

Following the initial installation, Sue organised a short training session for anyone interested previously, but now thinks it's time to do another. Run by a specialist from Sussex Heart Charity, a date has been set for Wednesday 29th April at 7pm at Masters & Son on Lewes Road.

When the little girl was taught to make pom-poms by her great-grandma she would have hardly dared to imagine that she would grow up to run her own fabric shop – but that was the dream for Caroline Packham from a very early age.

Take a stroll around Lindfield at any time of the day or evening and you'll almost certainly be passed by at least one runner!

Over the last few years, running has become increasingly popular, with our own Lindfield Village Run now a permanent fixture on the village calendar.

There are plenty of good reasons for taking up running and the benefits are huge - from getting fitter and enjoying the fresh air, to clearing the mind and setting and reaching goals. And, apart from the cost of a decent pair of running shoes, it's completely free!

While many people run for fun, some are taking their sport a step further as they train for challenging half and full marathons.

In this first of this two part feature, Claire Cooper meets three of them.

Paul Spensley

For GP Paul Spensley, distance running is a matter of practising what he preaches.

"I like to encourage my patients to get active so it's important that I set a good example too," he said.

"Running has huge benefits both physically and mentally, and can change lives," he added. "Park Runs and Couch to 5k programmes are great starting points.

"On a personal note, my job is quite a sedentary one, so I need to make sure I get out in the fresh air and exercise too!"

Paul has run regularly since his university days and was due to run his second Brighton Half Marathon on 23rd February.

"Last time I finished in 1hr 45 mins, so it would be good to beat that time," he said. "Although I have to remember that I'm now two years older!" he said.

Last spring he completed the Uckfield Triathlon. "I like to have an event on my calendar every year, to motivate me to keep up the training," said Paul, whose wife Katie, also a GP, and children Tom, Will and Eleanor will be waiting on the Brighton finish line.

"They have all taken up running and Katie completed the Brighton Half Marathon last year," added Paul.

Year 2 pupils at Lindfield Primary Academy are in the running to become the school's sportiest class, as both their teacher and teaching assistant prepare to take part in the London Landmarks Half Marathon.

Sarah Olive and Adrian Alcock, who join their pupils for daily morning runs around the playground, will both be on the starting line at the event which starts from Pall Mall on 29th March.

Teacher and PE coordinator Sarah, who ran her first Half Marathon in Brighton last year, will be raising funds for a Day Centre in Hemel Hempstead, in memory of her Nan Eve Olive, who died aged 92.

"My Nan was a wonderful inspirational woman who, despite suffering a stroke when she was just 49, led a full and active life," said Sarah. "Nothing ever phased her and she never moaned.



Attending the Day Centre meant everything to her so last year I ran the Brighton Half Marathon and raised £1,000 - enough to run dance sessions, which Nan loved, for one year." This year Sarah is hoping to raise a similar amount.

Sarah will be joined by her dad Alan, 63, who took up running after discovering that he was pre-diabetic. "Dad lost four stone, started running, and it's completely changed his life," said Sarah. Alan will be running his first half marathon and raising money for Diabetes UK.

The pair chose the London Landmarks event to fit around holidays and hospital appointments! "Dad is currently in Spain and due to have his gallbladder removed later this year, so we wanted to fit in a run before that happens," said Sarah. "The London Landmarks came at the right time and we also thought it would be an interesting route."

Ideally, Sarah would like to beat her previous time of 2hr 22 mins. "But it means more to me to cross the finishing line with dad, so we'll see how it goes," she said. "I'll probably start off quickly but dad's got much more stamina!"

Sarah takes part in regular parkruns, often joining colleague Adrian and his son Harvey. "Adrian supported me when I recently ran my 50th parkrun in Hove which was lovely," she said.

The pair also enjoy a daily 10 minutes run around the playground with the class, before settling down to lessons. "I'm passionate about encouraging children to take part in sport," added Sarah.

Teaching Assistant Adrian Alcock signed up for the London Landmarks Half Marathon, after being inspired by his 15 year old son Harvey.

"I started joining Harvey on the weekly parkrun in Clair Park, Haywards Heath (a particularly tough 5k!) about five years ago and found, to my surprise, that I really enjoyed it." said



Adrian, whose wife Katherine regularly goes along to support the pair.

Bitten by the running bug, Adrian and Harvey began exploring different routes around Sussex, even discovering runs on family holidays. "We have taken part in parkruns all over the country from Scotland to the New Forest," said Adrian. "Every October half term we get up at 4.30am to travel to Croyde Bay to begin our holiday with the 9am parkrun!"

After completing several 10k runs, including the annual Lindfield Village Run, Adrian decided it was time for a challenge. "I appreciate that I have a very comfortable and fulfilling life but believe that every now and then you need to stretch and challenge yourself," said Adrian.

"A half marathon is a huge step up from a 10k for me and I know it's going to be tough," he added. "I confess that I chose the London Landmarks Half Marathon as I'm hoping the route will be fairly flat. I worked in London, on and off, for around 38 years so at least I'll enjoy the familiar route which covers all the major city landmarks."

Adrian will be running to raise funds for the British Heart Foundation, "I thought if I'm going to put myself through this pain, I would take the opportunity to raise money for a great cause," he said. "Katherine's dad John passed away following a heart attack in March 2005, he was approaching his 59th birthday (I'm 59 now) so it's a charity we support as a family.

