Are you the parents of teenagers? (Or of 11 year olds who seem to be there already!)

All Saints Church is offering another opportunity for you to attend the parenting teenagers course. You are invited to join us for six Wednesday evenings. We will watch a DVD including material from experts, from parents themselves and from the presenters Nicky and Sila Lee of Holy Trinity Church Brompton. We will then have a chance to discuss in groups. There are no experts in the room, just people learning together. Topics covered will include keeping the end in mind; meeting our teenagers needs; setting boundaries; developing emotional health and helping them make good choices. The final session is an opportunity to explore passing on values and the part faith can play in parenting.

If you are not sure if this is for you, here are some comments from people who attended the course last year! "It was really helpful to be able to talk to other parents with similar age teenagers. No one was judgemental, so you felt you could share issues. It was a warm and supportive atmosphere. The DVDs were informative and I have tried some of the ideas. The bread and cheese were very welcome after rushing straight there from work!"

"It gave me a chance to stand back and reflect on whether my relationship with my daughters was going in the direction I had always hoped. I gained confidence in myself as a parent through listening and sharing experiences."

"The course was so worthwhile and useful. Teenagers have such a different life now to my life as a teenager all those years ago, it helped me understand a lot more. I have learnt the benefit of responding calmly in situations that easily escalate. This has truly resulted in a much more mature response from my daughter too. I learnt that we are not alone in our experiences. Almost everything in the DVDs rang a bell with situations we have faced."

The course will run on the following Wednesday evenings from 7.45 -9.45pm, in the Tiger Lounge at All Saints Church Lindfield: 27th January, 3rd, 10th and 24th February and 2nd and 9th of March.

School invites locals to speak in assemblies





I was born and grew up in Lindfield and have recently come back here to live. The Common and the pond are great village features and I have memories of both when I was a growing boy in the 1930s.

Our old family house was at Pelham Place and all I had to do was to cross the road and I was on the Common – the 'top common' as it was known as in those days. I spent many hours playing on that stretch of grass – football, cricket or with toys carried across from home. There was a long dry ditch along the border to Beckworth House - a wonderful place for my cars and lorries after digging out the soft soil in the bank.

A special 'conker' tree provided my prize specimens each year for the battles to come in the playground. Summer weekends meant family picnics on our Common and my parents would bring out chairs and blankets, food and drinks for a lovely afternoon! My dad used to bring out our old wireless and fix up an aerial so we even had our own music! They were peaceful, gentle days - a pleasant break for my parents who both worked very hard all week.

I remember standing on railings (there was no boundary hedge) watching games on the bowling green. The Thompson family lived next to the Bowling Green. Their daughter Kathy was a special girl friend, their son Albert went to Grammar School in Brighton with my brother and their older daughter Barbara moved to Turners Hill where I spent 50 years of my life.

The Common was a very convenient place for village events and gatherings, including the Annual Fair – officially on the calendar and by Ancient Charter on 8th August. The annual event started as a market venue for the thousands of sheep grazed in Sussex in the 1800s and the Common was covered with pens. Gradually other attractions were added to entertain the crowds, such as stalls, sideshows and refreshments. Horses were also sold at the fairs.

Over the years the sheep declined and the

amusements increased. In the 1930s the Fair grew bigger every year, with new amazing rides including Dodgems, Chair-o-planes and Wall of Death where you could climb up to the rim of a huge circular structure and watch dare-devils riding motor cycles round the vertical track! Sideshows were often weird - you could pay to stand and stare at a pig with two heads, Siamese Twins or a Bearded Lady. A great attraction was the Boxing Booth where local lads could try their luck against the resident pugilists, winning money if they stayed on their feet!

Watching the Fair being assembled was a huge joy, mainly because of the mighty traction engines that were used to haul the great waggons full of portable rides, shows and caravans from place to place. They were also used to generate the huge amount of power needed for the rides and the many lights. They gave the Fairs that very special atmosphere of steam, power and noise that people remember so much. They would be parked among the attractions and great driving belts would be run from the 'fly' wheel to the dynamo on the front of the engine to supply the power.

The Fair would arrive like a mighty train on the road and I remember waiting on Black Hill to see them coming. I would run along the pavement, keeping up with them to the pond where they invariably stopped to fill up with water. The steam and occasional tooting of the whistles all added to the excitement.

The next saga was watching these monsters with their many trailers in tow trying to negotiate the Post Office corner - a 270 degree turn! There was much backing and inching round, and shouting and swearing from the drivers and helpers as they tried to avoid damaging the adjacent properties!

