

AS ORGANISER FOR our entry in BT's "Race to Infinity", I would like to say a very big thank you for all the support I had from the churches, schools, Parish Coucil and various shops and traders.

BT announced on 3rd January that six communities all polled 100% results in their "Race to Infinity" and so will now have their exchanges upgraded as will apparently any exchange with over 1000 votes and 75% of the votes.

In a fuller but unofficial results listing that can be found at www.racetoinfinityandbeyond.veadas.net it is reported that Lindfield came 10th overall and polled 1347 votes or 61.11%, a very creditable performance, but apparently not enough to trigger BT's 75% mark for them to consider upgrading our exchange.

However, I am sure that Lindfield's Internet users would not want me or the Communications Forum to stop at this point in our campaign to get the Alma Road exchange upgraded, so that it's users in the village get the same speed and reliability of service as users of our neighbouring Haywards Heath exchange.

Motorbike Tyke





100 years celebrated in style



AS REPORTED IN last month's magazine, Lindfield's own King Edward Hall (KEH) celebrated its centenary in style at a ceremonious evening exactly one hundred years after it was opened by Col. Dudley Sampson of Buxshalls on 11th January 1911.

The evening was opened with words from the Chairman of KEH Management Committee, Brian Newcombe. It is humbling to realise the commitment of many to run our village hall on a day-to-day basis, but surely none more so than Brian - who has been on the committee for a staggering 52 years! I also discovered that his wife, Gwen, also had family history with the hall over two generations, and I also know that their children help out in practical ways too when its needed.

However, the celebrations were about the Hall, and the assembled gathering heard a new poem written specifically for KEH by Lindfield poet Anthony Baird, charting its history. One of the current Trustees of the hall, Graham Turner, also spoke of his pride to be involved. Lastly the West Sussex High Sheriff, Mrs Elizabeth Bennett, talked about KEH being "part of everybody's lives" as it touched us all in the village in different ways.



role in giving us opportunities to engage as a community. So when Dr Daunt first mooted the idea in 1887, only to be knocked back by public opinion, it turned out he was onto something after all!

Just before we toasted the 100 year old building with champagne, two gifts were presented. One was a commemorative cross-stitch created by Gwen Newcombe, which had taken over 275 hours to complete. The other was a plaque on a slice of oak given by Sheila Hobbs. The tree had come down in the '87 hurricane, having been planted many years earlier by King

Edward himself, in the grounds of Old Place.

As the evening closed, we got more time to study the KEH exhibition kindly researched by the Lindfield History Project Group - which really did highlight how much the hall has been appreciated and used so far. I'll raise a glass to my kids and theirs getting the same enjoyment out of 'the old girl'!

Halo is a science fiction video game franchise created by Bungie and owned and published by Microsoft Game Studios. The series centres on the interstellar war between humanity and a theocratic alliance of aliens known as the Covenant. The Covenant worships an ancient civilization known as the Forerunners, who perished in combat with the parasitical Flood. The main trilogy of games centre on the experiences of the Master Chief, a cybernetically enhanced human super-soldier, and his artificial intelligence (AI) companion, Cortana.


Microsoft's latest project, Halo Reach, to put it simply, is creator Bungie's greatest game to date. Up to now the halo franchise has been phenomenally successful with the likes of Halo 3, generating sales of over 300 million copies sold on the first day, and Halo ODST only adding to Bungie's already sterling repertoire. However Halo Reach tops them all. The game is set on a planet called 'Reach', which is under attack from a formidable foe named the covenant. Teams of warriors nicknamed 'Spartans' called noble team are tasked with repelling this threat and protecting Reach's inhabitants at all costs. You are dropped into the shoes of noble six, the newly initiated member of the noble team. From start to finish the game oozes class and top quality play value, from jaw-dropping

vistas and gut wrenching, epic scenes on a scale never before seen in a Halo game, to haunting scores encapsulating the dark despair of the planet 'Reach's' situation



perfectly by gaming's one and only Marty O'Donnell, who wrote the musical score for all the title previous games to date. This game is set to be Bungie's final curtain call in terms of Bungie's input into the halo universe; Microsoft will be helming the future of halo games. This is a shame! However, Bungie will still be developing. They wanted to go out with a bang and their end result, Halo Reach, certainly delivers, and on top of that brings us an experience which is both unique and changes the way the games will be made in the future. It is clear from the moment you pick up your Xbox controller that a lot of love and time has gone into making this game a success. From playing this I can certainly say that it is the best game to come out in recent months, and I can say without a doubt this game deserves a full recommendation.