"The BHF funds research to beat heartbreak from heart and circulatory diseases and the things that cause them," said Adrian who has already exceeded his fundraising target of £400.

Adrian is now busy training under the watchful eye of Harvey. "Harvey is a very strong runner and has become my personal trainer, putting me through my paces and really encouraging me," said Adrian, who also keeps fit by assisting in coaching the Lindfield Under 16 football team and helping run the cross country and football clubs at Lindfield Primary Academy, where he is also a member of the Local Board.

"I haven't really set a time but, based on my 10k runs, I'd be pleased with 2hrs 15mins," said Adrian, "although my main target is just to get round injury free!"

SDC wins Drinks Award for 2020


Lindfield's own retailer South Downs Cellars has been named as the 2020 Independent Drinks Retailer of the Year by the Drinks Retailing Awards.

The aim is to support and signpost patients to the right services for them, to prevent unnecessary hospital admissions and to help them to remain independent in their own home. We work closely alongside the GPs, voluntary sector and other health and social care professionals. Patients can either have an appointment at the surgery or if they are housebound then they can be visited in their home.

These are some of the things they can help you with are: Social isolation by arranging for volunteers to visit patients at home, take them shopping or just enjoy a cup of tea and a chat; Telephoning patients after discharge from hospital following an unplanned admission to ensure patients have everything they need; Accessing help in the home, Meals on Wheels, Telealarm/Lifeline and finding care providers; Preventing falls; Dementia/Alzheimer's support as well as Carers Support and getting involved with the local community; Safety in the home including security and fire safety; and Referrals for mobility aids and home adaptions.

New heights for fundraising crew

Three colleagues from British Airways cabin crew will be reaching new heights (and descents!) when they take part in a daredevil charity event next month.

Fran Burns, Lisa Desbrulais and Morgan Nonnis, who all live in Lindfield, will be part of a team of 13 pilots and cabin crew who will abseil 1,000 ft down Table Mountain in Cape Town, South Africa.

And abseiling down the mountain is only part of the challenge - when they reach the bottom, the team will hike all the way back to the top!

The trio, who have no previous experience of abseiling, signed up for the challenge to raise money for the Dreamflight charity.

"The idea came from one of our pilots who is an ex-medic and big supporter of Dreamflight – a UK charity which sends very sick children (some terminally ill, some with disabilities) on the holiday of a lifetime to Orlando, Florida," said cabin service manager Fran.

"These children travel without their parents and are cared for 24hrs a day by volunteer doctors, nurses and physiotherapists. Last year 192 children enjoyed a Dreamflight holiday."

Fran added that, although their working days are spent flying all over the world, all three have a fear of heights!

"Being encapsulated in an aeroplane thousands of feet up in the sky is very different to being on the top of a mountain and looking over the edge," said Fran, "I'm not very good with high buildings, but it's such a special charity I'm determined to brave it."

The challenge, on 25th March, will be part of a working trip and each member of the team has covered the £90 cost of the abseil. "That way, every single penny we raise will go directly to the charity," said Fran, who also has a very personal connection with Table Mountain.



Rather than viewing pictures on display boards, visitors will be encouraged to handle the prints and even re-arrange them!


Amateur photographer and former teacher James Skillicorn explains why he has chosen this novel approach for his exhibition Land. Sea

"I also do linocut printing and some of my original linocuts and cards will be available in exchange for donations to the charity."









Can you spot The Witch Inn? The Bricklayers Arms from Hickmans Lane

In the 1700s the land to the east of Sunte Avenue was
common land mostly owned by the Manor of Ditchling.
The north-west corner, around the site of the Witch, was
however owned by the Manor of Framfield; held by the
Sackville family. By 1798 this land had been cleared and
enclosed as a farmstead known as Wigsell's Watering
occupied by a Nicholas Wisden. The name Wigsell
could be derived from a Saxon word for a cattle and
herdsman's shelter.

George Clements purchased the property in 1851, and took it out of manorial control. A year later he sold it to George and Alfred Wood, owners of the Bear Brewery, Lewes, and by 1853 the Bricklayers Arms was opened. It was built by John Beard, a bricklayer, employing ten men. Being not too distant from the railway station at Haywards Heath, by the mid-1880s it had become a popular destination during the summer for 'bean feasts', a works outing and dinner, with parties travelling from as far afield as London and Brighton. It was the venue of choice for departments of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway's engine works at Brighton, a London firm of book binders, and Reynolds builders of Brighton, among many others.

In 1898, the Bricklayers Arms was acquired by the Southdown and East Grinstead Breweries and later this brewery was purchased by Tamplin Brewery, Brighton, and in turn that became part of Watney Mann. In 1925, the Bricklayers changed its name to The Witch, reputedly the only pub with this name in England.

Another Tamplin's pub, the White Horse, was situated opposite the Pond. Like the Red Lion featured in last month's article, the sign of the White Horse had also moved twice. William Mason senior, joined two cottages in Walstead, Walstead Cottages, and obtained a licence to run the premises as a beerhouse. The first reference to a White Horse name first appeared in the Lindfield parish records in the 1830s, this was just after the passing of the Beerhouse Act 1830. This name is usually

associated with the Royal House of Hanover, as it was their crest.

In the early 1840s, the sign moved to Old Mead Cottage, now Mead Cottage, in Lewes Road, where it remained until 1851, when the sign transferred to the purpose built pub premises, built by George Mason, opposite the Pond (now Tamasha Indian Restaurant). However, it remained restricted to the sale of beer and cider only, with James Mason as the landlord. The Mason family connection continued for nearly five decades.

