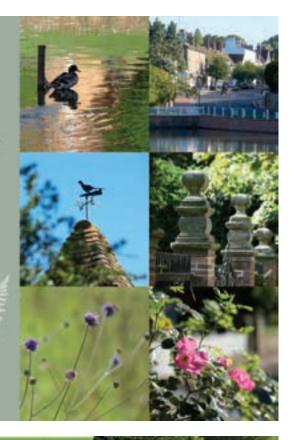

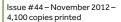
Welcome to the November issue of Lindfield Life!

School campaign for road safety launched

Mums from Lindfield Primary School are hoping this year's Road Safety Campaign will leave a lasting impression on the village community.

The school has joined forces with West Sussex County Council, Mid Sussex District Council and Lindfield Parish Council to help spread the message across the village and beyond.

School Road Safety Reps Amanda Harries, Berni King and Shelagh Robinson are rallying people living in the village to play their part in keeping the roads safe for children as they make their way to school. They are hoping that events during the week will not only educate children and their families but raise awareness across the village.

Amanda explained: "Everyone has a part to play in ensuring our children get to school safely. We are asking people to think about what they can do to help. For example, motorists passing through the village could drive a little more slowly and be more willing to stop and let groups cross the road, while those parking could be more aware of blocking pathways and crossing points."

School children have already been preparing for the campaign with a visit from West Sussex County Council Road Safety Representatives Bev Clayden and Louise Bishop, and Iollipop man Bob Winsor.

Many parents say inconsiderate driving and selfish



parking is a major issue. "Walking to school should be a pleasure for children and parents, giving them fresh air, exercise and time to chat, but sadly it can become a challenge as walkers face obstacles from badly parked cars and busy roads, "said Berni. "On a rainy day, a walk to school can be ruined by drivers speeding through a puddle and soaking the children."

Discussions ranged from how to cross the road and the benefits of walking to school, to alternative ways of travelling to school such as cycling and scooting.

Every November a unique event comes to Clair Hall in Haywards Heath – an event where some of the earth's treasures can be seen, admired and even purchased.

The Sussex Minerals Show, on Saturday 10th November, brings together some of the country's leading mineral dealers, collectors and experts to share their collections and their stories with amateur collectors and visitors. If you've never been before, prepare to be dazzled by the stunning range of crystals on show from all around the world.

Among the local collectors will be Colin Brough (pictured) from Lindfield, the secretary of the Sussex Minerals and Lapidary Society for the past 15 years. The Society is a group of people interested in collecting minerals, fossils, meteorites, and gems and discovering more about these fascinating materials.

Colin explained how he became an avid collector. "As a scientist, I have always been interested in man-made crystals for industrial use," he said. "When my son was eleven he started collecting natural minerals, so we decided to join the Sussex group together. That was 20 years ago and we are still members."

Colin sees the event as a chance to promote the society locally and encourage people to start their own collections and join the group. "We have around 150 members from all over the UK but the core of the society is made up of local members. Collecting minerals is a fascinating hobby for people of all ages and you can start a collection with only a few pounds" Colin explained. "The Society celebrates its 40th birthday this year and we enjoy attracting new members so that we will keep going for the next 40."

Colin has travelled all over the world collecting minerals. The Society is well known for organising local trips across the UK, and international trips including visits to USA, Canada, Ireland, India, Namibia, Bulgaria,

Slovakia, Hungary, France, Spain and even Russia. Next year the members will be visiting Morocco.

"Travelling to other countries and self-collecting is extremely rewarding," said Colin."We get to visit the famous mines and quarries, and chip away at the rock face ourselves if the manager allows it. It's wonderful to bring back minerals from the country of origin and to have all of the memories of collecting them."

He added that getting licences to bring the mineral back can be tricky, particularly in Russia, "but that makes the specimens even more special."

There are around 4,500 unique minerals and each one can form in many different colours and shapes. "Minerals can grow fairly quickly when man-made but in nature it can take around 100 to 10,000 years as the rocks slowly cool down," said Colin. "And when you consider that the minerals have been locked up in the rocks for tens or even hundreds of millions of years, then you can appreciate just how special minerals are and how exciting it is to break the rocks open and find them yourself."

