Sign competition

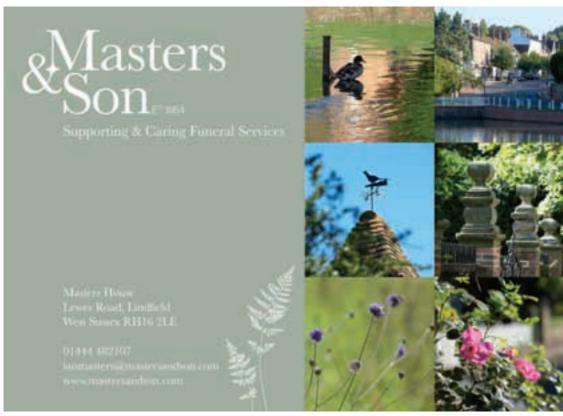
Observant passers-by will have noticed that the hanging sign at the front of the Tiger has vanished!

The world renowned Luminarium will be the focal point at this year's Lindfield Arts festival, which runs from 11th-13th May.

Appearing for the first time in the South East of England, the Levity III Luminarium will be erected on Lindfield Common, providing a major focal point to the Festival.

The 10 metre high structure is described by its designers, Architects of the Air, as "a dazzling maze of winding paths and soaring domes where Islamic architecture, Archimedean solids and Gothic cathedrals meld into an inspiring monument to the beauty of light and colour."

The structure's domes are connected by a series of tunnels. It also features several 'pods' – alcoves where people can sit and relax.

Throughout the weekend, performances will take place inside the installation including singing, poetry and drama.

Robin Belfield, Festival Director, said: "Bringing this major installation to the Festival is truly thrilling. It is a real coup to have the Luminarium here in Lindfield as part of an amazingly creative programme of events.

It will be a great attraction, enticing visitors to the Festival and to the village as a whole."

Elsewhere there will be a wide range of arts, performance, culinary events and crafts. The Festival is open to all members of the community, from children, young adults and families to senior residents of the village and those with special needs.

Poetry features heavily in the programme this year, with a competition for local primary schools that culminates in a poetry trail around the village. Other talented young people can join in the Festival's Showcase event.

There are lots of ways to get involved, so take a visit to the website **www.lindfieldartsfestival.com**. There you'll find details of the wide range of events being planned as well as information about how to register and get involved.

The 'Mickelson' Flop-Shot

GOLF TIP OF THE MONTH #5

Just when you thought your round couldn't get any worse you short-side yourself with an impossible shot over a bunker to a tight pin position...

However, do not despair. You too can play this shot, just like the aforementioned Phil Mickelson.

Using your most lofted club, open your stance around 30 degrees (feet, hips and shoulders) to the left (r/h golfers).

Position the ball opposite the inside of your left heel and turn the club in your hands so the face aims just right of the target. Set-up with the butt of the club aiming at your belt buckle so your hands are behind the ball and position the majority of your weight on your right foot.

The club head should now be flat-back on the ground with around 80° of loft. Make sure to stand tall and fairly

With a full swing along the line of your body, let the club slide under the ball. Do not scoop or dig... the club should just bruise the grass under the ball. Have plenty of practise swings to get the feel before you play the shot for real.

The ball will effortlessly soar into the air and drop like a stone on the green.

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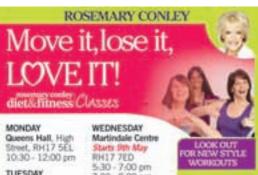
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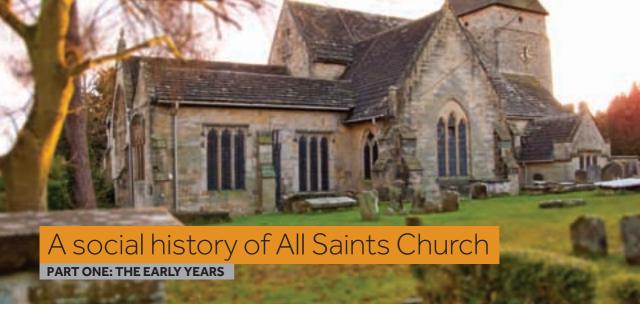

Christianity came to Lindfield in 765 AD with the establishment of a "House dedicated to God" on land endowed to the people of Lindfield by King Adwulf, Duke of Sussex, and the last of a long list of South Saxon Kings. The exact location of the Minster is unknown, although it is almost certain to have been proximate to All Saints. Most of the land surrounding the current Church, especially that to its north, was requisitioned along with the land now occupied by The Welkin, the grand old property known as the Bower House and The Wilderness.

