

Commemorate VE Day

A special family-friendly VE Day event takes place in Lindfield on 9th May. It is being organised by the Sussex Fundraising team of the Royal British Legion to commemorate 70 years since VE Day.

The event kicks off at 11.30am with a parade through the village. The parade will be led by a marching band with Standard Bearers from the Royal British Legion, Cadets and local school children dressed as WW2 evacuees. The parade will halt and a recording of Winston Churchill's famous speech to announce the German surrender and the end of the war will sound.

The event will include stalls from local businesses and a live band to keep the feel of 1945 alive. Food will be available, based on the era's ration restrictions, and street collections will be going on throughout the day to help raise vital funds for the Poppy Appeal. All proceeds from the Commemoration of VE day will go towards the Poppy Appeal.

Plastics recycling


Now instead of ending their existence in a landfill, West Sussex's plastic pots, tubs and trays will get a new lease of life as, amongst other things, garden furniture, duvets, carpets or even a fleece jacket.

Residents can now place plastic containers such as yoghurt pots, ice cream tubs, fruit and vegetable punnets and ready meal trays into their household recycling collection alongside plastic drink, detergent and bathroom bottles. The only requirement is that they are clean, dry and loose.

David Barling, West Sussex County Council's Cabinet Member for Residents' Services, said: "Plastic pots, tubs and trays take an extremely long time to break down, often sitting in landfill for years without showing the smallest signs of decay. It also costs the County Council more money to send waste to landfill than it does to recycle it, so there are real environmental and economic benefits to the changes we are making to household recycling collections."

New monthly activity group to support parents and carers with young children

The Koorana Centre in Ardingly is offering a new monthly drop-in session for parents and carers with young children. The sessions are free to attend and donations are welcome towards a local children's charity, Kangaroos.

The aim of the group is to provide a regular opportunity for parents and carers to make friends with like-minded people, while the children enjoy playtime and craft activities. Children with special needs are very welcome.

Organisers Anna Ashley and Gabrielle Anya Rafello, who both work from the wellbeing centre, believe this regular session will enable parents to feel more supported and help them overcome some of the feelings of isolation they may experience.

Anna runs Baby Calm and Toddler Calm parenting sessions. She will be on hand to provide support to anyone who may be interested in finding new ways to cope with the demands placed upon them as parents and carers. The 'gentle parenting approach' can help with all sorts of challenging situations, especially issues around sleep and how to manage some of the more difficult changes in behavior as children become toddlers and then move on to school.

Gabrielle Anya Rafello supports a variety of people with relaxation classes, and can provide tips on how to stay balanced and let go of tension and stress. As the founder and director of the Koorana Centre, she helps people to connect with teachers and therapists who lead activities in its wellbeing programme. As a practitioner, she specialises in supporting highly sensitive children and young people, and connects with a number of families who care for young children with specific learning needs.

They will be joined by Stacey Renphrey, who teaches the Relax Kids programme in Mid Sussex. Relax Kids is a unique 7 step programme which takes children from a high 'fizzy' energy to calm and relaxed in a fun and creative way.

The new monthly session takes place on the third Wednesday of each month from 1-2.30pm. There is no need to book in advance. Tea and biscuits are provided for adults, please bring drinks for the children.





Last month Graham Davison, the President of the Lindfield Miniature Rifle Club (LMRC), gave an inspiring speech to the gathering before making the toast to commemorate the centenary. He made the point that the club owed a debt to Mr Sturdy and Miss Savill for their generous donation, made 100 years ago, of the land and money to build the range.

The Club Secretary, Richard 'Dickie' Bird, the person responsible for the safety and regulatory compliance of the club, noted how different things are today. "The range, initiated to teach young men to shoot straight for their participation in an awful war, is now used for the enjoyment of a technical and disciplined sport."

The club also has a tradition of supporting the Scouts in their pursuit of firearm skills. Encouraging the youngsters of the district assists in the aims of the club, which is to bring new talent to the sport.

A feature not overlooked by Alex Henderson, who observed that LMRC is amongst only a few that encourages adolescents in this way. Alex, who joined the club when moving into the area, found the club inviting and the members friendly. He went on to represent British Schoolboys and now represents the Sussex County Team in .22 as well as shooting in the LMRC Teams.

