



Then Secret Dealers could be the programme you've been waiting for!


The ITV1 show's producers, currently planning the fourth series, are looking to film in West Sussex and are searching for people to take part.







At just 7 years old Marianne Brand announced to her form tutor Miss Pilgrim and to her family that she was going to become a teacher.

Throughout school and university her ambition never faded and last summer Marianne landed her dream job – becoming head teacher of Blackthorns primary school.

"Miss Pilgrim was my 'dream weaver,'" said Marianne.
"She was the person who inspired me to go into teaching
—I made my decision when I was 7 years old and I've
never looked back!"

Marianne took over as head of Blackthorns in September and has enjoyed a busy first term.

"I loved Blackthorns from the moment I walked through the door, " she said. "Seeing the children engaged with each other, their enthusiasm and the happy atmosphere – I knew that this was something really special."

Before joining Blackthorns, Marianne was deputy head at a large primary school near Milton Keynes in Buckinghamshire. With 500 pupils it was double the size of Blackthorns.

"There's something really special and unique about a small school and I love the way all the children know each other," said Marianne. "I really enjoy showing prospective parents around the school as I can see that they can sense the warmth here. I am truly blessed to have such a hard working group of staff who are totally committed to the children."

Marianne feels lucky to be taking over a successful school and stepping into the shoes of the previous popular head, Mrs Schofield.

"It's lovely to inherit such a successful school - Mrs Schofield did a brilliant job," said Marianne.

"Some of the previous schools I have worked for were failing and so the challenge was to raise the standards and quality of teaching.

"But here at Blackthorns standards of teaching are already very high, so the challenges are very different.

"I was lucky that Ofsted carried out its inspection shortly before I arrived, so I knew exactly where our strengths were. It's given me a good platform for moving forward and planning our development." On arrival at Blackthorns, Marianne was keen to work with staff to introduce the quality marking scheme 'Yippee Yellow' and 'Green for Growth'.

"It's a simple scheme where good writing is highlighted with yellow and green means 'needs to improve'," she explained.

"Children can see instantly how they are doing. It's been so popular that we have extended it into other areas and it's become part of the school vocabulary!"

She has also introduced two-weekly newsletters for parents and is currently redesigning a new website.

"We've also been looking at ways in which we can increase children's safety both in and outside school – that's one of our main priorities."

Behaviour and safety was the subject of one of the school's 'mini inspections' carried out by a team of pupils. The inspection scheme was introduced by Marianne as a way of getting feedback from pupils.

"We ask our older pupils to carry out their own investigations into issues that are important to us," she said. "They have recently been looking at safety and talking to their classmates about concerns and ideas they may have. We find that sometimes children will talk to other children rather than to teachers – it's a great way of finding out what they really think!

"I'm very pleased to say that the result was that a very large majority of the children feel safe," she added. "Our focus is on the individual child and that is absolutely central to everything we do. No child will ever get 'lost' here! Staff know each and every child very well."

Children supporting one another is also the ethos behind the 'School Buddy' scheme, designed to help the youngest pupils settle into school.

Returning to Sussex is something of a home-coming for Marianne, who is a huge Brighton & Hove Albion fan. Born in Cuckfield, she moved to Hove as a child and later studied at Brighton University. After getting married, she moved to Buckinghamshire.

"But Sussex is always home to me, so when the Blackthorns job came up it was the perfect opportunity to come back."

She admits to first day nerves - particularly taking her

first school assembly. "When you have every pupil and teacher sitting there waiting to hear what you have to say, it's extremely daunting."

But she needn't have worried. "It was an interactive assembly, so there was lots going on and the children had a huge input. Before long we were all laughing together!"

Getting to know the children has clearly been the highlight of Marianne's first term.

"I always have my door open and children know they are welcome in my office," she said. "It's lovely when they pop their heads round the door and ask me to come and see something they are doing. Whether it's measuring giants' footprints or singing a Tudor song!"

