Residents **Chris Lee** and **Peter Desmond** are championing the village to become Fairtrade accredited – read the plans on **page 27**. What a great idea!

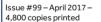
With Easter coming up at the end of April, **four local churches** take the centre spread to promote all that's going on this month.

Good news for bus users

A small group of bus users from the village have been talking to local bus operator Compass Travel about services which have been reduced in the area.

But they have recently had great news for Lindfield residents. From 24th April, the Compass number 30 service will resume with an off peak service along Backwoods Lane and Appledore Gardens.

The company has also stated that the number 31 service will be operating via West Common and both services will continue to go to Sainsbury's supermarket.

Lindfield Garden Trail coming

In 2016 more than 300 people visited the garden at 47 Denmans Lane and over £2,200 was raised in aid of St Peter and St James' Hospice.

For 2017 several other gardens have joined in this community event and so far six garden owners have agreed to open their gardens during the afternoon of Sunday 11th June. The gardens vary and reflect the interests of the owners and range from a small garden with a design inspired by a snail shell, an exotic garden and a garden with an emphasis on leaf shapes and colours to more formal gardens. Both of Lindfield's Primary schools tasted success at the recent Mid-Sussex hockey finals at East Grinstead Hockey Club. Having successfully qualified from the Haywards Heath/Burgess Hill event in February, both Lindfield and Blackthorn's Years 5 and 6 went into the tournament with high hopes of victory and a place in the county final.

Blackthorns - who won last year's competition managed to win three of their five matches, including impressive wins over Halsford Park (East Grinstead), and finished the event as bronze medalists. Lindfield. however, completed the tournament with a 100% record, including a 2-1 win in the 'Lindfield Derby' and a very tight 1-0 win over local rivals Harlands. For the past five years 11 year old local resident Tasha Lawrence has played the voice of Sarah in 'Sarah and Duck', a popular cartoon series on the BBC children's channel CBeebies. Tasha spends an afternoon every few weeks at a recording studio in London, helping to bring Sarah to life. It's generally a three-hour session recording three different episodes, and then the drawing is done to fit the character to her voice and the way she speaks her lines. (For those of you interested, sometimes with cartoons the process is the other way around.) The character of Sarah is only seven years old so, as she's got older, Tasha has had to remember to keep to the same, younger voice as her own changes slightly! Kate Mactear took up sailing at six years old, and when she eventually raced at the Cowes Week Regatta she felt she had accomplished her dream.

But there were much bigger successes in store for Kate when she swapped her boat for a bike and began triathlon training.

Last year, Kate represented Great Britain in the European Triathlon Championships, winning a surprise silver medal.

Now with her sights set firmly on this year's championships, and a possible entry into the World Championships Kate explains how she came to take up one of the most gruelling sporting challenges and how coming back home to Lindfield is vital to her training regime.

Kate Mactear was born in Canada but moved to England when she was five years old. "My dad's job brought us back to England," Kate explained. "We needed to live near to Gatwick and my parents were considering Haywards Heath but discovered Lindfield and fell in love with the village.

"We moved into Dukes Road and my parents are still there!" $% \label{eq:continuous} % \label{eq:conti$

Kate and her younger sister attended Lindfield Primary School before moving on to Burgess Hill School for Girls. "I loved school," said Kate. "I was always sporty and was a good runner but was never particularly good at team sports."

The first sport Kate fell in love with was sailing. "My dad was a keen sailor, and my sister and I would go sailing with him from a very early age. It wasn't long before I caught the sailing bug!"

Kate learned to sail at Ardingly Reservoir when she was around six years old. "I started sailing on Optimists - tiny little boats which look rather like bath tubs!" Kate recalled

"I got my first boat, a Topper, when I was 11." Kate

went on to join Sussex Yacht Club based at Shoreham and began to sail competitively, racing small keel boats.

"When I was 13 I really started getting into it," said Kate. "I was a fairly average sailor, coming in the middle of the pack most of the time, but I just loved it!"

But Kate's passion and commitment to sailing were rewarded when she was selected for the 1st Youth Team to compete at the Cowes Week Regatta.

"We sailed as a team of five, and I was at the helm steering the boat," said Kate. "It sounds important but it's really just a matter of doing as you are told!

"It was great fun and I was really happy to fulfil my dad's dream!" said Kate, who also qualified as a sailing instructor, teaching at Ardingly.

Kate stopped racing when she was 17, devoting her time to her A level studies. "When I reached the sixth form, driving back and forth to Shoreham to sail while trying to study for my A levels just wasn't practical, so the sailing had to take a back seat."

However, needing a new outlet, Kate had already begun to get interested in triathlons after her sailing coach encouraged her to give it a go.

She completed her first triathlon, a beginners super sprint race, when she was just 16. "I did it in a very amateurish way, riding my mountain bike and wearing a T-shirt and cycling shorts," said Kate. "I just wanted to complete it, but I was the only girl competing in the under 16 category, so I won!" It was a great way for Kate to start her triathlon career!

"Triathlon tends to be a sport for older athletes," explained Kate. "You don't find many teenagers doing it – particularly girls!"

