

£2,100 raised for limb charity

A well-being event that took place at Clair Hall in January has raised over £2000 for charity. "The purpose of this event was to kick off 2015 by teaching Sussex Residents a proven strategy for achieving their New Year's Resolutions of health & all round well-being," organiser and Lindfield resident Maxine Hayes commented. "This event contained an impressive collaboration of local Sussex talent. I truly believe that every person who attended walked away feeling inspired and proud of the area we live in."

In addition to performances by local street dance crew BPM Dance Academy, Christian Bates from The Perrymount Clinic gave an informative talk about the importance of posture and how it can have an effect on pain and everyday life. Maxine delivered a goal-setting presentation and the keynote speaker Ray Edwards MBE, Chairman of Limbcare, gave an emotional account of his life as he wowed the audience with his positive and hilarious attitude.

£2,100 was raised for Limbcare on the night.

Schools' academy status

Lindfield's two primary schools look set to become academies later this year after consultation results were 'overwhelming positive'. Head teachers at both Lindfield Primary and Blackthorns Schools have confirmed their decision to become academies as part of the University of Brighton Academies Trust.

Marianne Brand, Head of Blackthorns, said: "The governing body of Blackthorns CP School passed a resolution on 8th January to convert to an academy as part of the University of Brighton Academies Trust with a target date of 1st April 2015. The feedback from the consultation was overwhelmingly positive."

A letter to parents from Blackthorns governors added: 'It was felt by the vast majority of respondents that partnering with the University of Brighton in the way we have proposed offers increased stability and support for the school, development opportunities for our staff and enhanced learning opportunities for our children.'

Marcus Still, Head of Lindfield Primary School, also confirmed the decision. "In both cases, the governing bodies of the schools have resolved for their schools to become academies as part of the University of Brighton Academies Trust later this year," he said.

One Lindfield business is happily celebrating its 10th anniversary year in 2015.

Lindfield Barbers opened on 1st February 2005 at the location of the Pond Newsagents and sweet shop, and following its use as a children's clothes shop for a brief time. "Many customers come in and talk about 'The Pondie', with many having worked here doing a paper round," Hilary Harber, manager of the shop, commented. The business started off the back of a flippant remark by Hilary when she was cutting the hair of the owner of the building she now operates from. "I simply said that if he fancied turning it into a barber's then I would manage it for him. Next thing I knew, he talked to me and asked whether I was serious!"

Today you can get your hair cut by Hilary, Rose or Zoe – they are open six days a week and late on Thursdays.

The winner will be announced on Wednesday 1st April and the winning artwork will be proudly displayed in the window of the boutique, which is situated on the High Street.







Rogue Traders

Sussex Police are reporting that Rogue Traders are currently operating in the Mid Sussex area.

If a tradesperson comes to your door to say that they can do work for you – stop and think ... this can wait while I get trusted advice.

The trader may make it sound urgent but this is unlikely to be the case - you will probably have plenty of time to contact a trusted local trader for full advice.

Sussex Police have previously issued warnings about this type of crime. Works offered can include basic building or drains work, UPVC fitting, tarmacking, gardening or tree works etc. A reasonable sounding fee may first be agreed but along the way 'more serious problems' may be identified that raise the cost to an unreasonable level. The works may actually be unnecessary, or may not get completed, or may be to a poor standard.

In October last year a Police spokesperson gave a message that remains relevant: "We strongly advise residents not to engage with any cold callers of this type.

"Please report sightings of suspicious vehicles, persons or activities such as those described to us, using the 101 non emergency contact number, via our website, www.sussex.police.uk or, if there is an offence in progress, on 999."


Just to let know that, through your support, we have now located our relative Ken Ames via Lindfield Life / Bowls Club / Village Resident and finally through his daughter.

This Christmas every resident and many relatives were able to enjoy lunch together.

Residents, relatives, supporters, volunteers, staff and trustees were all invited to a tea party to celebrate the official opening of the dining room. Jeremy Nurse, one of the Trustees, gave a tribute to our benefactor and Mervyn Weeks of Lindfield Evangelical Free Church gave the blessing. Life at Compton House, thanks to Leslie

Fry, has been wonderfully enhanced. He left a void when he died but he will always be warmly remembered here.

