

# The committee from hell

Members of Lindfield Dramatic Club (LDC) have chosen master satirist Alan Ayckbourn's Ten Times Table as they return to comedy for this year's autumn production.

Last performed by LDC some 25 years ago, Ten Times Table sees Ayckbourn at his most impressive – analysing ordinary people in everyday situations – and was written in the 1970s when the author was at the top of his playwriting career.

We follow the planning and disastrous outcome of a group of members of The Pendon community as they plan their small town's first pageant, which is to be based on a long-lost piece of local history – The Massacre of the Pendon Twelve.

As the committee meetings in the long-since 'grand' ballroom of the Swan Hotel progress, we see a natural division between right-wing supporters of the patronising middle-class Helen, versus the bolshie left-wing teacher Eric and his two adoring female groupies. All have very different views of what the pageant should be and what it represents.

Battle commences. The day of the pageant arrives. And what was a mock-up of the event now becomes the real thing as both sides clash with hilarious and riotous results!

Ten Times Table is at the King Edward Hall on Thursday 31st October, Friday 1st November and Saturday 2nd November, starting at 8pm.

### Gordon's heading to the Royal Albert Hall

The spectacular annual Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall is watched by millions of people worldwide, and this year Lindfield residents will be watching just that little bit closer.

For Lindfield resident Gordon Upton will be among the dozens of standard bearers from all over the country proudly processing though the historic hall.

Gordon, who joined the Lindfield branch of the Royal British Legion around ten years ago and has been its standard bearer for the past two years, was chosen to attend the prestigious event from hundreds of applicants from all over the country after his wife Val, who is chairman of the branch, put his name forward.

He received the news by email. "Val told me she had nominated me but neither of us expected it to go any further," said Gordon, who lives in Luxford Road and is also a bell-ringer at All Saints Church. "I was extremely surprised but very honoured to be chosen. I'm already very nervous but it's a huge privilege."

The Festival of Remembrance is held to commemorate all those who have lost their lives in conflicts, and Gordon and Val believe this is the first time the Lindfield Royal British Legion Standard will be part of the proceedings.

Gordon is one of three standard bearers representing Royal British Legion branches across Sussex. The County Standard will also be carried in the parade, down the aisles and into the main hall.

The many highlights of the Festival include military displays and marching drills, choral works and prayers and the parade of servicemen and women and representatives from many uniformed organisations. The event ends with a million poppy petals dramatically falling from the roof of the hall and a two minute silence. There are two performances at 2pm and 7pm.

"I have to attend a rehearsal the day before the event and a training day in Hassocks when the standard will be inspected," said Gordon, who has bought a new black suit and beret for the occasion. Val will be proudly watching from her seat in the stalls, along with hundreds of others, including members of the Royal family.



Once the Festival ends, Gordon and Val will be heading straight back to Lindfield for the village's Remembrance Sunday service, parade and wreath laying in the afternoon.

It's one of three events where Gordon carries the Lindfield Royal British Legion Standard. The others are Armed Forces Day in June and Armistice Day on 11th November.

He's also called upon to attend funerals of exservicemen and women and British Legion members and other local events, and has taken over the organisation of the village Poppy Appeal following the retirement of Pauline Parkyns.

"It's going to be a very busy but unforgettable weekend for us," said Val. "It will be very moving to see Lindfield, represented by Gordon, at such a prestigious event."



Comic drama with dementia theme

coming to KEH

Following our feature last month on dementia, local resident and actor Stephen Gray tells us about a play that is coming to the King Edward Hall on 18th and 19th October.

Performed by the popular ACE Theatre Company, Bothered and Bewildered is a comic drama which tells the story of Irene and her two daughters Louise and Beth as they begin a long journey in which the girls lose their mum in spirit but not in body.

"It's a moving, comic and deeply understanding story of how Irene's deteriorating condition affects her and those around her," said Stephen, who plays an NHS consultant whose discussions with Irene's daughters helps them to come to terms with her condition and find a way forward.

"This bitter-sweet comedy is sure to provide both laughter and sadness as a family comes to terms with Altzheimer's disease," added Stephen. "While the girls are losing their mum in spirit, Irene is forming a new relationship with an invisible companion, the late romantic novelist Barbara Cartland, who helps her write a 'memory book' revealing profound secrets she has never shared – even with her family!

"Most of us know someone who is touched by this cruel disease in some way, and, although this is a serious subject, the play also finds the humour in the situations that the family find themselves experiencing.

"It's a moving and gentle play that exposes the dilemmas that any family could encounter when dealing with such a difficult subject. Full of wonderfully funny and poignant lines, this play is one that will touch many emotions."