At the November Mineral Show some of the best mineral collectors in the UK will be hoping for success in the annual competition. This year's theme is 'Self-collected minerals from the British Isles' and visitors will be able to decide for themselves if they agree with the judges. There will be illustrated talks on the society's recent field trip to the Faroe Islands, Sussex Dinosaurs (for juniors) and the 'William's Collection' from Caerhays Castle, Wales. Minerals from this fabulous and world renowned collection will be on display in the Main Hall. Another display will include mineral specimens collected by members during the trip to the Faroes. Children will enjoy visiting the Rock Hunt and Gold Panning workshops, and don't miss the amazing display of ultraviolet fluorescing minerals in the dark room.

The show runs from 10am to 4.30pm on 10th November. Admission is £2.50 adults and 50p for children.

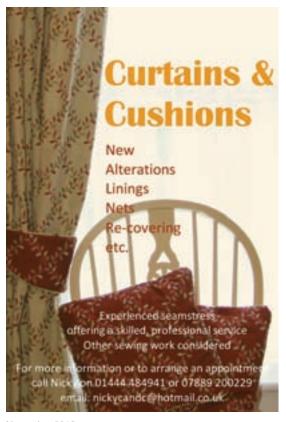

Esther smashes zumba world record!

Joined by around 250 zumba enthusiasts, including regulars from classes at the King Edward Hall, Esther led continuous sessions throughout the day and night to claim world record status. The event, held at Clair Hall in Haywards Heath, was organised to raise funds for St Peter and St James Hospice in North Chailey.

"I was completely overwhelmed by the whole experience," said Esther from Noah's Ark Lane, who took four days off to recover. "I know now how Team GB felt at the Olympics!"

There was a real party atmosphere from start to finish with many participants sporting pink tutus and wigs. Some of them had individually raised hundreds of pounds in sponsorship after doubling and sometimes trebling the hours they originally signed up for.

"The support was overwhelming – I even received a marriage proposal by text!"

And there was an extra surprise in store when Esther found she had not just broken but completely smashed the previous record. "We thought that the record stood at 36 hours. But later found that this was never validated," said Esther "it turned out that we had actually broken the record after 29 hours but as the event was organised for 36.5 hours and so many people had signed up for the last few hours, we just kept going."

In order to meet the strict requirements for world record status the whole event was filmed and at least 10 fitness fans had to be on the floor at all times. "But the lowest we had was 21 and that was at 2.15 in the morning!" said Esther. Comfort breaks were also carefully timed.

"The support was overwhelming – from the reports in Lindfield Life to a mention from Aled Jones on Radio 2," said Esther. "I even received a marriage proposal by text from an Iron Man!

"I'd particularly like to thank my sponsor Maureen Scholefield from Cullen Scholefield, all the wonderful volunteers, my Lindfield ladies (and gent), all regular zumba goers and new faces... and, most importantly, my amazing family."

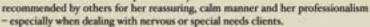

Itch by Simon Mayo

How do you create a great children's story? Ironically, by not trying to write one but by creating a series of ideas and characters that can appeal to all readers, regardless of age, you will be more likely to do so. Simon Mayo's first novel is about a boy with the nickname Itch who is obsessed with acquiring all the chemicals in the periodic table. The boy goes to some lengths to do so and then unwittingly comes across an undiscovered element that could change the world as it could be a source of a type of nuclear energy. This naturally brings out the bad guys – from a crazed Science teacher to a dodgy corporation, whom Itch and his family will have to fight. Will our hero be destroyed by them or the radiation sickness that the rocks are emitting? The action cracks along at a great pace. What Mayo does particularly skilfully is to give us an education about science without lecturing us or distorting his story. The other great quality in a children's book is to create a villain who both repels you and yet whom you cannot help but be fascinated by, which he achieves here with a baddie called Dr Flowerdew. Well worth a read and as a present for a young reader.

Inflation-proofing your savings

It is fair to say that you should always hold some of your money as cash. But if you keep all of your savings in this way inflation can eat away at it, especially when interest rates remain low for a long period of time.

How does inflation erode my cash?

It is easy to think that by holding your cash in a savings account, you will be getting a return equal to the interest rate that is being paid. For example, if you were to place £100 in a savings account where the interest rate was quoted as 3% gross per annum, you would imagine that at the end of the first year you would have earned £3 interest and in total you would have £103 to spend. In theory this is true. However, inflation will mean that the price of goods and services that you might pay for with this cash will also have risen and when the rate of these price increases exceeds interest rates, your cash is actually losing value.