Marianne is also happy to step in and take a class. "I love teaching and still cover around a couple of lessons a week," she said. "When a staff member is away I always look in my diary first to see if I can cover the class.

"It gives you credibility when staff and parents know that you are still teaching but more importantly it's what I love to do. I don't want to fall into the trap of doing hundreds of things in the office - I want to spend time teaching - after all this is what I trained to do."

Marianne is keen to build on the school's links with the local community and ensure that pupils continue to appreciate and feel part of their village.

"It's wonderful that the school is part of the beautiful village of Lindfield," she said. "History projects are easy because the children are surrounded by history all the time!"

She is also keen to strengthen links with other schools, particularly Lindfield Primary which her son Charlie attends. ("It's never a good idea for a child to go to a school where mum is the head!")

"We recently joined Tavistock and Summerhil School for an enrichment day and we get valuable support from Oathall Community College," said Marianne. "As budgets and support from the Local Authority continue to face cuts, it's more important than ever that schools find ways of working together."

Visitors are always welcome, and exciting events are being planned for the year ahead, including a 'Movie Making Festival' in the spring and summer when children will be using digital cameras, camcorders and iPads to make their own films.

The event will culminate in a red carpet awards night with Blackthorns own Oscars up for grabs!

Outdoor playground equipment is also being replaced thanks to fundraising by the Blackthorns PTA (FOBS) and in the spring children will be helping to create a school garden.

Looking to the future Mrs Brand sees scope for positive change. "When a school gets a new head than it's a very good time to make changes. We can never stand still –we have to keep moving forward, rising to new challenges and striving to get better.

"It's not always easy when the goalposts keep moving but this school has the potential to become outstanding and that is where we are heading."



# The Retail Distribution Review

### **MONEY MATTERS**

What is the Retail Distribution Review (RDR)?

RDR is a review by the Financial Services
Authority (FSA) which started in 2006 primarily to investigate how Financial Products are sold in the UK. It comes into force on 31st December 2012.

Why is the FSA doing this?

The FSA feels that there has been sufficient evidence of ill-advised products, poor service and decreasing investor confidence that warranted a complete review of how Financial Products are sold.

How does RDR affect Financial Advisers?

Firstly there will be clearer charges. Instead of being paid by commission, advisers will have to agree charges with the client upfront. Secondly, advisers will have to be clearer on how much of the market they can help you with, be it all possible investment solutions or specific areas. Finally your adviser will have to meet higher standards of qualifications and keep these up to date by completing a minimum amount of 'Continuing Professional Development' and adhere to a code of conduct.

How does this affect me as a potential client of an Adviser?

It is hoped RDR will improve public confidence in Financial Advisers and the advice they provide. From 31st December 2012 you can be reassured that all Advisers are required to hold a minimum set of qualifications, which has not previously been the case. The system is now designed for Advisers to provide ongoing advice and not just sell you a product. They get paid for their time and expertise, not from the commission generated by a sale.

The overall effect of RDR should be to increase professionalism in the financial services industry and safeguard the client, making charges more transparent.

Some of you will know that in mid November I was stopped in my tracks with what turned out to be acute closed angle glaucoma which has left me with severely impaired vision in my left eye. This article is not, you will be pleased to hear, a detailed account of my eye trauma nor is it a sob story since I am in a good place with it all and know that my right eye will quickly adjust to the "new normal". No, the purpose of this piece is to reflect on the importance of good design and the balance between function and form.

To me, interior design is about creating environments that work for the people spending time in them and works from a functional point of view as well as aesthetic. The argument for function over form is an age old debate but to me function has to come first. A dining chair that wows you visually yet has you craving the comfort of the sofa before the main course is served is clearly not doing its job.