Irene, one of the most challenging parts any actress can portray, is played by Chrissie White. Beth (Karen Hunt) and Louise (Hannah Jenkins) are her daughters who help her to stay at home and become her carers. Chris Clarke as Barbara Cartland plays a larger than life role as Irene's imaginary friend.

Supported by Josh Squire, Charlotte Faulkes, Kieran Gladman, David Burton and Steve Gray, the cast has delighted in putting this production together, sharing laughs and tears throughout the summer rehearsal period.

Lindfield gym and fitness centre Potential Personal Training (PPT) hosted a charity fundraiser last month to support one of its members.

68 year old Lindfield resident John De Longa has been a member of PPT for five years but sadly recently lost his wife Pat to cancer. Owner Maxine Hayes explained: "As a community we really wanted to do something to help John and to show our support. Although we have done various charity events over the last few years, we hadn't done anything like this! We thought the sheer endurance of the 'Zombike Challenge' would cause others to give or challenge them to take part!"

Personal Trainer Connor Pearce describes the resident assault bike as a 'misery machine', and so the team decided that organising 24 hours on the bike would be the perfect pairing of hard work and endurance – making completing it no mean feat! As they anticipated that participants would look like zombies afterwards, the event soon had its name too!

Over 130 people took part in the challenge, which ran from 8am to 8am in shifts of between 6-11 people. Two riders completed the whole 24 hours, and three rode over five hours each. The group ranged from 11 to 74 year olds, from casual exercisers to hardcore athletes. Over 500 miles was cycled on the tough bike, with over 16,000 calories burned.



Over £2,400 was raised for Cancer Research UK. Connor commented: "It was amazing, as a coach, to see the community come together for this cause and to support John. Young, old, fit or unfit – many did their time on the misery machine and cheered on their fellow riders."





The August local history article in Lindfield Life explained that the Common and Pond uniquely defined Lindfield and challenged that similar features could not be identified elsewhere in the country. It would be remiss not to pay tribute to another Lindfield icon, Humphrey's Bakery, about which a similar claim could be made. Namely, does any other community have a bakery that traded continuously from the same premises for 223 years?



The shonfront

At 65 High Street, Humphrey's shop front proudly proclaims the bakery was 'Established 1796'. Perhaps equally remarkable, it has been run by only three families since that date. Having regard to the bakery's history, it is appropriately located in one of Lindfield's oldest medieval buildings; Humphrey's, Bower House and Carriers were all constructed between 1300 and 1343. Its age is evidenced by the massive arched timber framing on the building's northern side, into which,

rather quirkily, three tiny windows have been cut. When viewed from the street it will be seen that Humphrey's shop is the cross wing of No 63 High Street, known as Wyncote. This is also of medieval date, although its age is not apparent having been re-fronted.

The early history of the building is yet to be fully discovered. However, a receipt document dated 1453, found during

redecoration in the late 1940s, states the property was then occupied by 'Thomas atte Ree', probably a farmer. He was paying rent of seven marks per quarter to his Lord of the Manor, the Dean of the College of Canons, South Malling. A mark was a unit of currency with a value of about 67p.

Returning to the bakery business, John Meads (1759–1826), a baker, first appeared in Lindfield parish records in December 1791, when with his wife, Ann, their daughter, Mary Ann, was baptised at the parish church. In 1793, he took on a William Murrell as his apprentice. John Meads appears again in the Poor Rate records as a ratepayer from 1797 at Humphrey's, which he rented from Thomas Blaker, a cordwainer. Accordingly, the claim that the bakery business at 65 High Street was established in 1796 is fully justified.

By the time of John Meads' death in November 1826 he owned both Humphrey's and Wyncote, having bought them from Thomas Blaker. Under the terms of John Meads' will, his wife Ann inherited all his property and goods. She continued to run the business until about 1838, when control passed to her daughter Sarah Smith and husband Edward Smith, also a baker. Ann Meads lived with Edward and Sarah Smith in the house until her death. In 1844 Edward Smith bought the business and property from her executors for £500.

During their marriage John and Ann Meads had nine children. Together with some of their children, they are buried in All Saints' northern church yard. His headstone forlornly reads:

Afflictions sore long time I bore Physicians were in vain Till death did cease and God Did to please to ease my pain

Their extended family became involved in many businesses up and down Lindfield High Street.

Edward and Sarah Smith and other family members ran the bakery business for some 40 years. The property was sold around 1883 to Henry Gasston, a local miller.

It is at this time the eponymous Richard Humphrey appears. Richard Humphrey senior was born Brighton in 1855. The Mid Sussex Times noted 'as a boy he was employed on the same premises by the late Mr Smith, who was widely known for his gingerbreads and brandy snaps. Mr Humphrey assisted in making vast quantities for the Lindfield Fairs'. Subsequently, as a Master Baker, he worked as a bread and biscuit maker in Haywards Heath.