At a licensing hearing in 1867, it was claimed the White Horse had stabling for six horses and a three carriage coachhouse, but it transpired these were little more than coal sheds - the family also ran a coal and wood business. A full licence was not granted until 1931. Long-time landlords in the 20th century, Mr and Mrs George Cresswell, retained its character as a local pub and this continued until the White Horse 'changed with the times' becoming Tamasha a few years ago.

To the east of the village, in Snowdrop Lane,

previously Sluts Lane, stands the Snowdrop Inn. The Mid Sussex Times reporting on a licence application in the 1930s said: 'the Snowdrop had been an inn for 300 or 400 years. It was an ordinary common inn for a great number of years. Afterwards it became a beer house, with a six-day licence'. It would appear the Snowdrop's history may have been considerably embellished to impress the Justices! At the time of the Tithe Map in 1848, the property was described as a 'House and Garden' owned by the Lowdell family, owners of the Bedales estate. The first identified reference for this property being licensed was in 1872, when a licence was granted to Edward Everest for the sale of beer and cider six days a week: it had to close on Sundays. Edward Everest had a market garden and shop and appears to have extended this business by acquiring the licence.

Apparently originally called Bedale Alehouse and later Lyoth Beerhouse, it was not given the name Snowdrop until about 1907 when a Mrs Knight was the landlady. It remained an alehouse selling about 100 barrels a year, mainly to local farmworkers and those living nearby. It was not allowed to open on Sundays until the full seven day licence, mentioned earlier, was granted in the 1930s. In making the case for this licence it was claimed to be needed due to the development of Franklands Village.



Grange Farm

On the road to Ardingly stood the Borde/Board Arms, now Grange Farm; it has also been known as Crawfurd Arms and Winterton Arms, being part of the Paxhill Estate with its name changing to reflect the family ownership. This alehouse could have existed as early as 1660s or earlier, as Rev Giles Moore, Rector of Horsted Keynes wrote in his journal that he purchased beer in a farm house when travelling between Horsted Keynes and Lindfield. By the mid-1800s, the Borde Arms was becoming dilapidated and closed in 1867. George Saxby, the landlord for 40 years, was given notice to quit in 1849 and applied for his licence to be transferred to a new house built by himself, 'situated by the canal side' and 'required for those who worked on the river'. The house, today Bridge Cottage, had its own brewery, but eventually closed following The Ouse no longer being navigable.

Moving across to Scaynes Hill, The Farmers originally The Anchor - was another alehouse owned by an estate: the Bedales estate. Dating from around 1828, it is said that the name derives, not from any nautical connection, although an old ship's anchor was displayed in the front garden, but because there was an anchor point used to 'brake' horse drawn wagons when descending the nearby hill. Rev Frederick Willett, formerly the vicar of West Bromwich, inherited Bedales in 1881 making it his home.

At this time The Anchor did not have a good reputation and during the late Victorian period temperance movement was in full swing. However, Rev Willett realised working men would not embrace teetotalism but could be encouraged to reduce their alcoholic consumption if the pub ambience and serving practice were improved. When the tenancy expired Rev Willett took the premises back into his direct ownership and installed a manager as licensee. The building was repaired, a club room with games opened, a quoits ground made in the orchard and an Anchor cricket team was formed. These changes almost 'eradicated drunkenness' and Rev Willett's increased his income from a £29 rent to a profit income of £40 a year. He regarded this an improvement method that 'might be followed by any lady or gentleman owning such a property'. Shortly afterwards the Bedale estate, including The Anchor was put up for sale, and as The Farmers the pub trades to this day.

At the river end of the lane that goes from Scaynes Hill down to the Ouse, it is understood a cottage was once an alehouse known as the Miller's Arms: now long closed. Unfortunately little else is known of this establishment, if you have information, please make

A short distance further down the lane stands the Sloop Inn. This opened in 1833, originally probably as a beerhouse, and extended in 1860. Apparently, sloops were the type of boat used to carry bricks for the building of the Balcombe Viaduct. It was no doubt opened to serve boatmen, men working on the nearby wharf and agricultural workers. It remain a beerhouse for many years, but like all the other pubs became fully licensed.

A friend recently asked me what was going on in the world of Virtual Reality (VR). As a casual gamer he had heard rumours of a VR takeover in recent years. Films such as Ready Player One reminded audiences of the endless (albeit speculative!) possibilities of VR but it all seemed to have gone quiet recently.



However; a quick look into the current state of VR shows a very different picture. Most high-powered VR headsets such as the Valve Index and the Oculus Quest are actually sold out across the board despite having extortionate price tags. PlayStation VR units are owned by 5% of their install base and whilst those numbers don't exactly scream 'next big thing' that is a respectable amount largely due to a quiet resurgence for the device in both 2018 and 2019.

Although there have been some critically acclaimed successes on VR platforms, there is still a hesitancy when it comes to fully committing to VR. Despite some other exciting releases planned for 2020 my personal belief is whilst the price point remains this high it will still be a large barrier of entry for most; reserved for one off occasions with friends etc rather than an industry defining revolution.

Although my fiancée would likely encourage me to don a headset and free up the TV for some more reality shows, she certainly wouldn't encourage me to spend thousands of pounds to do it.

Two Foundation Scholarships, covering 100% of the cost of a child's independent school education for ten years, from the age of eight to 18, are available to children currently in Year 3 at state primary school.