We are working on a care home project at the moment and will shortly be making final decisions on furniture choice. No Queen Anne chairs plastered centrifugally to the walls for this client. They are looking for a contemporary look, hotel lobby style communal areas and modern seating throughout. Having spent a few nights in hospital and since then many hours in outpatients, I found myself reconsidering some of my initial furniture choices. The wing back chair is a

classic style and very often used as the visitor's chair in hospitals and featured in living room areas of homes for the elderly, and is often the style that our care home clients are keen to avoid for aesthetic reasons. For David, function won hands down over form when he spent a night on the visitor's wing chair in hospital. The same can be said for seating in outpatients. Comfort, specifically lumbar support, is important, so whilst the chairs may not look that exciting they meet the need of the user. Form can be enhanced however by choosing the correct fabric and this plays a key role in how we approach the design of our care home projects. Not that I needed convincing but our recent hands-on experience has made me even more determined to ensure that we design with usability in mind and find ways of boosting the form of a product through finish and colour. During 2013 I shall be working closely with our furniture suppliers on a range of contemporary wing chairs which tick the function box yet still meet the contemporary scheme brief of my client.

So losing the function in my left eye has, I am pleased to report, not prevented me from pulling schemes together. If anything it has added a new dimension to my approach to my work and made me appreciate the importance of colours and finishes from a different perspective.

Is the New Year the time when you take stock of your life and make resolutions which you hope will last? Often these resolutions are linked to health and fitness, and last year 6 out of 10 people in a survey planned to eat more healthily. Perhaps we should think not only about eating more healthily but also more wisely and economically. There is no doubt that the cost of food will rise in 2013 due to a multitude of factors – bad harvests and higher fuel costs to mention just two.

Recently I have been talking to Helen Malik, the nutritionist at the Natural Therapy Rooms at Abbott's Pharmacy. My work in the food industry has always been promoting good food and cooking but Helen is focused on the nutritional aspects of our eating habits. She has told me research shows that families who eat together as a family are often healthier, the children do better at school and have less social problems. However, a shocking statistic shows only 44% of families sit round the table together and then only 1-3 times a week. Also, 34% of mothers surveyed prepare several different meals each night to satisfy the different tastes of the family. No wonder many of these may be ready-to-heat dishes.

Helen has highlighted her basic health tips which are excellent New Year's resolutions.

- Your body needs fat for a number of reasons including insulation, to transport important vitamins and for brain development. Choose wisely including avocados, nuts and seeds, and healthy oils such as coconut oil for cooking and a good olive oil for salad dressings. Be aware of the bad trans fats in doughnuts, baked goods and ready prepared foods. Read the labels.
- The Western diet is overloaded with sugar. Almost all processed and baked goods and drinks contain it. Bread and pasta are high in carbohydrates which are a form of sugar.
- Eat good quality protein such as poultry, fish, lentils and pulses at every meal. Protein converts to glucose very slowly and keeps your energy levels up.
- Eat a rainbow of fruits and vegetables every day.
   The different colours in natural foods represent a wide range of essential nutrients. Fruit is high in sugar so the majority of your 5-a-day should be vegetables.

- Try to eat seasonally, preferably foods produced in our own country and which have not been flown hundreds of miles around the world before reaching your plate. Freshly harvested foods contain far more goodness and flavour than those imported.
- Look for interesting and delicious ways to incorporate alternative sources of protein into your meals, such as lentils and beans.
- Look after your liver! Having a well functioning liver is essential to a healthy body but the western way of eating, including a high proportion of commercially produced foods, too much alcohol, fat and sugar (including artificial sweeteners), can cause this important organ to become overburdened.
- Cooking should be fun, not a chore. Try to get your children involved, making foods they enjoy eating.
- Enjoy your food! Enjoy sitting round the table eating as a family, eating a wide range of natural wholesome fresh food and taking part in the lively conversation and the arguments!

Try these recipes, they are simple and inexpensive, look delicious and taste great...

### Tomato Dhal

#### Serves 4

Lentils are a good source of protein, low in fat, inexpensive and an important source of complex carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals. Serve this creamy dish with warm naan bread and seasoned yogurt. If the family insist on visible signs of meat, top with homemade hamburger or meatballs.

