# 650 shingles signed

All Saints Church held a very successful event in the village during November when they offered the chance for anyone to write on one of the new wooden tiles (or 'shingles') which are being replaced on the church spire.

The 'sign a shingle' event was an initiative by the Church Development Project Group – known as ASPIRE – who were not only raising funds for the building project at All Saints but also raising awareness of the plans and reasons for wanting to undertake it.

Shingle tiles were available to sign on Sundays at the church but there was also a village event held in the former Parish Council offices on Denmans Lane. Clare Nibloe, event organiser, commented: "We're really pleased it captured people's imagination as they wanted to write their name in village history."

Nearly 650 tiles were signed by church members, friends and residents and over £3,000 was collected for the ASPIRE project fund. The installation of the shingles is likely to be completed during January, when the scaffolding is expected to be removed.

# Scaynes Hill shop donates to school library

SPAR Scaynes Hill has donated £300 to St Augustine's Primary School to buy books for their new school library.

The store's £150 donation was match funded by the Blakemore Foundation Independent Retailer scheme, which recognises the wide range of community activity undertaken by independent SPAR stores across the Meridian & Welsh Guild.

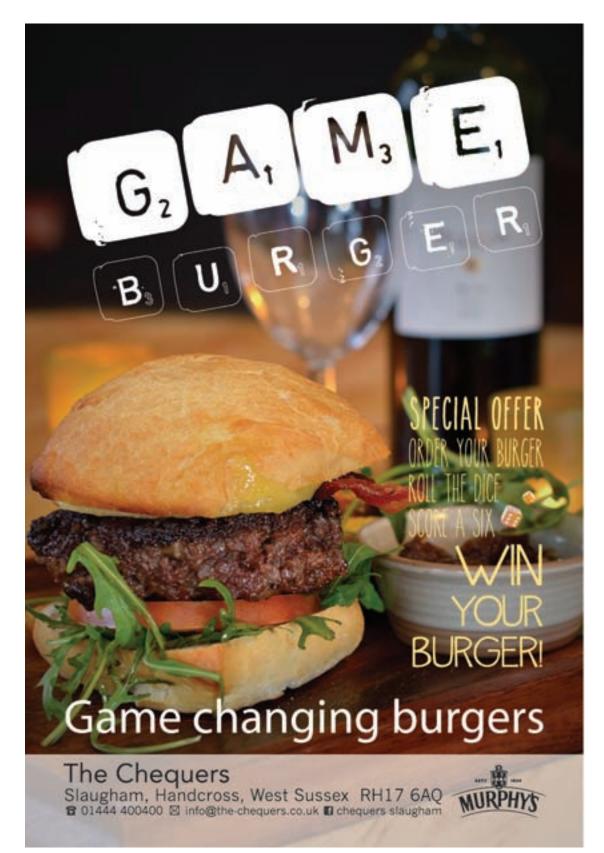

# Nearly 100 students perform Christmas production

The ghost of Christmas past haunted the stage at Oathall Community College as part of the school's festive production of A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens.

The cast and crew of nearly one hundred students showed off their talents during four shows.

They included a performance to more than 250 pupils from Northlands Wood, Blackthorns and Lindfield Primary Schools, who enjoyed the dance numbers and use of marionette puppets in the production.

Carole MacTaggart, Head of Performance faculty from Oathall, said: "We put together an ambitious play which featured lots professional touches such as a snow



machine, light projections and hand-made puppets. Our students both on and off stage worked incredibly hard on this production, which was a truly magical Christmas performance."

The play told the story of Ebenezer Scrooge, a man who hates Christmas and is devoid of all joy. On Christmas Eve, several years after his business partner Jacob Marley died, Marley's spirit visits Scrooge in the hope of showing him the error of his ways. The ghosts of Christmases past, present and future visit Scrooge and accompany him to various scenes in hope of transforming his ways.

# Oathall is good!

Staff and students at Oathall Community College are celebrating after being officially rated as good in all areas following a recent Ofsted inspection.