Good Food...

THE SECOND MONTH of the year may still be dark and gloomy, but we have Valentine's Day to celebrate which legend has originated from the Roman feasts of Lupercalia and the martyrdom of a saint called Valentine around 269AD. The Victorians greatly developed the idea of sending sentimental cards to loved ones and their highly elaborate cards, which often included real flowers, feathers and lace, are highly prized as antiques today. Why not make a heart-shaped cake for your special person (surely the way to a man's heart is via his stomach!). No need for a special cake tin, simply trim a round sponge layer to a heart shape, split and fill with jam and coat with icing.

This chilly month we still need substantial and warming meals. Try some of my favourites...

Butternut Squash and Chickpea Curry Serves 2

Cut a small butternut squash into four, remove and discard the stem, seeds and peel. Cut the flesh into bite-sized pieces. Finely chop a medium onion and gently cook in a little oil until soft and beginning to brown. Add the squash, a sliced carrot and some crushed garlic. Cook for 5 min, stirring. Stir in 1ths curry paste (or more depending on your taste), 1tbs grated fresh root ginger, 200g can chopped tomatoes, 400g can (drained) chickpeas and 200ml vegetable stock. Bring to the boil, cover and cook over low heat for about 15min, stirring occasionally, or until the vegetables are very tender (you may need to add a little extra stock or water). While the curry is cooking whisk a generous spoonful of mint jelly into 150ml natural yogurt. Serve the curry with rice, if wished, and the minted yogurt spooned on top. (May be frozen.)

Pasta with Vegetables and Eggs Serves ²

Cook 175g small pasta shapes such as twists to packet instructions. Put 2 eggs into a pan of boiling water, bring water back to the boil and simmer for just 3min. Immediately place the eggs in cold water and leave for about 8 min. Meanwhile slice 8 spring onions, 2 small courgettes and break up a medium head of broccoli. Cook in simmering water until just tender. Drain. Gently peel the eggs. Drain the pasta and return to the pan. Add 4tbs soy sauce and the vegetables and gently mix with two spoons. Season to taste, spoon into hot bowls and top with the eggs. As you cut into the lightly boiled eggs, the soft yolks form a sauce for the vegetables and pasta.

Smoked Trout Kedgeree _{Serves 2}

Cook a thinly sliced onion in a little oil until very soft. Stir in a crushed garlic clove, 175g long grain rice and 1tsp (or more) curry paste. Add 600ml hot vegetable stock, cover and cook over low heat for 10-15 min, stirring occasionally, until the rice is tender and the stock absorbed. Meanwhile, cut a quarter of a cucumber lengthways, scoop out the seeds and cut the flesh into small cubes. Whisk 2tbs mint jelly into 150ml natural yogurt, season and stir in the cucumber. Break 175g smoked trout fillets into pieces and gently fold into the rice. Serve with the cucumber relish and lemon wedges.

Local children learn about Epilepsy

DID YOU KNOW that epilepsy is the most common serious neurological condition in the UK? It affects around half a million people, that's one in every 131 of us. Over in Lingfield the National Centre for Young People with Epilepsy (NCYPE) has recently started an Epilepsy Education 4 Schools programme. Funded by the generosity of donors the programme provides free teaching to school aged children in South East to help raise awareness of this common but frequently misunderstood condition.

The team from NCYPE will be spending a week with the children at Lindfield Primary School in February. The youngest children will learn about the condition through story and song, with the older children taking part in activities that will help them to think about what it may feel like to live with the condition and how they can include children with epilepsy in the activities that they all enjoy. Witnessing an epileptic seizure, or worrying that one may occur, can have a profound effect on everyone concerned if they are unprepared. The team provides children and staff with information in an engaging and age-appropriate manner, which helps them to remain calm and safe.