Compton House Christian Nursing Home continues to have loyal supporters and a willing group of volunteers. The lovely gardens are maintained exclusively by the gardening group. Volunteers also help meet and greet visitors and answer the telephone in the afternoons, help with outings and some come to spend time with residents, reading, chatting and playing games.

Winston's Wish | Abseil for hospice in West Sussex

Winston's Wish is the leading childhood bereavement charity in the UK, helping children and young people rebuild their lives after the death of their mum, dad, brother or sister and enabling them to face the future with confidence and hope.

In West Sussex, Winston's Wish runs a unique bereavement support programme called SWITCH. The programme is aimed at children aged 8-14 who have suffered a close family bereavement which is having a negative effect on their behaviour. The bereavement may not be recent but may still be having an impact on the child. The SWITCH programme offers family work, individual work for children and their carers and group work. We end the programme with a celebration day. The aim of SWITCH is to provide children and families with the opportunity to work through their experience with qualified professionals and to help them make sense of their emotions and feelings, meet other people in similar situations and provide them with coping strategy to help them reach their full potential.

Whether you are a serious runner or you just want to jog around some of Sussex's loveliest countryside, then join the Village Run which takes place this year on Bank Holiday Monday 25th May.

Starting and finishing at Hickmans Lane playing fields, whether you choose the 10k or the 5k, you make your way across farmland, over hilly paths and rural tracks and even the occasional road. It has often been described as an old fashioned cross-country run. 



Following a childhood spent touring the country with her actor father and family, it was inevitable that Sam McAuley would end up working in the theatre. But instead of following the family's acting tradition, Sam was drawn to the more quirky and diverse performance arts. Sam has carved a career marketing some of the country's most successful alternative dance and theatre companies and is currently responsible for the Arts + Events programme at Canary Wharf.

Now happily settled in Lindfield, Sam tells us how she became passionate about promoting non-mainstream performances and why living midway between Brighton and London has given her the perfect work-life balance.

"I guess I was always destined for a career in the arts," said Sam, who appeared in her first film when she was just three months old! "My dad was appearing in a training film for the fire service and they needed a baby – that was me!"

Sam's family spent many years travelling around the country. "We went wherever the work was and we didn't live anywhere permanently until I was three. But being in and around theatres for most of my childhood definitely nurtured my interest in the performing arts."

Sam's dad, originally from Dublin, played to audiences all over the country in a variety of roles but is probably best known as the voice of Sinn Fein leader Gerry Adams! "When the Government banned his real voice from being heard on television or radio, my dad did the voiceovers!"

A promising dancer, Sam trained in ballet, contemporary and jazz, and was offered a place at Arts Educational in London along with several of her friends. "They all went but I didn't," said Sam. "I've always been quite practical and sensible, so I decided that it would be more beneficial to go to university and get a degree.

"I'd also seen my dad doing all sorts of jobs in between his acting work to keep us all going."

Sam enrolled at Exeter University to study for a degree in American and Commonwealth Arts. "It was a largely literature-based course exploring how history and politics are portrayed in the art forms of the time – art, film, music as well as writing – and what that can tell us about a country at a particular point in history," said Sam.

"It really prepared me for a life in the arts and gave me a broad grounding in many types of art and artistic expression."

The course also involved spending a year at the University of New Mexico, USA. "Moving to Albuquerque was like living in a film set with the beautiful desert, stunning mountains and amazing sky," Sam recalled. "It was a brilliant experience."

One of Sam's fellow students stayed on in Santa Fe and the pair have kept in touch ever since. "After we got married John and I spent our honeymoon in New York and New Mexico–I was so excited to go back."

After returning to England and completing her degree, Sam went work for Artsadmin in London. "They

are pioneers in contemporary art and introduced me to non-mainstream arts in London."

Sam went on to work with touring companies and venues up and down the country and, during a stint in Oxford, met her future husband John. "I was working with the Oxford Stage Company on a production of Romeo and Juliet," said Sam. "John arrived to do the casting."