The school was visited by a team of five inspectors who observed 52 lessons, met with students, teachers, senior leaders, the governing body and representatives from the local authority over two days.

The final report praised teaching standards, pupil behaviour and the school's leadership and management.

"The headteacher, the senior leadership team and the governing body have a clear vision for the direction of the school. Their actions have brought about improvements to standards of teaching and students' achievement and they have the ambition to take them to the very highest levels," said Ofsted.

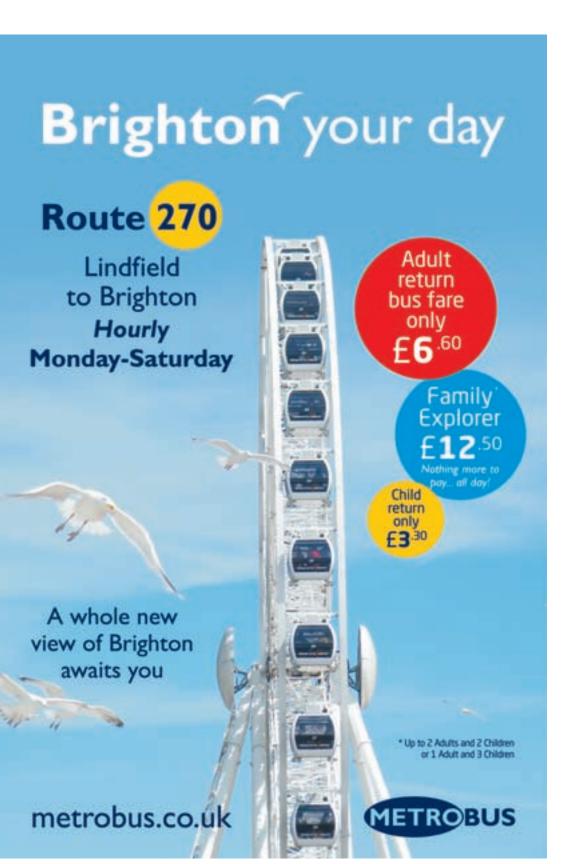
The inspection team reported that students typically have good, and in some cases exemplary, attitudes to learning, that the quality of teaching, like examination results, is good and improving and noted that the proportion of Year 11 students who remain in education, training or work on leaving school is significantly above average.

Analysis of the 96 responses to parental and carers' questionnaires showed that the school is regarded highly, with many saying they would recommend Oathall Community College to others. The inspection team also recognised that the school has an experienced governing body who know the school well and who are not afraid to ask challenging questions.

Headteacher Mr Eddie Rodriguez said: "We are happy that Ofsted has recognised the huge progress Oathall has made in recent months, which is reinforced by our best exam results to date in the summer. We are proud of what we have achieved and I know staff, students, parents and governors are absolutely committed to continuing to improve and being recognised as an outstanding school in the future."

## NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN PROGRESS REPORT

The members of the Steering Group are very grateful to everyone who responded to the publication, on 1st November, of our Pre-Submission (or draft) Plan for a consultation period of six weeks that ended on Friday 13th December.

As part of the public consultation we were required to undertake at that stage in the preparation of the Plan, we held two "Pop-In Sessions" at the King Edward Hall on Tuesday evening the 19th November and then on Saturday morning the 23rd November at the Millennium Centre in Scaynes Hill. We had 53 visitors on the Tuesday evening and 24 on the Saturday morning. We would like to thank everyone who came out to meet us and took the opportunity to discuss aspects of the Plan with us.

Now that the consultation period has ended we are going through the process of studying all the comments we have received and will be discussing these with our consultants from Action in rural Sussex. There will clearly be merit in at least some of the suggestions that we have received and we will be amending the draft Plan accordingly. It is also our intention to publish on our website, during the month of January, all the comments and input received during the consultation period. This is in advance of a meeting of the Steering Group, which will then be held on Monday 3rd February at 8pm in the Jubilee Room, King Edward Hall. You are of course very welcome to attend this meeting.