Teaching assistants from many of the local schools will also be attending a training session at Blackthorns School that will help them to identify the condition and find out more about how epilepsy can affect a child's memory, attention and learning.



THE DOCTOR LENT over his desk, looked over the top of his glasses and said "Well James, you have epilepsy, how do you feel about that?". I wanted, initially, to let my fists do the talking and show him how this news wasn't exactly what I was hoping for.

I am not the violent type so I just fumed. I let him explain that many people take this type of news badly and as a consequence need to be referred to a psychologist to help them readjust. It was about six months earlier that the first incident happened.

My dad was woken by a banging coming from my room in the early hours. I was known for keeping odd hours (I was a teenager) so my dad lay there for a moment before realising that this wasn't just me being inconsiderate but that something was wrong. As he walked in my room I was having a seizure. They used to be called 'grand mal' but nowadays are referred to as tonic clonic seizures. My body convulsed and shook like it had electricity being passed through it. With my jaw clenched I struggled unconsciously for breath and my eyes rolled back. Mum and dad stayed with me while the convulsions continued and then after a few minutes they began to ease.

The doctor came and even now I can remember the smell of his jacket. I think all doctors over a certain age who wear jackets and have the medical bag have a similar smell. However, I think they say that before or after a seizure your sense of smell can be heightened (don't quote me, I have it, but I am not a doctor!).

The doctor said that I had suffered a seizure but the cause was unclear and at this time no specific medical treatment was required.

I think anyone may have a seizure once and that may not mean you'll have another, so it was a case of wait and see what happens next. He advised rest and correctly stated that my body would feel fairly battered. To be more accurate I felt that I had been 12 rounds with a pro boxer. My tongue was blood red with teeth marks and swollen, all my muscles were filled with lactic acid and ached, I mean really ached, and I had a banging headache.

Once the doctor and his strange smelling jacket had left my mum gave me a Magnum ice-cream (a rare treat usually) to reduce the tongue swelling but on this occasion there was no pleasure in the eating. It actually hurt to open my mouth and my tongue didn't want to be consoled.

Time passed and I tried to shrug off the event and continue on. I was always aware that 'it' may return and did do some research on epilepsy, but confident that I

didn't fit the epileptic demographic it wasn't something I was going to worry too much about. I was coming up to 17 years old so I was concentrating on gaining some financial independence, and keen to have fun with my friends.

About six weeks later it happened again.

Much the same situation except this time it was a shorter episode. This time I actually woke up after the seizure (I cannot recall how much longer after) however I was petrified. My body was, as before, beaten up but I had a real sense of being under the control of something in my head. I was filled with fear knowing that it could happen anytime. There was no way I could sleep that night until I passed out with complete exhaustion.

I saw the doctor and he arranged for an Electroencephalogram (EEG) and MRI test. Although my fears were becoming reality, I was also really pleased that questions were hopefully going to be answered. The possibly horrible truth was better than the very scary unknown. The doctor showed me the results of both tests and both were unremarkable. No I didn't have a tumour, and yes I did have a brain. My poor GCSE results were down to my inability (laziness), not a medical deficiency.

At this point he delivered his diagnosis with all the tact he could muster. Epileptic? What? You said the tests were clear...? How do I feel about it? Come here and I'll tell/show you!

I believe it was this same doctor that told me how epilepsy will affect my life. Specifically, I couldn't work with children as I could harm them during a seizure. Sports teacher plans out of the window then... no need to aim high with any further academic qualifications.

Despite learning to drive when I was 15 years old (when working on a farm) I couldn't hold a driving licence of any kind until I had been seizure free for 3 years. Independence denied. Stuck in my rural village for another 3 years (at least).

Furthermore, I had to take pills everyday, twice a day. I was given the standard anti epileptic drug called Epilim. These purple tablets were to be taken every morning and every evening to ensure that the drug remained in my blood around the clock. I really did need to start living by the rules that were being laid in front of me.