My father organised one of the main car and cycle parks on the 'top' part of the Common opposite our home. Long wooden poles were used to make fence style railings to make a place to store the hundreds of cycles that would arrive. Posts and ropes were set up to mark out the car parking areas.







Cycles were charged 3d and cars 6d or 1shilling. Tickets would be pasted to vehicle or cycle tyres. The Fair was open until midnight on Fridays and Saturdays and the parking went on until after that for latecomers. My father had a group of neighbours who would help out for a small fee and my mother kept all concerned well supplied with refreshments. The income to my father was important in those difficult days in the 30s, when working class families had to do all they could to supplement their wages.

When the Fair was over we would run around watching the mass of equipment being packed away, followed by the manoeuvring of the giant engines to get the train of waggons back on the road. It had often rained and the ensuing mud on the Common made this operation all the more interesting! Great ruts and furrows were left behind where the Fair had been.

The other memorable event was, and still is, the annual Bonfire Night celebrations. Before the war the Anscombe family from Pondcroft Road would be the prime movers, preparing the flaming torches in their builder's yard and overseeing the building of the bonfire (used by villagers to get rid of an amazing amount of rubbish, including furniture and anything burnable!). Mrs Anscombe (Senior) would dress up and lead the burning parade round the village, ending up with the lighting of the bonfire and fireworks – very much like today but with far less concern for safety! It had previously been even wilder, with stories of 'tar-boys' rolling burning barrels down the High Street and young lads ripping off fences and boards around the village to feed the fire!

Regarding the pond, it was often said that to be a true 'Lindfielder' you had to have actually been IN the pond! This happened to me when I was about 8 or 9 years old on a Sunday afternoon coming home from a service at All Saints. I was trailing a stick in the water and slipped in, which frightened me considerably! I managed to scramble out – not easy as I was wearing a fairly new smart overcoat, run home and stand dripping in our

kitchen calling out to my parents who were by the fire in our 'front room' – it being Sunday!

Catching 'tiddlers' in a jam jar was a great pleasure but perhaps not for pedestrians, who had to step over many stretched out legs belonging to boys on their stomachs bent on catching the most small fish or tadpoles!

Every year in the 20s and 30s there was a spell of really hard frosty weather with below zero temperatures all day, causing the pond to freeze over for several weeks at times. As soon as it was safe, it became a heaven of sliding, skating, shouting and falling over! Older skaters would appear and waltz round so gracefully. When I was about 10 years old I was lucky enough to get a pair of ice skates and, because of years of roller skating, I soon became quite good. I also used to skate with friends at the Brighton Ice Rink.

The pond was the centre of sports and entertainment at two Royal occasions before the war - the Silver Jubilee of King George V and Queen Mary (1935) and then the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (1937). Water sports were held with races and fun events, including the famous 'Greasy Pole'. A long pole was fixed from the pavement out into the pond about two feet above the surface of the water. The pole was liberally spread with thick grease and a large hock of ham hung at the end. The idea was to walk along the pole and claim the prize. This caused huge amusement and encouraging shouts from the crowd but few ever succeeded! I remember a young man called Burtenshaw, who worked at The Laundry, getting his hands on the ham before falling in and he only had one good eye! The Vicar, Revd Sidney Swann, would row round the pond in his little boat organising events - wonderfully eccentric gentleman!

Lindfield is truly blessed with its lovely pond and wonderful 'Village Green' in the form of our Common. They were both a great part of my childhood and now, 80 years later, I often sit near both dreaming of idyllic childhood days gone by!

As I write this piece we are amid the mayhem that is pre-Christmas installs. I have decided that it is the relentless 'have your sofa before Christmas' message from DFS which is to blame, propelling so many into a festive fuelled panic to decorate. Yes, I want my house to look its best for quests but personally I would redecorate in January rather juggle it with all the other demands of the run up to Christmas. There is also the fact that new things might take a beating over the festive season. I am thinking mulled wine and similar, not that we slosh it around at home but you take my point. Talking to a friend recently who has just ordered new carpet for her house but is wisely having it fitted in January, I realised that I was not alone. So if like me you are one of those people who determines that the New Year is the time to start making plans for home improvements that do not involve knocking down walls, here are some ways you can give a room a refresh.

Consider a change of layout. This is by far the cheapest option since it only involves some muscle and an open mind. I have heard it said before that removing all the furniture from a room and then putting back only what you really need or love is the best approach. Not always logistically practical but the idea is sound and echoes the famous William Morris quote 'Have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful'.

