

According to Carl Jung, 'Colours express the main psychic functions of a man' and the latest module in my Applied Colour Psychology course has been all about colour and personality.

I guess it's no surprise to know that colours from the same time of year have a natural affinity with each other. Additionally, there are behaviours which align with the energy of each season. So, how is each season defined? Spring is all about bright clean colours, playful and fun. Spring is youthful, forward thinking and approachable; it's apple green, daffodil yellow and sky blue. Shapes and finishes associated with this seasonal personality are circles, polka dots and sparkle. This palette lends itself to children's brands and interiors (though better for playrooms than bedrooms since the bright colours could prove overstimulating). Spring interiors are fresh and airy with big windows, high ceilings and a sense of the outdoors. Spring hues are warm and yellow based with no trace of black. The media will use the spring palette to convey fresh ideas and exciting campaigns. Add some grey to these tones and you get the more muted summer palette; think hazy summer late afternoon light and sun bleached hues. The summer personality is cool, calm, quiet and elegant with a hint of old romance. The summer shape is more oval, curved with smooth textures and unstructured patterns. Brands will use soft and flowing fonts to convey the summer personality and convey a classic, quality brand. Unlike the yellow base of spring, the summer palette has its base in blue, e.g. lavender, wisteria and old English roses. Summer interiors examples include elegant craftsman-made furniture with plenty of curves, subtle prints and the classic proportions of Georgian architecture. Autumn is warm and yellow based, a combination of the spring brights tinted with black. So we have an olive green in autumn rather than the spring apple green. Autumn is down to earth, natural and rustic. Shapes are organic and interiors feature plenty of texture. The autumn personality is used frequently for recycled and ecofriendly brands, but brands who might not have these

attributes yet wish to convey the natural and organic image will also of course adopt this colour personality. How many 'natural' snacks are there around packaged in natural brown paper yet turn out to be full of sugar and additives? The autumn interior is comfortable. furniture is solid; the rooms are cosier; a cottage is a good example of an autumn interior. I read that spring or summer personality types can only live in a low ceiling property for short periods of time since they need the high ceilings! Finally there is winter which, like summer, is a blue based palette. Contrast is strong in winter; there are no subtleties here, with bold and icy hues against black and white. Shapes most often associated with winter are bold stripes, geometrics with finishes tending to be more gloss. The winter personality is bold and compelling, cool and unemotionally dramatic. Brands will use the winter personality to convey luxury and sophistication and a position of market leader. The winter interior is minimalist with splashes of bold colour. A winter scheme will typically have one or two key pieces to create the drama and absolutely no clutter. It is the most common interior style in the western world and is seen as aspirational.

Research shows that we are all drawn to a certain season but we may prefer styles from others, this is referred to as your secondary personality. The key here to creating an interior that 'simply works' is ensuring that the palette is rooted in one season, the primary personality. It is fine to bring in other style elements from another season, e.g. shapes, but for the scheme to work the colours must sit within the same seasonal palette. We have all seen schemes that jar and I shall be perfectly honest and say that I felt that it was simply down to whether they were blue or yellow based but the seasonal palette theories do add a bit more welly to something that could otherwise be just seen as personal taste.



As they approach their Golden Wedding Anniversary and prepare to renew their marriage vows, Colin and Veronica Carter feel blessed for the years they have spent together.

"I'm a very lucky man," says Colin, who affectionately calls Veronica 'My ol' darling!'.

"Being in wheelchairs hasn't stopped us from doing anything at all," added Veronica. "We've travelled all over England, and been on the Eurostar to Brussels."

"We've never had any help. We've just got on with life and being disabled hasn't really made that much of a difference."

The couple, who venture out every day in their motorised wheelchairs, are well known in Lindfield and Haywards Heath, and are responsible for setting up the Seahorses Swimming Club, which has made a huge difference to the lives of disabled swimmers from all over Mid Sussex.

From their home in Pelham Road, Colin and Veronica recalled how their story began, and how the promise of a car parking lesson on a frosty night led to romance and 48 years of happily married life.