As I walked from the doctors to the car I made a decision. I could either become angry, frustrated and be a victim in this situation, or live to the maximum that I could and endeavour to overcome any obstacle. Well there was no choice so I decided it was time to 'man-up'.

again is how lucky and privileged I am. Regardless of what happens I have family and friends that love and care for me, and now as I write this at 34 years old I am particularly blessed with my wife and two children. With this love and support nothing can touch me. Our blessings always outweigh our troubles, sometimes we just need to remind ourselves of that.

Later in my mid-twenties, after many seizure free years I had another seizure while I was working for Volvo as a salesman. This was a daytime episode so this meant I lost my licence for 1 year (DVLA were more lenient by now) but importantly I lost my job.

I had to reluctantly 'sign on' while I had an increase in my drugs and started taking

while I had an increase in my drugs and started taking Lamotrogen (also used as an anti depressant) with my Epilim. As I was keen not to sit about I went to a college for people with disabilities for a year to study Sales, Marketing and Customer Service. The college was residential and was a really interesting experience. Plenty of sex, drugs and rock n' roll. Well to be honest not so much rock n' roll. I didn't seem to fit the demographic there for sure. I spent most of my time as a recluse in my room minding my own business trying to avoid getting involved in the police raids (two in 10 months). There were a lot of people angry at life, frustrated by the limitations of their bodies and many who had also had their lives turned upside down and dreams and aspirations broken. The impact of my disability on me was not as harsh as those experienced by others. I was, and I am, very lucky.

The Fry Chronicles



THE WORD "POLYMATH" is the best one in the English dictionary to describe Stephen Fry. From writer to performer, to chairman of TV's "Q.l.", there does not seem to be any stopping him! Perhaps this is why the second volume of his autobiography (which this volume is) has been over twelve years in coming. You do not have to be familiar with that earlier volume, the wonderfully titled "Moab is my washpot", as in this book, Fry gets you up to speed with his troubled youth, which included spells on probation and in prison.

This however is mainly the story of the author from eighteen to thirty. Like many, he went through the Cambridge Footlights to make his way, at the same time as his comic partner Hugh Laurie and actor Emma Thompson. He also seems gently amused that one talent he practically wrote off at university – Simon Russell Beale – is now one of our finest actors. (Currently playing the Home Secretary in "Spooks.")

We learn about his obsessions with computers, his friendships and his ambitions. He does bring the necessary detachment to his vounger self, to see both his follies and his virtues. It is the weaknesses of many autobiographers that a desire to justify takes over their reason and their ability to see that they can mistakes - not so here. A bad book of this sort leaves you disliking the person who wrote



it more - but not in this case.

I particularly like the misunderstanding story between Fry and Hugh Laurie. Fry rang his partner to tell him that he had spent over a thousand pounds on a Mackintosh. Laurie was appalled that his friend could be so wasteful of money to spend that much on a coat. It took several minutes on the phone to explain that this was a new computer and not an item you wear!

Upstairs Downstairs

TEMPTING AS IT IS to write about how much I enjoyed this wonderful drama over the Christmas break it would be self indulgent and have absolutely nothing to do with interior design. Although I could of course comment on the stunning period interiors on show in the 1930s but that's another article all together...

Unless you are blessed with your own sweeping Titanic style triumph of architectural joinery or a more contemporary statement glass and metal installation, then the staircase can often be forgotten when it comes to interior design and seen as a means of connecting one space with another with no real identity of its own. As a transition between rooms the staircase needs to be decorated so it enhances the flow between the spaces running off it but it's more than a case of choosing a neutral paint colour.

My approach for any area of the house is to start by considering the structure of the space and how the proportions work. Now for most of us the stairs are pretty fixed, but perhaps a narrow flight could be enhanced with a wider bottom stair, curved perhaps to give the illusion of a wider flight. Proportions can be restored by clever use of colour and artwork. Cooler colours open up a narrow space whilst warmer shades will make it feel more constricted. If timber is a feature on the stairs, oak being the most popular, then use this as one of the three colours in your palate, then add a neutral plus your accent colour.