Can I inflation-proof my savings?

Yes, investing is a way to try to beat inflation by making your money grow at a faster rate than if you held it as savings in a building society account.

What types of investments could protect my capital from inflation?

There are various means of protecting your capital from inflation. Things you could consider include investment in Property, Shares or Bonds. You do not have to invest directly in these assets to reap their inflation-proofing qualities, nor do you need to have large sums of capital. For instance, you could start investing through a savings plan from £30 a month.

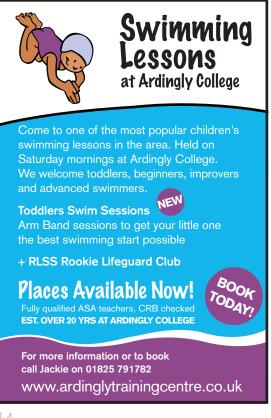
Is there anything else I can do to minimise the effects of inflation?

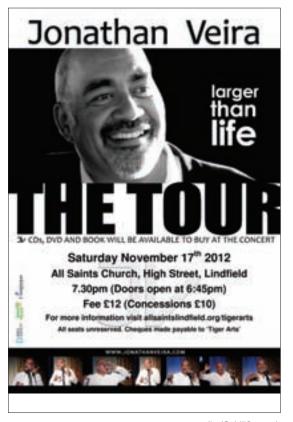
It is also important that you make maximum use of your tax free allowances such as ISAs at such times, which will maximise returns.

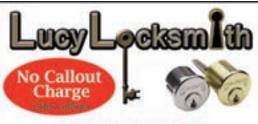

Lemon and Bacon Stuffing Balls

Serves 6-8

Gently fry 100g finely chopped streaky bacon until it is just golden then remove from the pan with a slotted spoon. Finely chop an onion and 3 celery sticks and add to the bacon fat in the pan. Cook, stirring, until just soft. Stir in the bacon, finely grated rind and juice of 1 lemon, 2tbs finely chopped parsley, 100g fresh breadcrumbs and 150ml hot chicken stock. Cool, shape into balls and freeze on a baking sheet until firm. Tip into a freezer bag and return to the freezer. Thaw before baking.

Cranberry and Raspberry Relish

Using a microwave and a large casserole, cover and cook 1 small chopped onion and 2tbs red wine vinegar for 30sec. Stir in 4tbs orange marmalade, 1tbs grated fresh ginger, 250g each fresh or frozen (do not thaw) cranberries and raspberries. Cover and cook on MED-HIGH for about 6 min, stirring once, or until the fruit has softened and the relish has thickened slightly. Cool and pot. Refrigerate for about 7 days or freeze.

Before the pre-Christmas rush, and while the children are still at school, be kind to yourself and get ahead on the food for the coming holidays. Many traditional dishes can be made ahead and chilled or frozen. Another plus is that many would make excellent gifts for those "difficult" friends and family members. A beautifully packaged gift of something homemade is always a success.

The basics such as brandy butter (try brandy and rum together), the bread sauce, bacon-wrapped sausages, flavoured butters, cranberry sauce and homemade stuffing will all freeze successfully.

No-Fat, No-Sugar Mincemeat

Makes about 2kg.

Into a large bowl, put 225g each of sultanas, raisins, currants, chopped ready-to-eat dried figs and dried apricots. Add 450g peeled, cored and sliced dessert apples and 100g blanched almonds, Stir and tip into a processor. Buzz until finely chopped. Return to the bowl and stir in the finely grated rind and juice of 2 lemons, the juice of 2 large oranges, 2tbs mixed spice, 150ml clear honey and 60ml rum, brandy or whisky, Make 2-3 weeks before using, cover tightly and refrigerate or freeze. Thaw at room temperature.

Mincemeat Crumble Cake

(This cake freezes well. Thaw at room temperature and warm gently in a cool oven).