Colin grew up in Newick with his brother and sister, and was diagnosed with muscular dystrophy at a very early age. After leaving school he entered the construction industry, first at Wilkins Builders in Newick, then at Lewes Road Sawmills in Haywards Heath. However, as his condition progressed Colin gradually lost the use of both legs and took early retirement.

Veronica was born in Blackburn but moved with her mother to Handcross to live with her grandfather when she was just 10 months old.

"After my brother was born, my mother got a live-in position in Lindfield House, first as a domestic and then a cook," she said. "We were sent to convent schools in Littlehampton and then Arundel."

Veronica lost her right leg to cancer following an accident when she was just 14. "I knocked my leg as I was getting off the bus on my way home from school," she recalled. "It seemed to take a long time to heal and one day, when I was walking from the river back up to my school in Arundel, I had an awful job getting there. I was in a lot of pain and I knew something was wrong."

Veronica's mother took her to the doctor, but was sent home after he diagnosed growing pains. But the pain continued and Veronica's mother sought a second opinion. "The doctor sent me to straight to Brighton for a biopsy where they found a large cancerous tumour," said Veronica. "The only explanation was that the cancer started as a result of the accident – that I'd had serious bruising on the inside rather than the outside.

"I clearly remember my mother telling me that the doctors would have to remove my leg. We were on the bus home. I was very quiet for the rest of the day and I cried myself to sleep that night. But I can honestly say that from that day it has never bothered me."

The operation took place at the Royal Sussex County Hospital in Brighton. "The surgeon had to remove the leg up to my hip and I very nearly died on the operating table due the amount of time I was under anaesthetic," said Veronica.

After leaving hospital Veronica quickly learnt to walk on her prosthetic leg. "I was told I would never dance but I proved them wrong."

Following the accident the family moved to Vale Road

in Haywards Heath and, on leaving school, Veronica went to work as a nanny for the family which ran Beech Hurst restaurant and gardens in Haywards Heath. She left after being offered a job as a domestic at the former King Edward VII Memorial Eliot Hospital on Butlers Green Road.

Meanwhile, Colin's failing health saw him leave the construction industry and take a job as a telephonist at Cuckfield Hospital. "Colin was a great telephonist as he's always chatting," Veronica laughed. "People assumed that we knew each other as we drove the same invalid cars. But it wasn't until he came to work at the King Edward to cover for a sick colleague that we finally met."

Their first date was in a car park! "Colin had offered to help me improve my parking but on the day it was so frosty that we couldn't do it!" said Veronica.

"Colin always says it was love at first sight, but it took me a little longer."

But love blossomed and the pair were engaged in April 1967 and married at St Paul's Church in Haywards Heath in January 1968. Veronica was escorted down the aisle by her brother, wearing a dress borrowed from a friend. "I was going to make my own dress but my friend offered me hers which fitted perfectly, so I made the bridesmaids dresses instead!"

A self-taught and talented seamstress, Veronica has gone on to make several bridal and bridesmaid's gowns. "Colin's mum gave our marriage six months, but we've lasted longer than both his brother and sister!"

The couple set up home in St John's Road in Haywards Heath and were delighted when their son arrived in 1969. "After lan was born we decided not to have any more children as Muscular Dystrophy can be hereditary," said Veronica. "Fortunately our son and our two grandchildren, Molly and Jack, are all fine.

"In those days it was considered unusual for disabled people to have children. One day I picked up the Daily Sketch and read a story about a couple who had become parents and one of them was disabled. I thought to myself, we've got a much better story – we're both disabled. I got in touch and they came to interview us."

The family moved to Luxford Road in 1970 and then to a flat in Pelham Road where they have lived for the past 30 years. "We've always been very independent and up until recently have never needed any help," said Veronica.

Swimming has always played a big part in their lives. "We used to swim at the King Alfred in Hove but I found that salt water affected my skin," said Veronica. "There were no disabled swimming groups in Mid Sussex so we decided to start our own!"