Foundation Scholars join Cumnor House Sussex, Danehill in Year 4 (aged eight) through to Year 8 (aged 13) when they move on to one of Cumnor's sixteen independent senior school partners, where they remain until they are 18.

The scholarships are means-tested and awarded to children who excel academically and ideally show potential in art, design technology, drama, music or sport. Two places are available for children starting in Year 4 in September 2020 and applications are open now until 30th April 2020.

The selection process involves completing an 'Application & Means-Testing Financial Form', which will be reviewed by the Headmaster and Bursar.

Assuming all initial criteria are met, a full report will be requested from the child's current school and the parent/s or guardian/s invited to meet the Headmaster. Prospective Foundation Scholars are invited to attend an 'Experience Day' at Cumnor; when they will be interviewed by the Headmaster, undergo academic tests, work and play alongside their contemporaries and offered the opportunity to show their particular talent/s in art, design technology, drama, music or sport, as appropriate.

The Bursar will then visit all prospective families at home, following which the Headmaster will put forward his final recommendations for consideration and confirmation by The Cumnor Foundation Board. The aim is to offer two Foundation Scholarship places each academic year, according to the potential of applicants.

Christian Heinrich, Headmaster at Cumnor House Sussex explains: "Once they join us, each Foundation Scholar is allocated a tutor who is a member of Cumnor's teaching community; while their family is given access to a Foundation Mentor who will meet with them regularly and continue to offer support and advice during their scholarship journey."

What sets Cumnor House Sussex's Foundation Scholarships apart from others is their tenure. Successful Foundation Scholars receive access to a free education in the independent sector for ten years, from the age of eight to 18.

Heinrich continues: "Due to the relationships we have forged with senior independent schools, each Foundation Scholar will move seamlessly from completing their prep school education with us to one of our sixteen independent senior school partners, also on a 100% funded scholarship as part of that school's own bursary scheme. Places are offered subject to each child meeting their chosen senior school's entry criteria."

Current senior school partners are Ardingly College, Bedes, Benenden, Cranleigh, Eastbourne College, Hurstpierpoint College, The King's School Canterbury, Lancing, Mayfield, Radley, Roedean, St Mary's Ascot, Sevenoaks, Tonbridge, Wellington College and Worth. Work continues on securing additional senior school partners.

There are a total of seven Foundation Scholars already in place across Years 4, 5 6 and 7 at Cumnor House Sussex. The first will make their transition to senior school in September 2021, with their sights set on joining Sevenoaks.

The mother of our first Foundation Scholar comments: "Every child is talented, they just unwrap these talents at different times. Through the Foundation Scholarship, Cumnor has offered my child an astounding opportunity and environment to discover new gifts. The school's ethos of children 'Daring to be Different', and its ability to embed well being into every lesson through its unique 'iSpace Wellbeing' Curriculum Programme, has allowed my child to manoeuvre confidently through new emerging friendships and embrace a newfound interest in a wide range of different subjects."

Making everything count

This month, I am carrying on the growing theme...with an added twist....

Growing a **tree** can help the climate for many years to come. Garden centres have lots of trees for sale but growing your own is even better. Acorns are still on the ground so if you can find some on a walk or in your garden, pop them in a pot of soil (or an old yogurt pot with holes in), water them and watch them sprout and grow into a massive oak tree! Some are easier to sprout than others, so you may need a few acorns.

Growing a pineapple is fun and uses the pineapple top that would have gone in the bin. Cut the top off your pineapple and use a few wooden toothpicks to suspend it above water. Keep in a warm sunny place. Refresh the water frequently so it is just touching the base of the pineapple plant. Once roots form – in a week or so – transplant it into soil. (I am trying this at the moment... no roots yet!)

Growing tomatoes from the rinsed off seeds of your tomatoes is easy. Dry them then pop them in a pot of soil and keep warm and damp.

Time to get cooking!



Gratin of Butternut Squash and Apple (Serves 2)

Preheat oven to 200°. Cook a thinly sliced onion in a little oil until just soft but not browned. Cut a small peeled butternut squash in half, discard all the stringy bits and cut the flesh into bite-sized cubes. Peel, core and thinly slice a large Bramley apple into a bowl, add 2tbs plain flour, seasoning and 1tsp cinnamon. Add the squash and onion and gently combine. Tip evenly into a shallow greased baking dish and pour over 50ml vegetable stock. Cover and bake for 30 min. Meanwhile combine a generous handful of coarse breadcrumbs with a little oil, some grated cheese if wished and some chopped nuts or seeds. Spoon on top of the gratin and continue to bake until golden brown and soft throughout.

Tomato Dhal (Serves 4-6)

Serve with hot Basmati rice and naan bread plus minted yogurt – just whisk mint jelly into plain yogurt and season to taste.

Gently cook 1 finely chopped onion in a little oil until just soft. Add 1 crushed garlic clove, 1tbs grated fresh ginger, a pinch each of ground cumin, turmeric and chilli powder. Cook, stirring, for 2-3 min then stir in 225g red lentils, a small can of tomatoes, 375ml vegetable stock and 400ml coconut milk (canned). Bring to the boil, cover and cook over a low heat for about 40 min, stirring occasionally or until the lentils are soft and creamy. Stir in the juice of 2 limes and season to taste.