All Saints started life as a single cell building of the Perpendicular style of architecture in 1098, then as now it was almost as wide as it is long. Its tower and steeple, the latter rising 116 feet above ground level and to the west of the building, was commenced in the 13th Century. Over the next two hundred years a number of superficial alterations were completed, probably of little consequence as the interior design remains largely unaltered with three chancels, a nave and side aisles and a north and south transept. The original design of the exterior of the church, that of a cross, remains unchanged.

Its first encumberant, William de Bosco, also Dean of South Malling, was appointed in 1230. Under his terms of reference he was required to spend three months of each year in Lindfield carrying out the duties of the church, visiting the sick and dispensing magisterial duties. The Bower House and later The Tiger were built for his accommodation.

The Tiger, now known to some as Church House, developed its own notoriety more recently as a smugglers pub but also in the mid 1450s as the home of the Michelbourne family. Edward was a Merchant Adventurer and appointed as such by King James I. Amongst other acts of exploration he discovered the entrance to New York harbour and Coney Island.

The Tiger was also the name of his ship. It is thought by some that he named his house after his boat and altered the shape of the animal logo on the outside of the building to more mythological design to help the mainly illiterate population to recognise his property. On the Michelbournes leaving Lindfield the Tiger became an Inn. The building was purchased, possibly repurchased given its history, by 55 All Saints parishioners in 1916 for £700. The Tiger returned to provide spiritual rather than spirituous needs!

Life for most of the populace was not good in the fourteenth century. Feudalism ruled. Lindfield, despite its relative wealth today, was a poor village and, amongst other residents, home to itinerate pig farmers whose herds grazed through the then deeply wooded Weald of Sussex. The only light relief to the working man were the weekly markets.

In 1344 Edward III had granted Lindfield permission to hold such events and two yearly fairs. The first was to be held on the feast day of the Apostles of St. Philip and St. James the Less, now better known as the 1st May and the second on the feast day of St. James the Great, 25th July. Both events attracted countywide attendance with shepherds and up to 15,000 sheep being driven in all states of malnutrition and desperation to each of the eight-day events.

The Church was actively involved in both gatherings, providing a pastor. His payment was half a guinea (52p), a considerable amount of money in those far off days. His sermon was listened to in silence, as any interruption was a fineable offence.

From about 1545 a clergyman, also from South Malling, supplemented the Dean's visits to Lindfield. He was required to host Sunday services, the first was at 0500-hours in the summer, an hour later in the winter. For his comfort a room was provided over the south entrance to the church. It was, and remains, approached by a spiral staircase close to the baptistery and was included in the church fabric to meet the overnight needs of the visiting priest, in some comfort it seems as the room came complete with heating sufficient to cook a form of English breakfast. Latterly it is believed it became a room used by the local militia, a common

feature of village life in those days, and then Lindfield's first schoolroom. In 1938 it became the church museum, euphemistically it continues to provide that service to All Saints today.

In the 16th Century religion and superstition formed a discordant alliance; in 1569 no less than the Bishop of Chichester described the populace of Lindfield as "blind and superstitious".

Proximate to the west door of All Saints is the Baptistery. It has a secret. On its west side is a small doorway, now blocked off internally but evident from the outside of the Church. This marks the Devil's Door. Practise was to leave it open during baptisms to encourage evil spirits to leave the child and pass out of the building.

Also it seems that common practise in those early days of church life was that water for baptismal purposes was blessed at Easter and kept in the font and under lock and key for the next twelve months to frustrate Satanists who would use holy water for their own ceremonies.

About 1545 pigeons were kept in the church. Within its north transept an area was reserved amongst the rafters. Meat was a rare treat; the birds were kept to supplement the clergy's supply of fresh meat.