The couple set up the Seahorses at the Dolphin Leisure Centre in 1980. "We registered as a charity and started raising funds for a minibus to get swimmers to and from the pool." This included Colin completing a five mile sponsored swim.

The club's second minibus was bought with a lottery grant of £22,500. "That minibus has now reached the end of its life and we are currently fundraising for a third," said Veronica.

She added that the club now has around 25 regular swimmers and helpers, swimming every Tuesday and competing in galas and competitions. New members are



always welcome. "I'm still the chairperson, Colin is the treasurer and we run the club with swim manager Alan Crook who has been with us for 25 years."

One of Colin's main roles is counting and recording lengths. "Disabled swimmers count up the lengths over the weeks to gain their distance badges," Veronica explained. Colin has swum 750 miles over the years and has the trophy to prove it!

The club has always entered a team for the Lions Club Swimarathon and Colin and Veronica were at the poolside once again at this year's event on Good Friday.

Away from the pool, Colin enjoys playing short mat indoor bowls while Veronica is keen on knitting and crochet. The couple also enjoy getting out and about on their motorised wheelchairs.

"We go out every day, rain or shine," said Veronica.
"We never bother about the weather as we have all our
wet weather gear! We go all around Haywards Heath as
the chairs can go 10 or 15 miles on one charge, and every
Sunday we come into the village for lunch at the Red Lion."

She added that they have also travelled by train to Bath, Winchester, Edinburgh, York, Birmingham and on the Eurostar to Brussels. "Our next trip is to Hungerford for my birthday.

"We feel very lucky to have our chairs as we can get anywhere we like," added Veronica. But the journeys haven't always been plain sailing. "We did have one memorable journey when we were accompanied by a police escort!"

"One winter's night we were coming back from the Dolphin Centre when we found we couldn't get up on the pavement as it was too slippery. We had no option but to go on the road," she recalled. "We were coming up the hill by the Burrell when we were spotted by the police. They waited for us and escorted us all the way home complete with flashing lights, but fortunately no sirens!"

The couple are currently busy making plans for their Golden Wedding in 18 months' time, "We'll be renewing our vows and celebrating with family and friends at the Birch Hotel," said Veronica, who is having a dress specially made for the occasion.

"I borrowed my wedding dress so this is my chance to have a new one!" she laughed. "We are looking forward to celebrating our very happy life together and everything we have achieved."

Rhubarb and Almond Crumble with Ginger Cream

Serves 4

Preheat the oven 180C. Top and tail 900g young slim pink rhubarb and slice into small chunks. Put in a baking dish and sprinkle with 75g soft brown sugar and a light sprinkle of cinnamon. Rub 75g firm butter into 175g white or wholewheat flour to form a crumbly mixture. Blend in 75g soft brown sugar and 50g chopped almonds. Spoon evenly over the fruit and sprinkle a few more almonds on the top. Bake for about 40 min or until crisp and brown.

Meanwhile whip 150ml double cream (or use crème fraiché) to soft peaks then stir in a knob of preserved ginger, finely chopped, and 2tsp ginger syrup.

Rhubarb is technically a vegetable, being a member of the sorrel family. Ancient documents show it was originally being used as a drug in China and Tibet in 2,700BC and the first known European recipe dates from 1608. The 'forcing' of rhubarb, producing a more appetising and slender succulent vegetable, happened quite by accident. In 1817 some roots were covered with earth in the Chelsea Physic Gardens in London (perhaps they had been thrown on the compost heap) but, when uncovered, were found to have grown slim bright pink stems. History does not

tell us who and when it was decided rhubarb was nicer eaten as a dessert than a vegetable.

The Yorkshire Rhubarb Triangle – Wakefield, Leeds and Bradford – is registered by the EU as producing a unique regional food. Here rhubarb is grown in vast heated dark sheds where prized strains are handed down through the generations of a small number of families. The young rhubarb season – in the spring – is very short so don't miss it... and please buy homegrown rhubarb.