Another member who holds high aspirations is Oliver. He joined the club along with his father James. He had used an air rifle under the supervision of his father prior to joining the club but wanted to stretch his skills. As a member of the Air Training Corps (Haywards Heath) he is currently training for the 'Cadet 100'. If he makes the grade he will be eligible to be selected for the GB Junior Squad. We wish him every success in all his competitions.

Dan, aged 20, and Ed, aged 16, both joined the club following meeting members at the LMRC 'Shooting Gallery' on Village Day. Both wanted to experience shooting in a proper environment. Ed has successfully competed in County competitions, which have provided him with the experience to shoot at different ranges

Another Village Day introduction to the club is Louise Toomey, a local vet. She was new to the area and was looking for a club to join. LMRC fitted the bill, being very

friendly and welcoming. She enjoys the 'calmness but competitive edge' of the sport.

Nick Holden, an ex-Naval Officer, enjoys the sport for the precise discipline that it brings. He feels the club is the right size and provides a good balance of age, backgrounds and abilities. He remarks: "It is a sport for all; not discriminating between young, old mature, disabled, religion or gender."

How the LMRC first started

Arising from the invasion threat in the Great War, the proposal that Lindfield should have a miniature rifle range was first made in autumn 1914 but did not proceed due to the absence of a suitable site. Suggested sites for the range included the school yard and on the common.

After a Council Meeting in January 1915 support from residents gathered momentum and the search for a suitable site was renewed. Mr W Sturdy agreed to provide a site in Tentermead adjoining Alma Lane and Miss Maud Savill offered to fund the building of a 25 yard four-target indoor range. Mr Parker Anscombe was ordered to put the work in hand.

This was announced at a well attended meeting on 13th February 1915 and it was agreed that a miniature rifle club affiliated to the Association of Miniature Rifle Clubs should be formed. Miss Savill was elected President along with six Vice Presidents and a large committee. All were prominent residents. Mr Rotherham and Mr Jesse Newnham volunteered to give shooting instruction and Miss Savill agreed to fund the purchase of four rifles.

The rifle range opening ceremony, performed by Colonel Dudley Sampson, took place at 3pm on Wednesday 31st March 1915. A Guard of Honour was provided by Lindfield Boy Scouts and the drum and fife band of the 2/2nd London Field Ambulance, RAMC played. It is reported that Colonel Sampson achieved a bull's eye with his first shot!

The Club's annual subscription was 2s 6d and 1s for boys under 16 years. The range was open each weekday evening and Wednesday afternoons. The Lindfield Boy Scouts and the Volunteer Training Corps were allocated use of the range on Wednesday and Thursday evenings respectively.

At the Club's first AGM in March 1916, subscriptions totalling £9 7s 0d and a £25 expenses deficit was reported. Membership numbers are not known but the Presidents, Vice Presidents and Committee totalled 25; largely the same individuals as the Lindfield Volunteer Training Corps. Indicating the 'great and the good' recognised the need for rifle practice in support of home defence. At the meeting it was decided ladies should be allowed to join the Club and were allotted Wednesday afternoons for their shooting.

Between March 1915 and March 1916, some 50,000 rounds were fired at the range. Members had to buy the ammunition at cost from the Club. The range continued to be widely used throughout the remainder of the Great War.

With the coming of the peace the Club closed as it was felt the last thing men would want to do was handle a rifle again. Following a short break, the Club was reestablished and continues to this day. A modern indoor range on the same site has recently replaced the original corrugated iron clad range building when it was rebuilt by Club members in 2010.



Badger watching sessions are on offer at Wakehurst Place all summer long.

Bookings are now being taken for Tuesday evenings until September to see the badgers in the Loder Valley Nature Reserve.

The evenings are led by an expert guide with viewing from a specially built hide, sunken to ground level, enabling views of these fascinating animals at close quarters as they emerge from their sett at dusk.

"Badgers vary their activity depending on the season, weather and time of darkness," explains Wakehurst's conservation manager lain Parkinson. "As a rule they first appear at the hide well before nightfall."

The sessions start at 7pm and last until the badgers have departed, up to 10pm. The average departure time is 9.30pm. The hide is approximately half a mile from the meeting point and stout walking shoes or walking boots are required.

When Alan and Wendy Stamford close the door of the village Post Office next month they will be marking the end of an era for the village.