Gently cook 1 finely chopped onion in a splash of oil (try coconut oil) until just soft. Add 2 crushed garlic cloves, 1 finely diced large carrot, 1tbs grated fresh ginger root, 1/4 tsp each of ground cumin, turmeric and chilli powder. Cook, stirring, for 2-3 min. Stir in 225g red lentils, 4 skinned and chopped large tomatoes, 400ml vegetable stock and 400ml coconut milk. Bring to the boil, cover and cook over low heat for about 40min, stirring occasionally or until the lentils are soft and the mixture is creamy. Stir in the juice of 2 limes and season to taste. Serve topped with chopped coriander and flaked almonds.

### Crunchy Muesli

#### 6-8 servings

Instead of sugar-laden breakfast cereal, serve this muesli topped with chopped fresh fruit and yogurt for a great start to the day. Health food shops sell a wide selection of different grains.

Measure 225g mixed cereal grains into a large bowl. Add 50g EACH of wheatgerm and chopped almonds, 2tbs sesame seeds, 2tbs sunflower seeds, 2tbs mild oil and 4tbs clear honey. Lightly toss to combine and tip evenly into a large roasting tin. Bake at 180° for about 25min, stirring once or twice, until golden brown. Stir in 100g chopped dried apricots or other dried fruits. Cool and store in an airtight container.

### Vegetable Soup with Barley

#### 4 generous servings

Choose a wide variety of different coloured vegetables and cut into even bite-sized pieces. Leafy or frozen vegetables take less time to cook than roots so add partway through the cooking time. Could also be cooked in the microwave covered with a vented lid (about 30 min on HIGH). Pearl barley can be cooked ahead in stock and then frozen. Thaw then add to recipes such as soups and casseroles.

Prepare 3 mug-fulls of vegetables and tip into a large pan. Add 1.5 litres of well flavoured stock, 45ml tomato puree, some crushed garlic and 50g pearl barley. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for about 50 min or until the barley is soft. Season to taste.

### **Banana Muffins**

#### Makes 6-8

So simple – get the children to make these.

Preheat the oven 200°C. Measure into a large bowl 250g plain flour, 85g jumbo porridge oats, 1tsp baking powder, 1tsp ground cinnamon and 75g chopped dates (or other dried fruit). Stir to combine. In a large jug whisk together 2 eggs, 200ml milk, 75ml vegetable oil, 3 mashed ripe bananas and 7tbs clear honey. Add to the dry ingredients and stir just to combine (don't over mix). Spoon into paper-lined muffin cups and bake for 25-30 min.

### The long bunker shot

#### **GOLF TIP OF THE MONTH #14**

#### By Simon Iliffe

Often regarded as the toughest shot in golf, the 30 to 60 yards bunker shot can be tamed if played in the right way.

To make the shot easier, take your most lofted club (a lob-wedge is ideal) so you can be more positive.

Take your normal full-swing set-up and position the ball just forward of centre. Make a full swing aiming to hit the bottom of the ball.

The sole of the club will just strike the sand first and take enough power off the shot to hit a 60 yards shot.

To change the yardage, control the length of the backswing and keep positive through the ball. DON'T ease up on the shot!


Make sure to swing right through to achieve good loft and ball-stopping control.

### Battleground Sussex by John Grehan & Martin Mace

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

This book is a comprehensive military history of Sussex from the Iron Age to the present day. Both authors are experienced military historians and writers who live and work in the county. However, this is a book that will appeal to fans of history and those interested in their home county alike. The overriding theme that struck me was how fortunate we are to live in times of peace, as over previous centuries Sussex and its inhabitants were under almost constant risk of attack and invasion. This originates primarily as a result of Sussex's proximity to mainland Europe and England's traditional enemy France. When this is allied to the open nature of Sussex's flat beaches and the convenient striking distance from London and the power base of the South East, it is easy to see why Sussex has so often been on the nation's front line in warfare.

