Martin wins Chelsea Gold for 38th time!

Lindfield resident Martin Durrant is best known in the village for being the creator of the Bonfire Society's Guy Fawkes effigy for 5th November. However, Martin has just picked up his 38th Gold Medal at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show.

The award was given for an exhibit of 'a range of orchids' by McBean's Orchids based in Cooksbridge, near Lewes. Martin has worked for McBean's for over 40 years, after training at Plumpton Agricultural College following school. "The flower show exhibitions are purely publicity really and, these days, we can't afford too much time working on them," Martin explains. He is now Nursery Manager at the plant breeding firm and says in recent years all the work happens in 2-3 weeks. "I was particularly pleased to include some of the original plants that were used in the McBean's display at the very first Chelsea Flower Show in this 100th anniversary year."

McBean's are one of only three companies that took part in the first Chelsea Flower Show who remain involved today.

Lindfield cattle barn takes design award

Fulling Mill Farm now boasts an awarding winning barn on its site off Spring Lane. The 'roundhouse' barn, which was built over ten months and finished last year, scooped the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors' South East Award for Design and Innovation at a ceremony that took place in April.

Alison Eggert-Hobbs, who runs the farm with her father David, was very surprised when she heard their name read out at the Awards event. "You could have knocked me down with a feather. I never imagined a cattle barn would take the prize," she commented.

The barn was designed and built by specialists Roundhouse Building Solutions and was one of the first of this size to be built anywhere. The judges praised the design for its positive impact on animal welfare and the environment. Alison explains: "The air flow in the barn is incredible and this makes a real difference to the health of cattle held together in these numbers. The barn currently holds a 100-strong beef herd and they have been noticably happier and healthier in their new surroundings," Alison concludes.

The huge 45 metre diameter barn is sitting on over 200,000 tonnes of hard core and its floor is made from compacted chalk. The barn is pictured on the cover.


We did it! Twenty two of us completed the Kamikaze at Pippingford Park. The team spirit was amazing.



When Lindfield businesswoman Jackie McGahan looked for an ice-cream supplier for the Toll House cafe, fate played a helping hand.

In choosing Brighton-based Boho Gelato, Jackie was also reuniting ice cream entrepreneur Seb Cole with the village that played an important part in his childhood.

It turns out that Seb is the grandson of the former owner of the Toll House, Frances Cole, and spent many happy days exploring the nooks and crannies of the High Street shop.

"I first met Seb when we worked together on the Hungry Sailors programme," said Jackie. "I thought at the time that if I ever wanted to sell ice cream, he would be by my first choice."

Several years later, Jackie found herself running the Toll House cafe in the High Street and with it came the opportunity to introduce speciality ice cream to the village.

When she mentioned that the business was in Lindfield, Sam said he would look forward to delivering as he had many happy memories of visiting his grandmother who used to live and run a shop in the village.

"We were both amazed to discover that the shop was the Toll House!" said Jackie.

Seb took up the story: "I can remember the shop frontage very well but my favourite place to play was in the cellar!

"My brother Ben and I used to get out may granddad's old toys and trains that were stored there.

Once grown up Seb began his career as a printer but links with an Italian company meant regular trips to Rome, where he became passionate about ice cream.

He enrolled on a training course to master the art of making traditional Italion gelato. "The key to making gelato is to use extra creamy non-homogenised milk, "said Seb. "We buy it fresh each day from a local supplier."

Since then he has created 400 flavours of ice cream, ranging from the fruity strawberry 'eton mess' and the decadent fig and mascarpone to the popular peanut butter and sea salt caramel, all on sale at The Toll House.

For those wanting something out of the ordinary, such as bacon and maple syrup or 'starry night' – a concoction of beetroot, berries and licquorice – orders can placed with Jackie.

Art on the Line

'Art on the Line' will transform waiting rooms into mini art galleries across the Southern network, starting with Haywards Heath station.

This unique and innovative platform for promising young art students, emerging artists and professional artists is the brainchild of creative arts entrepreneur Nigel Ryan who has teamed up with Southern Railway, The Gielqud Academy and Rohan Solicitors.