In 2004 Sam took the decision to go it alone and launched McAuley Arts Marketing Ltd, known as makesthree. "Lots of people in my line of work freelance really early on but I believe that getting quality experience working in a range of venues and seeing how things are put together is invaluable," said Sam.

It's undoubtedly this experience that helped secure Sam one of her most high profile jobs - as Marketing Manager for events at Canary Wharf. "I market the entire programme, from comedy nights and music gigs to large outdoor concerts with companies like the London Symphony Orchestra.

"The Jazz Festival in August is the biggest free outdoor jazz festival in London and over the winter we have a fantastic ice rink."

Sam is also busy promoting the current show for the hugely successful BalletBoyz, which arrives in Brighton in June. "Working with 10 gorgeous boys is such a hardship!" laughed Sam. "The boys are such brilliant role models for younger boys as they are very down to earth and come from a variety of backgrounds," she added. "Some didn't set out to become dancers, including one of the original balletboyz, Matt, who was planning to join the Royal Marines if his BalletBoyz application was unsuccessful."

Sam is also working with Kneehigh Theatre Company (Cornwall's National Theatre) on the forthcoming tour of Dead Dog in a Suitcase, a new version of The Beggar's Opera.

Another exciting new project is 'The Spalding Suite' a unique and exciting dance and theatre interpretation of an anthology of poetry about basketball. "I'm working with director Benji Reid and poet Inua Ellams and their producers at Fuel, who are creating a show around the physical beauty of the game," Sam explained. "Basketball players are similar to dancers; there is a short

peak time when the body can do amazing things and achieve impossible feats."

She added that, with its beatbox soundtrack, the show should appeal to young dancers and basketball players. The show opens at the South Bank Centre in April before moving closer to home as part of the Brighton Festival in May.

Sam's career has taken her to a wide range of venues but perhaps the most unusual was the car park behind the National Theatre, which became the setting for The Roof, an innovative '360-degree panoramic performance under the night sky," held last summer.

Based on computer games, the production mixed contemporary dance, free running and 3D sound, and was watched by more than 10,000 people. "It was also my first time filming with a drone camera, which was amazing," said Sam.

When she's not working from home, Sam travels to her 'bolt hole' office in London above busy rehearsal rooms. "I never know who I'm going to bump into," said Sam. "I've met Joanna Lumley in the loos and heard Mark Rylance roaring through the floor rehearsing Jerusalem!"

The internet and social media have made working from home a practical option for Sam but also play a huge part in marketing non-mainstream work. "Small productions with tiny budgets can now reach so many more people and new technology has made it possible.

"Digital cameras mean you can get really good images and make trailers at very little cost; it's allowed unusual work to have a voice," said Sam. "As a result there's much more of a crossover now between traditional theatre and 'weird stuff'!"

Away from work Sam enjoys village life and particularly walking her dog Jack in the Sussex countryside. "We fell in love with Lindfield after visiting friends here," said Sam. "It's perfect for us."

She's also training in genealogy and was surprised to discover that some of her ancestors lived in the area, with weddings recorded in Ardingly and West Hoathly churches.

"I've also found that I'm related to Debroy Somers, Leader of the Savoy Orpheans in the 1920s. It was the first resident dance band at London's Savoy Hotel, so it appears that performance has always been in our blood."



Transferring your weight

TEEING OFF

By James Verrall, Head Golf Professional

The golf swing is a dynamic movement which lasts around 1.5 seconds. During this time your body is expected to perform a movement that involves transferring your weight. A correct weight movement does not just help with maximising distance but also increasing the consistency of your shots.

We will be looking at how to make the correct movements for someone who using an iron and is right-handed.

At address you need to have an even amount of weight placed on both legs and feel like you are on the balls of your feet. This is a very athletic position, which means your body is ready to move whilst keeping good balance.