The bells of All Saints have rung true throughout the years, now they combine the mellow melody that can be found from the eight that inhabit the church tower. History tells us that in the days of Elizabeth I, when Lindfield was an intimate gathering of souls good, bad and indifferent, a muffled bell was rung when a death occurred in the village. At other times it was used to pronounce events of national pride. Such an event occurred in July 1588 when Francis Drake defeated the Spanish Armada. With great enthusiasm, and armed with too much strong ale provided by The Tiger, the bell ringers broke one of the ropes and cracked one of the bells.

In the reign of the Stuart Kings (1603 to 1714) life both spiritual and mundane was about to undergo considerable change. Congregations at that time "spewed and farted, played scales and cards, jostled and stuck pins into one another and talked or sang rudely or out of tune". This was also the time of the Puritans, who in 1644 influenced the banning of church organ music by Parliament. Cardinal Wolsey aided and abetted by Henry VIII had already connived to introduce the Dissolution of the Monasteries. This was to have a profound impact on All Saints; the church fell into disrepair, almost to the point of dereliction. With the active surreptitious support of the Church Wardens much of the fabric of the Church was sold.

It wasn't until July 1617 that any effort was made to re-establish the Church. Much of the burden fell on the local community of 290 souls who, through burdensome taxation, attempted to refurbish it. Their initiative was to fail. Another attempt was made in 1720, also with little early success.

HOT CROSS BUN PUDDING

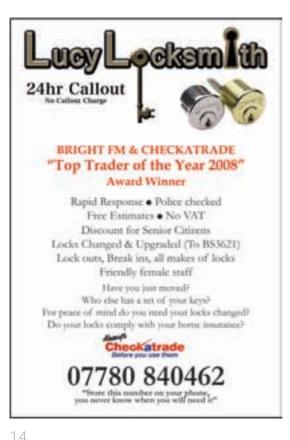
For 2-3 servings, use 2 buns per person. Split them in half and generously spread with your favourite jam. Place "jammed" sides together and cut each bun in half. Arrange in a single layer, cut side down, slightly overlapping (like roof tiles) in a shallow buttered baking dish. Whisk together 40g caster sugar, 2 eggs and 568ml whole milk or single cream. Strain over the buns and leave to stand for about 30 min. Place in a preheated 160° oven and bake for 45-60 min or until just set and golden brown. Serve hot.

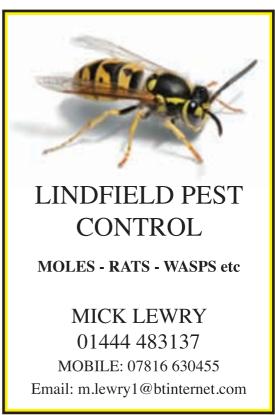
FIG SLY CAKES

a pan with 75g broken walnuts and 50g each of sultanas and raisins. Add 150ml water and cook, uncovered and stirring continuously, until the water has evaporated and the mixture is soft and thick. Leave to cool.

Preheat the oven 180°. Line a 18x28cm shallow baking tin with ready-rolled puff pastry. Spread the fig filling evenly over the pastry and top with another piece of puff pastry. Press the edges together with a fork and brush with a little milk, finally sprinkling with caster sugar. Bake for about 40 min or until golden brown. Serve slightly warm with ice cream as a pudding or cold as cake.

Roughly chop 225g 'ready-to-eat' dried figs and put into

I don't know whether it still exists but there used to be a pub in Docklands called The Widow's Son which had a strange assortment of Hot Cross Buns called The Widow's Bun Collection. Apparently a widow once lived on the site of the pub in the early 1800s and every Good Friday she baked a bun for her sailor son, who unfortunately never returned home. After the pub was built, the terms of the lease state that each year a sailor should hang a bun in the window in memory of this sad lady. Each Good Friday the bun collection is hung in the pub and added to each year. Today, now that Hot Cross Buns are sold all year round, try this different way of enjoying them.

Why not follow tradition and serve fish on Good Friday?

SALMON AU GRATIN

For 2 servings

Thickly slice 2-3 slender leeks and cook in a knob of butter until just soft but not brown. Add the finely grated rind of 1 lemon and spoon into a shallow baking dish. Place 2 salmon fillets on top and sprinkle with a handful of small prawns.

Preheat the oven 160°. Make 300ml white sauce and stir in 50-75g finely grated Gruyere cheese. Spoon over the fish and cover with a generous layer of fresh buttered breadcrumbs. Bake for about 30 min or until golden brown. Good with tiny new potatoes.