Then during March both Lindfield & Lindfield Rural Parish Councils will meet to discuss and agree the changes to the Plan in order that we can formally submit the revised Plan to Mid Sussex District Council, who will then carry out the final consultation, examination and referendum stages.

## **DIARIES**

We were delighted to be able to deliver the Lindfield diaries in good time this year. After last year's disappointment with the late arrival and poorer quality of the diaries, we went to a new printer and we hope you will agree that the diaries are now back to the standard we were used to until recently. We also hope that most of our residents are still finding their diaries useful now that modern technology has changed how many of us organise our appointments.

## BUDGET

The Council's committees have been looking at their budgets for next year, with a view to keeping the precept at its current level but still undertaking projects that will improve our village. We are in discussion with WSCC about re-paving the pedestrian area from the Post Office to the crossing, which has badly deteriorated, and with MSDC we hope to be able to update the play equipment in the Hickmans Lane playground. The Planning and Traffic Committee is proposing a traffic study to enable an assessment of the impact of recent and approved future development. We will be seeking funding for projects from other sources where appropriate, particularly from developer contributions.

## WATER MAIN UPGRADE BY SOUTH EAST WATER

You will probably all be aware by now of the work to take place from 20 January on installing a new water main between All Saints Church and Park Lane. This will mean a road closure in this section of the road for approximately 13 weeks. The Parish Council shares the concerns of all who will be affected during this long period of road closure and we are doing all we can to minimise inconvenience to residents and facilitate good communication throughout the process.

## WINTER WEATHER

West Sussex County Council is taking a different approach this winter with regard to supplying salt to parishes. They have filled the bins pre-winter but have stated that they will not refill them during the course of the winter, so if parish councils want to be able to refill their bins they have to find a way of storing reserves of salt locally. We have done our best within our limitations to make sure we are prepared. We are very thankful that we have joined a cluster partnership with Haywards Heath Town Council as their team will refill our bins from the reserve. WSCC has also supplied some extra bins for which we will be paying a contribution. The Parish Council has also purchased a snow brush as an addition to the plough for clearing snow from pavements, which should work better on the more compacted snow and we have plenty of shovels for people willing to help.

Having equipment is one thing but we need a team of volunteers to use it. Clearing snow and salting the pedestrian routes around the village centre makes such a difference to the safety of pedestrians but it cannot be denied that it is exhausting work for the very few people who normally do it. With enough volunteers signed up, the job can be organised into shifts so that no one person has to work for too long. Please contact the Parish Office or one of the Councillors if you feel you can make a commitment to this worthwhile community effort.

# PROPOSED PUBLIC TOILETS ON THE COMMON

Over the last year the Parish Council has been working with a firm of chartered surveyors to draw up a proposal for reinstating public toilets on the Common. Keep an eye on our website and noticeboard for news of a public consultation early in the New Year, as we want your views before we go forward with submitting applications for planning permission and approval from the Secretary of State under the Commons Act.

Recycling from all households in West Sussex is delivered to Ford Materials Recycling Facility (MRF) via a network of transfer stations. In Mid Sussex these are at Burgess Hill and East Grinstead. At the transfer stations the recycling is bulked up onto bigger vehicles before being transported to the MRF to reduce the number of vehicles on the road. At the MRF the mixed recycling is mechanically sorted and separated into individual material types, baled up, then transported to reprocessors for manufacturing into new goods and products.

A range of technology is employed at the MRF to sort and separate recycling into high quality products ready for reprocessing. To help the MRF perform to its full potential, it is vital that only the correct items are put in our recycling bins and not tied in bags, which the reprocessors cannot open. If the wrong items are put in our recycling bins, they risk damaging the MRF and could ruin the quality of the correct items for recycling. That can lead to loads of otherwise suitable recycling material having to be taken to a landfill site.