Nigel Ryan, Director of The Creative Reach Consultancy who is the architect of Art on the Line said: "Having owned art galleries and curated exhibitions internationally, I am aware of the talent that's out there but unfortunately it doesn't always get the exposure or have the physical platforms to be exhibited or displayed. So I hope that with this collaboration with Southern and the sponsors we will be able to create those platforms."

The inaugural exhibition is being sponsored jointly by Rohan Solicitors, who are agents for Carlos Acosta the world-renowned ballet dancer, and The Gielgud Academy, run by Lindfield residents Piers and Suzanne Gielgud.

BSW recycles or reuses 98% of its waste

BSW Building Services is demonstrating its commitment to local environmental concerns by ensuring that more than 98% of its waste is either recycled or used to generate green electricity. Achieved through a partnership recently entered into with Rabbit & Enviropower, a unique waste management organisation based near Lancing, only 2% of BSW's waste finishes up in landfill.

BSW gathers waste from the central heating and building jobs it undertakes, including numerous kitchen and bathroom replacements in and around the South East, and collects it in special refuse skips located at its HQ in Scaynes Hill. Rabbit & Enviropower then uplifts the skips and transports them to its state-of-the-art sorting facility, which includes a £15m biofuel waste incinerator and electricity generating plant, the first of its kind to be privately funded in the UK.

At the facility the waste is processed to remove all recyclable materials. The plant is capable of producing five megawatts of electricity, which transfers directly into the National Grid; sufficient for up to 8,000 dwellings.

In my last update I stated that hopefully we had put the poor weather behind us, unfortunately for all of us this has continued for several more months! More large-scale development in Lindfield

Regrettably, Mid Sussex District Council has granted planning permission for yet another large housing estate to be bolted onto the village of Lindfield. The Wates scheme is clearly unsustainable and offers no benefits to counterbalance the considerable harm it will do. It therefore fails, in our view, to meet the requirements of national planning legislation. It was clear from the district planning committee's discussion that there was little support for the proposal, and yet a majority of councillors flinched at the prospect of fighting an appeal by the developer.

We would like to thank those councillors who had the courage and vision to support our community.

Councillors who voted for Wates, and who may be tempted to think that they have reduced pressure on their own constituencies by sacrificing Lindfield, should think again. By advertising that they are not willing to face appeals, they have effectively handed control of planning policy to developers. Sadly, communities across the district are now likely to pay the price.

Wrought Iron Bus Stops

The Parish Council and Lindfield Blacksmith Richard Bradshaw have agreed a plan and removal of the Litter Bin attachments and renovation of the poles is now nearing completion with several already re-installed. If anyone has an idea for recycling, rather than scrapping, the old 'half round' Litter Bins please let the Blacksmith, Parish Council or Preservation Society know. The Society offered to fund a trial modification and siting for one of the 'surplus' litter bins but this was not accepted by the Parish Council.

Old Pond work

The 'Old Pond' between The Limes and Eastern Road Nature Reserve. Still no progress but MSDC have improved the main footpaths on the Eastern Road Nature Reserve and there is evidence of recent tree surgery.

Street Lighting

We have previously commented upon the increasingly 'tatty' state of the WSCC maintained lamp posts along the High Street and elsewhere. It is now believed that nothing will be done to rectify this situation until 2014 – maybe!!

What exactly is a Neighbourhood Plan?



As you may or may not be aware, the village has started the process of creating a 'Neighbourhood Plan'. However, in the wake of the decision by MSDC to grant permission to Wates to build over 200 homes off Gravelye Lane to the East of the Lindfield, we ask some key questions of Faustina Bayo (from Action in Rural Sussex), Andy Spooner and Alan Gomme from the Lindfield Parish Councils.

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is a framework and policies for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area. It forms part of the statutory development plan for the area when it passes a referendum. It may deal with a wide range of social, economic and environmental issues (such as housing, employment, heritage and transport). Neighbourhood Plans have to be subjected to an independent examination and referendum in order to bring them into force.

Who is putting it together?

Neighbourhood Plans can be prepared by either a parish/town council or a neighbourhood forum where there is no parish/town council. The Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan is being put together by representatives of both Parish Councils, with enormous help from various community working groups. They are being guided by the consultants from Action in rural Sussex (AirS).