The little Post Office on the corner of the High Street and Lewes Road has served generations of villagers, often patiently queueing outside the door to buy their stamps and post their parcels.

For the last 17 years Alan and Wendy have been the friendly faces behind the post office counter, along with staff Glenda (four years) and Janet (two years), so it seems appropriate that they are all retiring together next month.

As they prepare to leave the village, Alan and Wendy spoke about how they came to buy the Post Office and become an integral part of village life, how, faced with adversity, they were touched by the kindness and support of customers, and how they are looking forward to their first proper holiday in 17 years!

Alan and Wendy first met as teenagers when they worked at WH Smith's in Churchill Square in Brighton. "I was only 15½, and it was my first job," said Wendy.

Romance blossomed and the pair were eventually married, moving to Grimsby working at WH Smith before returning to Sussex and running Dillons newsagents in Worthing for 25 years.

With many years' experience running newsagents' shops, it was only a matter of time before Alan and Wendy decided they would like a business of their own.

"We had always thought about running our own business but didn't want to take the risk while our two children were young," said Wendy. "Alan had always wanted to own a card shop as he loves choosing and ordering greetings cards!"

Tired of the long hours involved in running a newsagents, the pair started looking around for a business that didn't involve getting up at the crack of dawn to organise the morning paper rounds.

"So we were delighted when details of the Lindfield

Post Office arrived in the post!" said Wendy.

However, at first it seemed an impossible dream as the sale included both the shop and house next door and was way beyond the couple's budget. "I spoke to the estate agent who sang its praises and suggested we still came and looked as there might be an opportunity to buy just the Post Office. Even without the house it was still slightly over our budget but we loved it straight away."

So the couple jumped in at the deep end and bought the Post Office. "We had to stretch ourselves just to buy this bit and we wondered if we were pushing ourselves too far," Alan recalled. "But it proved to be absolutely the right decision."

Alan and Wendy took over the business in November 1998. "Alan had two weeks training, followed by someone working with us for two weeks and then we were on our own," said Wendy.

"We were straight into the Christmas rush but it was good fun and such a relief not to have to start work at

5am every morning!" She added that they also enjoyed their first Sundays off for 25 years!

"When we took over there were no computers, so every transaction had to be processed by hand," said Alan.

The couple quickly settled into the village life, thanks to the warm welcome from customers.

"My son-in-law suggested it might take years for people in the village to accept us but in reality he couldn't have been more wrong," said Wendy. "Everyone accepted us straight away."

It was this support which carried Alan and Wendy through the traumatic time when the Post Office was ram-raided in December 2007. In the early hours of the morning a 4x4 vehicle was driven at speed into the building, demolishing the outer wall.

When Alan and Wendy arrived on the scene, the Post Office resembled a building site - everything was covered in rubble but the safe was still intact.

"I think they assumed the safe was on the wall they demolished, but fortunately it was on another wall and just got buried in rubble!" said Alan.

But the extensive damage meant the Post Office was closed for 5 months. "Everything had to be replaced, including the counter and glass," said Alan. "Because nothing had been taken we couldn't claim for loss of earnings and we used up all our savings just to survive. It was a tough time and it seemed to go on forever."

But customers and the wider community soon rallied round.

"We had so many cards and flowers that our house resembled a florist's shop," said Wendy.

"We're Christians so we had great support from the church too," added Alan. "Without them I don't think we could have carried on."

Even when the Post Office reopened, times were hard. "People had started going elsewhere, so it took a couple of months to get back on our feet."

The support has continued and today the little Post Office is as busy as ever, with customers often queuing outside the door at busy times. "It always surprises me that people don't complain about the queues," said Alan. "But I think they enjoy chatting to each other."

The nature of the Post Office business has changed over the years with a huge increase in parcel posting due

to online shopping such as ebay and Amazon. "It's also brought many more younger people into the shop," said Alan.

The couple's decision to retire last year presented an opportunity for the Post Office to review its presence in the village, resulting in the forthcoming move to Martins newsagents further up the High Street.

"The Post Office needs to be within a viable business," Alan explained. "The business needs to support the Post Office rather than the other way round.

"At first customers were concerned about us, until they found out that we were very happy to be retiring," he added. "Once they knew that, many said they had no objections to the move. I think most people are relieved that Lindfield will still have a Post Office, particularly as others such as Horsted Keynes have closed."