A nickname for Palm Sunday is Fig Sunday, as Christ was said to eat them when travelling to Jerusalem. Figs are a rich source of protein, B vitamins and calcium – who says all delicious things are bad for you! They also make a delicious filling for crisp pastry.



Pain in the gut

NATURAL THERAPY

April is national Irritable Bowel Syndrome Awareness Month. Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS) is one of the most common gastrointestinal conditions, often occurring between the ages of 25 and 45 and affecting women more commonly than men. Symptoms include recurrent abdominal pain, bloating and diarrhoea which may alternate with constipation. There is no known single cause but stress may be a contributory factor as well as a side effect. It is useful to rule out conditions which may produce the symptoms of IBS, including candida or other yeast infections, parasite infection, inflammatory bowel disease, lactose or other food intolerance. Stool tests can be used to rule out many of these conditions and you are advised to speak to your GP or a qualified Nutritionist for further information.

The Nutritional approach to IBS consists of four stages and is often referred to as the "4R" approach. **REMOVE** – this refers to infection in the gut by parasites or bacteria, or yeast overgrowth such as candida. It may also refer to the removal of dietary triggers – problematic foods can be identified and eliminated whilst healing takes place, before these foods are gradually reintroduced.

REPLACE – IBS sufferers can often be deficient in digestive enzymes or stomach acid. Natural replacements are introduced to support digestion.

REINOCULATE – this stage is introduced to ensure a healthy balance of good bacteria in the gut.

REPAIR – this stage looks at supporting the cells in the qut and improving absorption of nutrients.

On-going management of symptoms such as constipation, bloating, flatulence and stomach pain is also part of the Nutritional treatment strategy for IBS sufferers.

Essential oils can be used at home to help with the symptoms and causes of IBS. Blend the following oils into 15 mls of carrier oil or cream and massage into the abdomen in a clockwise direction once a day:

To help Candida - 2 drops each of Lavender, Myrrhand Tea Tree To help bloating and flatulence – either 2 drops of Peppermint or 2 drops each of Ginger and Lavender

For IBS where there is constipation and diarrhoea – 2 drops each of Lavender, Myrrh and Patchouli

For IBS with constipation – 2 drops each of Black Pepper, Lavender and Myrrh

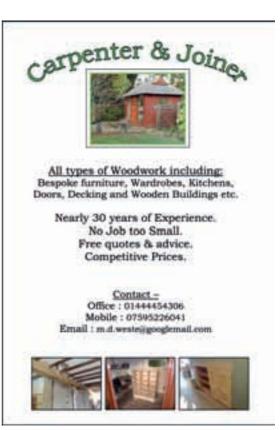
For IBS with diarrhoea – 2 drops each of Ginger, Lavender and Patchouli

If you are suffering with more than one symptom or cause, it may be wise to check with a qualified Aromatherapist as to which combination of oils would best suit your circumstances.

Relaxation is an important element of managing IBS. Indeed one of the simple ways of dealing with the spasms that can form part of IBS is to breathe deeply, imagining you are breathing into the area where the spasm is occurring, helping your body to relax and release the spasm.

What is Pilates?

Zoe: Pilates is a uniquely precise, intelligent approach to exercise and body conditioning. Pilates gives greater body awareness and agility, a leaner and more toned physique and because of the focus required, a calmer more relaxed mind.

Joseph Pilates believed "modern" life-style, bad posture, and inefficient breathing lay at the roots of poor health in the early 20th Century. I believe his words are even more relevant now.

How does Pilates differ from other forms of exercise?

Zoe: Rather than focusing on the body's naturally stronger muscles, we switch off over-recruited parts of the body and strengthen the weaker ones – the ones in your 'core'. By finding these deep muscles, we are building strength from within.

How did you discover Pilates and become an instructor?

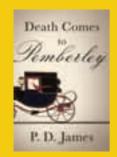

Death comes to Pemberley by P.D.James

This is a clever and witty novel. Drawing upon the characters of "Pride and Prejudice", P.D. James has created a crime story set six years after Austen's novel. Mr Darcy and Elizabeth are living an idyllic life at Pemberley, where they have two small children. However, the problems caused by Mr Wickham come back to haunt them and their world. If you are a little rusty on Austen's original, James cleverly summarises the book in the opening chapter. The author clearly shows her great love for the comedy of manners style but she has managed to add her elements of detective story without losing any of the original's charm. So many want to write like Austen in our age: this is pretty close. It is amazing to think that for the first fifty years or so after her death she was seen as a totally trivial writer. Actually, she was a great student of the human condition, which this book pays homage to.