As you turn away to start the backswing, try not to feel like you are shifting your weight on to your right leg. This will likely cause you to slide your hips over to the right, otherwise known as a sway. Instead of shifting you need to perform more of a pivot with the right hip going back. The right foot should stay braced on the instep, with your right knee remaining inward. (Imagine someone just about to throw a ball and pushing off from the right leg). Making this pivot movement will help you coil and create resistance at the top of the backswing.

To start the downing you must start shifting all your weight on to your left side. This needs to start with the knees and hips first. This you may have heard of as a term called 'clearing your hips'. The top half of the body and arms should then follow. The difference of movement between the hips and the top half is known as laq.

At impact your belt buckle should have shifted well left of the golf ball. Your hands should also be past the ball, apart from when using a driver. Your left leg should have straightened to avoid you sliding through the shot.

So remember, pivot on the backswing and don't shift your weight; then shift your weight on the downswing, leading with the knees and hips!!

Stuffed french toast


In 1921 Wonder Bread, the original soft white mass-produced loaf, was introduced in the USA and later, in 1930, pre-sliced bread went on sale there for the first time, changing the world of sandwich making for ever. In the USA, French toast is made with thick slices of fresh bread (no filling), served with crisp rashers of bacon and a drizzle of maple syrup. Tastes better than it sounds. This is my English version.

Using soft sliced bread make sandwiches generously filled with butter and your chosen filling – grated cheese, sliced soft cheese, ham, crisp bacon, canned salmon or tuna (could be mixed with a little mayonnaise) – whatever you fancy.

In a shallow pie plate beat 1 egg with 300ml milk (enough for 2--3 sandwiches). Dip each sandwich in this, coating both sides.

Heat a good knob of butter in a fry pan and cook the sandwiches until a rich golden brown on both sides. Cut into quarters and eat piping hot.

For a sweet version try a filling of jam and thinly sliced bananas. Yummy!

Our familiar loaf of bread, which we take for granted, has been around for a long time. It has been one of the principal forms of food from the very earliest times. A milling stone dating from the Stone Age, 7,500 years ago, shows evidence of grinding primitive seeds and grains. Bread making is one of the earliest crafts known to man, with evidence from Egyptian tombs. The British Museum has loaves made over 5,000 years ago. A bit stale by now!

Fast forward a few years – to 7th July 1928 and to Des Moines, Iowa where a jeweller had invented a mechanica bread slicer. Before then all loaves had to be hand cut but by 1933 80% of the bread made in the USA was sold ready-sliced. There is nothing to beat a well buttered slice of very fresh bread but it can also form the basis of some delicious, inexpensive main dishes, perfect for chilly days.

Bread and butter pudding is that wonderful quivering baked combination of creamy custard, bread and fruit, certainly not to be confused with the rather solid mixture called Bread Pudding. Rather than being a vehicle for stale bread ends, this humble pudding now comes made with every conceivable type of bread and in numerous variations. It is even said to be Prince Charles' favourite pudding and his chef includes a liberal addition of whisky. I have made puddings with pannetonne, that delicious Italian Christmas bread, brioche and croissants – be adventurous and try this savoury version.

Savoury bread and butter pudding

Cut the crusts off 6 large slices of fresh (or 1 day old) bread and lightly spread with butter, plus a little mustard if wished. Top three slices generously with thinly sliced ham and grated or thinly sliced cheese – Gruyere is especially delicious. Top with the remaining three slices of bread and cut into triangles. Arrange in a shallow buttered dish slightly overlapping, like roof tiles. Whisk together 2 large eggs with 600ml full fat milk or single

cream and seasoning. Pour through a sieve over the bread. Cover and refrigerate for 45 min – 1 hour.

Preheat the oven 170°. Uncover and bake for 45-60 min or until just set and golden brown. Serve freshly baked.



This month we return to our series of features from Walstead Burial ground with the story of a remarkable woman who, despite suffering horrific injuries in a car accident, went on to become an Olympic medallist and one of the county's leading campaigners for disabled rights: Davina Marcia Ingrams, 18th Baroness Darcy de Knayth.

Born on 10th July 1938, Davina Marcia Herbert was the daughter of Vida (Cuthbert) and, Sqn Ldr Viscount Clive, the 17th Baron Darcy de Knayth.