Alan, Wendy, Janet and Glenda will serve their last customers on Thursday 18th June. The new post office opens at Martins the following day.

"We'll then spend about a week packing up before leaving the village," said Alan. He added that the building will be sold in due course.

Meanwhile, the couple are looking forward to lazy mornings and long walks near their home in Worthing. "It will be lovely to choose what we want to do and when we want to do it," said Alan. "I'm planning to enjoy our garden and the chance to go for walks on the seafront and stop for a coffee."

"And I'm looking forward to being one of those ladies who lunch," added Wendy.

They also plan to visit their daughter in Australia at the end of the year.

"But we know we are going to miss Lindfield and particularly the people," said Alan. "Lindfield has a very special community feel where people genuinely look out for one another. We've seen lots of people come and go but have made some lovely friends."

"We'll miss the connection with people and the banter and, of course, our staff. And Alan will miss ordering the cards!" Wendy added.

"We are so grateful to everyone who has supported us over the years. To us it's always been more about the people than the business, and that's why we have enjoyed 17 very happy years here."

Colour is something which is all around us. The effect it can have on our sense of wellbeing is enormous, so getting it right in our living spaces is crucial. Colour is unsurprisingly an everyday part of the job of an interior designer and it is down to us to use it cleverly to produce a scheme that works for our client, whether we are designing someone's sitting room or bedroom or a dining room or admin office for a nursing home.

Whilst colour and how it makes people feel applies to all our projects, our residential clients will usually have a clear idea themselves about their colour preferences so we tend not to get into meaty discussions about the psychology behind it. Having said that, at the very early stages in a project when exploring a husband and wife's position on different shades, we have witnessed not only couples who had no idea about the other's strong feelings on green but dawning realisations on the genesis of certain colour aversions, such as an old school uniform or a paint colour used on a hospital ward stayed in as a child. Where colour psychology comes into play mostly for us is in our commercial design work. Choosing the right colours for key finishes is paramount when designing care homes. Since colour can affect certain behaviours, we are really looking at the function of the space in tandem with the needs of the resident when deciding on a particular hue. The dementia home we have just begun working on has prompted me to look into colour psychology in more depth. The following findings are by no means exhaustive but the ones I felt most noteworthy.

White is used by many architects for its purity and neutrality. From a psychological point of view white can be sterile and isolating and does not promote long term well-being. I fully concur with this; white does not do it for me at all and whenever I see it used en masse it strikes me as such a missed opportunity for something a little warmer and more inviting. Teal is an

interesting one. Its properties include balance, calm, soothing and rejuvenation. It's an equilibrium restorer and a combination of blue (known for its tranquillity) and the peace and balance of green. What I found most interesting was that as a combination of blue and green, teal mixes the two colours for which our eyes require little or no adjusting. I am guessing that this has something to do with their being colours of sky, sea and land, hues that we have as human beings always felt at one with. Indigo stands for trust, honesty and friendly logic and reason. As the colour of the mind it stimulates clear thought but as such may suppress appetite, so best avoided in kitchens or dining areas. Orange is fun, invigorating and motivational. The boost of orange comes from the red, whilst the happiness and optimism stems from the yellow. It's a colour that encourages social interaction and also stimulates the appetite, so a great colour for dining areas in care homes. I should add here that I am not having Happy Eater thoughts but am definitely using certain shades of orange in the dining areas for this current project. So now on to grey - I know, it seems to be everywhere. An alternative to cream, it's another safe neutral for walls. I like grey and have used it for clients as well as ourselves but I have also seen some appalling applications of it too. Grev comes across as calming but studies show that if used in isolation it can be calming to the point of draining and should be avoided in environments requiring creativity. So if you are using grey, make sure that you team it with a more upbeat accent colour.

On a final note, I know in last month's piece I rather confidently announced that our sparkly new website would be up and running. It was not and we realised this the day we received our own copy of the magazine. Children in Year 3 at Blackthorns Primary School got the chance to show off their term's work last month when they held 'The Great Exhibition'.

The class was studying Victorian Britain and, in particular, how the railway coming to Haywards Heath affected the area. It was noted, for instance, how the sign at the station originally read 'The station for Cuckfield & Lindfield' – as there was hardly anything making up Haywards Heath town at the time.