Preheat the oven 180° and base line and butter a 23cm cake tin. To make the topping: rub 50g chilled butter into 75g self-raising flour to form crumbs. Add 50g Demerara sugar, ½tsp mixed spice and 50g broken walnuts. Beat 115g soft butter with 115g caster sugar, 2 beaten eggs and 3tbs milk until smooth. Sift over 175g self-raising flour, 1tsp baking powder and stir to combine. Spoon into the tin, top with 450g mincemeat and sprinkle over the crumb topping. Bake 45-50 min or until golden brown. For a festive finish, just before serving either sift icing sugar over the top or drizzle with lemon glace icing.

Support for breastfeeding mothers

New mums in Lindfield and beyond are being offered breastfeeding support from a new group of volunteers.

The Mid Sussex Breastfeeding Peer Support Team began volunteering at baby and toddler groups across the area last month.

A team of 12 breastfeeding peer supporters, trained by The Mid Sussex NCT (National Childbirth Trust), are providing mother-to-mother support to women trying to breastfeed

Research shows that only 35% of UK babies are being exclusively breastfed one week after birth. The World Health Organisation recommends that all babies should be breastfed exclusively for the first six months.

With this huge disparity in mind, the Mid Sussex NCT decided to train up local volunteers to provide more support to new mothers who want to breastfeed their babies

The newly trained peer supporters are all mothers who have breastfed at least one baby and are passionate about supporting other mothers who want to breastfeed. Their role is to listen, support and to offer factual information. The NCT peer supporters are qualified to support mothers with a "normal" breastfeeding experience.

Ally Hewitt-Lock, Breastfeeding Peer Support Project Co-ordinator, Mid Sussex NCT: "Having met so many women who want to breastfeed but have not been able to, I became frustrated that there wasn't more help and support for them. There are lots of different barriers to breastfeeding that a new mother may encounter and many of them are small things that can be solved easily. This new group of peer supporters are extremely enthusiastic and are keen to help any local mothers who want to breastfeed their babies."

The team, who have now finished their training of between 20 and 30 hours, are all offering their time voluntarily. "It's an amazing commitment, especially considering they all have families of their own and most work outside the home in a variety of demanding jobs," said Ally.

The newly trained volunteers are an invaluable resource for local new mothers as they have been fully versed in the mechanics of breastfeeding; what happens from the moment of birth onwards to produce milk, how to position and attach the baby effectively, how to teach a mother to hand-express and how to store breast milk.

The Breastfeeding Peer Support Team will be on hand to help at many different locations throughout the week, including on Mondays at the NCT Haywards Heath Bumps and Babes Group at 'The Yews', Boltro Road. Plans are also in hand to offer support sessions in Lindfield. Mums, whether NCT members or not, are welcome to drop in to speak to one of the team for information and support with breastfeeding.

"NCT is here to support parents. We give them accurate, impartial information so that they can decide what's best for their family and we introduce them to a network of local parents to gain practical and emotional support," said Ally.

Draw, Fade or Straight

GOLF TIP OF THE MONTH #12

Why do golfers want to hit the ball straight?

A straight golf shot is the hardest to play, as the ball will only curve away from its intended target rather than to it. What do I mean?

If you are a fader of the ball (left to right), you know 90% of the time the ball will start left and curve back to the right. It is therefore always flying back towards the target.

If you try to try to hit the ball in a straight line and don't, the ball is now flying away from the target and will only continue further off-line.

All golfers have a natural right to left or left to right game.

My predominant shot is a draw (from right to left) so, when I warm up for a tournament, I spend my time on the range figuring out how much the ball is drawing on that day.

Every day will be different. The secret is to use what you do naturally on the day. Don't fight it!

Lucy's golf update...

I'm pleased to say I've had a bit of a breakthrough with golf! My most recent lesson with Simon saw me not only hitting the ball past the 100-yard mark but also only hitting the tree twice!

I started off with a few practise shots that weren't too bad, the ball went a decent distance and I didn't accidently whack the floor once which is unusual for me! After these practises, Simon adjusted my hands on the club, pointing out that my top hand was in the wrong place as my knuckles were almost facing upwards. He explained that this was altering the position of the club and so when I hit the ball it was sending it off to the right instead of straight (tree-hitting situation explained then).

Although it felt a little odd at first as I had got used to holding the club that way, when I twisted my wrist so that the top of my hand was facing upwards the ball went so much straighter and a lot further. It goes to show that although practising on your own is good for confidence and experience, it's vital to have a regular lesson with a Pro who'll pick up on these little things that make a huge difference. It's great to be at a point now where I'm no longer worrying about 'if' I will hit the ball, but now trying to determine 'how far'.