HOME FRONT

I know, I know, not perhaps the obvious next episode to follow wallpaper and fabric but people often ask how we started and why we started the business, so here goes.

When David and I met, I was working in marketing with dreams of a career change into interior design. David was working for a leading cabinet maker with dreams of one day running his own business. To our friends we were a business waiting to happen. Pregnant with Cameron (11 this year) we bit the bullet and decided to plan our exit from the world of the employed. There is no right time to do this I told myself, so, 4 months after Cameron was born, HomeSmiths was also born. The name was the result of a night out over a bottle of wine and a pizza – it sounded cheesy initially but it kind of stuck.

HomeSmiths started off as a bespoke furniture making business, with David doing all the designing and the making, and me responsible for admin, accounts and bringing in the work. One of our clients was looking for help with paint colours and that's where it all started for me really. Having previously decorated my own house and helped friends with interior design ideas, the thought of putting myself out there properly was petrifying but a few courses later, and with my first "proper clients" under my belt, I was loving it. In 2003 we moved from Dorking to Lindfield and took space at a unit by the Bluebell Railway. The office was damp; the workshop cold. I can still remember, 7 months pregnant with Piers, laying carpet tiles in the office. By the time Piers started nursery we were able to take on larger interior design projects and at the same time made the decision to close the workshop and focus on the interior design side of the business. Looking back this was the best decision we ever made. David had reached a point where he needed a change from a cold, solitary working environment and was keen to re-direct his design, construction and space planning skills, so it was goodbye workshop and hello garden office. We opened accounts with more fabric companies, saw the business grow and pretty quickly got busy enough to need help in the office; enter the lovely Nikki Smith. It has been a regular source of amusement to suppliers to find another Smith in the office and a few have commented on how we look nothing like each other (we're not related) or whether it's part of our recruitment policy to only employ Smiths. Trading through the recession has been tough but we are still here. We have moved house, expanded the office and our collection of fabric books and the business is growing. Would we do it again? Yes we would. We love working together and, as we both come at projects from different backgrounds, our clients get the best of both worlds!

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The Rose Trio won the Ensemble Prize at the Royal Over-Seas League competition in 2010 and have also performed at the Queen Elizabeth Hall. They make their Wigmore Hall debut in June 2011, and appear in Haywards Heath by courtesy of the Countess of Munster Recital scheme. They will perform a range of wind pieces, including works by Mozart, Jean Français and Gordon Jacob. The concert will take place at 7.45 pm in St Wilfrid's Church, Haywards Heath.

Parking issues in Backwoods Lane

We would like to appeal to people who park vehicles in Backwoods Lane, particularly those attending sporting events on the Common and parents of children at Lindfield Primary School. Backwoods Lane is the route for the 30 bus and it has been brought to the Parish Council's attention that parking has been causing problems and even total traffic jams when the bus simply could not get through. Please bear in mind not only the inconvenience but the fact that if the road is blocked it could delay the emergency services with potentially fatal consequences. Winter Management

The Parish Council's new snow clearing equipment had its maiden outing in February when a small group of three Councillors and a volunteer cleared the snow from the High Street. More could have been achieved with more people to help, so we are looking for willing and able volunteers to sign up for duty. Training is required before the equipment can be used, so we hope to put together a team of people who can be trained before the threat of winter weather becomes imminent again.

We have had a number of enquiries about providing salt bins - the Council's policy is to focus on the High Street and the main pedestrian routes into the Village centre and we have identified a number of other locations for the supply of salt in "Hippo" bags from West Sussex County Council. We felt let down by WSCC last winter as these bags were not delivered when snow was forecast in February but we have made our disappointment clear to those concerned and hope for better support in future years. Residents of roads maintained by WSCC Highways who are prepared to club together to pay for a bin should contact the Parish Office: WSCC are normally prepared to fill bins that have the Parish Council's approval but any new bin would need to be cleared with them first because it might be necessary to obtain a licence from WSCC.