On returning to Lindfield, in October 1883, Richard Humphrey senior entered into an agreement with Henry Gasston to rent the shop and dwelling (65 High Street) for £45 per year. Likewise his son Richard, also working in the business, rented the adjoining Wyncote, which at that time housed the bakery.

An advertisement in Clarke's 1884 Directory announced 'R Humphrey, fancy bread and biscuit maker, pastry cook and confectioner, High Street, Lindfield. Brown and home-made bread. Families waited on daily at Haywards Heath'.

Henry Gasston, as owner of both properties, in 1896 built the first detached bakehouse replacing the bakery in Wyncote. When Henry Gasston sold the properties to Richard Humphrey, senior, in 1912, this facility was described in the sale particulars as 'Bakehouse and Flour Room, fitted with Webber's 8-bushel Iron Oven, and Truck Shed, Stable for three horses, Van and Cart Shed, W.C., and Manure Pit. Well of Water.'.

Richard Humphrey senior and junior were still listed as running the business in early 1940. Following his father's death in March that year, Richard junior took control but sadly died less than two years later.

Richard Humphrey senior had been well respected and active in Lindfield, having served on many local committees and as a Parish Councillor. Like his father, Richard junior was a keen cricketer playing regularly for Lindfield Cricket Club.

Consequent upon the Humphreys' death, Clayton Wiles took over the bakery, having previously been a Master Baker and Confectioner in Guildford. He ran the business throughout the 1950s and into the 1960s. Following his passing in 1968, his son, David Wiles, took over the running of the bakery, having worked with his father for many years.

The name Humphrey's has continued and the beautiful old style shop front retained, but one major change was made. The modern bakehouse we see today replaced the old 1896 building.

Unfortunately the bakery closed this summer, it is understood, due to ill health. The Wiles family having provided excellent service to Lindfield for the past 77 years. There cannot be a resident, of any age, in Lindfield who has not enjoyed bread, cakes, pastries or a snack baked by David Wiles, our Master Baker. His doughnuts are legendary – thank you.

The community can only hope a bakery of similar quality will continue the 223 years of tradition established by the Meads/Smith, Humphrey and Wiles families.



Ireland has given the world many things – Guinness, Primark, the invention of colour photography, the world's first armoured tank and even the cure for leprosy. While the country might not have a culinary reputation to rival the French or the Italians, it is certainly well-known for good food and, specifically, good bread, just like our next interviewee and manager of The Bent Arms, Howard Collins.

After a string of failed attempts to make a profit out of The Bent Arms in the late 90s and early 2000s, Howard Collins stepped up to the plate in 2003 and has successfully managed the establishment ever since. In the beginning the business had few customers but lots of potential. "I stood outside, looked through the window and saw the Rotary Club meeting," Howard remembered. "I thought to myself – if nothing else, at least I've got 20-30 people coming to eat every week and decided to give it my best shot."

As an avid Boy Scout, Howard found his love for hospitality through the multiple charity events he was part of, many of which he'd be in charge of catering for. Upon deciding that university wasn't for him, he landed a job as a management trainee at a four-star hotel in the centre of Dublin. "The manager was French and I expressed an interest in spending some time working in Paris," Howard shared. After a few months, they found someone in Paris who wanted to take part in a reciprocal visit and, as they journeyed to Ireland, Howard found himself at the Plaza Athénée, a five-star hotel now part of the Dorchester collection. "It's just off the Champs-Élysées and I loved it. I'd have stayed longer but after two and a half years my work permit ran out and I had to leave," Howard explained.

Back in the UK, Howard set his sights on London and worked in management roles at a hotel in Bayswater



and then The Cumberland Hotel before taking over the food and beverage operations at Heathrow Airport. "Everything was made in-house at Heathrow in those times," he told me, "and I had 20-30 Urdu speaking ladies working on an incredible production line. I'm a dab hand at sandwich making now!"

In the 70s Howard moved to be Assistant Manager at a hotel in Maidenhead owned by legendary nightclub impresario Louie Brown, known throughout the West End as the 'King of Clubs'. Three managers had been sacked within six months before Howard took the reins. "I was on a one-week notice period," Howard said laughing, "which kept me on my toes. I paid every bill as soon as it came in just in case I was out of a job at the end of the week." During his two and half-year stint, Howard and his wife Rosalie welcomed their two daughters into the world – Katie, currently living in Spain and working as an artist, and Lorna, who bases herself in East Grinstead and is an opera singer.