Am writing this just after checking there is nothing in the garden that will blow away when the promised dramatic Storm Ciara arrives later today. Batten down the hatches – a good time to get cooking! I am not a vegetarian but have never been a fan of red meat – I can't remember when I last roasted a joint of beef. However I do love vegetables and include them in as many dishes as I can, including desserts and baking. Have you tried adding a generous spoonful of crunchy peanut butter to your banana bread recipe? Or combining vegetables and fruit in a main dish gratin? Lentils are inexpensive and a good source of protein, complex carbohydrates,



Green Bean Stir fry (Serves 3-4)

Cook 450g green beans until just tender but still crisp. Drain and cool under cold water, then dry on a teatowel. Using a wok or large frypan, heat a can of anchovies in their oil plus 2tbs rapeseed oil, plenty of crushed garlic, a drained can of sliced water chestnuts, chopped parsley and the finely grated rind and juice of 1 unwaxed lemon. Add the beans and cook, stirring, until hot. Delicious with hot garlic bread.

Carrot and Oat Bars

Preheat oven to 170°. Oil and base line a 20cm square shallow baking tin. Measure 115a SR flour, 115a coarse porridge oats and 2 large coarsely grated carrots into a bowl. Measure 150ml black treacle, 150ml rapeseed oil and 115g demerara sugar into a saucepan. Warm over a low heat until just combined. Add to the dry ingredients plus 1 egg beaten with 4tbs milk. Briskly stir until combined. Pour into the cake tin and bake for 1 hour or until it tests cooked in the middle. Cool in the pan then, if possible, cover and allow to mature for several days. Serve cut into squares.

Jerry Bradley

VILLAGE PEOPLE

In a doctor's office at Southampton Hospital in 2009 Jerry Bradley was given the devastating news that Irene, his wife of 25 years and the love of his life, was suffering from dementia.

It was a bolt from the blue. "Irene had been unwell for some time but dementia never entered my head," he said. "We thought she was suffering with severe depression."

Driving home later that day Jerry made what was to become a life changing decision. "I vowed that I would start writing my memoirs so that if I ever became ill with dementia my memories would still be there for me."

Over the following years, while caring for Irene, Jerry completed his life story and, since her death in 2015, has gone on to publish two novels to raise money for Dementia UK. He is currently writing a third.

Now living in Lindfield with daughter Hannah and son in law Pete, Jerry recalls his journey from racing car mechanic, market trader and locksmith to full time carer, and describes how his newly discovered passion for writing and raising awareness of dementia brought him back to life.

Jerry was born in London, the middle child of three boys. "When I was about three we moved to live on a barge on the Thames," he said, "It was a strange decision as none of us could swim and we spent most of the time wearing life jackets!

"My dad was a draughtsmen and part-time trumpet player and did various jobs," added Jerry, whose life changed when the family settled in Elstead. "We moved into this lovely old school house and had a garden for the first time. It was an amazing village - a lot like Lindfield."

A year later Jerry's father was tragically killed in a car accident and his mother worked hard to keep the family together. "Mum had won a scholarship for the Royal Academy of Music and was a talented concert pianist, but gave it all up to look after us."

Jerry left school with a handful of CSEs. "I wasn't academic and my spelling was atrocious," he said. "I'm naturally left handed but teachers insisted that I used my right hand. I spent hours practising writing but it didn't come easy."

At 16, Jerry landed a job in the glamorous world of motor racing. "I was an apprentice mechanic working on saloon cars and later rally cars," he recalled. "It was an exciting time as Formula One was extremely popular. We would work on the cars during the week and then go to Silverstone and Brands Hatch at the weekend to race.

"Our driver was Colin Vandervell and I can remember standing with him on the grid at Silverstone in front of thousands of cheering fans!"

After completing his apprenticeship, the garage was taken over, the racing track visits stopped, and Jerry turned his hand to bricklaying.

"I met a guy in a pub who asked if I wanted to work abroad," said Jerry. "The money was good so I jumped at the chance!" Jerry spent time working in Antwerp, Eindhoven and Dusseldorf, where he was part of the team which built the railway station. "It was just like Auf Wiedersehen, Pet," he laughed. "We were earning good money and living the high life."

After 18 months, Jerry returned to Surrey to train as locksmith. "I found the job boring, but it's how I met the love of my life," he said. "I fitted some locks at Irene's house, we got chatting, I asked her on a date and two months later we got engaged."

After getting married, and the arrival of daughter Hannah exactly one year later, Jerry began to look for new ways to earn extra cash. "I began buying and selling watches on market stalls and found I was very good at it!" he said. "I didn't want to sell rubbish – my watches were genuine Seiko, but I could sell them for half the price of the shops."

Jerry soon went from weekend market trading to seven days a week – thanks to inspiration from the Royal Family!

"At the time Sarah Ferguson (former wife of Prince Andrew) had been photographed wearing a huge bow on the back of her hair," said Jerry. "I has some on my stall and they sold out in about 15 minutes." Sensing an opportunity, Jerry quickly tracked down suppliers of ribbon and hair clips.

"I phoned my mum, who fortunately knew how to make bows and Irene and I set to work.

Before we knew it we had a cottage industry making Fergie bows! We made thousands of them," said Jerry who went on to supply several major London stores.

Jenny continued market trading for around 20 years, travelling all around the South. "I loved every moment of it." he said.

He eventually returned to being a locksmith as he and Irene dreamt of retiring to a bungalow by the sea. "But that all changed when Irene became ill," Jerry recalled. "She began to get more and more withdrawn. The doctor prescribed anti-depressants, but they didn't help."