Budget and Precept

The Parish Council has reduced the budget for the 2012/13 financial year and, consequently, has agreed a precept of £152,000 which is £6,000 lower than 2011/12. The precept, which is paid to us by Mid Sussex District Council, is the Parish Council's main source of income. It is a very small percentage of the overall Council Tax which ratepayers pay to MSDC each year.

Police surgeries

Our Police Community Support Officer, Stuart Clough, continues to hold a surgery once a month in the Parish Office for residents to come along and raise any issues of concern. Forthcoming surgeries will be advertised on the Parish Council noticeboard.

Mobile Civic Amenity Collections

The refuse freighters will be in the Tollgate car park on Sundays 13th May and 8th July 2012, between the hours of 10.00 a.m. and 12.00 noon, for the collection of household and garden waste. Please note that due to current legislation they cannot accept items such as televisions, computer monitors and fluorescent tubes. These can still be taken to a civic amenity centre. Please do not leave rubbish in the absence of the refuse freighter.

If somebody had told me a month ago that I would soon be regularly attending a fitness class I would have laughed! If they had then told me I would be going with my family, laughing the whole way through and actually enjoying exercising, I would have thought them mad! Now I am the one laughing and it's pretty much the whole way through class....

After hearing all the hype about Zumba and that it's possible to 'drop a dress size in four classes', I was ready to give it a try!

With my Mum and sister (already Zumba-fanatics) I went along to the class with my fiver in hand. The fun atmosphere was noticeable straightaway from the buzzing coming from the hall and I was introduced to the teacher, Esther Featherstone, who was welcoming everyone with a packet of Jaffa Cakes in her hand – this seemed like my kind of exercise!

In past fitness classes I've been to, I have fought for a hiding place at the back of the room to quietly get on with it. But trying to find a spot at the back of Esther's class wasn't hard at all; it seemed everybody wanted to be near the front!

When everyone had arrived, Esther briefly showed us the steps to the first dance – I was amazed that nobody else looked worried that they weren't following. "If you get lost, just wiggle" she told us all, and the music kicked in.

Starting with a fairly gentle stepping and arm waving dance to warm-up, I got the hang of the first bit quickly. The pace soon quickened and I was surprised to be keeping up! What's great in Esther's class is that she constantly calls out the next steps, counting everyone down from each repeated move and telling us what muscles we are working too. Anything from the Charleston to Flamenco to Salsa, Zumba is a combination of all sorts of dance. The music is really varied too – from beautiful Spanish

quitar melodies to gangster rap!

During the hour session, I was one of around 20 women and a couple of men, we went through about eight different dances – this is typical for a Zumba class. It seems Zumba appeals to people of all ages as the music is so diverse. Esther's oldest participant is 92!

The feeling of being able to follow the dances confidently is great and I found I was able to follow without stopping in almost every dance by my second class. People are constantly beaming throughout the session but, similarly, when they totally mess up a dance and have lost their rhythm, they're usually howling with laughter because of it! Most people just freestyle when they lose their way during a dance or, as Esther advises, they just 'wiggle' – they're still burning calories, keeping momentum and enjoying it!

Zumba started back in the late 1990s, when a fitness teacher called Alberto Perez forgot his music before a class and hastily grabbed all the dance-music tapes from his car to use instead: a mixture of flamenco, Latin, mambo and salsa. Leading his class through his favourite moves (as a keen dancer himself) the popularity was overwhelming and Zumba was born. Now 18 million people attend classes around the world every week!

I really enjoy Zumba because, even when I'm not in the mood for exercise, I only have to be there for five minutes and I'm laughing, enjoying myself and most importantly, I'm exercising. Esther changes the music every 6-8 weeks so we always have new dances to learn. Believe me, it won't be long before you're recognising the steps and following the dances like a pro!

She also has a little-known but fascinating fact about her career, plus she is set to attempt a world Zumba record later this year... but more of that later!

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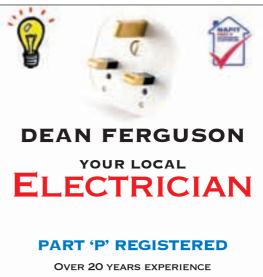

There's no such thing as a bridge too far for Lindfield's Brian Pritchard - the retired engineer has travelled all over the world designing and supervising the building of bridges!