Hanging artwork on the stairs will provide a focal point and help to break up an otherwise straight run and reduce any sense of vortex! Stairs are great spaces for galleries – smaller pictures work better in small stair areas; larger pictures should be hung in halls or landing spaces where you have more space to stand back and admire them. If you have the luxury of a spacious half landing then consider a narrow console table or perhaps a small tub chair. A well dressed window can make a stunning focal point too.

Lighting plays a key role; treads and risers need to be well lit so clearly distinguishable and the bottom of the stairs, the landing and any half landings need dedicated light sources. Lighting can be more than just practical, it can provide a decorative feature – low level wall lights washing light over each stair, under-lit hand rails and so forth.

Fully carpeted staircases are found in many homes, covering up functional softwood. If your staircase is hardwood then you may well want to show it off and go for a runner and stair rods. For a recent local project we specified a stunning Crucial Trading striped runner for the stairs, with mustards, smoky blues and mid browns to sit with the traditional oak of the staircase. The carpet provided us with our palate and all the other elements worked within it creating a real statement for the hall.



JAY MADE THE decision to become a plumber about five years ago – when he had had enough of the unfriendly hours demanded by truck driving. Like many of us, when we make a career decision, Jay admits:

"I had no idea how I made the decision but I thought it would be a good thing to do!"

In the past five years Jay has worked in and around Lindfield developing his business, generating work mainly through word of mouth and recommendations. The key, however, has been his gaining of the Gas Safe accreditation and his listing on the Gas Safe Register (www.gassaferegister.co.uk). This listing gives a full description of what the plumber can do concerning gas appliances – simply if you haven't been trained on an appliance you can't offer to service or fix it. According to lay:

"This has given people the confidence to use my services and I now receive far more calls than I did before – increasingly from people who have had unsatisfactory work done by non Gas Safe registered companies. By law, all gas engineers must be on the Gas Safe Register. It is the only official list of qualified gas engineers and is there to help keep you safe – it has replaced CORGI."

As you can expect, interaction with the village has been mainly solving our boiler and pipe problems – fixing burst pipes quickly in the Red Lion made sure the regulars were kept happy for instance. Perhaps the strangest call out was for a blocked sink on William Allen Lane– which turned out to have a Phillips Screwdriver wedged under the plug-hole!

In terms of marketing, advertising and leaflet drops to the surrounding area have worked – but he doesn't have a website. As previously mentioned, the majority of Jay's work is through word of mouth for private households and a good growth area has been his work with the local estate/letting agents.

Perhaps most interesting is Jay's philosophy towards his work. He stresses that prevention is better than the cure in many cases - especially during our seemingly endless cold and snowy winters of recent years:

"We rely on our gas boilers, cookers and fires more than ever during winter to keep warm, have hot baths and showers and cook hot meals. It's important that gas appliances are regularly serviced to help keep us safe and prevent them from breaking down when we need them the most."



Here are some of Jay's tips to keep yourselves warm this winter and hopefully save you some money in the long-term:

- Always get your boiler serviced during the summer so it's ready for the demands of the winter. As Jay points out: "A recent survey of gas engineers showed that most problems with gas appliances are caused by a lack of annual servicing."
- 2. Outside taps need to be isolated (turned off from the inside) before they freeze.
- Correct any leaking overflows before the onset of winter – again any unfixed problems may lead to damage to your pipes

As touched on in previous articles for small companies and one-man bands in trades such as plumbing, trust is key and the correct training is paramount – Jay has spent over a year on training courses and invested a large amount of money to have that reputation. With so many companies offering similar services it is increasingly important to check accreditations – which can be reflected in the growth of services such as Checkatrade. In Jay's case his Gas Safe listing and his growing number of satisfied clients in and around the village proves that his time and money invested in training is well spent.

I AM ONE of those people who hates running. Always the last in races at school, and with an abhorrence of cross country running, I got involved with Lindfield's run just because I am on the King Edward Hall committee.