After passing her A levels Kate took a gap year, travelling to Nepal with her friend Joanna Storer.

"I also volunteered at the 2012 Olympic sailing events at Weymouth, which suited me perfectly!" said Kate. "I was lucky enough to be there watching from the shore on the day Ben Ainslie won his medal!"

Kate also worked a ski season before going to Bristol

University to study engineering.

And it wasn't long before Kate had joined the University's Triathlon Club. "In the aftermath of the Olympics, cycling was becoming extremely popular and there was increasing interest in triathlons.

"People had seen the Brownlee brothers in action and the sport just took off." $% \label{eq:continuous}$

Kate, who had also joined Mid Sussex Triathlon Club along with her dad, swapped her mountain bike for a proper triathlete's road bike and embarked on a new training regime.

"The Mid Sussex Club is brilliant and caters for everyone from complete beginners to world class athletes," said Kate." Every time I come home to Lindfield I love going back to the club."

Kate explained that triathlons are split into four distances: the Sprint – a 750m swim, 25km cycle ride and 5km run; Olympic – 1,500m swim, 40km cycle ride and 10km run; Middle – 1,900m swim, 90km cycle ride and 21km run; and Iron Man – 3.8km swim, 180km cycle ride and 42km run.

Kate competed in her first 'proper' race last summer – the European middle distance championships in Walchsee in Austria. "I had qualified the

previous summer and this was my first and only international race," said Kate.

"I was only going for the experience and hoping to finish somewhere in the middle of the pack."

Kate finished just seconds under five hours, but with competitors starting at five second intervals there's no way of immediately knowing where they have finished.

Pleased with her time, Kate got showered, changed and returned for the medal ceremony but was surprised and delighted to find she had finished second in her age group (under 25) and had won a silver medal!

"It was wonderful to represent my country and be part of the Great Britain team and actually come home with a medal," said Kate. "My parents had travelled to Austria to watch me and were shocked, surprised and very proud!"

Fellow members of the Mid Sussex Club were also delighted and are excited about Kate's future.

"This will be my last year competing in the under 25 age group, so I'd like to give the Olympic distance a try," said Kate. "When I move up to the next age group it will get much more competitive. I'll be up against much stronger athletes as triathletes tend to get better as they get older."

Her next race - this year's European Championships - takes place in Kitzbuhel in Austria in June.

"I'm also hoping to qualify for the World Championships," Kate added. "There's a qualifying event in Arundel in July and I'll need to finish in the top four in my age group."

Kate is currently living in Bristol and working for BAE Systems, as part of a two year Graduate Scheme, but still finds time to train six days a week. "It's often difficult to fit in the training but I train in the morning before work, swim at lunchtime and go for a run in the evening,"



she said. "I also cycle to work and go for longer bike rides at the weekends.

"Bristol is a very sporty city with lots of cyclists and I'm lucky that the council has a scheme for international athletes where we are given free gym membership and swimming.

"When I come home to Lindfield I keep up my training with the Mid Sussex Club. I also find Sussex very calming and relaxing which also helps me to focus."

Kate's training regime also includes marathon running. She completed the Brighton Marathon last year in 3.22 hours but describes it as 'the most painful thing I've ever done!'.

Kate will be on the starting line for the London Marathon on 23rd April when she hopes to improve her time.

As an amateur athlete, Kate has to cover the cost of training and competing herself. "My bike cost £2,000 and I need a new pair of £100 running shoes at least every six months. Then there's travel and accommodation costs and entry fees," said Kate.

"It's more expensive than I thought but it's still cheaper than sailing!"

Last year she was sponsored by Enterprise Learning in Haywards Heath and she'd be delighted to hear from any local businesses who would be willing to help her progress to her second European championships and beyond.

"Triathlons are very addictive," said Kate. "So many people start by aiming to complete one event but end up wanting to improve their time and challenge themselves with longer races.

"I haven't ruled out moving to the elite (Olympic) race but it's a totally different way of racing," Kate explained. "It's very tactical as you're racing as part of a team and all working together. Not many people realise that the Brownlee brothers have a third team member, who blocks the opposition and paves the way for the other two runners.

"I'd also love to do an Iron Man race at some point."
Kate has one piece of advice for potential triathletes
- join a club. "There's no way I would have got as far as
I have if I hadn't joined the Mid Sussex Triathlon Club,"
said Kate. "The moral support I have had from such a
lovely group of people has made all the difference."

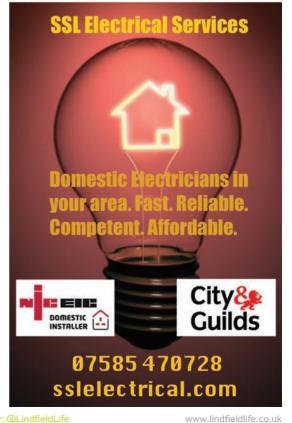
Everything will be supplied but you are encouraged to start saving your old toys

Members of Lindfield Evening WI were proud to take up the challenge to show the love this month.

At our meeting, we carried out an activity to sew pretty green fabric hearts and decorate paper hearts with wording and symbols to signify what matters most to us that we could lose if climate change is not reversed (to make this an inclusive activity for members who are visually impaired or have limited needle skills).