Sadly, when she was just five years old, her father died in action in 1943 flying a Mosquito as a squadron leader in the RAF. His death meant Davina became the 18th Baroness Darcy, the youngest British baroness in her own right.

Brought up by her mother and stepfather, Brigadier Derek Schreiber, she was educated at St Mary's school, Wantage, Oxfordshire. After leaving Wantage, she took a secretarial course and spent a year in Italy and at the Sorbonne in Paris. Blonde, pretty and with a title of her own, the press regarded her as the 'catch of the season'.

On 1st March 1960 Davina married company director Rupert Ingrams (the brother of journalist and Private Eye editor Richard Ingrams). They had three children - a son and two daughters.

Tragedy struck in 1964 when Davina and her husband were involved in a serious accident. Returning from a dance, their car hit a tree. Rupert was killed outright, and Davina suffered injuries to her face and spine. She was cut free from the wreckage and taken to Cuckfield Hospital, but flown by helicopter to Stoke Manderville Hospital where it was discovered that she was paralysed from the neck down.

She spent a year in hospital and later recovered some movement in her upper body. Davina became a wheelchair user, but was determined to live as normal a life as possible, and had a car converted so she could drive her three young children.

She also took up table tennis and archery and went on to become one of the leading voices in the campaign that led to the creation of the Paralympic Games.

Not only did Davina help create the Paralympics but she successfully competed events including wheelchair fencing and the women's slalom. She won a gold medal

in swimming at the 1968 Summer Paralympics in Israel and a bronze for table tennis at the 1972 Games in Heidelberg, West Germany. She was also an archery champion.

In 1969 Davina took up her seat in the House of Lords, She had been admitted as one of the first 16 hereditary peeresses six years earlier. It was believed that she was the first member to be referred to on the floor as a 'kinswoman'.

In 1970 she was one of four wheelchair-bound members of the House of Lords whose intervention in a debate on a private member's Bill dramatically raised public awareness about the plight of the disabled.

Together with Baroness Masham, Viscount Ingleby and Lord Crawshaw, she was one of the 'Wheelchair Brigade', for whom one of the crossbenches was removed from the floor of the House so they could speak on the second reading of the Bill promoted by the Labour MP Alf Morris.

Introducing an amendment to allow pensioners on invalidity benefit to earn £9.50 a week without losing their entitlement to state aid, Davina 'spoke with the authority of a young widowed mother of three who was paralysed from the chest down.'

In the years that followed she became a persistent campaigner for equal rights for disabled people in the Lords. In May 1990, she was responsible for defeating the Conservative government by 87 votes to 86 for her



amendment to grant deaf and dyslexic students the right to claim income support and housing benefit.

One of Davina's great victories came in March 1991 when she helped inflict a defeat on the Major government, killing off its effort to end the Independent Living Fund, which enabled seriously disabled people to live in the community.

Uninterested in party politics, Davina is remembered for considering every issue on its merits. She was a moderate opponent of the hunting ban, was strongly opposed to ID cards and supported the Human Fertilisation and Embryo Bill in the House in 1990.

In 1996 she was made a Dame (DBE) for her services to disabled people.

After the House of Lords Act 1999 removed most of the hereditary peers from the House of Lords, she was the only one of the original hereditary peeresses elected to remain after coming top of the ballot of crossbench peers. She continued to be driven up from her home near Maidenhead by Lord Lawrence, who did not retain his seat.

In the January 2003 debate on Lords reform, she favoured the retention of an "all-appointed" upper chamber. As a Catholic convert, she opposed any further concessions on abortion. She also served as the President of Skill: National Bureau for Students with Disabilities.

Davina died at Wrexham Park Hospital, Slough, on 24th February 2008 and is buried at Walstead, next to her husband Rupert. The day after her death, the House of Lords paid her warm tribute when it passed the third reading of the Disabled Persons (Independent Living) Bill.

Her son, Caspar David Ingrams, succeeds her as the 19th Baron Darcy de Knayth.