When Irene began to decline rapidly, doctors carried out more tests.

"By this time Irene was a shadow of her former self, had terrible mood swings and could barely speak," said Jerry. "But all the tests came back negative.

"Irene got it into her head that she would be happy if we moved, so we re-located to Wiltshire," Jerry added. "In hindsight it was the worst thing we could have done as nothing was familiar to her.

"She was eventually admitted to Southampton Hospital where she had every test going. Six weeks later doctors diagnosed dementia.

"Irene didn't really understand what they were saying but I was in shock, particularly when the doctor said there was nothing we could do," he recalled. "Of course I now know that there is lots that can be done, even in the later stages of the illness.

Life changed dramatically. "We returned to Elstead and I got a job as a welder close to home so I could spend lunchtimes with Irene," said Jerry. As her conditioned worsened he became her full time carer. "I was the only one who really knew her and, of course, I loved her," he said.

Life wasn't easy, as Irene's mood swings worsened making her aggressive "I had to think of little ways to make her happy," Jerry recalled. "Every morning I would give her a present wrapped up and wish her a Happy Birthday. It didn't matter what was in it – having a birthday made her happy. I must have given her the same watch about 500 times!

"We would then visit our local café where the owner, who had got to know Irene, would put a little candle on her slice of cake!"

Irene passed away on 1st February 2015. She was 63. Jerry was devastated. "I hid myself away for around six months but then, out of the blue, I got a call from an alzheimer's charity asking if I was interested in giving a talk about caring for Irene.

"It was far too soon, but it made me realise that I had to do something positive in Irene's memory," he said.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I think this would happen to us, and I desperately wanted to help other families going through the same thing."

Remembering how he would sit and write his memoirs while Irene slept, Jerry picked up his pen. "It was like a light being switched on," he said. "I wrote a story for a friend's 40th birthday and she loved it."

Jerry was inspired. "I told everyone I was going to write a book to raise money for Dementia UK."


His first book, The Candy Man, a 'gritty adult insight into the underbelly of drugs, addiction, crime and gangs', was published last year and has already raised over £2,500 for Dementia UK.

His second book, Unfinished Business, was launched last month at the Institute of Directors in London. "It's a gentle story, very different from The Candy Man, about someone being given a second chance," said Jerry who is now working on his third book Bermondsey Boys.

Once again proceeds from sales will go to Dementia UK.

"Ironically, dementia is a forgotten illness, but there's so much that can be done to prevent and manage the condition," said Jerry. "Raising money though my books is my way of raising awareness, supporting people thought the tsunami that is dementia, and giving carers a big hug!"

HHGC housing update

Mid Sussex building developer Fairfax has issued new information ahead of a 'forthcoming Planning Application' for the site of Haywards Heath Golf Club.

In the public consultation document which has been distributed to existing homes in the area, the land developer describes the site as holding up to 725 homes, including up to 218 'affordable homes'.

Among the 'benefits to Haywards Heath' listed on the flyer are: Safety improvements to existing roads, improvements in flood risk and surface water drainage, new public open spaces (previously private land) and a new community hub for retail, services and other amenities (which could include health centres).

Under the new developement it is claimed that 'approximately a third of the land [of Haywards Heath Golf Course] will remain undeveloped leaving a substantial amount of green infrastructure and open space'.

Growing up in Mid Sussex in the 1960s and 1970s presented a simple view of mortgages. Homeowners invariably took them out in their twenties, paid them off over about 25 years and never borrowed again. Those days are largely over. With low interest rates, house price inflation enabling remortgaging and the



provision of interest only mortgages, many homeowners are borrowing into retirement.

A common reason for that is when remortgaging 'interest only' mortgages. The investment strategies intended to repay those have often proven unsuccessful or were abandoned, so many borrowers are finding themselves with their mortgages ending but without the money to pay them off.

Downsizing may be a solution. A smaller property may be acceptable, if there is sufficient equity available. Moving home is not always best, though. People have emotional attachment to their homes and moving has associated costs, not just logistics but estate agents' commissions, conveyancers' fees and stamp duty on the new property.

Thankfully the financial services sector has responded and there are now options for over 55s (even over 50s in some cases) to take out mortgages into retirement, even for life. The term is 'later life lending', an unpopular term with the author, who is in that age group and still considers himself youthful.

Later life lending comprises term mortgages, Retirement Interest Only mortgages (RIOs) and lifetime mortgages.

Term mortgages, like traditional mortgages, have a set duration. They can be repayment or interest only, usually the latter. They require affordability, with income throughout the term being considered. For terms extending beyond retirement, pension income is assessed. For joint mortgages, independent affordability must be demonstrated after a certain age, for example the ability to transfer pension benefits to a spouse

after death, or life cover. If the repayment method is interest only there must be a repayment strategy, often downsizing, although sale of holiday homes or investment properties are other possibilities.

Alternatively, an RIO might be the solution. These are interest only mortgages which last until the borrower (or last borrower for joint mortgages) dies or goes into permanent care. They require affordability but need no repayment strategy. Currently up to 70% of the property's value can be borrowed.