Our hearts were displayed on the silver birch tree planted by members of Lindfield WI in Tollgate Car Park in 1972. This was our contribution towards the WI's work as a founder member of the Climate Change Coalition, which is the UK's largest group of people committed to take action to limit the threat of climate change.

Why does climate change matter?

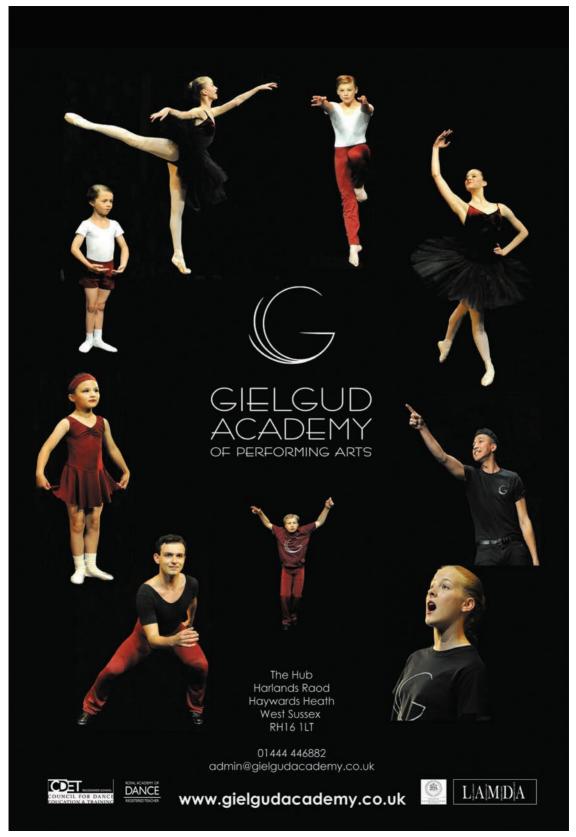

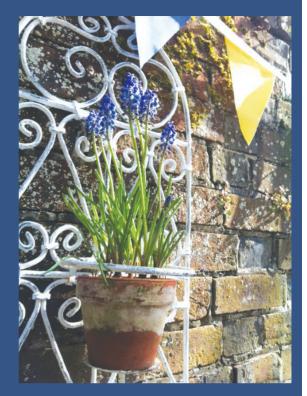

Visitors to last year's Lindfield Bonfire have helped keep youngsters in the saddle by supporting a local Riding for the Disabled Group.

Every year Bonfire Society members work hard to collect donations from those who attend the annual celebrations. All the money collected on the night is donated to local charities.

Members of the Court Meadow RDA were delighted to be among the beneficiaries this year, particularly as the group is celebrating its 40th anniversary.

Founded in 1977, Court Meadow RDA provides weekly riding lessons for children with learning difficulties who attend Woodland Meed School (previously Court Meadow School in Cuckfield and Newick House School in Burgess Hill).

The group also works with pupils from the LVS Hassocks school in Sayers Common and with pupils with special needs from mainstream schools in the area.

Sessions are run by a dedicated team of volunteers, whose roles range from getting the ponies ready, putting out equipment and leading and side walking during lessons to organising fundraising events and activities, including a visit from the Easter Bunny!

Five walks around Lindfield – let's walk them

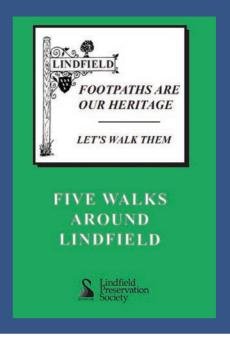
Now that spring is here the people of Lindfield, their guests and their dogs will be keen to don their walking boots and get out into the fresh air. But where can they go without having to leap into a car?

Lindfield to become a Fairtrade Village

Lindfield residents and members of All Saints Church, Chris Lee and Peter Desmond, are looking to have Lindfield accredited as a 'Fairtrade Village'. This will recognise that Lindfield is a community which thinks globally as well as locally. Support has been given by Lindfield Parish Council and the process of applying to the Fairtrade Foundation for accreditation has begun.

The Fairtrade mark means that producers of goods in developing countries are guaranteed a price to cover the costs of sustainable production. An additional premium is built into the price we pay, which allows the producer communities to invest in local infrastructure such as education and health. Fairtrade also ensures safer and ethical working conditions.

One question continues to be asked: "Should I buy local produce to

support farmers in the surrounding area or Fairtrade goods to support producers in developing countries?" In fact, it is possible to do both as most Fairtrade products don't have a local equivalent. Also, it is no longer the case that Fairtrade products are inferior quality at a more expensive price.

Several shops and cafes in Lindfield are already selling a range of Fairtrade foodstuffs and a number of organisations are using Fairtrade goods. Other nearby towns and villages are also Fairtrade accredited, including Burgess Hill, East Grinstead, and Horsham.

A stall is being organised at Village Day on Saturday 3rd June when visitors will be able to sample a range of Fairtrade products. Visit the stall and try some of the range for yourself.

"Our everyday buying decisions can make a real difference to the lives of the poorest people in the world," said Peter.