From time to time David and I will be asked what it's like to work together. Without wishing to sound nauseating, we have now worked together for over thirteen years and it works; we love it. Clients have looked at us incredulously as we explain that we don't argue and certainly don't battle with each other when it comes to our work. I think the key is that we have different skill sets and, depending on the project, will each bow to the other's expertise. And, crucially, neither of us is ego driven nor do we 'have to be right'. Our clients tell us that they like the dual approach and feel that they get the best of both worlds. So how does that split work? Well, David, with his background in bespoke furniture design and making and his space planning skills, is a natural fit for kitchen and bathroom projects, whilst I am more drawn to sitting rooms and bedrooms and more generally in the business will be the one who puts together the colour schemes.

So when we landed a large country house project, David was the lead on the bathroom designs (there were four). This particular project was not only especially exciting due to its scale but the client wanted to invest in a high end finish, so our scope for gorgeous design was huge, especially in the master en suite (above). The existing en suite had been a rather cold and cavernous dual aspect space, yet with stunning Downs views. What it lacked apart from warmth was a sense of privacy. As I have mentioned here before, the structure of a room is the first thing to consider and David felt that this needed to change. By adding a partition wall about 90cm into the room facing you as you walk in, the bathroom started to feel more like a retreat. Where you had been able to see straight into the space from the bedroom, you now, on entering the room, had to turn left before properly feeling you were 'in the en suite'. David designed the space with a large walk in shower on the other side of

the new wall. Double sinks with walnut drawer storage feature on the opposite wall, flanked by the Bisque towel rail and the simply designed WC. A spacious free standing teardrop bath completes the look, perfectly placed to enjoy the gorgeous view afforded by the huge picture window. With so much wall space, the tiling had to be carefully considered. It would not have been wrong to have 60cm x 30cm tiles throughout but it would have shown a crushing lack of imagination when there are so many fabulous shapes and sizes of tiles on the market. The Ghost White tiles David chose offered a wide range of sizes, including some 8cm x 60cm and 8cm x 75cm strip tiles which, mixed with the larger format tiles, enabled him to create a fully bespoke look. Tiles like this demand to be lit well and the Oslo wall lights from Astro are perfect for this. The shower enclosure itself provided the ideal backdrop for some striking Bisazza mosaic tiles; the green gives you a real sense of rainforest. (For a stunning application of Bisazza tiles Google 'Naples Toledo metro station' – incredible). The sanitaryware was sourced from high end Swiss supplier Laufen. Some years ago David and I were lucky enough to be invited to the Cotswolds for a supplier event where we learned what makes Laufen such a superior product. We returned experts in flushing quality and how toilet seats had been designed for ease of cleaning. But seriously, these guys test their products relentlessly and each one is checked by a lint gloved inspector for porcelain imperfections as they come off the production line.

As we applied the finishing touches to this country house project, we reflected on the rooms which made us smile most. Whilst we were both delighted with the end results throughout the house, it was the sitting room and master bedroom which I felt most excited about and, yes, the master en suite did it for David.

Neighbourhood Policing Panel

One of the functions performed by our Parish Council is to provide a representative for Lindfield Rural parish on the local Neighbourhood Policing Panel, which covers Lindfield, Ardingly, West Hoathly, Sharpthorne, Horsted Keynes, Scaynes Hill and Rural surrounds.

The Neighbourhood Policing Panel is a group of local residents, not just Parish Councillors, who meet on a roughly 10 week schedule with our local Police Community Support Officer, Erica Baxter, at Haywards Heath Police Station. The meetings start at 7.30pm and last for about an hour and a half. We discuss any and all issues relating to crime and anti-social behaviour in our area. Erica advises us on the various reported incidents that have arisen since the previous meeting and we are able to highlight any concerns that we (or our community in general) are aware of which we feel would benefit from a review or investigation by the Police. Issues such as inconsiderate parking of vehicles, theft (of all types), anti-social behaviour, suspected drug use etc. are discussed.