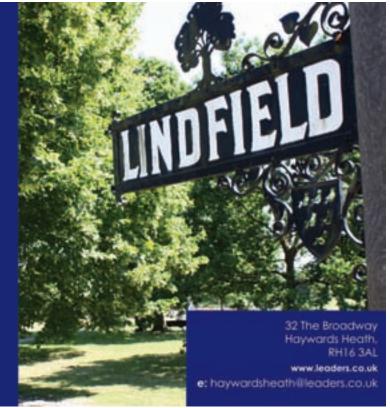

#### Banana Bread

Try toasted topped with a scoop of ice cream. Add a spoonful of Winter Fruit Compote – mixed dried fruits simmered in weak black tea and sweetened with maple syrup.

Preheat the oven 180°C. Lightly butter and line a 900g loaf tin.

Measure 175g wholewheat flour, 50g coarse porridge oats, 1% tsp baking powder, 175g soft brown sugar and 50g chopped dates (or dried cranberries) into a large bowl.

Mash two large ripe bananas and combine with 142ml plain yogurt, 125g melted butter and two large eggs. Add to the bowl and gently stir together. Spoon into the cake tin and level the top.

Bake for 1 hour or until it tests cooked. Cool for 10 min before turning out on to a wire rack to cool completely.

January is traditionally the time for new resolutions, many of them with the word 'diet' featuring in them! Surely on cold, wet, dark days the last thing you want to be eating is a bowl of salad, no matter how good it is for your waistline. How about this for a different resolution that may well help your purse as well as your waistline. Resolve to try a new food you haven't cooked before, such as all the varieties of grains. Many are rich in protein, vitamins and minerals and come in a variety of forms easily found in wholefood shops and your supermarket. Wheat can be wheatberries, wheatgerm, wheat flakes and cracked wheat. Try using pearl barley, cooked in stock, instead of rice for pilaffs and risottos or in place of potatoes. Porridge oats are delicious added to crumble toppings, to all kinds of breads, muffins and cakes. Look for the organic jumbo oats in the supermarket. Quinoa was cultivated by the Incas high in the Andes and now is said to be 'the supergrain of the future'. Especially good for gluten-free diets, quinoa is highly nutritious and well worth trying. Grains such as wheatberries, pearly barley and spelt can be cooked, cooled and then frozen, ready to be added to quick cooking recipes. Be adventurous; perhaps try my recipes as a start.

#### Instant 'Risotto'

#### Serves 2

Gently fry 50g cubed pancetta or streaky bacon until just golden. Remove from the pan. To the fat in the pan add a generous handful of chopped vegetables – leek, onion, celery, fennel, grated carrot, diced peppers or spring onions or a combination of any of them. Cook, stirring, until just soft. Return the pancetta to the pan and tip in 2 portions of pre-cooked chilled (or frozen) pearl barley or wheatberries. Add a splash of white vermouth or stock, cover and cook over low heat until bubbling hot. Stir in a knob of butter, season to taste and serve immediately topped with shaved or grated Parmesan cheese.

#### Creamy Green Lentils

#### Serves 2

Gently cook 4 sliced spring onions in a little oil until softened. Stir in some crushed garlic, 1tbs Dijon mustard, the zest and juice of 1 unwaxed lemon, 4 chopped and deseeded tomatoes and a drained 400g can green lentils. Poach 2 eggs. Stir 4tbs crème fraiche into the lentils, gently heat to serving temperature, season and served topped with the poached eggs.

On the 20th January South East Water will begin installing a new water main in Lindfield.

This 2.2 kilometre pipeline will ensure the water company's current customers in the village will continue to receive top quality water in the future while also securing supplies.

The first phase of work will take place in High Street, Lindfield between Church Lane and Park Lane from 20th January and take 13 weeks to complete. Following this, construction will move into phase two and start on 21st April and last approximately seven weeks. The third phase will be in private land alongside Ardingly and will take 10 weeks to complete.

Chris Love, Delivery Manager at South East Water, said: "The pipeline we are installing is large, 400mm in diameter, and each section of pipe will need specialist equipment to lift it into place.

"Due to the pipe's large size, the high number of other utility services within the High Street which we need to avoid, as well as ensuring the safety of the public and our contractor, we have spent a long time considering the best installation method.