The National Farmers Union will be exploring how farming has changed over the last 50 years as well as what the future holds and, in the main ring, visitors will

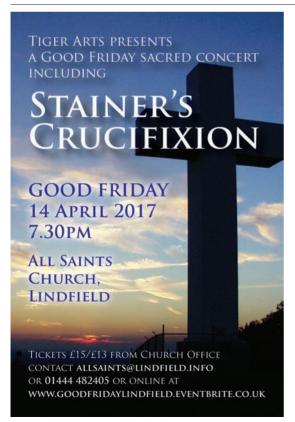
be treated to a special display of farm machinery led by Society mascot 'Bill the Tractor' - the first tractor that was purchased 50 years ago and still in use today on the showground.

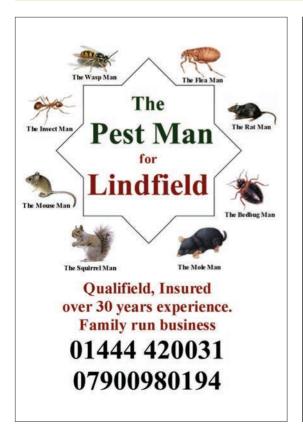

As well as the nature trail, there is also a café, children's play area and shop.



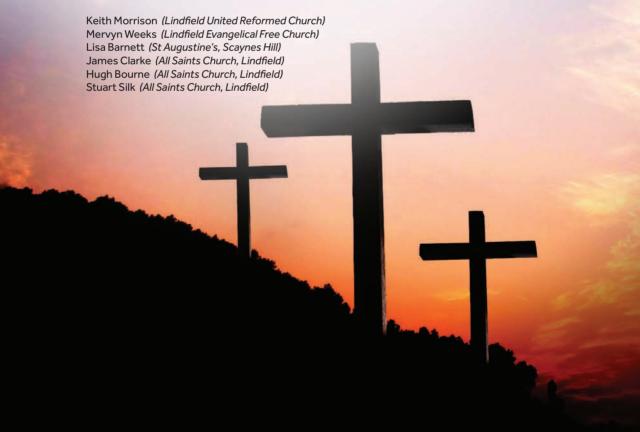


"Christmas is significant, Easter is decisive."

The mental health of students has featured in the press recently and with the exam season approaching many students are feeling the pressure to perform well... not only for their ongoing studies, university entrance requirements and other future prospects but also to live up to their parents' expectations and those of their teachers, peers and friends.

The pressure to achieve and do well in exams can result in significant and prolonged stress for all students, whether they excel in the classroom or are more challenged academically. The physiology and neuroscience associated with this exam-related pressure is the same as the stress response we see in adults, which if left unchecked, results in symptoms of exhaustion and burnout.

The brain handles stress by flooding the body with the 'Flight-Fright-Freeze' hormones. This hormone mix, or 'brain juice', gets the body ready to react to the threat, with heart-rate, breathing, blood pressure all increasing, heightened awareness with muscles readied for combat or avoidance tactics. Oxygen-rich blood is also diverted from the prefrontal cortex, the area of the brain concerned with concentration, focus and thinking, to the rear brain which looks after the breathing, heart rate, blinking etc.

This is a normal stress response and a little bit of stress can be a great motivator, but the effects of prolonged periods of mental and emotional stress have been well proven to negatively impact health and mental well-being. Students may suffer an inability to sleep, may feel isolated and lonely, be irritable and short-tempered, overeat or not eat enough, and all are classic signs of a student suffering stress. In its worst-case scenario, a student may withdraw completely, self-harm, suffer depression or even suicidal thoughts.

It's important that students understand a bit of the science behind their symptoms, this 'normalises' their experience. As an example, knowing that the prefrontal cortex is impacted during the body's stress response and that this impacts their ability to focus, concentrate and think clearly. This has a major impact on their ability to plan, revise, study and remember information with any degree of efficiency.

Being able to help the student to rebalance the hormones in their brains and create better 'brain juice', will reduce the negative impact of the stress response. This in turn will facilitate their ability to study.

As a parent or teacher there are things to consider:

- Let them understand the neuroscience...it'll make sense of a distressing situation
- Encourage them to relax and do something fun...it'll help rebalance their 'brain juice'
- Ensure they are hydrated and sleeping...it'll help their brain function
- Keep things in perspective for them...don't add to the pressure

Lindsey at the NineDot Partnership commented: "Students often need help to see the 'wood for the trees'. Giving them the tools and techniques to manage their anxiety will greatly facilitate their resilience in the classroom and enable their revision and preparation.

"Working with several schools in Surrey, Sussex and Kent, I remind the students that revision by its definition is 're' meaning again and 'vise' from the verb to see...' see it again'; that the information is already stored in the brain, the hard work is done; the knack is how to sort and retrieve it efficiently when needed. It's an anxious time for everyone involved but it can be improved with some simple steps."