Next time I'm going out on the course for the first time, which is very nerve-racking – let's hope it's a quiet day at the club.

Fat facts

NATURAL THERAPY

The word "fat" has a very negative meaning for most people, yet not all types of fat are bad – in fact some fat is vital for health.

Fat is one of three macronutrients that supply us with energy—along with protein and carbohydrate. Fat can be obtained from food and some fats are made by the liver.

When we eat fat it is broken down in the gut and then reassembled into molecules which enter the bloodstream. Some of these molecules are taken up by the muscles as a fuel source and some become fatty tissue (fat stores) in the body. These fat stores would have been used by our ancestors for energy at times when food was scarce, however with the typical Western diet we don't tend to use them!

Fat also provides insulation and helps the body absorb and transport vitamins A, D, E and K through the bloodstream. The essential fatty acids (which cannot be made by the body and therefore have to come from the diet) are important for controlling inflammation, blood clotting and brain development (the brain is about 60% fat).

Types of Fat:

. Saturated fats

Saturated fats are found in foods including fatty meats, butter, cheese, whole milk and cream as well as some tropical plant and vegetable oils, including coconut and palm oil. There are many different types, although we tend to consume three main types in our diet. Stearic acid, found in cocoa and animal fat, has been found to have no adverse effects on cholesterol levels. Palmitic and lauric acids raise "bad" cholesterol levels but they also raise "good" cholesterol by the same amount or more.

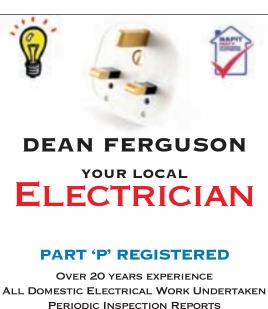
Unsaturated fats

Polyunsaturated fats – the main dietary types are Omega 3s and Omega 6s, neither of which can be made by the body so need to come from your diet. Omega 3 fatty acids help to control the body's inflammatory processes, whilst Omega 6 fatty acids can increase inflammation. It is important that they are consumed in an appropriate ratio, however the Western diet typically results in an excess of Omega 6s. Omega 3 fatty acids can be found in linseed, walnuts and some other foods but the most beneficial form of Omega 3 which contains the fatty acids DHA and EPA (important in preventing and fighting physical and mental disease) is only found in fish oil and krill.

The richer an oil is in essential fatty acids (particularly Omega 3s) the more damaged it becomes during frying and therefore the more toxic it is to the body. If you must use oils when cooking, use those which are less damaged by the process – these tend to be the hard fats.

Monounsaturated fats – these are typically liquid at room temperature but may become solid if chilled. Olive oil for example contains some monounsaturated fat. It is preferable not to heat olive oil to high temperatures.

Every September London plays host to one of the most important events on the international design calendar, London Design Week. This ten day festival is a combination of trade events, exhibitions, seminars, private views and parties and provides a global platform for designers through a wide range of disciplines to showcase new products and launch new ranges. Now in its 10th year the festival has firmly placed London on the design map and is something that we always make a point of visiting for at least one or two of the key events. This year, with junior designer Katy as a permanent part of the team, I was able to justify an extra day in London to soak up more of the action! A great deal of pavement pounding was involved since the events span the capital from 100% Design at Earls Court to Tent at Old Truman Brewery near Brick Lane but it was worth it.

So what did we see? Our first stop was 100% Design featuring new and exciting developments in a variety of aspects of interior design including kitchens, bathrooms and lighting, so it was right up David's street. This show is less about fabric and more about the architectural side of design; we found a fantastic staircase and some fabulous textured large scale wall tiles for a commercial project. Next stop was the Brompton design district, which includes venues such as The Conran Shop, Skandium and Jonathan Adler. Eyes out on stalks I went from shop to shop with an ever growing wish list. These places never fail to excite and, on seeing my pictures of the red themed Conran windows, Cameron's "Ah Mum that looks way cool! Can we go?" proved that this appeal spans generations.