Get painting. Paint is a relatively cost effective way of transforming a room and I would urge you not to be afraid of using colour. The orientation of the room and of course the colours you already have in it will largely define the wall colour. The best way of testing this is to paint up sheets of lining paper, stick them on all walls and see how they behave in daylight and artificial light. Colour psychology comes into play here too, as subconsciously

we all relate to certain colours in different ways. Picking the wrong colour, even if it works from an interior design perspective, can alter your mood. (More on colour perception next month.)

Change the lighting. Combining or layering light will add depth and interest to a room. It's important to combine three types of lighting: ambient or general lighting (a pendant or ceiling recessed downlights for example); task lighting (for example under cabinet lighting in a kitchen or a reading lamp); accent lighting (where the light itself focuses on an object such as a piece of art). Restaurants do this well using narrow beam width recessed spots directly over table centre pieces, lighting only that. A simple change of switch from standard to dimmer can improve general lighting, and table and floor lamps will add another layer of general light as well as some interest to a scheme. Thinking about how you use a room might prompt the addition of some task lighting, for example a lamp to read by. Accent lighting can be truly transformational; an angled, recessed spot will make a piece of wall art centre stage.

Change, or perhaps introduce, an accent colour. This can be achieved by a painted feature wall, with cushions, new shades on lamps or accessories. Some of the show homes that we design involve using furniture from a previous scheme and giving it a completely new lease of life with a new accent colour. It's important to balance accents, so look at your room from various angles and you will be able to see where the gaps in colour lie. Cushions are also a great way of adding colour and textural interest to a room. Reframing art will also give a room a refresh - a different, perhaps coloured, mount will lift a painting as would a change of frame.



Peppers with Spicy Sausage

Cut 1 red and 1 yellow pepper into thin strips, discarding pith, seeds and stem. Put into a small casserole with 1 thinly sliced small onion and 1tsp oil. Cover and cook 3 min. Stir in 1 tbs tomato purée, 2tbs dry sherry (or stock), a pinch of sugar and 1 finely chopped chorizo sausage. Cover and cook 2 min until bubbling hot. Season and serve.

Tomato and Basil

Put 1 finely chopped onion, 1 crushed garlic clove and 1 tsp oil into a casserole. Cover and cook 1 min. Stir in 200g can chopped tomatoes, 1tbs tomato purée and 1tbs chopped basil (fresh or frozen). Cover and cook for 3 min until bubbling hot. Season to taste and serve topped with grated Mozzarella cheese.

Happy New Year! I am sure, like me, many of you have been spending a lot of time in the kitchen recently. So, as a change of pace, I have gathered together some very quick, easy and adaptable recipes using that indispensible piece of kitchen equipment – the microwave. I came face to face with my first microwave when working at Good Housekeeping Magazine around 1980 – a simple metal box with just an on and off switch. How they have developed to the all-singing, all-dancing versions we have now - make full use of yours.

These very quick sauces can be spooned over a jacket potato, hot rice or tossed with pasta. They serve two generously. All cooking is on HIGH. And a couple of simple puddings.

Apple Crunch

Arrange 2 peeled, cored and sliced eating apples in a shallow dish and add a handful of sultanas and a little brown sugar (or use left-over mincemeat). Cover and cook 2 min. Crush 4 crunchy biscuits (such as shortbread or gingernuts), mix with 1tsp sugar and a pinch of cinnamon. Spread over the fruit and cook, uncovered, 1-1½ min until bubbling hot.

Chocolate Mousse

Break 100g plain chocolate into a small bowl and cook MEDIUM for 3-4 min, stirring once, until melted. Cool slightly. Whip 2 large egg whites to stiff peaks. Whip 4tbs double cream to soft peaks and stir into the chocolate. Gently combine with the egg whites and spoon into two glasses. Chill for 1 hour before eating.

After a few years, Pauline's volunteering took a different turn. "They decided to start a second hand bookshop and asked if anyone was interested in getting it off the ground. I volunteered and have been helping to run the shop every Wednesday for the past few years."

The book shop has recently become busier after relocating twice following a fire. "Visitors can browse after enjoying lovely home cooked food and cakes," said Pauline, who is also on hand to help in the restaurant.

"I'm happy to do whatever I'm asked, including extra days when the park is busy," she added. "I particularly like helping with the craft sessions for children."

Pauline's husband volunteers as part of a team compiling a database of all the trees in the gardens. "Each tree is given a unique number which you can bring up on the computer," said Pauline. "The idea is that anyone wanting to know more about a particular tree can find it. He's got a scientific mind and he loves it!"