Rhubarb Bread and Butter Pudding – with a twist

Serves 4

Cut 3 slices bread into cubes and roughly break 100g gingersnap biscuits into small chunks. Combine with 125g quartered strawberries and 4-6 slim sticks of rhubarb, sliced. Tip into a buttered baking dish. Whisk together 2 eggs, 568ml creamy milk and 2tbs caster sugar. Strain over the fruit and leave to stand for 30 min. Place in a 170° preheated oven for about 45min or until the top is crisp and golden brown. Serve warm.

Rhubarb Fool

Serves 4

Place 450g thinly sliced young pink rhubarb in a pan with the juice of 1 orange and 75g sugar. Cook, covered, for about 10 min or until tender. Cool then buzz to a purée in a processor. Gently combine with 150ml double cream, whipped, or a carton of dairy custard. Spoon into four glasses and chill before serving.



NEW MEMBER

After following the due process, the Council has coopted Roger Pickett to fill the casual vacancy due to the resignation of Liz Hinze. Roger previously served as a member of this Council for several years and we are delighted to welcome him back. We would also like to thank Liz for her contribution to the work of the Council during her time as a Councillor and we wish her well for the future.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

As you may have seen in the last edition, the Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan successfully passed its referendum on 28th January 2016, and we hope that by the time you read this the Plan will have been formally made by Mid Sussex District Council, as we are expecting the District Council to have performed this duty at their meeting on 23rd March. At that point it will become part of the District Council's development plan and will help to shape future development in our area.

It has been a long and complex process, but to put it in context for you, nineteen Towns and Parishes in Mid Sussex have prepared or are preparing Neighbourhood Plans. Of those, six have already been formally made, and so together with Twineham and Turners Hill (who both held referendums on the same day as we and the Rural Parish did) the Lindfield and Lindfield Rural Neighbourhood Plan will finally cross the line in seventh equal place.

TRAFFIC SURVEY

You may have noticed a few traffic loops appearing in the roads and streets in Lindfield. These are at Newton Road (just east of Newton Close), then the High Street (just south of Hickmans Lane), both aimed at capturing speed and flow data, and finally one at the notorious junction of the High Street with the Lewes Road, in order to undertake a peak hour turning count between 8-9am and 5-6pm. This shows that our traffic consultant is well underway in the first phase of gathering data and evidence to help us decide on what solutions may be possible and practical to the wide range of traffic/speeding issues there are in our Parish. We hope to have the initial report in late March.

PROPOSED PUBLIC CONVENIENCES ON THE COMMON

The Parish Council has been working on a project to rebuild the public conveniences on the Common and we'll shortly be seeking your views on the proposals. Over the next two months we will be holding public exhibitions, displaying the plans, a scale model, background information and the estimated costs, and we'll be asking for feedback. If the response is positive, this will give us the mandate to move forward with an application for planning permission followed by an application to the Secretary of State for the consent required under the provisions of the Commons Act 2006. The dates and venues of the exhibitions will be published on our website and the Council's notice board in Denmans Lane and we intend to begin with a display at our Parish Meeting on 28th April.

LINDFIELD PARISH DIRECTORY AND YEAR BOOK

In our last newsletter we mentioned a suggestion made to us about using recyclable card covers instead of the usual green plastic ones. We have asked our printers to provide a sample of a durable card cover and to quote accordingly, and they have responded that for the diary to be supplied with a 350 gsm cardboard cover it would need to be 'perfect bound' (i.e. glued) which would increase the cost by £1,287 - nearly 24%. In view of the additional cost, the Finance and General Purposes Committee agreed to continue with the usual plastic cover. The diary pages are of course completely recyclable and are easily slipped out of the cover.

PAVING – HIGH STREET/LEWES ROAD CORNER

Since the paving was relaid and extra bollards installed to deter parking, which had caused the paving to deteriorate, vehicles are still being parked there. The double yellow lines on the edge of the road also apply to the adjacent pavement and vehicles known to be parked on the pavement will be reported to the parking enforcement team at Mid Sussex District Council.