"As a result we will need to close this section of High Street, Lindfield while we install the pipeline within the road. When we are working in Park Lane, this road will also be closed due to its narrow nature.

"All businesses will be open as normal while our work takes place and customers wishing to use Lindfield's shopping area will be able to do so by driving from the southern end of the High Street. Parking will be unaffected.

"I would like to reassure the local community that we do not impose road closures lightly and our contractor will be working hard to complete this work quickly by

working extended hours and progressing on multiple work fronts."

For those living or working within the sections of road which will be closed the Company will maintain access to those properties for residents, customers, emergency services and refuse collection.

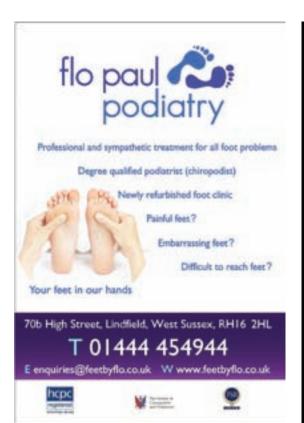
Construction will be carried out in stages, so not all of the sections of road being worked in will be affected at any one time. As soon as work completes in one stage, it will be returned to its original state and the construction area will move along to the next stage.

Diversion routes for when the High Street and Park Lane will be closed will be clearly sign posted.

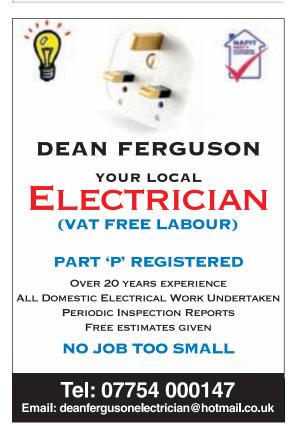
This work forms part of a wider £1.6 million programme of work that South East Water is undertaking in the Lindfield and Haywards Heath area.

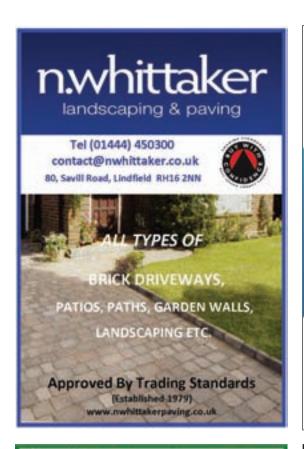

We have last minute curtain jobs to squeeze in, a care home install plus a show home fit out, a pitch to work on for a new care home project for 2014, as well as keeping a close eye on our refurbishment projects and maintaining the pressure on trades to ensure that critical dates are not allowed to slip. Oh and we decided to redecorate our own dining room in time for Christmas, deciding that by giving ourselves a deadline we would finally get round to making choices on paint colour and blind fabric. I am my own worst client!

It has been a year of challenge and opportunity for HomeSmiths. I have got more and more accustomed to life with one working eye and as a team we have grown in size and the roles and responsibilities of the team have developed to enable me to focus more on the design work and less on the screen which I tire of more easily these days. The silver linings that this time last year I was so determined to find, have manifested themselves in an expanding team and a new business opportunity. In August Jenna Gale joined the team as estimator. Jenna costs jobs for us and keeps a close eye on schedules and suppliers. Our recently added 'meet the team' page on our website plays stage to mug shots and bios if you fancy a nose. Jeanette Seabrook also works for us on a freelance basis, helping us out with both residential projects and show home installs. The business opportunity stemmed from the talk I gave at the Care Show in Bournemouth in March. It was there that I met a lady from The Thomas Pocklington Trust (a charity that provides housing support for blind and partially sighted people). They have all this wonderful research material from various collaborative projects with Stirling and Kingston Universities, yet have had little success in translating this into accessible guidelines for interior designers and architects. As someone who

loves networking in all forms and has a heartfelt need for more people in the construction and interior design world to consider the needs of the visually impaired when designing, I am really excited about working on this project and spreading the word via blogs and forums.

