed with this report, together with an abbreviated version of the receipts and payments for 2018/19.

The ongoing work of the Committee includes reviewing monthly income & expenditure against the budget, carrying out periodic checks on the financial records and reporting to Council annually on the effectiveness of the internal audit and internal control procedures. The finances of the Council are subject to both external and internal audit – to date no significant problems have been identified and some helpful suggestions have been followed up.

The proposed capital project for providing public conveniences on the Common also comes under this Committee. In the summer a public consultation was held and 97% of those who responded agreed that they would like to see the provision of public toilets on the Common. The council successfully applied to Mid Sussex District Council for planning permission, which was granted on 29th March 2019. The next steps for this project are as follows:

- Apply for permission from the managers of Lindfield Common to undertake the works set out in the approved planning application
- Apply for permission under the Commons Act 2006 for consent to build on common land
- Apply to Mid Sussex District Council for grant funding Each year the Council sets aside an amount of money in the F&GP Committee's budget for grants/donations, either to local village based groups or to organisations whose activities benefit residents of our Parish.



Several planning and traffic matters are currently affecting our village:

Taylor Wimpey: 130 units at Gravelye Lane / Lewes Rd

Construction of Taylor Wimpey's housing estate, dubbed 'Lindfield Meadows', at Gravelye Lane on the ridge overlooking the Village Common, is now in progress. We are keeping a close eye on proceedings with a view at least to minimising its impact by preserving the trees on the ridgeline, which provide some level of screening.

Tavistock and Summerhill School site

The site of Tavistock and Summerhill School was subject to a highly inappropriate proposal for large blocks of flats that was withdrawn last year following widespread opposition. A subsequent application for 38 units is now under review. The new proposal remains in our view a transparently speculative attempt to overdevelop and urbanise this prominent site, and we have objected to it.

Reside Developments: 48 houses at Portsmouth Wood Close (now being pursued by Croudace)


We still await a detailed planning application for 48 houses off High Beech Lane, a scheme that received outline planning permission despite a history of land instability and flooding in that area. We will work to see these issues addressed fully when the application materialises.

Haywards Heath Golf Course

The would-be developers seem to have adopted the tactic of attempting to have this site included in the District Council's next list of sites officially allocated for development. This would effectively grant permission in principle for large-scale house building. We expect a public consultation on site allocations this summer. It will be very important at that stage for residents to object to including this site on the Council's list.

Campaign to stop Heavy Goods Vehicles

We, as well as other concerned residents, continue to lobby West Sussex County Council to restrict the intolerable levels of HGV traffic rat running through Lindfield. The Council refused to act on our detailed proposal of 2016, which would have banned HGVs from minor roads (except for access) across the district. Local residents, with our support, are now pursuing the more limited objective of at least banning them from Lewes Road between Gravelye Lane and the High Street (except for access). This would largely remove the temptation for hauliers to use Lindfield as a short cut to sites farther east. Again West Sussex County Council is resisting, but we will persist.





Memories of Bell Ringing

It was my pleasure to write a few articles for Lindfield Life some years ago concerning my early days here in the village. Since the amazing work carried out recently at All Saints Church and the chance I had to see the new bells, it prompted me to write again about my early years here.

I was born in Lindfield in 1926 and spent the first 20 years of my life growing up here. A great deal of my growing up took place at All Saints Church, where I followed my brother Leslie into the choir. There was a full boys choir of 16 with some 12 men in those days. I joined the 'afternoon choir' when I was eight years old and graduated into the full choir soon after. My brother was Head Boy, and I followed him into that exalted position later on.

Visiting the church recently I was able to see the beautiful new bells on display, and that is what prompted me to write this short piece. My brother was a ringer and was very interested in the mathematics of the various peals that were rung. He used to write out all the 'changes' on long pieces of paper. When I was 11 years old I joined him in the bell tower and began to learn the way to ring. The Tower Captain was Mr Baines, and he allowed me to handle one of the lighter bells. I found the powerful swinging 'solly' often had a mind of its own and it took masterful hands to control it! This soft, coloured part of the bell rope was there for two reasons. I think. First to indicate to the ringer where to grab the dangerous swinging rope and also to save hands from damage in catching the rope as the swinging bell directed it. This is not surprising when you consider the weight of metal in a bell swinging around above your head in all but a full circle!