The family moved back to Ireland when Howard's older brother suggested opening a restaurant above the hairdressing salon he owned. The eatery proved so popular that they started operating two sittings,



making sure the 6-7pm reservations knew they needed to be up and out by 8:45pm so they could reset for the 9pm sitting. "I remember customers would sit on the stairs and wait for the earlier guests to depart," Howard said, "and after a short while a first floor unit became available across the road which we used to run a satellite restaurant and cater for more people."

Howard and his brother opened a chain of successful

restaurants in and around Ireland's capital city, including The Front Page in Dublin's equivalent to Fleet Street in London. In the early 80s Howard's brother was involved in a car accident and sadly passed away. The Collins family took the decision to sell up and move to Glasgow, where Rosalie was born and grew up. "I took a job to support the management of four pubs for a chain which wasn't doing very well," Howard explained. "We tried to turn them around but in the end the owner filed for bankruptcy. Nine months previously the manager had decided to cut his losses, and, on hearing I was available, asked me if I'd like to join him in East Grinstead." The

family lived in East Grinstead for ten years before moving to Lindfield and taking over at The Bent Arms.

When not working – which is only one day per week – the Collins enjoy museums and will often venture into London for exhibitions, they like a good city break and green-fingered Howard takes the opportunity to keep his garden looking spectacular. "I'm always here at 6.30am to make the bread and mainly find myself filling the gaps in the operation of the pub," he said, "and if I can, I'll pop home between 3pm and 6pm when it's quiet as my house is directly opposite."

Howard attributes most of his character and drive

to his childhood upbringing. His parents moved from Latvia and Lithuania to Ireland in 1917, and while his father worked as a coal merchant, driving a horse and cart around Dublin, his mother stayed at home to look after her five children. "My mum used to bake for local suppliers and as we got older she actually started to really provide in a financial way for our family," Howard told me. "My mother taught all of us to bake, to sew,

to provide, to mend, and so we all grew up knowing how to cook and look after ourselves from a very young age."

The philosophy Howard works to is to always source the best quality, make everything from scratch and cut down on the margins, "if we wouldn't eat it, we wouldn't want anyone else too either," he added. Meat is well-hung before purchase and hung further in the fridges at the pub, bread is made freshly every morning and the team make it their mission to get everything right first time. "I'm so proud of The Bent Arms and the incredible staff team who I could not do without," Howard made clear. "My assistant manager Charlie

Fairhead (pictured above with Howard) has been here over 14 years, her sister even longer, and many more have worked with me for a long time."

If Howard were to give one piece of advice to any aspiring pub owners, he would say: "If you don't like hard work, don't do it. You can't just sit at the end of the bar and play host, you've got to be prepared for it to be your entire life. And that's why I love it."

Hall and Woodhouse crowned The Bent Arms with The Best Food 2019 earlier this year, so if you fancy some award-winning local grub, the pub is open all week long.



### Preparing to make spring great

LINDFIELD IN BLOOM

As the warm summer nights have slipped away we'll start to keep a watch for the first frosts in the garden.

Tender plants will need to be protected from the cold with a covering of horticultural fleece or by bringing them under the cover of a greenhouse or into a cool conservatory.

But as we put the garden to bed for the winter, we can enjoy the promise of new life by planting spring-flowering bulbs. All the local garden centres have a great range available and they're so easy to plant - simply dig a hole that is three times deeper than the height of the bulb and drop in the bulb, with the pointy end upwards, before replacing the soil back into the hole on top of the bulb. If you're planting tulips or alliums, pop a handful of grit or washed pea shingle into the bottom of the hole before placing the bulb on top, as this will help with drainage and will give these bulbs the best chance of surviving an overly wet winter ready for a fab display in the spring.

The great thing about bulbs is that they do well in pots as well as in the ground, so even if you don't have your own garden or are renting your property, you can pop them in a pot on your doorstep to enjoy every time you leave the house.

### New Village Day co-chairs introduced...

Why do you think Village Day important in Lindfield? KA: I think it is a fabulous event that brings the whole village and wider community together. DT: I love the fact it's just something that a few awesome people started over 40 years ago, and now it's a proper village tradition!

She encourages us to achieve cleaner air by walking and using electric vehicles, as fossil fuels are one of the main causes of climate change and air pollution.

If you are an eco warrior and want to get involved, don't doubt yourself because no one is to small to make a change! So go and run after your dreams just like Greta Thunberg!

#### **ORGANIC FOOD**

Organic food is a great way to help in the fight against climate change and also supports a healthy environment for both us and wildlife. 
It's every parent's nightmare – the cup of tea that wasn't quite out of reach, the oven door you were just about to close or those hair straighteners which you thought had cooled.