What or who is/are AirS? Are you a company profiting out of this legislation?

AirS is an independent charity supporting rural communities. Community planning has been a key service for many years. Neighbourhood plans are a community plan and we have the local expertise and knowledge to provide a service to parish councils to assist them in developing their NP. For more information about AirS, visit www.ruralsussex.org.uk

In the light of the approval of massive development off Gravelye Lane, why should we bother with this? Won't the Neighbourhood Plan also just be ignored by Council/ Government?

An approved Neighbourhood Plan's policies are full planning policies and have the full force of law within the area covered by the plan. All applications for developments during the 20 year life of the plan will be expected to conform to them. The Wates application did not have to conform to any Neighbourhood Plan policies because the NP does not yet exist. Also, MSDC does not have an approved District Plan and could not demonstrate a five year land supply.

Will it just look like a plea from 'NIMBYs'?

No, because the NP will not stand up to scrutiny - or be adopted by the local authority – if it simply objects to all development and growth. It has to be in general conformity with the emerging District Plan which will inevitably include growth targets for the area. NPs are about maximizing the benefit of this development for the community and shaping it as much as possible by type, tenure, location, scale and method of delivery; not simply saying no.

When is it likely to be completed and in place?

The aim is to have the plan ready for submission to the local authority by November 2013 for a referendum in May 2014.

A natural approach to headaches

NATURAL THERAPY

I think that most of us at some time or another suffer from headaches. Whether it be just an occasional one or something more regular, we all know how frustrating and debilitating they can be. Taking a paracetamol or some ibuprofen will sometimes relieve the symptoms. But it can be useful to know some other ways of alleviating headaches more naturally.

One of the first things worth doing is to try and see if you can identify the likely cause of the headache and to see if you can remove or reduce the cause. There can be many different reasons but one of the most common is actually dehydration! When we're dehydrated the body takes fluid from all around the body to keep it going, including from the brain, so this in itself can cause a headache, along with the fact that the lymphatic system is compromised and can't clear the waste effectively from your body, which in turn can make you feel slightly 'toxic' leading to a headache. Some other causes could include muscular pain (especially in the neck and shoulders), sinusitis, physical or emotional tension, heat exhaustion, side effects of medication, eye strain (perhaps from working on a computer or being in poor light), tiredness or allergies.

From an aromatherapy perspective, two particularly useful oils are lavender and peppermint. Both oils are very effective analgesics (pain relievers) and where lavender has a sedative effect, peppermint has a more stimulating effect, which many over-the-counter remedies include, to counteract the slightly depressive effect that the tablets can have.

Lavender can be used neat on the temples, whereas peppermint should only be inhaled neat or used diluted on the skin. For ease you could put a drop of each oil on a cotton wool pad or handkerchief and inhale from it regularly. Don't inhale straight from the bottle of oil regularly, as the more the oil is exposed to the air the quicker it will degrade.

Headaches caused by catarrh or sinusitis benefit from inhalations with lavender and eucalyptus to help to clear the nasal passages, help with the pain and to fight the infection too. Put two drops of each oil in a basin of hot water, cover your head with a towel and inhale for five minutes with your eyes closed. This method is not recommended for asthmatics without guidance from a qualified aromatherapist.

Headaches aggravated by allergies may benefit from a combination of lavender and camomile as camomile, as well as being a very effective analgesic, is a well-known anti-allergenic oil. In cases of allergies, I would suggest diluting two drops each of lavender and camomile into 15mls of a carrier (oil or cream) and massaging it on to your temples and chest.

Please note: Any persistent or recurring headache should be checked by your GP.

A steam train pulls away from the station – a solitary figure emerges through a cloud of smoke and a young Jenny Aqutter utters the immortal words: "It's my Daddy!"

The classic scene from The Railway Children has brought tears to the eyes of generations of film fans, including a Lindfield actor who captured the moment for thousands of theatregoers last summer.



Roger Lawrence – acting name Roger May - played the father in the hugely successful and Olivier Awardwinning adaption of the Railway Children, which drew huge audiences to the site-specific theatre at London's Waterloo Station last summer.

Night after night audiences were moved to tears in one of the most successful family shows staged in recent years.