Finally, there are lifetime mortgages, otherwise known as equity release. Like RIOs, they last for a lifetime or until going into permanent care. Affordability is not required. Maximum borrowing depends on the younger borrower's age and the value of the property. The older the borrower, the more that can be borrowed, currently to a maximum of 58% of the value of the property. Possible features include rates fixed for life, voluntary payments, quaranteed minimum remaining equity and downsizing protection (escaping early repayment charges on moving, typically after five years). Lifetime mortgages are appropriate if no other option is feasible or desired. Monthly payments are optional - otherwise the interest rolls up and equity decreases. Products with a 'no negative equity' guarantee are recommended.

The mortgage products above can also be used to raise capital on an existing property or purchase a new one.

The later life lending market is complex; the above is a simplified overview. Specialist lenders are usually required and, with many criteria to be considered, care must be taken in selecting a product - the use of a qualified mortgage adviser is highly recommended and sometimes required by the lender.



Men: It's good to talk...

March is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month. Organised by Prostate Cancer UK, this special month aims to raise awareness of prostate cancer, as well as raise money so the charity can provide even better support to both sufferers and their families.

Simon Woodhams, part of West Sussex Urology group, is urging men to get to know their prostate. The prostate (found only in men), is located below just the bladder and produces some of the fluid in semen. The prostate fluid protects sperm during intercourse. While the prostate often enlarges as men get older, for many men it doesn't cause any problems.

Sadly 10,000 men die from prostate cancer each year. It is most common in older men with the majority of newly diagnosed men in their 70s to 80s.

The common symptoms of prostatic enlargement are reduced urine flow, increased number of day and night voids, urgency, hesitancy at the start and a persistent dribble towards the end of urine flow.

Simon Woodhams, Consultant Urologist explains: "Not wanting to talk about issues 'down there' is a common problem for lots of men. But it's definitely worth doing so if you are at all worried."



A very full life for David

1934-2019

In November last year, family and friends from around the world gathered at All Saints Church to celebrate the life of former teacher and Lindfield resident David Sutcliffe.



Throughout his 45 year teaching career David helped change the face of education across the world, founding three United World Colleges in Wales, Italy and Bosnia, and launching the International

A proficient sailor, he also completed the Observer Single-Handed Trans-Atlantic Race, while reading the Complete Works of Shakespeare and Tolstoy's War and Peace! We are pleased to bring you his story:

Baccalaureate.

Born in 1934 and son of a Guernsey doctor, David spent the war years in England while Guernsey was under German occupation, although his father remained to provide medical services to the community.

Returning after the war, David had recalled: 'Like many others of my age, I can only be grateful to my parents who allowed me, without reservation, to cycle all over the Island of Guernsey at the age of eleven and twelve with a powerful air rifle strapped to my back, to canoe on the open sea, to climb the cliffs for bird-nesting, to clamber out to rocks at low tide, remain there all day and return in the evening when the tide had again fallen with our catch.'

David left Guernsey to attend Sedbergh, a boarding school in the north of England, and went on to gain a degree in Modern Languages at Cambridge University, where he excelled at rugby.

He then taught for four years at Salem, the school in Baden-Württemberg, Germany, where he met his wife Elisabeth before spending a year at Gordonstoun in Scotland (where former pupils include Prince Charles.)

In 1962, David became a member of the founding staff at Atlantic College where he taught German - but that was only a small part of his life at the College. Under the leadership of headmaster Rear-Admiral Desmond Hoare, the College was actively developing sea-rescue services. David led the Canoe Lifeguard Unit, initially separate from, but working with, the Beach Lifeguards before the two merged into the Surf Lifesaving Unit.

He quickly became a proficient surf canoeist, later

taking over the Inshore Lifeboat Station, was also a housemaster and then Director of Studies, taking part in early discussions about an ambitious new curriculum which later became the International Baccalaureate.

In 1969, David succeeded Desmond Hoare and became Headmaster.

By that time, the College had already gained a reputation for radical pioneering educational initiatives and David's innovations included setting up a summer school for inner city students and the restoration of the Cavalry Barracks which became a centre for the Youth Training Scheme for unemployed young people.

He also developed an Arts Centre for the local community and led a group of staff and students to work throughout the night after the disaster at Aberfan in the Welsh valleys.

David was vigorous in his support of the International Baccalaureate, encouraging teachers to help develop new syllabuses, such as Peace Studies. By 1973 more than half of IB Diploma candidates in the world were from Atlantic College.

David's active support of the IB continued in his later roles during the 1990's as Vice President of the Council of Foundation and Deputy Chair of the Executive Committee.

In 1982 David left Atlantic College to become the founding Rettore (Head) of the United World College (UWC) of the Adriatic in Duino, near Trieste, Italy. He was proud that, during his time, virtually all students were offered places on full scholarships, largely financed by the Italian authorities.

David travelled widely in the Balkans on behalf of the Adriatic College, and the Yugoslav wars of the early 1990's (during which he had been a keen supporter of student work in refugee camps in Slovenia and Croatia) made a big impression on him.

In his 2000 speech in Prague, marking the annual opening of the Adriatic College he said: "It must become our joint task to take international education not to where it can be afforded, but to where it is really and urgently needed."

In 2001, after his retirement, and with support from Pilvi Torsti (now State Secretary in Finland) and Antonin Besse (who had previously bought St. Donat's Castle for Atlantic College and had been instrumental in setting up the Adriatic College) David set about establishing a new kind of UWC in Bosnia & Herzegovina.

His plan was to introduce international quality education to support the educational reform in Bosnia & Herzegovina, which had suffered immensely during the Balkan war of the 1990s, and to set up a major teacher training programme.