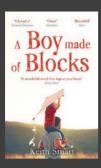

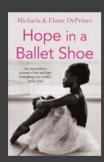

First novels are often difficult to like. This tale isn't but is a compulsive page turner which tackles two issues that are known to me: the game Minecraft and autism. Keith Stuart is the games editor at the Guardian and has used his expert knowledge of this and the fact that he is the father of an autistic boy to develop a story which is moving and compassionate about his characters. His narrator is an estate agent struggling to balance work, marriage and the needs of his son. There are a variety of other characters who add to the drama as well as a couple of plot points that give this story a rich texture. There is much here to admire and I hope that Keith Stuart is able to develop his talent even further.



Hope in a Ballet Shoe by Michaela DePrince

Exploring the history of Lindfield

The Lindfield History Project Group has kindly agreed to provide Lindfield Life with a monthly local history article.

Formed in 2004, Lindfield History Project Group is a small friendly group focused solely on uncovering the rich history of the village, its people and events. The aim is to share the findings through exhibitions, walks for adults and school children, articles, booklets and the occasional talk.

Exhibitions in the King Edward Hall have included 'Lindfield in World War II', 'Lindfield - a Sense of Place', '1911 Centenary of King Edward Hall' and 'Lindfield and the Great War'. 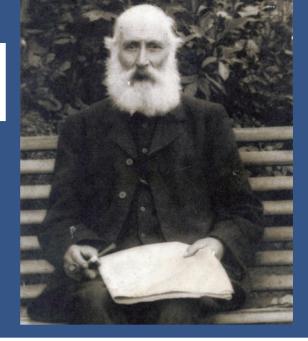

Julius Guy, inventor and local activist

LINDFIELD HISTORY

Today our cars with their independent suspension on all four wheels give a smooth ride, despite the occasional pothole and bumps in the roads. Likewise all roads have smooth hard surfaces. It was not always that way. Pity the traveller in the nineteenth century, when the roads at best were of variable quality and horse-drawn carriages gave their occupants a bumpy ride.

Elliptical springs that had traditionally been fitted to carriages in the 1800s did little to improve the ride for passengers. Julius Guy, a Lindfield carriage builder, set about finding a way to improve this crude form of suspension. In 1885, after trying various possible improvements, Julius Guy discovered that the attachment of India rubber cushion blocks to the springs considerably enhanced their performance. He patented his invention as the Climax Combination Spring.

This simple but effective device received great acclaim. His invention was exhibited at the Anglo-Danish Exhibition of 1888, where it was awarded a gold medal and diploma of honour. The Exhibitors Journal described Mr Guy's invention as 'One of the best and greatest improvements' to carriage suspension, saying 'the unpleasant jarring is considerably reduced'. It further explained 'Another advantage is that the liability of breaking either springs or axles, and the wear of the carriage is very considerably reduced; the oscillation and extra strain on other parts of the carriage is also obviated'.

Julius Guy was enrolled a Member of the Institute of British Carriage Manufacturers and his patent was taken up by very many carriage builders. It was also applied to the carriages belonging to the British Royal Family and the King of Belgium. A testimonial written by Lord Suffield, relating to the rubber blocks fitted to the carriages of Queen Victoria and the Prince of Wales, said they were 'found to very much enhance the comfort'. Praise indeed for a village coachbuilder.

Who was Julius Guy? He was born in 1831 at Chiddingly and after being apprenticed to his father, went to London and gained coach-building experience at some of the leading workshops before opening his own business. His wife's health was affected by the foul London air and he decided to move to Lindfield in 1859, acquiring the business of Mr H Packham. Julius Guy's home, workshop and yard were at the northern end of the Bent Arms, adjacent to Brushes Lane.

His business thrived, and with the introduction of the motorcar he transferred his skills from carriage building to being a motor body builder and repairer. Julius Guy was also one of the first agents for the Car and General Insurance Corporation, the insurance company that pioneered the comprehensive motor policy.

In addition to his business, Julius Guy played an active role in the life of the village, holding several roles, such as Parish Constable, Churchwarden and member of the School Board. He held a keen interest in national and local politics, and with regard to the latter was a staunch opponent of the old Lindfield Local Board (the parish council). The Board comprised eleven members and their monthly meetings were held behind closed doors, with the boast that business was completed in quarter of an hour. Every year they nominated and re-elected themselves.

Julius Guy led a group of residents in revolt against these practices and demanded open public elections. To pacify him, the Board members offered to elect him onto the Board... he declined, but which prompted him to take legal action against the Board for not conducting the elections according to the law. This resulted in the Local Lindfield Board being dissolved. As a consequence, Lindfield, for a time, lost the right of self-government and came under the jurisdiction of the Rural Authority.

Julius Guy died on 28th April 1913, aged 82.

If you've ever been on safari, you'll have heard the term 'the big five'. It refers to the five must-see animals, including the infamous African lion. While Lindfield isn't as exotic as the plains of Africa, it does have five must-see pubs, and The Red Lion, which takes pride of place in the middle of the High Street, is one of them.

Having originally been a coaching inn in 1720, this historical building has changed somewhat over the years, including a recent makeover in 2016 by its current managers, Peter and Elaine Brown.

When I first moved to Lindfield from Derbyshire, I brought my Mum down to visit the house I wanted to buy and asked for her opinion. We were both drawn to The Red Lion as our preferred place to dine and discuss the best course of action and now I know why: Peter and Elaine are originally from Leicestershire – fellow 'Midlanders'!