"The set was built on the old Eurostar line, with 500 seats on either side of the platform," said Roger, who also played the doctor. "It was a wonderful experience."

Roger, who lives in Meadow Lane with his wife and daughters Amy and Tasha, is enjoying a successful and

varied acting career – from playing female roles in school productions, to regular appearances in the world's longest running radio soap opera The Archers. He is currently shaping up for his next role in Dr Who.

The youngest of four boys, Roger's interest in acting emerged at an early age. "I suppose I wanted to do something my older brothers had not done," he said. "Acting gave me a chance to be someone else and explore different behaviours. In fact, it's not unusual for youngest siblings to become actors."

He first took to the stage in productions at his boarding school in Bristol. "It was a boys' school and I was often cast in female roles!" said Roger. "But I must have done something right as, when I played Nancy in Oliver, I got fan mail from both sexes!"

After leaving university with a single honours drama degree, Roger took a year off and formed a theatre company to perform 'The Jail Diary of Albiel Sachs', the story of a real South African lawyer who spent 168 days in solitary confinement in the 1960s (based on a true story).

"We took the play to a theatre festival in Canada – and were delighted when we were asked to stay on to do extra performances after the show sold out," he said.

On his return to England, Roger won a place at the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School playing, amongst others, Sky Masterson in Guys and Dolls and Ford in the Merry Wives of Windsor.

"I was lucky as the school was acknowledged to be one of the foremost theatre schools outside London and attracted top directors to come and do mock auditions," Roger recalled. Following one audition, Roger was one of four young actors who caught the eye of director Patrick Sandford. "He invited us to audition for a show at the Nuffield theatre in Southampton," said Roger. "I was lucky enough to be offered a part in Much Ado About Nothing before I had even left drama school."

The role led to Roger being cast in four plays there

over the years. "One of the most memorable was Twelfth Night, when we had a proper swimming pool in the middle of the stage," he said.

"Another show there was 'And a Nightingale Sang' – set during the blitz." Patrick contacted the writer to ask for permission to re-set the play in Southampton – it was originally set in the north-east. The writer said it could be set anywhere that had suffered in the blitz, which Southampton had, badly. We included some local references and incidents and it ended up being a very powerful piece of local theatre."

Roger's career continued to flourish and, following seasons in Exeter and Harrogate came the opportunity to try something different – radio work.

"I auditioned to join The Radio Rep –a stable of, at the time, about 20 actors," he said. "The audition included a speech and sonnet, then some paired-up dualogues. My roles ranged from a 40-year old father to the oldest man in the world!"

Roger was given a six month contract, extended to a year. "I did dozens of radio plays and readings and completely fell in love with radio," he said.

"What I love about radio is that it doesn't typecast you in the same way as stage and TV, and I've worked with some extraordinary people."

"At the time, everyone in radio wanted to be in one of the Inspector Morse plays, so I was delighted when I was asked to play Nicholas Quinn in an episode called The Silent World of Nicholas Quinn," Roger recalled. "However, when I received the script I found that Nicholas was a deaf mute who died on page 2!"

Roger met his wife, Hilary Maclean, in 1999, while recording a TV series in Bristol together. "Hilary's character was helping to plot revenge on my character, who was a slimy bigamist. It was an odd way to start a relationship."

After setting up home in London, the couple decided to move out of the capital after their second daughter, Tasha, was born and they chose to move to Lindfield.

"Of course, no sooner had we moved than I was offered more work back in London," said Roger, who had been playing Monsignor John Magee alongside David Suchet in The Last Confession at Chichester Festival Theatre, which transferred to the West End. "It was a fantastic experience," he said. "After a short tour, we had a very successful three-month stint at the Haymarket."

Other roles have meant flying out to film locations, including a particularly memorable trip to The Ukraine where Roger was among the cast in the first Hornblower TV series.

"That was a strange experience," he recalled. "We flew from Gatwick to Kiev and then transferred to an old twin propeller plane for the remainder of the journey where you could see the rivets moving."

Roger had to complete the journey there and back four times over the next four months. "I don't know which was worse – the flight or the fact that I had to have hair extensions glued onto my head for the whole time."