Suggestions for areas in the village that might benefit from a little 'TLC' are always appreciated, particularly if you could let us know in advance to help with the planning. If there is a task you particularly want to tackle, please let us know beforehand and we'll save that job for you. Litter pickers and bags, buckets, detergent and cloths will be provided but you are asked to bring your own gloves - and wheelbarrows can be very useful for bringing back sacks full of litter. If you are aware of an area that needs sweeping and would like to take that on, please come with brushes and shovels as we don't have a supply of these.

BUDGET AND PRECEPT 2016 / 17

The Parish Council has agreed a budget of £183,580 for the financial year 2016/17 and a precept of £157,000, which is approximately 3.3% more than the precept for 2015/16. This is the first increase since 2009/10, and in real terms adds just £1.57 to the Band D equivalent.

LOCAL POLICING PROGRAMME

Changes to Neighbourhood Policing are currently in progress to address significant funding challenges. The Local Policing Programme seeks to balance a reduction in staff with the needs of the communities served by Sussex Police. There will no longer be a dedicated beat officer for each area; instead the policing in each district will be undertaken by Neighbourhood Policing Teams (NPTs) with a named person who has an understanding of the needs of the community, rather than an officer being physically present in every locality.

The role of Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) in the NPTs will change: they will be equipped with a wider range of skills and become more flexible so that they can focus on those most in need, actively contributing to reducing crime. We were disappointed to learn that PCSO Erica Baxter has been redeployed to the East Grinstead Neighbourhood Policing Team; we wish her well and convey our thanks and appreciation for her contribution to the policing in the village and her hard work seeking solutions to problems.

BUS SERVICE CHANGES

The Sussex Bus service 30 which currently operates in Lindfield and part of Haywards Heath is to be replaced from 4th April by the 28 and 29 services. The 28 will broadly cover Sainsburys, Balcombe Road, Penland Road, South Road, America Lane, PRH, Colwell Road and Vale Road. The main changes to the Lindfield service are during the day when the 29 bus route no longer includes Backwoods Lane and Appledore Gardens and it will return from Haywards Heath via Oathall Avenue, Hanbury Lane, Gravelye Lane and Lewes Road. There will only be two buses calling at the hospital, early in the morning. The timetable is available on the Sussex Bus website: www.thesussexbus.com. You can also pick up a timeable from the Parish Office.

As this is a commercial service, West Sussex County Council has no control over route and timetable changes. The Parish Council noted the revised route at the Full Council meeting on 10th March and has agreed to make representations to Sussex Bus.

MOBILE CIVIC AMENITY COLLECTIONS

The refuse freighters will be in the Tollgate car park on Sunday 15th May, between the hours of 10am and 12noon, for the collection of household and garden waste. Please note that due to current legislation they cannot accept items such as televisions, computer monitors and fluorescent tubes. These can still be taken to a civic amenity centre. Please do not leave rubbish in the absence of the refuse freighter.



Pitch it high

TEEING OFF



By James Verrall, Head Golf Professional

One shot that many golfers dread is the high shot over an obstacle like a bunker or water hazard. Whether you are worried about hitting it too hard and the ball going too far or hitting too much ground and the ball going nowhere, then read on, we are about to fix all that.

First tell yourself you can... make sure you approach this shot with lots of confidence knowing you are about to hit the ball high over whatever is in front of you.

Make sure you have enough loft on the club; a sand or lob wedge is ideal.

Grip the club lower down to get more control, and then flex your knees more so you can get under the ball. The ball should be positioned in the middle of your stance or, if you desire a really high shot, then just slightly forward of middle.

Have your stance slightly open and you are ready to go.

Begin the backswing by hinging your wrists whilst keeping everything else still. The club should feel like it goes back on a more vertical line rather than around you.

As you bring the club back to the ball, make sure you are slightly accelerating and turning your hips through the shot.

Don't slow down in fear or pull your arms away in panic, as this will cause some of the dreaded outcomes you want to avoid.

Finally, make sure that your hands have done very little as you hit the ball. Flicking is something to really avoid with this shot, so make sure your hands stay firm.

Yes, this shot is harder than your average chip and run, but follow these steps and you will start to see the ball flying high and landing softly on the green.