Once I'd heard this, I was most interested in finding out why they moved and how they met, hoping for a love story involving Peter 'pulling' Elaine over a pint. In reality their story is much cuter.

"We were childhood sweethearts," explained Peter.
"We met each other at school and have been inseparable since. We didn't get married until we moved to Lindfield.
Our ceremony took place in Haywards Heath, followed by a reception at Borde Hill, which in those days you could rent the entire property and grounds."

Peter continued: "Before relocating to Sussex we lived in Croydon, and then we worked at a pub in Bromley,

but following the arrival of our first child we wanted to move somewhere that was more suitable to families, and Lindfield was the perfect spot."

Peter and Elaine have three children and have run The Red Lion for over 20 years. Their eldest has now stepped up as Assistant Manager. While the idea of being able to hand everything over to a trusted family member sounds appealing to me, the downside is that the family can't go on holiday together as there's no one left to manage the pub.

"This year Elaine is celebrating a 'big' birthday,"
Peter told me, "and I'd like all of us to be able to go away
together. She's a nervous flyer, so it won't be anywhere
you need to catch a plane to get to, but somewhere all
five of us can relax."

Due to the busyness of The Red Lion on the day of my interview, Elaine couldn't join us, so I asked Peter questions a man can only answer honestly once he's escaped the presence of a wife or partner. Questions such as: 'who really wears the trousers?' and 'tell me honestly, who should take the glory for successfully running a pub for over 20 years?'

"Honestly? It's all Elaine. She dots the i's crosses the t's. She's the business lady. I'm the people person that gets 'hands on' out front while she keeps everything in order behind the scenes. I'd be nothing without her by my side," he replied.

I took my own wife along with me, who is currently five months pregnant, and our conversation soon turned to babies. Peter talked about the rarity of managing the



same establishment for such a long period of time and reminisced about seeing the children of his friends now become regulars.

"Most of all, I'm looking forward to grandchildren," he remarked. "My boys are at the age where they're independent of me, and my daughter is quickly growing into a young lady. It all goes too fast. There's so much you want to do and achieve but, before you know it, that chance has past. I have no regrets, but I can't wait to experience having young family around me again."

"I've always been a family man," Peter added. "We work till the early evening on Christmas Day, but I still always host a party for close friends and relatives so we can spend some quality time together."

As I sat across the table in what used to be the stable block, which is now a stylish and well converted dining room that still gives you a good sense of what it used to be, I was interested to find out more about the history of the place. Peter explained that behind The Stand Up Inn there used to be a brewery, of which elements were powered by horses. In an effort to preserve part of this, some local historical societies got together and The Red Lion donated some land in their beer garden to reconstruct the horse gin house. In case you were wondering (I was), a horse gin house is actually to do with water, not the spirit.

Whilst talking of history, I asked Peter about his career and ambitions.

"I've always worked in the hospitality sector," explained Peter, "having originally wanted to join the Navy when I was sixteen. Though between my birthday and enrolling I discovered pubs and going out and my social life became too important to leave behind. The

Falkland's War hit soon after and the thought of actually fighting became very daunting, I just wanted to travel and see the world, so it wouldn't have been the right choice."

Peter loves events and being part of the community. The team are currently getting ready for summer, with hopes of hosting a party in their aforementioned beer garden as soon as the weather allows. It's often said when it comes to great ideas for events, that the best are stolen, and Peter agreed. "I can't face a wall when we go to a different venue," he said. "I drive my wife insane otherwise as I just want to see what they're doing, how they work, what they've got on display, and try to picture the things I like at my own place."

When Peter's not running a pub or thinking of ideas for events, he likes to play golf, is an avid supporter of Leicester City and manages the football club Sporting Lindfield FC.

My last question for Peter was: "If you were to give any advice to an aspiring pub owner, what would it be?"

"Think really carefully about it," he said. "Running a place like this is a lifestyle choice, it's not a job. I live upstairs, people are always getting hold of you, and there's no separation between life at home and life at the pub. While Elaine and I love it, and we make our relationship work, it wouldn't be something for everyone."

Finally he remarked: "The most important thing for me is to treat everyone the same and with respect. If you respect people, they respect you back. It's that philosophy that brings people back time and time again."

'When so much is in turbulence beyond our front doors, there is a sense that only here, at home, can we effect change on our own terms.'

When I read these words, written by Michelle Ogundehin, Editor-in-Chief for Elle Decoration, I instantly identified with what she was saving. In my twenties, after a failed relationship, I recall rearranging the furniture in my flat and repainting the walls; that was me, effecting change on my own terms. If, when all else around us feels uncertain and redecorating makes us feel more in control, I wonder what the colours we gravitate towards say about us and our need for comfort? I wonder whether it brings out our true colour preferences. What I mean by this is that we all relate to colour in different ways and love or loathe a certain hue for varied reasons, some at a conscious level, others subconsciously. In addition we can all be classified in terms of seasons. Most of us are a combination of two, the primary dictating the colours that suit us most, complement our natural colouring and the secondary season reflecting our style and key personality traits. In the world of personal colour consulting you will engage the services of an expert who will drape you in various coloured scarves to ascertain which season you are most allied to. People working in this field will describe clients who will tell them that they definitely suit black. Interestingly only a true winter personality suits black. Someone who is pure winter will suit cool hues such as pistachio green and ice blue. Magenta will not overpower them and they will suit the very dark and cold end of the spectrum and, at its extreme, black. The archetypal power dressed look is winter: it means business, it's dramatic and luxurious. Victoria Beckham is a good example of a true winter with her angular features and natural affinity with black. The reality is that very few of us Brits are a true winter. Many non winter women dress themselves in winter colours, subconsciously channelling the persona they would like the world to see them as.