From being arrested in Nigeria to rubbing shoulders with the Queen, his story has as many twists and turns and ups and downs as the roads and bridges he has built!

From his home in Denmans Lane, shared for the past 15 years with his wife Helga and daughters Annabel, Suzy and Katja, Brian has now turned his talents to writing and has been compiling his memoirs, 'Bridging Obstacles.' He describes his story as: "50 years of international bridge engineering dealing with obstacles of roads, railways, and rivers, and 50 years of diabetes."

But it's more than that. It's an insight into a man who, determined not to let a chronic condition stand in his way, embraced opportunities, travelled extensively, shared and gained knowledge and experience, leaving his stamp on bridges all over the world.

Recalling his decision to write his story, Brian says: "I realised that my 50 years of bridging had collected a large number of quirky and often humorous tales.

"Highway engineering is definitely the oldest profession in the world – don't believe the ladies of the night with their claim – after all engineers built the streets they walked on!"

Born in Mumbles, a village near Swansea Bay in South Wales, Brian's career in bridge design and construction began after leaving university with a BSc in civil engineering, when he became a junior engineer with the contractor Sir Robert McAlpine and Sons.

A six month spell with a prestigious bridge consultancy in Copenhagen, resulted in Brian being awarded a Marshall Aid two year scholarship with the first year spent at Washington University where he gained an MSc in Bridge Engineering.

The following year was spent working with various bridge consultants, contractors and researchers in St. Louis, Oregon, Chicago, Philadelphia and New York.

Living in large cities gave Brian the chance to indulge in his love of classical music and at the New York Philharmonic Society he was pleased to meet Aaron Copland and Leonard Bernstein.

While in St Louis, Brian met Nilda, a Puerto Rican university student who grew up in Los Angeles where her parents were servants to the composer Sergei Rachmaninov.

Nilda had watched him compose his 4th Piano Concerto and took Brian to see it performed at the St Louis Concert Hall. "It remains one of my favourite pieces," he said.

The pair became close but were separated when Nilda's

mother became ill and she had to return to Puerto Rico.

Brian took Nilda to the airport and as she boarded the Dakota aircraft she dropped flowers from the bouquet he had given her. An impulsive Brian responded by running up to the taxiing plane and knocking on the aircraft door! "A startled stewardess opened the door and passed the flowers to Nilda," he recalled.

Another highlight of his time in the US was playing for the New York cricket team with Sir Alec Douglas Home, then the UK Ambassador in Washington, as captain. "I remember one charity match with the visiting West Indies team when, with some luck, I managed to bowl out their famous batsman, Walcott, with my first ball!"

On returning to London and setting up home in Chelsea, Brian visited the doctor to discuss weight loss and skin infections.

He was advised to take glucose powder daily - a prescription that very nearly killed him.

"I trusted my doctor because of his past performance and his resemblance to a then popular TV character Dr Cameron – elderly, Scottish and wearing formal morning dress," said Brian.

The sugar sent undiagnosed diabetic Brian into a dangerous comatose state and he was rushed to hospital.

And so began the daily routine of blood sugar testing and insulin injections before breakfast, lunch, dinner and at midnight. "At that time testing was pretty crude and self injection was undertaken with large stainless steel syringes," he recalled.

With his condition under control, Brian was soon back to travelling, although the 10-12 hour time differences flying in and out of SE Asia and Australia often made diabetes difficult to control.

"I had to devise my own system of speeding up my injections and meals from 4-5 hour intervals to 2," he said.

It's certainly not been a smooth ride and Brian has suffered more than 100 'hypos'. These sudden collapses have sometimes resulted in him being mistaken for a drunk! The most glamorous location was a dinner dance at the fairytale ballroom at the Hofburg Palace in Vienna, where he was transported unconscious down the magnificent staircase in front of bemused guests.

The least glamorous was being escorted into a Paddington Green overnight cell by two policemen who had mistaken his hypo for a drunken rampage!

Occasionally the hypo has caused an out of body experience. "There I was, spreadeagled upside down against the bedroom ceiling and gazing down at my wife Helga busily pouring liquid glucose into my mouth," Brian recalls. "I also experienced the walk down a long dark







tunnel towards the glorious light at the end, where I was met by dead relatives urging me to 'go back'."