This year we have taken on some exciting refurbishment projects, one in the village and another in Bolney. We have continued to work with Barratt Southern Counties, starting 2013 with show homes in Bexhill, Worthing, Horsham and Crawley and finishing with a further site in Worthing and one in Heathfield. Our care home work has continued with an Extra Care project in West Kent. Extra Care sites are large developments of one and two bed apartments with access to communal lounge and dining facilities with IT suites, hair salons and activities rooms. Creating schemes that sit between a home and an elegant hotel has been our aim, whilst at the same time ensuring that the designs remain practical. The Lewes House of Friendship, a drop-in centre for the elderly, contacted us during 2013 for help with their refurbishment plans and by the time you read this article work will be starting on site.

And in other news, and much to the delight of Piers (pictured here bottom left), HomeSmiths are the proud sponsors of Lindfield Juniors U9s football team! # A local perspective on crisis

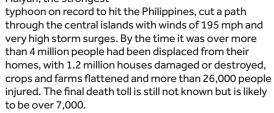
As the people of the Phillipines still come to terms with the devastating consequences of Typhoon Haiyan we asked Lindfield resident Phil Candy to tell us about his recent experiences in the country

I arrived in Manila, the capital of the Philippines, in November to conduct a week's security workshop for a German charity, something that had been planned for

months. I work for RedR UK, a humanitarian charity which trains and supports aid workers around the world. My area of expertise is security; how aid workers can stay safe in warzones and other dangerous places.

However, as we all saw on our TV screens, the day before I arrived Typhoon
Haiyan, the strongest



The humanitarian community reacted swiftly and, despite the massive infrastructure challenges due to the damage, life saving operations started within hours of the disaster, providing health care, clean water, food and emergency shelter. As the scale of the disaster became known, I was asked by RedR to stay on to conduct a training needs assessment to see how RedR could best help train and support aid workers and the local community in responding to the many needs.

Over several days in Manila and Cebu, the logistical hub of the response, I met with government departments, United Nations agencies and several non-governmental organisations (NGOs) already on the

ground. I heard what they were already doing and what they planned to do. The scale of the disaster is incredible and many Filipinos can share stories of the impact. I spoke to one taxi driver whose parents-in-law had abandoned their destroyed house and also to a South African tourist who had lost everything and was trying to repatriate the body of his 13 year old son.

Nearly a month after the typhoon the main needs remain food, shelter, the recovery of livelihoods and restoration of basic services, such as sanitation, to prevent disease outbreaks. While aid agencies and local government bodies are still busy with life-saving work for now, rebuilding what was lost will take a long time. The Philippines is hit by several typhoons each year and so this is an ongoing battle. Some aid agencies are planning on a two year response and RedR UK, alongside our partners RedR Australia and RedR India, have launched an appeal. Initial funds have already been received and we will help provide Philippine nationals and international aid workers with training in providing clean water for sanitation and drinking, and in providing shelter for victims.

I'm sure many of us have given towards the relief effort and I would encourage you to continue to do so. Our money really does make a difference to the aid agencies saving lives and giving hope.

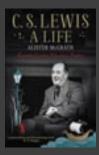

# C.S. Lewis – A life by Alister McGrath

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Fifty years after his death (a stone to commemorate him was unveiled in Poets' Corner last November) C.S. Lewis remains one of the most significant authors of the last hundred years.

His children's books like 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' have recently received the Hollywood treatment, partly benefitting from the interest in fantasy tales since the success of the 'Lord of the Rings' films. Yet Lewis is also a writer of religious themes who is still hugely influential in shaping the way many think about the Christian faith. This well researched and thoughtful biography succeeds in showing the complexity of Lewis without undermining our sympathy.

The effects of two deaths – of his mother and his wife Joy - were to shape his attitudes and his faith. McGrath is not out to debunk as A.N. Wilson's biography of the 90s or to eulogise as many of Lewis' friends have done. This makes it all the stronger, as we get "a warts and all "portrait and not a plaster saint view of the man.

Lindfield Life readers will also be glad to know that former resident of the village, and leading Lewis expert, Michael Ward's theories about the Narnian chronicles are seen as giving insight.