Tent is to me the grittier of the shows – the Brewery being a much more relaxed venue than Earls Court or the Royal Hospital grounds in Chelsea, yet here you find some exciting new and emerging talent. For me there was a hint of emperor's new clothes about some things but it was fascinating to see some of the new projects from recently graduated design students, which included Brighton University design graduate Chloe Meineck's Music Memory Box created for Alzheimer's patients. It plays familiar tunes and is full of significant objects selected to remind the user about important moments in their life. Chloe's design ethic is to make people's lives better through design. I love that.

Day two saw us at Chelsea Harbour for Focus, which is where the main and established soft furnishings companies launch their new collections. You could probably nibble and quaff your way around the show rooms for a couple of days, cooing over the latest patterns and weaves but we only had a few hours so by mid morning were on the courtesy coach heading for Decorex. This is probably my favourite of all the shows - gorgeous fabrics, stunning wallpapers, unusual accessories, dazzling lighting and exciting new furniture designs, plus a whole crowd of industry mates to bump into and this year so much COLOUR! Highlights for me were the latest range of geometric patterned flatweave rugs from The Rug Company, the new textured wall coverings from French company Elitis (via Abbott & Boyd) and PaperBoy Interiors. This relatively new paper and fabric company is the brainchild of a lady who, being unable to find the right paper for her 8 year old son's bedroom, designed some herself and put them into production. Brilliant!

So back to HQ inspired and laden with samples and fired up for our new projects. It would be so easy to spend a week at London Design Festival; perhaps next year!

Neighbourhood Plan Exhibitions



The Joint Working Party organised two Exhibitions during September in connection with the Neighbourhood Plan that is jointly being undertaken by your Parish Council and our friends in the Rural Parish. The first was held in the King Edward Hall on Saturday 15th September and we had about 200 visitors that day, while the second was held in the Millennium Centre in Scaynes Hill on the following Saturday, where they had over 100 visitors. In addition to Councillors from both Parishes at the exhibitions, we had great assistance from planning experts from Planning Aid England who were able to answer many visitors' questions about the wider implications of the Localism agenda from Central Government and the recently announced changes to planning controls.

We obtained considerable useful feedback from many visitors to the exhibitions and we do appreciate the openness that so many of them showed in their responses to the various displays, in particular to those relating to infrastructure, landscape and housing.

We are now collecting together the 500+ completed questionnaires that have been returned to us, together with some associated letters. These will all be shortly forwarded to AiRs (Action in Rural Sussex) for independent analysis.

The report on the independent analysis of the questionnaires will be published in Lindfield Life early in 2013 and there will be presentations on it at both Parish Councils' Annual Meetings in April.

In the meantime the JWP will continue to meet regularly in order to progress various matters, including a Sustainability Report that we are required to produce. A number of villagers have indicated their willingness to assist us in some of these areas and we will be contacting them in the near future to see how they can help us.

Stall holders will have to bring their own tables and chairs and, as the High Street is pretty dark in places, we suggest bringing some battery operated lighting for their stalls. However, we are pleased to say that there will be Christmas lights in the High Street this year.

Pond Aerators

It would be difficult not to have noticed the two fountains on the Pond that appeared late in the summer. We thought we should say a few words about them in case you are wondering why they are there. The water in the Pond needs to be aerated to prevent an algal bloom forming on the surface which looks awful, smells bad and, with lack of oxygen, the fish die and the smell becomes even worse.

The pond is within the boundary of the Common which is why it is managed by Mid Sussex District Council but of course, as it is a particular feature of our village, the Parish Council takes an active interest and we work with the District Council officers wherever we can to maintain the health of the Pond and its wildlife.

There are no aquatic plants to oxygenate the water, and we are told by MSDC that these would only be eaten by wildflowl, so the water in what is actually a very shallow pond, needs to be moved around to aerate it and alleviate the potential for stagnation. For several years there was an aeration pump in place to the right of the large island, which was never enough to aerate the whole



Pond and because its workings sat on the base of the Pond, it quickly silted up and ceased to function. Last summer, without the benefit of this pump, the water became very smelly and the Parish Council urged MSDC to replace the pump with something more effective and offered to pay towards its purchase.

MSDC took advice from pond restoration experts and settled for two pumps with the appearance of fountains and because these float on the surface they do not suffer from silting. MSDC are monitoring the effectiveness of these new pumps and if a third one is needed the Parish Council has offered to fund this as the health of the Pond and its wildlife is so important.