The children also had chance to write their own letters of support or protest about the coming of the railway as if they were contributing to the 1837 Town Hall meeting.

Visitors to the exhibition heard about the children's field trip into the village with local historian Richard Bryant, learning many interesting things about Lindfield,

including the fact that Happy Feet shoe shop used to be the village blacksmiths.

The information about Lindfield has been collated into a large display board in the school reception area. The board shows the High Street with large QR codes (2D bar codes which can be scanned by smart phones) at various locations. When scanned these codes show the viewer a YouTube clip featuring old images of the building or area, or a sound clip of the children reading key facts relevant to the Victorian era in Lindfield.

Year 3 teacher Sarah Neller explained: "After the walk around the village, when the children discovered many new facts about life in the 19th century, they wanted to find a way of sharing the information. Recording the facts (with the help of parent Clare Jones) was their idea and I think they have done it really well."

No more lorries!

A group of Lindfield residents have mobilised a campaign to restrict the movement of large heavy goods vehicles (HGVs) through the village. Working with Lindfield Preservation Society, the group has started a petition to: 'Implement a 7.5 tonne weight limit (except for local access) on the B2028 and throughout Lindfield and to support the removal of all signs that direct traffic for Wakehurst and the South of England Show through Lindfield High Street'.

The group – known as Lindfield Traffic – would also like to see the speed limit lowered to 20mph in the conversation area in the village. The large 32 tonne trucks have been a familiar sight driving through Lindfield over the last 18 months en route to various assignments. The current job is a huge land project which has planning permission for receiving up to 6,000 lorry loads. It is currently thought that Lindfield sees around 25 (plus return trips) per day.

In their research members of Lindfield Traffic discovered that Lindfield is one of the few villages in Sussex to not already have a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO). The order would mean that HGVs over 7.5 tonne would not be permitted to use the route.

They also looked at the width of other local roads. Lewes Road (B2111) is 4.65m at its narrowest point by the Post Office but has no width restriction. Whereas Hurstwood Lane in Haywards Heath does have a vehicle width restriction of 1.95m in place even though its smallest point is 5.0m wide.

However the group's petition also wants to see roadside signage changed after a TRO has been granted. This has not been met with universal praise from businesses on the High Street. Mary Collins, co-owner of The Toll House Store & Café, commented: "Whilst



we appreciate the need to reduce the number of HGV vehicles travelling through the village, directional signage to Wakehurst Place and Ardingly is invaluable in helping increase passing trade for all the shops and eateries." Tufnells owner Lisa Goodger concurred: "It is a fact that many of the businesses in the village report increased footfall when there are large events taking place at the South of England Showground & Wakehurst and this is not something we would want to lose."

The petition can be signed online at the following website shortcut http://ow.ly/KWneN. Residents who have already signed it seem to feel strongly: "I live in this pretty village and am fed up with these lorries speeding through," was a comment made by Kay Jackson. Crispin Billson cited children, the infirm and elderly as being particularly at risk from these vehicles that are 'unsuited to the road'.





Smoked Duck with Pears

Very finely chop (or use the processor/blender) a small handful of fresh mint leaves with 2tsp sugar. Whisk in 2tbs white wine vinegar, 6tbs rapeseed oil and 2tsp clear honey. Season to taste. Tip into a shallow bowl. Peel, core and cut 4 ripe dessert pears into thin slices and add them to the dressing. Gently turn in the dressing to coat the fruit, cover and leave for 2-3 hours.

Arrange thinly sliced smoked duck on individual plates and add the sliced pears, drizzling with the pretty herb-flecked dressing.

Mixed Seafood au Gratin

Preheat the oven 160°. Cut 400g salmon fillet and 400g halibut into portion-sized pieces. Place in a single layer in a large frying pan and add 250ml dry white wine and 125ml water. Cover and cook over a low heat until just cooked. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the fish to a hot shallow baking dish (large enough to hold the fish in a single layer), placing the salmon and halibut at opposite ends of the dish. Pile 200g cooked large prawns in the centre.

Strain the cooking liquid and make up to 375ml with water. Melt 40g butter in a pan and stir in 40g flour.