Roger also travelled to Morocco for a role in the biblical film Jeremiah, which starred Patrick Dempsey and Oliver Reed. He recalls meeting Oliver Reed in the hotel bar. "He saw me ordering a double vodka – a throwback to

my time on Hornblower in The Ukraine - commented that he was glad to see that I wasn't one of those 'sissy beer drinkers' and promptly ordered us a bottle of vodka each," said Roger. "That was the first time I met him."

But the part that has made Roger a household name with Radio Four listeners is James Bellamy – the wayward son of Lillian Bellamy, stalwart on The Archers.

"I couldn't wait to tell my mum that I had a part in the Archers – she's a huge fan so she was really proud and telling all her friends," said Roger.

She was less enthusiastic when it turned out that James Bellamy was a complete cad – turning up like a bad penny to swindle his mother!

Roger's character, described on the Archers website as a 'spoilt posh boy', has made regular return visits, always leaving a trail of chaos, but it remains one of his favourite roles.

Roger is also a familiar face on the afternoon soap opera Doctors, where he has played a clinical psychologist for the last three years.

His next TV part will be watched by audiences of millions but you won't recognise him in every scene. "I'll be appearing in a drama which marks the 50th anniversary of Doctor Who," he said. "The show is about the making of the very first series and I play the part of an 'extra' who appeared in the show for the first three years. It was great fun, as I got to play various monsters, including a Dalek, a Cyberman and a giant moth. David Bradley (Argus Filch in the Harry Potter films) plays the first doctor, William Hartnell, and there's an uncanny resemblance there. In fact the whole thing is very accurately and lovingly recreated."

The programme will be shown on the date the very first episode was shown. "Interestingly, the first programme coincided with the assassination of John F Kennedy, so TV was dominated by this event," said Roger. "The producers decided to repeat the episode the following week before episode 2 – the rest, as they say, is history."

He also appeared in the Winslow Boy with Timothy West, and in a radio version of Death of a Salesman. "It was recorded to commemorate Arthur Miller's 80th birthday," said Roger, "and we were lucky enough to meet him. He had an extraordinary aura about him – an amazing man."

With a talent for accents, Roger has been a popular choice for recording audiobooks. "I'm happy to do a variety of accents - which is often required in a 300-page book," he said. "Audiobooks are hard work, as they require a huge amount of preparation beforehand and a lot of concentration in studio. It's just you, a producer, a book and a microphone for the day."

Roger has recorded dozens of books including, recently, a series of nine of John Creasey's 'The Toff' books.

"I've been very lucky in that I haven't had to find another job to make ends meet and I seem to have found a niche in voice work," he said. "When I left drama school we were told that 25% of actors would never earn a penny from acting in any given year, another 25% would earn under £5,000 and another under £20,000, which leaves only a few able to make a decent living. Well, 22 years later I'm still at it, so I quess I'm doing something right."




Pasta and Pesto Salad

Finely grate the rind of 1 unwaxed lemon and place in a salad bowl with the squeezed juice. Whisk in 50ml olive oil and 4tbs pesto sauce. Add 4 finely sliced spring onions, 225g halved cherry tomatoes and some sliced pitted green olives. Cook 250g pasta (any small shape) to packet directions and drain thoroughly. Tip the hot pasta into the salad bowl and gently stir to combine. Cool then season well. Makes 4 servings.

Spiced Bean Salad

Measure 100ml olive oil, 6tbs red wine vinegar, 1-2 crushed garlic cloves, 2-3 tbs mild curry paste and 2tbs clear honey in a salad bowl and whisk to combine. Tip a 400g can each of chickpeas and cannellini beans into a pan and bring to the boil over low heat. Drain well and add to the dressing. Stir to combine. Cool slightly then stir in some finely chopped red onion. Cool. Extra good served topped with a spoonful of natural yogurt and a sprinkling of freshly chopped mint. Makes 4 servings.

With warmer (fingers crossed) weather ahead, lighter foods are more appetising than rich casseroles or roasts. Make the most of the wide range of fresh vegetables now available and serve along with barbequed or grilled meats, fish and poultry. Leafy salads are quick to assemble but I like to have one or two more substantial salad-type dishes in the fridge, where they will keep for several days to be dipped in to. Combining vegetables with rice, pasta, beans or other grains makes excellent well-rounded meals. The trick for a great result is to make a well-seasoned dressing and add it to the rice, beans etc when they are hot then they will absorb flavours far better. If the salad has been refrigerated allow to come to room temperature before serving for the best flavour. Here are a few of my favourites...