I realise now, with the advantage of 5 or 6 years hindsight, that our run (on the late May bank holiday every year) attracts people from all over the country, seasoned runners and first timers alike. Moreover, they all seem to enjoy it!

Our run has been going for about 25 years, and 2010 saw the largest number of participants ever. We hold two runs on the same day – the shorter "FUN" run (just 5km) starts at 10.30 and the longer, professional version (10.5km) starts 15 minutes later. A huge group of friends and family assemble on Hickmans Lane playing field to support the athletes. The first runners are back in less than three quarters of an hour, others can take hours. The slowest was a lady who participated to exercise her dog and who enjoyed the beautiful scenery 'en route'. In 2010 the fastest 8 participants all ran the whole course in less than 45 minutes. The winner of the fun run took less than 20 minutes.

Taking in a varied terrain, the run goes across playing fields, country roads and farmland. Runners have to negotiate gates, stiles and foot bridges on the gently undulating route. Strategically placed marshals are present to provide directions and encouragement. I usually marshal towards the end of the course and can't think of counting the number of times I've called out "only a short distance now!"

The weather plays a large part in the success of the run – on a beautiful day we get many people who just turn

up – and our registration process can cope with this. Increasingly though people are registering on-line (www.kingedwardhall.org.uk/village-run). Not only does this save time, it also ensures we can post results to everyone. Come rain or shine, there is always a core group of runners who turn up year after year. This is an indication of the uniqueness of the event – mixing elements of road running and cross-country.

All participants receive a medal to reward their efforts. Everyone is timed too – and a full set of results is published on-line. This year they will mark the run for the King Edward Hall centenary.

Why not join in yourself? Runners range in age from 5 to 85 and there is a real sense of achievement when you complete the course. Even the professional runners admit that this is not a course where you will gain a personal best for the distance (the obstacles mentioned above sometimes slow people down), but you will enjoy a run in the most beautiful scenery.

Of course, you don't have to run. We would love to recruit some new marshals – it will only take an hour or two of your time and 500 runners will appreciate your contribution. Or even help us mark out the course over the 48 hours beforehand. All volunteers will be welcome – send us an e-mail (villageday@kingedwardhall.org.uk) or call me on 01444 482306.

2011 marks my 'get fit' year. You never know, if we can get enough helpers I may be free to participate in the run myself. Just the shorter run this year...



The Code Breaker in our midst

MICHAEL WARD is a former Lindfield resident who has in the last few years began to gain an international reputation.

While studying for the priesthood in Cambridge, he was pursuing a Phd on the work of C.S. Lewis. One evening, he was reading a poem called "The Planets" which Lewis had written in the 1930s. It was to change his life.

Michael's love for the Narnia books had began when he was a school boy in Lindfield thirty years before. He had read and re-read them several times. But he felt that there was always more to them than at first thought.

"When I read that poem, I had my eureka moment, "he said. "It was then I realised that there was a pattern to the way the books were put together. Each of the books reflected the seven planets which people in the Middle Ages. Each planet had a different God linked to it and revealed particular characteristics of human and divine nature." He began to dig deeper and realised that Lewis was using these characteristics to reveal ideas about the Christian God.

Michael began to share his insights with people who had known Lewis, such as Walter Hooper who had been Lewis' personal assistant in the early 1960's.

"Lewis could be a very secretive man, so the idea that there could be another layer of the books which he had not revealed to others seemed to fit," Michael says. "After all, he had secretly married Joy his wife, without telling one of his friends, Tolkein."

Soon, the theory was being discussed by many scholars and formed the basis of two books "Planet Narnia" (an academic investigation of his theory) and "The Narnia Code" (written in a more popular style for the general reader.) Following a BBC documentary about Michael's work in 2009, his first book made the Guardian bestseller list as well as topping the Amazon charts.

Michael is now the chaplain at St Peter's College in Oxford. He is also the editor of two other books "Heresies" and "The Cambridge Companion to C.S. Lewis."

He has presented his theory at the Christian arts festival Greenbelt, at several universities in the UK and the USA, and at All Saints Church here in Lindfield, where his mother and father have worshipped for over fifty years.