We have two Bank holidays this month and maybe you might be planning to do some entertaining? Hopefully we will be seeing more sunshine, our gardens will be looking fresh and colourful and the shops offering lighter summery foods to tempt you. Family or friends, it is always fun to gather around the table and enjoy a delicious meal together. These are some of my favourite dishes to serve now that hearty roasts and casseroles no longer appeal. They all serve 4-6. Serve the simple fish dish with grilled English asparagus spears and the hot Potato Salad. Enjoy.

Cook, stirring, over low heat for 1 min then whisk in the fish stock to make a smooth sauce. Gently simmer, stirring, for 4-5 min then season to taste and remove from the heat. Beat in 1 egg yolk and 125ml double cream to make a rich sauce. Spoon over the fish, sprinkle with a good handful of finely grated Cheshire or Gruyere cheese and slip under a preheated grill until golden brown.

Hot Potato Salad


Boil 800g very small new potatoes in lightly salted water until just fork tender – do not overcook. Drain well then tip on to a tea towel to dry. Put 1tsp wholegrain mustard into a serving bowl with 1tbs white wine vinegar, 4tbs light olive oil and seasoning. Whisk to combine then stir in a good handful of finely sliced spring onions. Add the

hot potatoes and turn to coat with the dressing. Very finely chop fresh mint, parsley and chives – you need about 3tbs – add to the potatoes and gently combine. Serve while hot.

Lemon Cream Parfaits

Up to 2 hours before serving: whisk 450ml double cream to soft peaks then gently fold in 4-5tbs good quality lemon or lime curd. Using one third of the cream mixture, spoon into 4 tall dessert glasses. Top with a small layer of fresh raspberries then a similar layer of crushed chocolate chip cookies. Repeat the layers – cream, fruit, cookie crumbs then end with a layer of cream. Decorate with a few more raspberries and a mint sprig. Chill.





This month we are pleased to return to our series of Walstead Burial Ground features and tell the story of a world famous musician, composer and Military Band leader.

Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Francis Vivian Dunn KCVO OBE FRAM FRSA was the Director of Music of the Portsmouth Division of the Royal Marines from 1931 to 1953 and Principal Director of Music of the Royal Marines from 1953 to 1968. He was also the first British Armed Forces military musician to be knighted.

Francis Vivian Dunn was born on 24th December 1908 in Jabalpur, India. His father, William James Dunn, was bandmaster of the Second Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps and later director of music of the Royal Horse Guards.

Dunn studied piano with his mother, Beatrice Maud, and undertook choral studies in Winchester. In 1923 he attended the Konservatorium der Musik in Cologne while the family was in Germany with the Army of the Rhine, and on returning to England two years later he went to the Royal Academy of Music.

He studied conducting with Henry Wood and composition with Walton O'Donnell. As a violinist, he performed in the Queen's Hall Promenade Orchestra (under Wood) and in 1930 was a founder member of the BBC Symphony Orchestra with Sir Adrian Boult.

Dunn was released from his contract with the BBC and on 3rd September 1931, aged 22, commissioned as a lieutenant in the Royal Marines to be director of music for Portsmouth Division of the Corps. This appointment also carried with it the responsibility of directing the Royal Marines Band on the Royal Yacht. He took part in the royal tour of South Africa in 1947 aboard HMS Vanguard and in a Royal Marines band tour of the US and Canada in 1949.

His appointment as Principal Director of Music of the Royal Marines, the subsequent promotion to

Lieutenant-Colonel and election as a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Music were all achieved in 1953. Later in the Coronation year, Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh embarked in SS Gothic for a world-wide tour of the Commonwealth, for which Dunn directed the accompanying Royal Marines Band.

At the conclusion of the tour the Queen appointed him CVO, and in 1960 appointed him OBE.

In 1955, Dunn was asked by Euan Lloyd of Warwick Films to compose the theme music for The Cockleshell Heroes (which was otherwise scored by John Addison).

He later appeared as himself, conducting the Royal Marines, in the end titles of the 1966 film Thunderbirds Are Go.

In 1968, Dunn retired as the professional head of the Royal Marines Band Service after 38 years' service. In January 1969 he became the only military musician ever to receive the Order of Knighthood in the Royal Victorian

Throughout his 'retirement', Dunn continued to further the cause of orchestral, military and light music.

He became a guest conductor with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, recorded with the Light Music Society Orchestra and conducted bands and orchestras at several universities in Canada and the US.