"It takes just a split second for a child to get burnt, and it can happen to anyone," says nurse Krissie Stiles who has spent over 15 years working at the burns unit at the Queen Victoria Hospital in East Grinstead.

"What's really important is to be aware of the potential dangers in your home and to know what to do if you or your child gets burnt. "I've seen so many cases where a simple knowledge of first aid for burns could have made a huge difference to a child's recovery."

The most common burns seen in very young children are to the face, torso and hands and are often the result of grabbing a mug from a table or bumping into someone holding a hot drink.

"It can happen to anyone, including me," said Krissie whose own son was burnt in an accident at a coffee shop in the village. "We were in the queue when a woman turned to leave the counter with her drink and collided with my son, spilling her hot drink on him. The café owners gave me ice, but I knew that wasn't the best thing and asked for water and cloths. Although ice can help to deaden the pain it can actually kill nerve endings and prevent healing." Krissie's medical background and her quick thinking prevented her son's burns from becoming serious.



"What happens in the time between the incident and the patient arriving at hospital is absolutely crucial and that often starts in the home," stressed Krissie, who has been surprised at the general lack of knowledge and misconceptions on how to treat burns.

"At the Queen Victoria we saw all sorts of 'first aid' applied to burns from butter and eggs, to toothpaste and turmeric," she said. "None of that helps. You need to hold the burn for 20 minutes under cool running water

- not freezing. If running water is not available, then soak clean cloths in water and apply to the burn.

"Once it has cooled you can cover the burn loosely with cling film. Not only does this keep the burn clean it also means that on arrival at hospital the staff can quickly see what they're dealing with."

With this in mind, Krissie has written a children's book 'The Family Oops and Burns First Aid', which uses rhyme to tell the story of the dangers found in most homes and gives advice on treating burns.

The book, which has been released to mark National Burn Awareness Day on 16th October, is illustrated by Jill Latter, who runs the art clubs at Lindfield Primary School where Krissie's son Sam is a pupil and daughter Lily attended before leaving for secondary school last term.

"I'd been looking for an illustrator for a little while and was in the school lobby when I spotted a fantastic new picture on the wall which had been commissioned by previous head Bob White," Krissie recalled."It was clearly a work of passion and love and I thought 'that's exactly what I want my book to look like!'

"When I found out that Jill was the artist, I showed her my poem and was thrilled when said she loved it and agreed to illustrate it for me. It was wonderful to see my characters come to life, particularly Baby Oops!"

The message is simple – Remove, Cool and Cover – but those three words could make a huge difference for burns victims.

"The effects of a burn can last for up to three hours after the incident, so anything you can do within that time can help begin the healing process and reduce scarring," said Krissie, who has helped treat hundreds of patients during her time working at the Queen Victoria.

"I went there straight after graduating from Brighton University, which was a bit of an odd choice as my first degree was in social psychology at Sussex University," said Krissie. "But in the third year of my degree I worked with the nurses in a care home and decided that's what I wanted to do.

"In the third year of my nursing degree I chose the Queen Victoria for my placement and ended up staying there for the next 15 years!"

The Queen Victoria has two wards separating adults and children, and an intensive care unit. Krissie has worked in all of them. "Working in the children's ward was incredibly hard, challenging and very emotional," she said.

"Children have the most severe burn injuries as their skin hasn't developed its adult thickness," she explained. "Serious burns in children can mean wearing a body suit for 24 hours a day and scar massaging four times a day.

"Looking after a child who has suffered from severe burns can put a massive strain on the whole family," she added. "Children under five won't remember the incident, but the parents have to live with the trauma and often the quilt."

Common childhood burns are from oven doors, ceramic hobs and hair straighteners. "When very young



children pick up something hot like hair straighteners they haven't developed the reflex reaction to let go so will hold on to it," Krissie explained. "This leads to deeper and more complex burns.

"These boiling water taps which are becoming more common in newly built houses are a real worry too, particularly when most children expect cold water to come out of a tap."

Chemical burns are also becoming more common in children. "Those

squishy washing tablets look like sweets and are very tempting for children," said Krissie. "But if the liquid gets into their mouth or eyes the gooey, high alkali substance is really difficult to wash off and can quickly burn the mucous membranes.

"I've seen children lose their sight as a result."

Krissie has also worked with the London Fire Brigade and Children's Burns Trust, giving presentations in schools. "That's when I had the idea for my book," she said. "We were developing a presentation pack for schools and discussing the best way to get messages across, and I kept getting this rhyme going round and round in my head. I wrote it down and that's where it stayed for quite a while - on a sheet of A4 paper!"

She decided to bring the book to life after taking on her current role with the Katie Piper Foundation burns charity.