Sussex has also been the site of probably the best-known battle fought on English soil – the Battle of Hastings, which is comprehensivley analysed in the book. Further, I was made aware through the book of the importance of the battle of Lewes in 1264, where through Simon de Montfort's legacy the principle of rule by democracy was established.

By 1939 the inhabitants of Sussex were threatened by attack from the air and a large part of the book is devoted to analysing the Battle of Britain, the success of which largely depended on the radar stations, many of which were sited in Sussex, and allowed

Sussex ports then played a major role in the largest sea borne assault ever undertaken in the D-Day landings of 1944 and the book vividly depicts the whole of Sussex becoming a giant marshalling yard prior to the invasion. It portrays the effects of the war and the bombing campaign on Sussex through first-hand accounts of residents.



### STREET LIGHT DAMAGE

Our street lighting engineer has recently discovered that the street light in the footpath from Brookway to Sunte Avenue appears to have been shot at with an air gun. We have arranged to replace the lantern, at a cost of £125, because it was no longer water tight due to the damage, causing the lamp to fail as well as being a safety risk. We hope this was a one-off occurrence but we would ask residents to report any further incidents to us so that we can pass the information on to the police.

### CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

We hope you all like our new Christmas Lights in the High Street!

Since the pollarding of the trees we've found it to be more and more challenging, with the equipment we had, to comply with regulations for electrical installations over the public footways. So, encouraged by the number of people who signed last year's petition, the Parish Council engaged Blachere (a festive lighting company) to provide and install new lights. We chose these carefully, trying to get a tasteful effect worthy of our High Street but using modern low energy equipment. We are indebted to the property owners who allow us to use their power supply to make the whole thing possible.



### LINDFIELD PARISH COUNCIL IS ON THE MOVE!

The Parish Council took up residence in its present location in Denmans Lane in 1996. At that time it was ideal and has served us well for many years. However, for some time now it has been apparent that we have outgrown the space. The conditions for the staff have become very cramped and we have had to pay to store paperwork and other items elsewhere in the village.

The Council has looked long and hard at the alternatives and, to be honest, there are very few. The possibility of extending our current building has been considered but we have been advised that we would be very unlikely to get planning permission. So, we have been looking for other premises within the village centre and have drawn a blank.

A property that we looked at some time ago as a possibility to rent came up for sale last summer and we have now completed on the purchase. The premises are at Clock Tower House on the Lindfield Enterprise Park in Lewes Road and they are ideal for our needs. We will be able to offer much better working conditions for the staff, have storage space on site and also be able to offer better facilities for the public.

Some of you will be pleased with the location as it will be nearer to where you live but we do appreciate that others amongst you may feel that the new location will be difficult for you to get to. We are addressing this issue and will do our utmost to make sure that no-one is disadvantaged as a result of this move.

We hope to be operating from the Lewes Road premises from early spring and the new contact details and opening hours will be advertised as widely as possible.

### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

### REPORT ON QUESTIONNAIRE ANALYSIS BY AIRS

#### Councillor Alan Gomme

Action in Rural Sussex (AiRS) submitted their analysis and report on the 533 responses that were sent to Lindfield & Lindfield Rural Parish to the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group in December.

There was great support (98%) for a plan being developed jointly by both councils with most respondents (97%) being from households within our parishes with most (78%) working outside of them. The most popular way of commuting to work is by car within Mid Sussex (25%), while 23% use public transport. A great number (56%) supported the need for better peak time public transport to Haywards Heath and 63% consider that rail services from the station are currently adequate.

The vast majority (95%) agreed that Sites of Special Scientific Interest, Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and our Nature Reserves should be reserved without compromise, while 95% agreed that wildlife corridors should be preserved and enhanced. Nearly all respondents (98%) agreed that our Parishes should retain their heritage and identity to provide attractive places to live and visit, while over three-quarters (80%) agreed that small businesses in Lindfield High Street should provide a mix of local services and essential provisions and high-end boutiques. There was similar support (80%) for the protection of business units and retail shops and change of use to residential should be resisted while most (93%) agreed that new businesses that provide local jobs should be encouraged.