One of the main problems/issues that Erica regularly highlights is an apparent lack of interest within the community as a whole in reporting any suspicious activity. It is generally left to the poor victim of a crime to make the first report to the Police, by which time, of course, it is too late. The police cannot be everywhere observing what is going on but if someone in the community reported any suspicious activity that was observed, it might be possible to prevent certain crimes taking place.

To put it simply, prevention is better than a cure, so if you are aware of any suspicious activity, of whatever type, please report it via the 101 telephone number (or if it is a crime in progress, the 999 number). It may be nothing and therefore, when the Police investigate, no further action is required but equally it may be something serious and you could potentially be preventing a crime taking place.

One other way of identifying problems is for more members of the community to actually participate in the Policing Panel. For example, at present, apart from the 'odd' Parish Councillor or three, there is a representative from a Neighbourhood Watch group in Lindfield as well as a resident from Horsted Keynes who acts on behalf of his neighbours but more local community members would be welcome. The Panel is open to anyone who feels they have a view about the relevant issues. So, for instance, if

a group of residents in your road regularly discusses (or moans about) things that happen around you, why not select a representative to attend the Panel meeting to keep abreast of things and also make any points relevant to your local area. At least give it a try.

If you are interested in finding out more or attending the next Panel meeting, which is currently scheduled for 7.30pm on Thursday 16th April 2015, then please contact PCSO Erica Baxter by email at Erica.Baxter (a) sussex.pnn.police.uk and she will make all the necessary arrangements.

If you don't feel able to attend the Panel yourself but still have issues or information, we can of course raise them on your behalf. However, to do this we need to know about them, so please let us have details via the Parish Clerk, either by telephone on 01444 831499 or via email at lindfieldrural.parishcouncil@virgin.net but please remember that it is always better to deal with these things first-hand.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

Following formal submission of the Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan to Mid Sussex District Council (MSDC) on 12th December 2014, we have now been advised that the 6 week public consultation should commence on 12th February 2015. This consultation is being organised by MSDC. Please look out for the relevant advertisements.

Gravelye Lane Allotments

Many residents in the Parish, and particularly those residing in the Kaleidoscope and Heathwood Park developments off Gravelye Lane, may not be aware that the Parish Council owns and operates the Allotment Gardens off Gravelye Lane, Lindfield.

It has certainly proved very much a popular pastime to grow your own fruit and vegetables and, although there are no vacancies on the allotments at present, the past year has seen a larger than usual turnover of plotholders. This has resulted in the waiting list being substantially reduced, so the Parish Council are re-opening the waiting list to those residing within the Parish boundary. For those residents who are unsure whether they are within that boundary, may we remind you that residents from the hamlet of Walstead and the village of Scaynes Hill would qualify. Residents may, however, consult our website or phone the Parish Office for confirmation.

Shared ownership enables you to buy a share of the property and pay rent on the remainder, owned by Horsham-based housing association Saxon Weald. Over time you can buy a bigger share and could eventually own your home outright.

The spacious and modern homes are built to a high standard with good insulation and double glazing. They are carpeted throughout and the fully fitted kitchens feature integrated oven and hob, washing machine and fridge/freezer.

Priority will be given to:

- applicants who have lived in the Parish of Lindfield Rural for two years or more
- applicants who have been employed in the parish (at least 16 hours a week) for the previous two years
- applicants who have immediate family who have lived in the parish for five years or more (two years if the applicant is over the age of 65)






Grantchester: Sidney Chambers and the Shadow of Death by James Runcie

BOOK REVIEW

The creation of a credible amateur detective is quite a skill. James Runcie has in the form of Sidney Chambers developed a thoughtful and believable character. As the son of an Archbishop of Canterbury, the writer is in a unique position to bring us a new clerical sleuth, a new Father Brown. By setting the tales in the 1950s, Runcie is able to comment on contemporary issues such as euthanasia and homosexuality. Sidney Chambers is a good man but he has his flaws, which flesh him out but do not compromise his faith. He is a man, too, of his time; hiding the tragedies he saw in war and finding it difficult to express his love for the one woman he should marry. The writing is so strong that even if detective fiction is not a genre that normally figures in your reading, try this. It is a rewarding novel that proves that good (in moral terms) characters can be readable.