You will understand that my ringing days were very short as the war started and the lovely bells fell silent. My ringing days in Lindfield were all too soon curtailed.

I do know that the experienced can pull the bell into action, make it ring as expected with its full circular motion, hold the bell steady for a while when following a complicated pattern and then get the bell to 'set' (that is, remain upside down) ready for the next ring. All this they can do while watching the other ringers and making their bell strike at the right moment – something I sadly never got to learn but have the greatest admiration for the skills of those who can.

I was so pleased to see the new bells in church, as once they are hung in the tower they are seldom seen by anyone – just heard and enjoyed! May they ring out for many, many years to come. I will think of my brother ringing the old bells and of my very short time in the tower each time I hear them.

Now that the bells have been reinstated at All Saints Lindfield, you may hear them rung while tested and practised in the coming weeks. The first Sunday ring is expected to be on

Did you know that in the year 2003 the recycling of glass saved enough energy to launch ten space shuttle missions! Another problem that has grown is that we produce and use 20 times more plastic a day than we did 50 years ago. These problems will keep growing unless we do something about it.

THE IMPACT:

As I have said in earlier articles, plastic and non-recycable materials are finding their way into our oceans or adding to landfills, which is damaging our environment and the animals around us.

THE SOLUTIONS:

You can make loads of cool creations with your old packaging. These are unique and save buying new things that have lots of packaging.


Here are some ideas of the materials that you can use, but there are many more:

- Juice bottles/plastic milk bottles make fantasy fairy homes, beautiful terrariums and hanging baskets
- Old magazines cut some shapes (a tree, flower) out of some black card and place it on top of a mixture of bright magazine cuttings and make a flower or tree of pictures or words
- Yoghurt pots and string wind the string round the pot and make a money box

Cockhaise Farm Tours available

A recent visit to Cockhaise Farm in Monteswood Lane was enjoyed by 20 residents of Lindfield. The Fairer World Lindfield aroup was given a guided tour by farmers Jeremy and Dan Burdett who were keen to explain their approach to sustainable organic dairy farming. Jeremy has been on the farm since 1986 and his son Dan joined him in



Dan joined him in 2008. They have four full-time staff who look after 300 cows plus 100 young stock which are non-milking breeds. Cockhaise covers 700 acres and their method of farming aims to build soil fertility and create a vibrant ecosystem.

Dan told the visitors that for many years they had grown a large area of arable crops such as wheat, oats and beans, but now the farm is mainly growing grass. They are now bringing greater diversity into the fields to build up organic matter in the soil through 20 varieties of grass, herbs and deep rooting plants. Everyone was fascinated by the intricacies of managing soil and grass, which results in healthy

organic milk and greater biodiversity on the land.

RECYCLE THIS...

Colin McFarlin is a Volunteer Waste Prevention Advisor with West Sussex County Council and sheds some light on what can and can't be recycled.



Thank you for all your individual enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails to the editor on recycling. Do keep the questions coming...

Recycling bin overflowing?

We want to say a big thank you to everyone who recycles all that they can. The recycling rate in West Sussex is improving!

More and more people are recycling at home and, if your recycling bin is anything like ours, sometimes by the time it's due to be collected it's getting pretty full!

Some great advice is to 'wash and squash'.
Particularly for items such as milk and fizzy drinks
bottles, and detergent and bathroom bottles. Give them
a quick rinse and then squash them down. Do remember
to take the tops off.

Large items of cardboard can be torn into smaller pieces – the size of a cereal packet is ideal.

If you've done all this and your bin is still full then why not get in touch with Mid Sussex District Council who may be able to organise another recycling bin for you. Email: wastematters@midsussex.gov.uk

Just a little reminder though, please ensure that all your recycling is:

- CLEAN free from food and drink leftovers a quick rinse will do.
- DRY keep your recycling bin lid shut soggy paper and cardboard can't be recycled and can clog up machinery at the recycling plant.
- LOOSE not tied up in plastic bags.

TOPS OFF

I received an email asking how to recycle inhalers, and I would like to share the response with you all.

Nationally 73 million respiratory inhalers are prescribed every year in the UK and only 1.2 million are recycled.




First, locate your nearest participating pharmacy (https://bit.ly/1d95Cfj)

Then simply hand in your empty, out of date or unused inhalers. This service has been fully funded by GlaxoSmithKline.