The Foundation opened its groundbreaking Rehabilitation Centre in Merseryside last year to provide care for burns survivors of all ages, including people who are living with effects of burns injuries which happened several years ago. Krissie is Head of Clinical Services and oversees the rehabilitation centre programme.

"When patients are discharged from hospital their medical treatment has often been very successful, but they have to deal with the consequences of the healing and learn to live with the scars," Krissie explained.

"Many struggle to cope with life-changing and often disfiguring injuries, and many burns patients never get to meet other survivors.

"People stay with us for a month and during that time undergo intensive therapy work on their scarring and build up their strength and fitness. Equally important are the social activities, which build confidence and resilience, and the opportunity to spend time with other survivors. It can, and has, changed people's lives."

Working with adults who are coping with effects of childhood burns makes Krissie's book even more significant. "Children are never done with their burns injuries and as they grow the scars have to be surgically remodelled," said Krissie. That's why it's so important that we make children aware of the dangers around the home, but in a light-hearted way. We need to ensure that our children know what to do when an accident happens - after all, we are educating our future first-aiders!"



#### RECYCLE THIS...

Colin McFarlin is a Volunteer Waste Prevention Advisor with West Sussex County Council and sheds some light on what can and can't be recycled.

Thank you for all your individual enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails to the editor on recycling. Do keep the questions coming...

Plastic recycling is the most frequent item in my post bag and topic of questions when I am out giving a talk.

So what plastic can I recycle?

If it has come from your bathroom or kitchen and if it is a bottle then YES. Clean dry and loose please with the tops removed. The tops are too small for our mechanised sorting. Tops in the rubbish bin or to charity.

Is it plastic or foil from the bathroom or kitchen, a tub or a tray then YES. Again, clean dry and loose and with tops separate. The tops are big enough for sorting. Top needs to be jam jar lid size or areater. We want all colours, as you can see. We can recycle black plastic in West Sussex. We have the technology!






And now for some of the other items.

We can recycle take away coffee cups and the lids in West Sussex. We have the technology! We can recycle tetra packs. even with windows

We can recycle



And finally I would like to mention batteries - do not put into your rubbish bin or into your recycling bin. Do take them back to any shop that sells batteries. By law they must take them back. No need to take them back to the same shop you bought them from.

#### Roasted tomato sauce

Preheat the oven 180°. Tip 2kg very ripe tomatoes and 2-3 roughly chopped unpeeled red or white onions into a shallow baking tin. Add several unpeeled cloves of garlic (I love the flavour so use a whole head) and drizzle generously with oil. Season and toss to combine. Bake for about 45 mins until the tomatoes have burst and are lightly browned. Slip off the onion skins and squeeze the garlic out of the skins. Tip into a processor and buzz to a smooth consistency – you may need to do this in batches. If you want a very smooth sauce push through a fine sieve – alternatively leave slightly lumpy (my preference!). Now comes the adventurous part – at this point you can add extra flavours by adding a spoonful or so of harissa paste or some pesto sauce, some wholegrain mustard, chopped herbs, a spoonful or so of chilli sauce – whatever you fancy – or just leave it as is. Cool, pack and freeze.

#### Bacon and bean hotpot

(serves 2, may be doubled and frozen) Roughly chop 150g streaky bacon (or use bacon lardons or sliced chorizo sausages) for about 5 mins stirring, or until a rich golden brown. Drain and rinse a 400g can butter beans and add to the pan with 450ml Roasted Tomato Sauce (or a 400g can of chopped tomatoes). Bring to the boil and gently simmer for 10 mins. Looks good served topped with something green such as pesto or chopped herbs. Serve in bowls with hot garlic bread.

Now is the time to fill your freezer with tasty ingredients to add delicious flavours to winter meals. It is also a way to preserve a good harvest of vegetables. The Roasted Tomato Sauce is my favourite way of using an abundance of home-grown tomatoes. Packed in recipe sized portions it can be frozen for up to six months. Salads need to be a bit more than just green leaves come the cooler weather. Adding fruit or fresh vegetables to cooked grains makes a filling bowlful.

## Roasted tomato gnocchi

Use 150g fresh chilled gnocchi and 150ml sauce per serving. Fry the gnocchi in a generous knob of butter until golden brown. Spoon over the sauce and heat gently to serving temperature. Serve topped with freshly shaved or grated Parmesan cheese.

Citrus coucous salad (serves 4-6 as a side dish) Measure 50ml orange juice, 1tbsp white wine vinegar, 75g each of sultanas, frozen Edame beans and sliced dried apricots into a small pan. Bring just to the boil, cover and leave to stand 15min. Using half orange juice, half water cook 150g couscous (small or large grain) to packet directions. Cover and leave to stand. Using a large salad bowl combine a quarter of a cucumber, chopped, 4-6 sliced spring onions and a small handful of finely chopped mint. Stir in 2tbs olive oil. Add the cooked fruits and the couscous (drain first if needed), toss with a fork and season to taste.