Under David's leadership, the UWC in Mostar opened in 2006 - the only school at that time where Bosniaks, Serbs and Croats shared a classroom. It has continued to thrive, with students from each of the three main groups in Bosnia and many international students.

David had a strong sense of adventure. In the early 1970s he bought a Contessa 26 yacht, called Lady Anne of St. Donat's and began taking family, colleagues, and students on increasingly long voyages.

In 1976, he entered the Observer Single-Handed Trans-Atlantic Race.

Despite unusually ferocious weather, leading to two fatalities and 47 yachts out of 125 starters having to be rescued or retire, David crossed the finish line in Newport, Rhode Island, 44 days after setting offreading all of Shakespeare's plays, Tolstoy's War and Peace, and many more great works along the way!

He also had a subtle sense of humour, and when asked to give a formal speech, he would sometimes begin with: 'The three most difficult things are to climb a fence that is leaning towards you, kiss a girl who is leaning away from you, and say something original about international education'.

David was a family man and devoted husband, married for 58 years to Elisabeth, father to Michael, Veronica and Edward, who sadly died in 1993, and grandfather to Rebecca, Felix, James and Andrew.

He was also a prolific writer and one of his last pieces of writing was a history of Elisabeth's distinguished German family.



After retiring in 2001 as Head of the Adriatic College in Italy, David and Elisabeth decided to retire to Sussex to be near their daughter Veronica and her family who live in Brighton. He and Elisabeth fell in love with Lindfield, particularly its pond and High Street, and they enjoyed walking on the Common and surrounding countryside. He became an Assistant Warden of All Saints Church, loved the village life and the friendly people and was also an avid reader of Lindfield Life. Elisabeth still lives in Lindfield.

Since his death from prostate cancer on 11th November last year, hundreds of former students have joined Facebook pages recording their memories of David, many telling how he changed their lives.





Chairman's Update

As newly elected Chairman I would firstly like to pay tribute and to give our grateful thanks to Councillor John Dumbleton who, after 21 years as Chairman, recently decided to step down. To serve as the Chair for that length of time shows great commitment to the local community and we are pleased to say that John will be staving on in his Councillor role.

Along with the Vice Chair Sol Mead, the Clerk to the Council Santi Gil, our Responsible Finance Officer Sarah Anderson and the other Councillors we are taking this opportunity, at the start of a new decade, to review and refresh the workings of the parish council and to modernise how we interact with you the community.

As part of our new business plan we have already launched our Facebook page and we have plans to create a new community friendly parish website that is as interactive as possible.

We are, however, very aware that we cannot complete all that we want to achieve without reaching out to and getting help from the wider community.

We have already started to implement an improvement plan for the Walstead Burial Ground that includes repairs to the old chapel, the better management of trees and the continued identification of historical graves. We are very aware that we are the custodians of an historical location and as such we need to be sensitive to the site when contemplating any work.

In the very near future we will also be looking out for people to contribute with ideas for improvements to Anchor Pond in Scaynes Hill. Our initial view is that this could be improved to make it a more attractive place to visit, again within the boundaries of what is appropriate.

If you are a resident, local organisation or business, we very much welcome your views on our plan.

Another important part of the role of the Parish Council, is to reflect and represent your views and this is none more apparent, than by the number of emails we receive concerning the developer's actions at High Beech Lane and the Haywards Golf Club.

Despite seemingly not fully complying with the MSDC conditions before work could start at High Beech Lane, developers appear to be going ahead regardless. At Haywards Heath Golf Club the site was not designated as a site for development by MSDC however a developer has started consultation for 750 new homes on the golf course and I understand that a planning application could be imminent.

I fully appreciate that these are very worrying times for the residents concerned and the impact that it could have on the local area. At the Parish Council we remain committed to lobby and reflect your views when and wherever we can.

Lastly a note for your diary: Our Parish Meeting is to be held on the Monday 27th April at St. Augustine's Church, Scaynes Hill starting at 7.30pm.

It will be a fantastic opportunity for you to come along and meet your local Parish Councillor, to find out what we have planned and maybe for you to get involved?

The Council has recently voted to purchase three commemorative benches to celebrate the 75th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day (VE Day), the end of WW2. This anniversary has been made an official Bank Holiday and takes place on the Friday 8th May. We are willing to listen to any suggestions on where these could be placed. Please see a photograph of the bench (they are all identical) below.



The defibrillator is now fully operational, this is on the outside wall of the Esso service station in Scaynes Hill and is available 24/7. It is in a large yellow box on the wall by the entrance door to the shop. All instructions are clearly



marked on the unit itself. South East Coast Ambulance Service (SECAmb) have all of the details for this location, including access code. There is another defibrillator located in the Millennium Village Hall, but this is not accessible all the time.

The Chapel at Walstead Burial Ground is in the process of having both porches refurbished, to keep this beautiful building lasting many more years. You can see the photographs overleaf, or on our Facebook page. We are also in the process of replacing a large wooden cross in the Memorial garden at WBG, this was damaged beyond repair in a storm last year.

The Councillors have agreed to fund further Household and Green Waste Freighters this financial year. That is one Household and one Green freighter, on four occasions throughout the year (providing our service provider can meet these provisions). As always, they will be located at the Millennium Hall car park.



go to the charity shops marked 'rags' for which they get money!


In November 2018, the sustainability group arranged a trip to the black bin recycling plant in Horsham. We all learnt so much about what happens to our black bin contents.