Of concern to many is the provision of water supply, as only 52% consider that this is adequate and also of concern is the current capacity of our medical centres as only 47% consider that it is adequate.

Most respondents (97%) agreed that children from within our parishes should have priority for places at schools and nurseries within the Parishes, while nearly all (97%) agreed that children and families should be encouraged to walk to school. Over two-thirds (67%) agreed that there is a need for more facilities and services for our youth within the Parishes.

There were a number of questions on future housing with which most respondents agreed, including the protection of the strategic gaps between Lindfield, Scaynes Hill & Haywards Heath (94%), protection of the character and heritage of Lindfield and of views in and out of the village (97%), future housing developments should be of small scale, geographically spread around the parishes and delivered at a steady annual rate (86%), previously used industrial sites ("brownfields") should be used rather than agricultural land ("greenfields") (93%) and that any new housing within the "Lindfield Conservation Area" should be in conformity with the Lindfield Village Design Statement (89%) or within Scaynes Hill it should be in conformity with the "Scaynes Hill Village Plan" (85%).

The full analysis of the completed questionnaires and the other material that was submitted to both Parish Councils during the consultation will now be used as a basis to begin the drafting of our Neighbourhood Plan and it is our intention to be able to present this to our communities at our respective Annual Parish Meetings during April 2013.

The full analysis and report from AiRS is available on both Parish Council's web sites and a printed version is available to study at both our offices during normal opening hours. Due to the length of the report, a small charge will be made for printed copies.

# STREET LIGHTS - maintenance

The Lindfield Preservation Society's newsletter in the December edition of Lindfield Life may have given the impression that the Parish Council was not aware of the condition of the paintwork on our street lighting columns until the Society's representative brought it to our attention. This is not the case and the matter is already in hand. Following the initial inspection by Direct Technical Services when we engaged them as our street lighting maintenance contractors in April 2011, we decided that the recommended upgrade of the equipment should be the first priority for reasons of safety, compliance

with regulations and because there was a significant saving to be made on energy by replacing old lanterns. The contract includes painting of columns in the fifth year, but as long ago as 2011 we discussed bringing this forward once the work on the equipment was completed. The upgrade was finished in September 2012, which was too late to begin the repainting programme this year because of weather conditions. Painting of the columns will begin in Spring when the conditions are right.

### ROAD SURFACE AT BLACK HILL / BACKWOODS LANE MINI ROUNDABOUT

As many of you will be aware, there has been a large depression in the road at the Black Hill / Backwoods Lane mini roundabout. A WSCC Highways Officer has advised that problem is more than just a pothole and he has put in an order for exploratory work. A temporary repair should make the road safe in the meantime and we have been assured that this is being treated as high priority.

## MOBILE CIVIC AMENITY COLLECTIONS

The refuse freighters will be in the Tollgate car park on Sundays 20th January and 10th March 2013, between the hours of 10am and 12noon, for the collection of household and garden waste. Please note that due to current legislation they cannot accept items such as televisions, computer monitors and fluorescent tubes. These can still be taken to a civic amenity centre. Please do not leave rubbish in the absence of the refuse freighter.

### **POLICE SURGERIES**

Our Police Community Support officer, Stuart Clough, continues to hold a surgery once a month in the Parish Office for residents to come along and raise any issues of concern. Forthcoming surgeries will be on Tuesday 22nd January 1-2pm, Thursday 21st February 10-11am and Thursday 21st March 10-11am.

# BUS STOP POLES AND INTEGRAL BINS

The Environment and Amenities Committee has agreed

a programme of refurbishment of the wrought iron bus stop poles, which will involve removal of the semi-circular bins which are too small and difficult to maintain. The bus stop poles will be reinforced so that they can stand alone without the support of the bin. Where bins are considered to be necessary, suitable replacements will be installed, including three wrought iron, free standing, circular bins left over from last year's renovation programme.