In 1969, he received an EMI Golden Disc award for sales of more than one million Royal Marines Band records. In the same year he was also elected as an



honorary member of the American Bandmasters Association. In 1987 he received the Sudler Medal of the Order of Merit from the John Philip Sousa Foundation.

He became the Founder President of the International Military Music Society in 1976, a position which he held until his death.

In 1988, after serving as the Senior Warden, Dunn became the first military musician to be installed as the Master of the Worshipful Company of Musicians.

Dunn composed and arranged more than 60 pieces of music. These include The Globe and Laurel (1935, rev. 1945), The Captain General (1949), Cockleshell Heroes (1955) and Mountbatten March (1972). He arranged numerous others including The Preobrajensky March attributed to Donajowsky (later to become the official slow march of the Royal Marines) and A Life on the Ocean Wave (the official quick march).

Dunn married Margery Halliday in 1938. They had one son (Patrick) and two daughters (Leonie and Rosey).

Daughter Rosey recalled how her parents chose to live in Lindfield quite by chance. "They were visiting friends in the area, got lost and happened to drive past the house - 16 West Common which was newly built," she said. "They bought it soon after and rented it out until my father retired in 1969.

"They loved Lindfield village, particularly the duck pond and especially the Bent Arms where they had many meals with friends."

She added that Vivian was a passionate golfer and was a member of Haywards Heath Golf Club for many years.

Vivian Dunn died from lung cancer in Haywards Heath on 3rd April 1995 aged 86. Margery, Lady Dunn, died on 26th June 1998.

Both chose to be buried in the country cemetery at Walstead. "The funeral, complete with Royal Marines orchestra and buglers, was beautifully managed by Masters and Son," Rosey recalled.

Last year Rosey and her sister Leonie returned to Deal for the unveiling of a Blue Plaque by the Deal Historical Society placed on the house in the former RM barracks where the family lived.

'Few musicians can claim, as Dunn could, to have been linked in some way with their chosen profession in every decade of the 20th century. He was born in its first decade, on Christmas Eve 1908, within earshot of his father's band room in Jabalpur, India; Dunn senior, then bandmaster of the Second Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps, was later to become Director of Music of the Royal Horse Guards. In the century's last decade, Vivian Dunn could be seen conducting the Central Band of the Royal Air Force in one of his own compositions.'

The Alex Crow by Andrew Smith

BOOK REVIEW

To create a world is the aim of every novelist. Andrew Smith's tale manages to combine a series of different stories which effortlessly merge into one whole tale. Ariel is the survivor of an attack on a Middle Eastern village who is adopted by a geneticist in the USA. Then there is the teenager who thinks Joseph Stalin is telling him what to do. A tale of a ship trapped in ice in the Victorian era. How can all these come together? The skill of the writer is that he sustains these disparate elements until the big reveal. By using a convention – what teenagers get up to at a summer camp – he subverts the literature of American youth while seemingly embracing it. Smith is an original voice, with a unique talent. This story is well worth searching out. Although probably aimed at teenagers, this is a book whose tale will satisfy all ages.







Success from a downhill lie

TEEING OFF

By James Verrall, Head Golf Professional

With such a varied array of slopes on the golf course it is essential that a good golfer knows how to approach each one. The downhill lie which we will look at today is one of the harder, awkward lie shots.

When deciding on which club you want to hit from the downhill lie, do not chose a wood!! Even if you still have 300 yards to go, you are much better off choosing a hybrid. The angle of the hill means you cannot get the club shallow to the ball, something crucial when playing a wood. The downhill lie also takes loft off the club, something which a fairway wood does not have much of.

Now we have got the right club in our hands we need to get the right set up. The first thing to do is get your shoulders parallel with the hill; this can be done by leaning more weight on the front foot. The ball then needs to be positioned back in the stance, which will ensure you do not hit too much ground first.

When swinging back try to keep the weight on the front foot, this will mean you won't turn much on the backswing and will end up swinging more with the arms. This is ok, so don't try and force a turn.

Because of the angle of our shoulders and the less turn on the backswing, our downswing will be steeper. Again this is ok as it will mean we don't hit the ground first. But what this will cause is a left to right ball flight. Make sure you allow for this by aiming left of your target.

Try this next time you find a downhill lie and see how you find the strike.