She added that another volunteer team is nicknamed the 'slashers and burners' as its work involves cutting back and clearing scrub.

Pauline would urge anyone considering volunteering to get along to the recruitment fair to find out more.

"I work as part of a lovely team and I've met some super people who all enjoy promoting the charity to the public," said Pauline.

"Sheffield Park is an important part of our heritage and it's lovely to feel part of the team working to preserve these beautiful gardens. It's nice to feel useful and to go home feeling that you're helped make a difference.

"It's a commitment – you can't just turn up when you feel like it, but it's great to feel you've doing something worthwhile."

Neighbourhood Plan Referendum

Following the recent further public consultation into the content of our Neighbourhood Plan and having reviewed the 25 responses received, Mid Sussex District Council (MSDC) Cabinet decided, on Thursday 30 November 2015, that the Plan should now be put to a referendum.

The referendum will be held on Thursday 28th January 2016, for which residents should have already received their polling cards (or will do so soon). It is now for the residents of the two Parishes to decide whether the Plan should form part of the District's planning strategy until 2031.

Please play your part

The Plan to be voted on has already been published. It is basically a revised copy of the Plan submitted to MSDC by the Parish Councils of Lindfield and Lindfield Rural back in December 2014 (was it really a whole year ago?), together with a few minor changes to the wording that were recommended by the independent Examiner. It stipulates that any new housing development should be within the current built-up area boundary of Lindfield and Scaynes Hill. However, following the latest public consultation, it was accepted that this should include the new Heathwood Park development beside Gravelye Lane, since all that land has already been granted planning permission.

MSDC's website www.midsussex.gov.uk/ planning/9768.htm has all the relevant details with the referendum timetable, and a copy of the Plan is also available for viewing at each of the Parish offices.

The Steering Group will be holding Pop-in Sessions on Saturday the 16th January, in Scaynes Hill's Millennium Centre from 10am-12noon and in Lindfield's King Edward Hall Jubilee Room from 2-4pm. If you would like to refresh your memory about the Plan, find out about the whole process or remind yourself about the amount of work that was undertaken by the community during the Plan preparation, then please come along. Watch out for the publicity advertising these events.

So far, there have been four referendums for Neighbourhood Plans within the District and another two will be held on the same day. The highest turnout of voters so far has been 42%. Let us see whether we can beat that number and make the point that our communities are the ones that should (and have) decided on planning strategy within our Parishes.

It is very important that local residents exercise their vote at this referendum.

DEVELOPMENT PROPOSAL

DM/15/4457 Land to the South of Scamps Hill, Scaynes Hill Road, Lindfield Rural

Outline application for the development of land to the South of Scamps Hill, to accommodate up to 200 dwellings, a 9.54ha County Park and land for a Half Form Entry Primary School, together with associated access road, car parking, landscaping and open space.

The Parish Council will be considering its response to this important application within the Rural Parish in January.

Lindfield Rural Parish Council have called a Public Meeting at the King Edward Hall in Lindfield for 8pm on Wednesday 6th January in order for Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Parish Councillors to hear the views of the applicants and local residents before they consider their respective responses to Mid Sussex District Council.

Lindfield Rural Parish Council will then consider this application at their meeting on Monday 11th January at the King Edward Hall in Lindfield at 8pm, and Lindfield Parish Council will consider it at a special meeting of the Council at 8pm on Tuesday 12th January in the Jubilee Room at the King Edward Hall.

Full details of this important application are available on Mid Sussex District Council's website and paper copies of it can be studied at Lindfield Rural Parish Office during their normal opening hours.

WEST SUSSEX COUNTY COUNCIL STREET LIGHTING UPGRADE

Hopefully by the time this edition comes out, this upgrade will be nearing completion. As stated in previous newsletters, the Parish Council has agreed to make a contribution towards the heritage embellishment of lights in the Conservation Area and some adjacent roads in the village centre. The final cost of our contribution, £13,143, was confirmed by SSE Enterprise Lighting in November 2015 and the bill has been paid. We hope the conversion will be completed in the very near future.

LINDFIELD PARISH DIRECTORY AND YEAR BOOK

(the green diary)

The 2016 diaries have been delivered and it is hoped that they continue to be of use. It has recently been pointed out to us that the covers are not recyclable and the suggestion was made that we should have them supplied with card covers for environmental reasons. We would appreciate your views about this.