Lemony Lentil and Artichoke Salad

In a salad bowl whisk together the finely grated rind and the juice of 1 unwaxed lemon, 50ml olive or other fruity oil, 2tsp clear honey, 1tbs wholegrain mustard and 1-2 crushed garlic cloves. Tip a 400g can lentils into a pan and bring to the boil over low heat. Drain well and immediately add to the dressing, stirring to combine. Drain a 400g can artichokes (in brine), quarter each artichoke and add to the bowl, along with a finely chopped red onion. Season well and allow to cool slightly, then serve (or refrigerate). Good with grilled meats or just topped with chunks of feta cheese. Makes 4 servings.

Couscous Salad with Apricots and Pinenuts

This recipe is good made with instant couscous but even better with wholewheat giant couscous. No pinenuts – try salted peanuts or other nuts.

Put 150g of either type of couscous into a pan with a handful of roughly chopped dried apricots. Stir in 450ml hot vegetable stock, cover and cook over medium heat for about 8 mins or until soft. Remove from the heat and leave to stand for 5 min. If any stock remains tip the couscous into a colander to drain. In a salad bowl whisk together 50ml olive, walnut or hazelnut oil, 3tbs white wine vinegar, 2tsp mild mustard and 3 tsp sugar. Tip in the hot couscous, stir to combine and leave to cool. Season well. Add 4 finely chopped spring onions and 50g toasted pine or other nuts. Makes 4 servings





The woman who went to bed for a year by Sue Townsend


Eva decides that when her twins leave home she'll go to bed and stay there. She has had enough of the world and its disappointments, especially her marriage to Brian. He is having his own problems, as his love affair with another woman is not satisfying him. He is also angered and confused by Eva's gesture – who, for example, will cook his dinner or iron his clothes?

Sue Townsend has created a moving and comic novel which examines the frustrations and confusions of middle age. In creating Eva she has shown that, as well as being responsible for bringing into being the most authentic teenager in all literature - Adrian Mole, she can also flesh out a woman dealing with an empty nest and the consequent search for meaning that can bring. As the interview with the author in the Penguin edition makes clear, all characters do reflect the author to some extent.

Townsend's well-publicised serious illness and becoming blind in 2001 were perhaps the catalyst for creating this world, as she seems to have experienced the same lostness and bereavement due to her disability. The last few pages of the book are genuinely moving. The final sentence is a poignant reminder of why we need to show what Eva calls 'simple kindness' to all.

Neighbourhood Plan



It has been a very busy quarter for the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, ably supported by more than 30 volunteers from both our parishes in four Focus Groups. They have done an amazing amount of research and conducted a number of interviews with stakeholders from both within and outside our parishes. The research covers all manner of current and possible future issues relating to our communities and they have written superb reports documenting their work. You can find these, along with some extra research material that they have also gathered, as part of our evidence base on our website.

We held 'Pop in Sessions' on 20th May at Scaynes Hill & 23rd May at Lindfield, as part of our community involvement programme to highlight to our community some of the issues that the Focus Groups were researching. Both events were well attended and some interesting ideas proposed by some of our visitors, which the Focus Group members found most useful.

The Arts Festival and Village Day were also attended by our mini-stand within its own gazebo and this was staffed by members of the Steering Group & Focus Groups. Although the Saturday of the Arts Festival was cold and windy, Village Day as you will all know was much better with some summer sunshine. At both these events our conversations with interested visitors usually started on the topic of "Wates"; sometimes it was difficult to explain that what we are trying to do is to define how the current community wants the parishes to develop over the next 20 years.

The 'State of the Parishes' report that we commissioned from Action in Rural Sussex (AirS) was published during May and this contains statistical data relating to our parishes obtained from the 2001 and 2011 Census, other published statistics and the reports of our own Focus Groups on current and possible future local

issues. The report can be found on our website.