The same principle can apply to interiors. We all feel happier in living environments which resonate with our seasonal personality. I can ask a client many questions, encourage them to curate a library of images from Houzz or Pinterest, ask them to show me favoured pieces of art and so forth, all in the quest to nail this. Interestingly there have been occasions when a client will explain that they like a certain look but then on closer probing I will establish a lack of congruence between this and what their answers to other questions tell me. Some (and definitely not all) will compromise their innate style for the aesthetic they feel they should have or to please a partner. I then wonder whether the true season comes out in all of us when it comes to decorating our homes in times of change or uncertainty. I am an autumn primary and a summer secondary which means that the colours I am naturally drawn to sit in the autumn palette but I prefer elegance in interiors which is very much a summer trait. My sitting room is completely autumn in colour - warm aubergines and F&B Archive on the walls. My dining room used to be similarly toned, yet on a mission for change I opted for greys. It's never worked for me and still grates. To be fair, our dining room serves a multitude of purposes, including HomeSmiths goods in and design board production, so it's a way from my perfect dinner party setting, yet the main issue is probably down to the fact that grey is not an autumn hue. Salmon au Gratin (Serves 6)

Thickly slice 8-12 very slender leeks (amount depends on thickness of leeks) and cook in a knob of butter until just soft but not browned. Add the finely grated rind of two large unwaxed lemons and spoon into a shallow baking dish. Place six salmon fillets on top and sprinkle with a generous handful of small prawns. (Cover and refrigerate if making ahead)

Preheat the oven 160°. Stir 100g finely grated Gruyere cheese into 450ml double cream or crème fraiche (or add to 300ml white sauce) and spoon over the fish. Cover with a generous layer of buttered fresh breadcrumbs and bake for 30 min or until golden brown.

New Seasons Asparagus (Serves 6)

Trim and cut 450g English asparagus into 2.5cm pieces, putting the tips to one side. Tip stem pieces into a large shallow dish and add 150ml vegetable stock. Cover and microwave HIGH for about four minutes until almost tender. Stir in the tips, recover and cook one minute. Just before serving toss with 150g crumbled Feta cheese and season to taste. Serve immediately topped with toasted pine nuts.

Easter is often the first time families get together since the Christmas festivities, so we need menu suggestions suitable for all age groups and that don't require hours in the kitchen and lots of last minute fiddling. See if my suggestions fit the bill. The fish dish can be assembled ahead and if not suitable for the whole family slip some bread-crumbed fish portions or fish fingers in the oven at the same time. I have omitted a starter and instead finish the meal with a leisurely course of cheese, biscuits, fruit and Easter eggs!

Menu: Salmon au Gratin

New Seasons Asparagus Oven Roasted Baby Potatoes Creamy Broad Beans Triple Strawberry Whip Berries in Citrus Syrup

Oven Roasted Baby Potatoes (Serves 6)

Tip 900g washed and dried new season's potatoes into a shallow baking tin large enough to hold them in a single layer. Add 1-2tbs olive oil and shake to coat the potatoes. Sprinkle with coarse seasalt and roast until just tender – about 40 min.

Creamy Broad Beans (Serves 6)

Cook 450g (or more if wished)new season's broad beans with a little water until JUST tender. Drain and return to the pan. Stir in 4tbs double cream, salt and pepper and a good handful of chopped chives. Heat until just bubbling.

Triple Strawberry Whip (Serves 6)

Dissolve a strawberry jelly tablet in 450ml water and chill until just setting. Whisk two eggwhites with 3tbs caster sugar until smooth and glossy. Whisk the jelly until frothy then fold into the eggwhites with 150ml carton strawberry yogurt. Crush 150g ripe strawberries and lightly fold in. Spoon into individual glasses and chill. Top with whole strawberries.

Fruits in Citrus Syrup (Serves 6)

Pile 675g prepared strawberries and raspberries into a shallow glass bowl. Sprinkle with 4tbs fresh lemon or orange juice and 4tbs caster sugar. Let stand for about 30 min by which time a tangy light syrup will have formed. Serve with scoops of vanilla icecream or fruit sorbet.







Sussex group aims to get kids outside

What's your favourite memory of playing outside as a child? Chances are (depending on your age!) you might remember climbing trees, building dens, making mud pies, daisy chains or perfume from flowers and playing outdoors for hours at a time.

Children's play today is very different - increased traffic, fears about safety, parents having to work longer hours and advances in technology have all led to children spending far less time outside playing than they did in previous generations.