Brian has now lived with diabetes for nearly 53 years and was awarded the Diabetic Society 50 year Gold Medal in 2007 - 120,000 jabs later!

In January 1958 Brian joined the Scott Wilson
Consultancy and led the design teams working on
motorway bridges for the M20 in Kent and the M6 in
Cheshire. Using ideas picked up in Denmark, Brian designed
many underbridges and overbridges, later supervising
construction on site. He then moved on to designing the
M20 bridge crossing the River Medway in Kent.

Next came a river bridge over the Thames at Shrewsbury, where Brian incorporated smooth and cobbled paving into the embankment slopes. "When I visited the finished bridge I was amused to see local children sliding down the slopes of the smooth paving," he said.

When a new Exhibition centre and concert hall was constructed for the Festival of Britain, it was Brian who was commissioned to design the access bridge over York Road.

A move to manage the Bridge Department for the Harry Brompton London consultancy brought more opportunities to design motorway bridges, including two over the M4 in Gloucestershire.

But the most challenging was a new railway bridge to carry the twin track railway from London's Paddington to Bristol. "The line was busy and we could only work for four hours from midnight on Sundays. This meant much of the assembly had to be done off site and it was essential that all components were a perfect fit."

Before retiring in 1991 Brian worked as Director of Bridge Engineering for WS Atkins Consultancy based in Epsom.

His role included heading the team designing and constructing the M1 intersection with the busy eastwest A406 North Circular Road at Staples Corner and the design of bridges for the southern end of the M11 London – Cambridge motorway near Harlow.

"The opening ceremony was conducted by Kenneth Clarke, then Minister for Transport," said Brian. "He formally cut the tape accompanied by a pair of enthusiastic ladies wielding a banner reading 'Thank heaven for the M11' - a somewhat rare local attitude to the intrusion of a motorway!"

One of the highlights of Brian's career came at an exhibition held to mark the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Institution of Civil Engineers (ICE)."My wife and I were invited to attend the formal evening dinner and explain a model of the six viaduct Woodford Interchange

to the Queen and Prince Philip. I remember Queen Elizabeth calling: 'Philip do come and see this model with all the flyovers and teeny cars," said Brian.

At another exhibition, held at the Royal Fine Arts commission in London, Brian found himself in conversation with poet John Betjemen, who even composed a poem for the occasion!

In summer 1975 Brian was sent to Nigeria to lecture on bridge design and, hopefully, secure new bridging contracts. The first lecture almost ended in disaster after one of the speakers made a bitter attack on the government, which was reported in the following day's papers.

"I was treating myself to a relaxing breakfast in bed when two burly pistol-carrying policemen burst through the door," said Brian. "A somewhat sinister interrogator produced that day's Lagos Times with a report on the attack on the Government which had been made at our lecture. It took a lot of explanation and telephone calls to convince my would-be jailor that he had the wrong man!"

One of the last jobs Brian undertook was much closer to home - the 10 year inspection of the Newhaven swing bridge.

Brian discovered an innovative way of inspecting the bridge from the water-surrounded central pier, with minimum disruption to traffic on road and sea. He even devised a way for workmen to discreetly 'answer the call of nature' avoiding trips back and forth to the dock!

Retiring didn't mean putting his feet up. With a lifetime's knowledge and experience of bridge building worldwide Brian was very much in demand as a consultant.

Projects included working on design solutions for the sharply curved Bray viaducts in Devon, plus strengthening of new and restoration of old bridges in the construction of the Docklands light railway in London.

In 1992 Brian was invited by the Institution of Civil Engineers to tour Malaysia to chair and lecture two conferences on bridge repair and management.

Closer to home, Brian entertained fellow villagers with a talk to the Lindfield Preservation Society in 2003 – 'Keep the Traffic Moving.'

You don't have to travel far to see the results of Brian's work. In the late 1990s he introduced a new strengthening technique involving stuck on steel plates at the Bolney Flyover, lifting a ban on heavy load bearing vehicles and avoiding months of traffic disruption.

And if you're wondering where you may have heard some of this before – you're probably a Radio 3 listener, as Brian recently shared his story of Nilda and Rachmaninov on a breakfast programme.