## Savoury bread and butter

pudding (serves 4)

Traditionally Bread and Butter Pudding is just that - a pudding but how about a savoury version?

Make 4 large sandwiches, using the bread and filling of your choice, such as cheese and ham, buttering the bread and maybe adding a dash of mustard or chutney. Lightly butter the outer sides of each then cut into triangles and arrange on edge like roofing tiles in a shallow buttered dish. Whisk together 2 eggs and 568ml full-fat milk and pour through a sieve over the bread. Leave to stand for 30 min the place in a 325° preheated oven and bake for 45-60 min, until set and crisp and golden brown.

# Lindfield filmmakers progress

It was a magical day and the sunshine was beautiful, so we were able to capture Sussex looking its best."



And lastly, the award-winning composer Vangelis, who Suzanne and her choreographer husband Piers Gielgud previously worked with on both Oliver Stones' feature film 'Alexander' and Suzanne's own awardwinning documentary 'Dancing for Oliver', is now 'artistically interested' in the Olga project. To that end, rehearsals were held in London during the summer with the two international dance stars from the film. Xander Parish and Laurretta Summerscales, Piers choreographed two new dance numbers for the film and Suzanne filmed the work and sent it to Vangelis to watch. She goes on: "We are now waiting on tenterhooks to see if Vangelis wants to come on board with the Olga project and compose original music for these new dances. It would be so exciting to collaborate with him again, as all his musical compositions are legendary and his music would add something very special to the film."

## Life-saving knowledge

We'd like to encourage everyone living and working in the village to familiarise themselves with the sites of the life-saving defibrillator machines and learn how to

An estimated 60,000 people each year in the UK have an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and, sadly, less than 10% of those people will survive. Yet if a bystander is able to start CPR they could double a person's chances of survival.

Lindfield has four defib machines that we know about. Many will have noticed the unit outside the King Edward Hall, and there is another one mounted on the outside of Selby's chemist further up the High Street. Then there are an additional two which can be obtained during working hours. One sited in the Doctors Surgery and another in The Tiger at the top of the High Street (building next to All Saints Church). This is the office for the church and is open between 9am-1pm, Monday to Friday (door with buzzer is accessed round the back).

All of the machines are portable and contain full instructions, but why not give yourself a head start with an online tutorial?

The Resuscitation Council (UK) has produced plenty of information to help us all learn more about what to do in this dramatic and highly pressured time, should we find ourselves involved.

You can watch videos and play interactive games to increase your understanding. You can even download an app - see www.resus.org.uk/apps/lifesaver for more information.

At Lindfield Life we will commit to reprinting this map and information on a regular basis, in order to familiarise the whole village regarding access to this life-saving equipment - which can be used by anyone.

Please give it a go. With our emergency services so overworked, we as communities can get better at helping ourselves, and it really does make a difference.

If anyone knows of any other publically available defibs in the area, do please email us (editor@lindfieldlife.co.uk) and we'll update the map for next time.

We are aware of plans for one to be installed in Scaynes Hill shortly, and we also understand that one of the Lindfield schools is seeking funding to buy a unit too.



Chailey Repair Café is going from strength to strength as it enters its second year of operation.


The Cafe's recent first birthday celebration saw the village hall packed with more than 140 people attending and more than 90 repairs attempted.

## A day out on the buses

#### By Bob Campen

Previous itineraries in this series have begun by going east. In this one, we look at what is available if we go west. Only one bus, the 89, does this, and funding cuts made by WSCC have resulted in this being much reduced. So, the first thing to say is that these schedules are available only on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. This might be a suitable trip to undertake with the grandchildren during the summer holidays or half term.

Our trip starts at Lindfield High Street. Take the no. 30 bus at 09.30 and alight in Perrymount Road, opposite Waitrose, at 09.39.

Cross to the stop on the Waitrose side of the road, and take bus 89 from this stop at 09.52 all the way to Horsham bus station, arriving 10.41. You can spend time in Horsham before proceeding if you wish.

From Horsham bus station, take bus 98, showing destination Southwater (to Southwater Country Park). This runs every 15 minutes; in the morning it is at 10, 25, 40 and 55 minutes past the hour, and takes about 15 minutes.

Entry to the Country Park is free. There is room to roam, a lake, with a small beach for paddling, canoes can be hired, and there is an activity centre for children way across the park at Dinosaur Island. Snacks and ice creams are available at the Visitor Centre.