But local group Nature Nurture Sussex aims to change all that. The group is working to encourage children and their families to get outside more. "Our aim is to get more children playing and learning outside all year round, enjoying the countryside, seeing and feeling the changes in the seasons and developing a love of nature," says founder Suzanne Mark

Nature Nurture Sussex was set up with some initial grant funding by West Sussex County Council and the West Sussex Social Enterprise Network. The group currently works with preschool and primary aged children in Mid Sussex and has been running sessions for the last 18 months but is now looking for a site to establish an outdoor preschool or 'Forest Kindergarten'.

Inspired by the Scandinavian way of doing things, where young children spend the majority of their time outside, as well as the growth of outdoor nurseries and Forest Schools across the UK, Nature Nurture Sussex wants to find a site with lots of open space for children to run around in and explore, and nearby woodland for them to climb, dig, hunt for bugs, jump in puddles, make shelters, play with sticks & mud, learn about plants and wildlife and develop their skills and confidence. "As long as the children are wearing enough layers and the right clothes to stay warm and dry, they can stay active and have fun outdoors," says Suzanne.

Though a building would be a bonus, it's not essential. "We can put up a yurt or bell tent to provide a cosy shelter for children. The main thing is lots of outdoor

space with some woodland nearby and good access," Suzanne added.

Lindfield Parish Council commented: "We've had quite a few complaints about this matter, which have duly been reported on to Mid Sussex District Council."

MSDC own and manage the common and are responsible for any ongoing maintenance – but the Parish Council do try and hold them to account where necessary.

In an email to MSDC, Lindfield Parish Council said: 'Is there any way MSDC could consider increasing the collection rates of these bins? As you may know, the bins on the common are heavily used, and the situation also reflects, in my view, the increase in population (and dog owners) thanks to the ever increasing number of housing developments nearby! Perhaps MSDC planners should try and seek substantial s.106 contributions to help cover the costs of this.'

Dog owners are asked to assist by not adding to the pile on the floor when the bins are full.

Making the right connection with the turf

TEEING OFF

There are plenty of times on the golf course when you want to hit the ground as well as the ball, so what do you need to do to make sure you make the right contact with the ground?

Well firstly we need to understand the different ball positions for each club. Put the ball too far back and you will get steep, whereas putting the ball too far forward means you will get shallow.

A 7/8 iron is played from the middle of the stance with woods and hybrid more forward to the driver (this should have no divot) which should be in line with your front foot's heel. Shorter irons can be played from just back of middle.

This has a big impact on the angle your club approaches the ball. If you approach the ball from a very steep angle then you will get a very deep and short divot. If you approach the ball from a very shallow angle then your divot will be too long and thin. The ideal divot should be around the size of a business card.

A big divot could also be caused by you decelerating at impact. Your club will not have enough speed to travel through the ground and likely get stuck.

Don't be afraid to take a divot, it won't hurt. Modern clubs absorb the shock at impact, meaning all you will feel is the nice contact of the ball with the club. Try taking a divot next time you are out and see what results you get.

Spring has finally arrived and the garden continues to wake from its winter slumber. A little work now will save you lots of work in the long run. My top tip for this time of year is to keep on top of any perennial weeds that have reared their heads. If you can prevent them from flowering you'll be ahead of the game in trying to stop their spread. Some weeds have a life cycle as short as six weeks, so if they manage to flower and run to seed you'll be playing catch up!

With the weeds tackled, my second tip is to look at your soil before it dries out over the summer. If you have heavy clay soil you may benefit from digging a 5cm layer of washed pea shingle into the top 40cm of soil, together with a similar amount of organic matter (well rotted manure or spent mushroom compost are ideal) which will restore nutrients that the winter rains may have washed away while adding much needed drainage to prevent heavy rain from water-logging your plants. Once this is done, or if you're lucky enough to have soil that's been worked by previous gardeners, then you need not do it again in the future. Next I'd recommend adding a yearly mulch. A mulch is simply a layer on top of the soil, about 5cm deep, that is intended to keep weeds at bay by preventing sunlight from reaching them and it helps to keep the soil from drying out completely in the summer months, reducing the need to water so

often. A mulch might be a layer of organic matter or something more decorative, such as bark or coloured gravel. Organic options will be taken down into the soil by our friendly earthworms and continue to improve the nutrients in the soil for some time to come. With the soil sorted out, your plants will benefit from improved vigour and less competition from weeds.

My favourite tulip bulbs come into flower at the end of this month. I'm spoilt for choice between 'Survivor' with its upright stem and mid-pink flower head, 'Ballerina' with its orange, fragrant, fluted petals and 'Black Parrot' with its moody dark purple-plum wavy-edged petals. If you missed planting bulbs in the autumn you'll be able to find some ready-potted at the local garden centre, but do put a note in your diary to buy some more in the autumn for a fabulous display next year. I'd love to hear about your favourite bulbs - please write to me via Lindfield Life if you'd like to share your favourites and if you have photos of your spring garden we'd all love to see them!

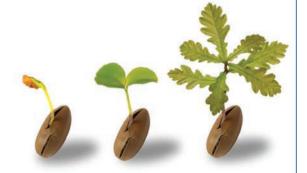