The diary is still very popular and people keep it handy for the information it contains, however the cost of printing these diaries is no longer covered by advertising income as it once was. We are very grateful to the businesses that do take out advertisements, many of which have been regular supporters of the diary for many years. There was a time when we had over 70 advertisers but now we are down to 37, so we would encourage any of you with local businesses to think about taking out an advert in the next edition.

PAVING – HIGH STREET/ LEWES ROAD CORNER

The paving at the corner of the High Street and Lewes Road has recently been relaid and extra bollards added to deter the parking of vehicles on this pavement, which had been the main cause of its deterioration. The Parish Council paid towards the laying of this paving nearly twenty years ago as part of a scheme to implement traffic calming measures and has funded the recent work with a contribution from West Sussex County Council, who arranged for the work to be done through their contractors.

RECYCLING

Did you know that the energy saved by recycling one plastic drink bottle will power a computer for twenty five minutes and that an adult fleece jacket can be made out of twenty five two litre plastic bottles?

We've been asked to help publicise MSDC's recycling collection, particularly as it seems there are still a lot of people not recycling plastic pots, tubs and trays. The following items can now be put in the recycling bin along with milk/drink bottles and bathroom/laundry bottles and tubs: food, fruit and ready meal pots, tubs and trays and plastic container lids, but NOT plastic bags and wrappers; plant pots and seed trays; polystyrene; plastic toys and furniture; small plastic bottle tops and bubble wrap. All items for the recycling bin should be clean, with no food leftovers, dry and loose (ie not in plastic bags). This book comes with recommendations from Joanne Lumley, Stephen Fry, Michael Palin, Ian Rankin and Simon Mayo; a formidable group of endorsers.

It asks the question 'What does it mean to feel truly alive?'. Matt Haig writes with humour, wit, wisdom and moving self-analysis about how his lifetime of depression and anxiety has shaped him. With one in three of the UK population suffering from depression or anxiety conditions, this account of the emotions and experiences of the author provides a vital resource for those who suffer and their relatives.

The chapters are deliberately written in a way which will enable those who are struggling with these conditions. With honesty about his experiences, Matt Haig does not give us a self-piteous narrative but one man's account which can help us understand what the human condition is.

This is an important book to read, for all of us!

New Proposal for Housing Development

Wates the developers have applied for outline planning permission for up to 200 more houses between Gravelye Lane and Scamps Hill. This scheme would cause a further loss of irreplaceable countryside and wildlife habitat. Another surge in population would put even more pressure on schools and health services that are already overstretched. Hundreds more cars would add significantly to congestion and pollution in the village. Please have your say - be sure to send your comments to Mid Sussex District Council by 15 January.

Planning and Traffic matters in 2015

We have continued to pressure the District Council and Barratt Homes about making good after 'The Limes' development. Dukes Road and Newton Road were finally resurfaced this March.

The Lindfield Preservation Society inspects all planning applications received by the District Council for proposals that could be considered unsympathetic or for work on protected trees that could harm their contribution to the village. In the last twelve months we looked at 138 applications in Lindfield Parish and 78 in the Rural Parish. We are particularly pleased to report several applications from owners for work to restore and conserve their Listed Buildings, with which Lindfield village is especially well endowed.

One the other hand, we have been very concerned about the lack of a District Plan, including recent announcements of further delays to getting one approved and the resultant open season for developers to propose destructive schemes like the ones at Birchen Fields and at Scamps Hill (mentioned above). Better news is that the Neighbourhood Plan for Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Parishes is a step nearer to acceptance, with a referendum due early in 2016.

Since our Newsletter in Lindfield Life in June, we have met with and obtained support from Haywards Heath Town Council and all nine Parish Councils, including Lindfield, for our revised Traffic Regulation Order (TRO). We also have support from two local

MPs. The TRO proposes weight limit signs in strategic locations to make HGVs remain on or outside a ring of 'Advisory Routes', already designated by East and West County Councils for this purpose, and thereby to deny them access to the roads that the County Councils have declared as unsuitable inside the ring, unless for legitimate purposes. Every Council has carefully considered the challenges and advantages of our proposals, including enforcement, preserving amenity and historic buildings, the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders, and has backed the scheme. Recently we met Highways Officers and Councillors at WSCC. We expect to formally submit the application for the TRO in the near future but not before taking legal advice to ensure, so far as it is possible, that it is successful. We are under no illusion that reaching our aim to protect Lindfield and surrounding villages will be easy. However, as John Kennedy suggested, we don't do this because it's easy.

Talks in King Edward Hall

There will be another programme of talks in the King Edward Hall in 2016, covering for example the Wealden iron industry and life on English canals. Non-members are also welcome. Please see our website (below) for details.