Following on from the publication of the State of the Parishes report, on the 29th May AirS hosted a "Planning Workshop" in the King Edward Hall for 24 stakeholders. The workshop task was to consider the various issues highlighted in that report and provide some feedback to the Steering Group and AirS on what policies they thought could be included in the draft Neighbourhood Plan.

Thank you very much to our residents who returned their Housing Needs Survey forms to AirS during May. Overall we had a 25% return rate which is excellent. The survey analysis and report has been published on our website and the results are very much in line with surveys done in other MSDC parishes recently. The results show that 60% are in favour of additional affordable housing to meet local need, and 41 new cases identified of local householders in need of such accommodation.

During the next couple of months AirS will, in consultation with members of the Steering Group, write a draft Neighbourhood Plan for our parishes. This draft will then be published to our community and your views sought on the policies it contains. This is an initial consultation exercise which will include similar public events, probably during September, very much like the 'Pop in Sessions' we held recently.

Overall we are on schedule to produce a Neighbourhood Plan that can proceed through its various legal stages as quickly as possible and hopefully be approved by a local referendum towards the end of 2014.

Planning & Traffic Committee

The last few months have been dominated by the application within the Rural Parish by Wates to build 230 new homes at the rear of the current Croudace development off Gravelye Lane. This Council supported our colleagues on the Rural Parish Council throughout the process of examining the application and jointly retained the services of Richard Walker, a planning consultant, to provide us with professional planning advice and to identify planning grounds on which to focus our response.

Based on that advice, both this Council and Lindfield Rural Council submitted letters of objection to Mid Sussex District Council, as did the Preservation Society and a great number of local residents.

The main Wates application and two further applications concerning change of land use were considered by the District Planning Committee of Mid Sussex District Council on the 21st May and both parish Councils asked Richard Walker to speak on our behalf. Despite the planning objections, however, MSDC's Committee members from areas outside Lindfield, and despite the views of local members, voted by a majority to approve the principal application and one of the change of use applications to permit the development, subject to the usual agreement of conditions and section 106 infrastructure payments.

HIGHWAY CLUSTER AGREEMENT

We are delighted to report that, along with Lindfield Rural and Ardingly Parish Councils, we have formed a partnership with Haywards Heath Town Council which has entered into a Highways Cluster agreement with West Sussex County Council to undertake minor Highways works in the town and partner parishes.

The service will be delivered by a new Haywards Heath Town Community Interest Company (CIC), owned by the Town Council and funded by WSCC. The Parish Council partners are not liable for costs as a result of this agreement.

The works to be undertaken include: Weed spraying; temporary and permanent cold fill pot hole repairs; Highway sign cleaning; vegetation removal (road sight line, twitten and alleyway); gully inspection and clearance; graffiti removal; fly tipping removal; management of highway defects; flood warnings; damage to highways, street furniture and chevrons, loose slabs etc.

This arrangement will have certain advantages, including: being able to make good use of local knowledge; prompt response to problems and local needs; ability to return to persistent problems and better value for money by reducing unnecessary works, reducing wastage of materials and the duplication of works.

CONCESSIONARY TRAVEL SCHEME

We were recently notified that as from Sunday 19th May 2013, the price of an annual Senior Railcard at the Station increased to £30 (from £28). The price of a voucher under Mid Sussex District Council's Concessionary Travel Scheme increased on the same date to £25.50 (from £23.80). Vouchers, of course, continue to be available from the Parish Council offices. Just a reminder, though, that we cannot accept cards but cheques (made payable to Mid Sussex District Council) or cash are both fine. Also, it is a new requirement for the form that a national insurance number is provided. If you are a new applicant you will also need to bring valid proof of age and address.

Free Senior Railcards or Disabled Persons Railcards are available free, instead of the bus pass, but as from 1st April 2013 we can no longer deal with bus pass applications, lost bus passes or the free rail vouchers. We do have the forms in the Parish Council office or they can be downloaded or requested from West Sussex County Council's website (www.westsussex.gov.uk). However, they now need to be sent directly to West Sussex Bus Pass, PO Box 212, Waterlooville, PO7 6ZN.

Bus passes are renewed automatically and free rail cards can be renewed simply by phoning the West Sussex Bus Pass Information Line: 0845 075 1018, which is also the number to ring with other queries regarding bus passes and the free rail cards.