Because there is only one 89 bus back from Horsham to Haywards Heath, it is best to be back at the same bus stop at which you alighted – because bus 98 runs in a clockwise direction around Southwater – no later than in time to catch the 98 at 15.47 or 16.02, arriving Horsham bus station 16.04 and 16.19 respectively.

The last bus 89 leaves Horsham bus station at 16.30, arriving Perrymount Road 17.19. Cross to the stop on the Waitrose side of the road. Bus 270 is due at 17.36 to take you back to Lindfield High Street at 17.41.

Should you unfortunately miss the 89, a long detour is possible by using bus 23 at 17.07 or 17.44 from Horsham bus station to Crawley bus station, arriving 17.48 and 18.23 respectively. Bus 271 leaves Crawley bus station at 18.40, and will bring you back to Perrymount Road at 19.14. Alas, it is another 30 minutes before the arrival of




the 270 at the stop by Waitrose at 19.44, which will take you back to Lindfield.

Please note that these travel details apply on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays only. Bus routes and times are changed every so often, so if the magazine you are reading is 'old' by a few months, you should not rely on these schedules without checking.





West Sussex County Council's Love West Sussex website and apps are the most efficient way to report any concerns relating to the public footpaths and highways. Importantly, reporting this way ensures that WSCC have a record of reoccurring issues and agreed timescale to address reports.

#### How does Love West Sussex work?

The Love West Sussex site and app allow you to inform them of any highways issues such as potholes, overgrown vegetation, damaged kerbs, footpaths and verges, which you come across in the county.

Using the Love West Sussex site or app you will be able to check on the progress of your report and any work being undertaken.

#### How do I sign up?

You can sign up by creating an account at: https://love.westsussex.gov.uk/account/create

You may log an incident anonymously. However WSCC will be unable to come back to you if there is any additional information required to action your report.

## Pat's dream for mum/pup units

Over the past four years, Lindfield's Pat Kaye has rescued hundreds of abandoned dogs and puppies from European shelters, bringing them to loving new homes in the UK through her charity Small Dog Rescue Sussex.



Pat is in regular contact with the shelters, and her work is both rewarding and heart breaking, as she can only rehome a small number of the dogs that are rounded up daily. However, during a recent visit to Romania, the plight of one tiny puppy has prompted Pat to launch a new fundraising campaign to run alongside her rescue work.

Pat is on a mission to raise £5,000 to build two special mum and puppy units at the private rescue shelters she works with. The units would provide safe, warm and hygienic spaces for the most vulnerable homeless dogs.

Pat explains why building these kennels would make such a difference to the work of the dog rescue volunteers.

"I travelled to Romania with other rescue volunteers earlier this summer visiting six public shelters and two private shelters," said Pat. "Between us we reserved more than a hundred dogs.

"For me it was a fact-finding mission and my heart broke over and over again seeing dogs, some with awful injuries, incarcerated in small, empty enclosures with no home comforts and often just a wooden pallet as a bed.

"But what hit me the hardest was the mums and pups in the public shelters and all the little puppies fending for themselves without safety from disease or comfort of any kind."

Pat added that some puppies would crawl through the wire between pens where they were at risk of being attacked by the resident dogs next door. "One tiny pup, no more than two weeks old, alerted me to its fate with terrified screams as it was pounced on by the dogs next door," Pat recalled. "I grabbed it from them before it was harmed thankfully, and returned it, still screaming, to its mum."

The following day Pat and the volunteers rescued both mum and pup who are now safe.

"Both the private shelters we visited are bursting at the seams, and the selfless rescuers who run them devote their lives to caring for the rescued dogs," said Pat. "Their workload is unimaginable and their devotion is absolute. There is space to build more kennels at both shelters but, sadly, no money."

Pat returned home with a vision - to build specialist puppy units at each of the two private shelters.

"These units will be safe, warm, comfortable and easily cleaned, where mums and puppies can be segregated from other dogs and the risk of disease," she said. "They will have large pens for play and areas of enrichment to stimulate the puppies and keep them healthy emotionally, as well as physically, until they are old enough to travel to new homes in other parts of Europe including the UK."



Pat added that every small dog or pup taken out of public shelters and brought to the UK for adoption by Small Dog Rescue has the relevant vet checks, tests, vaccinations, microchip and passport. The charity also provides backup for all its rescue dogs.

"It really would be a dream come true to build these units," said Pat, who has set up a JustGiving crowdfunding page https://bit.ly/2k0P3SQ

Fundraising events are also being planned and kick off with 'Curryfest' at the King Edward Hall on Saturday 30th November. The evening includes a three course meal and entertainment from a variety of performers from Rokskool in Haywards Heath. 
## Juliet gardening talk
